Re: Hatfield McCoy Regional Recreation Authority

Dear Mr. President and Mr. Speaker:

The Post Audit Division is currently conducting an audit of the Hatfield McCoy Regional Recreation Authority as a spending unit of state government. In our letter to the sub-committee on November 18<sup>th</sup> 2014, it was determined by Attorneys with Legislative Services that HMRRA is indeed a state agency and should be operating as such.

Although this review is ongoing, we have found several areas in which this Authority has consistently ignored state law regarding the handling and use of public funds. In short, the Authority has conducted its business as if these laws do not apply to that organization.

## **SUMMARY**

We have made these determinations regarding the Hatfield McCoy Regional Recreation Authority (HMRRA):

HMRRA has received over eight million in State and Federal funding since 2010;

- HMRRA violated Article 6, Section 38 of the WV State Constitution and awarded bonuses to full time employees. Bonuses budgeted to employees in 2013 alone totaled over eighty-nine thousand dollars;
- The Post Audit Division has received information bringing into question the propriety of some of the employment practices of HMRRA. There has been no avenue for independent review of these claims. Since HMRRA is a state agency, the state grievance procedure applies and the Public Employees Grievance Board is a proper forum for resolution of employee allegations.
  - HMRRA has procured almost ten million dollars in purchases since 2001 that, under state purchasing laws, should have been processed through the WV Purchasing Division.

#### **DETAIL**

These determinations are based upon the following information, including records of HMRRA's purchases and expenditures, as well as statutory and constitutional authorities.

### 1. HMRRA Has Received Over \$8.3 million in Federal and State Funds Since 2010

HMRRA's revenue mainly consists of a combination of revenues from federal sources, state sources, various grants, sales from merchandise, and sales from permits (permits in which riders pay to ride the trails). HMRRA classifies all moneys received as revenue. Over the past five years, HMRRA has collected over \$18 million of revenue, from various sources. This, accompanied with inadequate documentation in the QuickBooks accounting software HMRRA uses to account for operations, makes it impossible to identify state money from federal moneys or revenues from sales and operations once it is placed in HMRRA's bank account. This issue is further complicated by HMRRA not being a spending unit in WV OASIS or WV FIMS.

# 2. HMRRA Awarded \$220,547 in Payroll Bonuses to Full Time Employees (2011 – 2013)

HMRRA has bypassed state law by awarding full time employees bonuses. These bonuses are compiled from "Operating Revenues" for the year. This Operating Revenue includes all money received by HMRRA, including grant money, federal money, and state money. This equates to HMRRA awarding employees bonuses based from, in part, by state and federal moneys received during the year.

The following tables display the amount of pay budgeted for HMRRA employees as well as their bonuses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, 2012, and 2013:

#### 3. HMRRA Should Be Subject to State Grievance Laws

The Post Audit Division has received information bringing into question the propriety of some of the employment practices of HMRRA. This information includes allegations of discriminatory treatment of similarly-situated employees, favoritism based upon personal relationships, and disciplinary action without an appeal, including at least three employee terminations. Since it is outside the scope of the Division's review, the Post Audit Division has not attempted to determine the actual facts of these situations.

In a letter to the Subcommittee on November 18, 2014, it was determined that HMRRA is a state agency. Therefore, according to Legislative Services attorneys HMRRA and its employees would be subject to the state grievance procedure for public employees. If HMRRA were not to participate in this process, then the only forum available for the resolution of employees would be civil actions in Circuit Court. Such actions tend to be more lengthy and more expensive. In some circumstances, there would be the possibility of an award of punitive damages that is not contemplated by the state Grievance Procedure.

Ultimately, the resolution of HMRRA employee grievances, including whether the Grievance Board has jurisdiction to decide the claims, must be left to the Public Employees Grievance Board.

# 4. HMRRA Made Almost \$10 million of Purchases in its History That May Have Fallen Under State Purchasing

The state purchasing law set forth in the West Virginia State Purchasing Division Handbook, Section 3.2, states that

Amounts spent with vendors are viewed comprehensively. State agencies should continuously monitor their expenditures with vendors to ensure that the total amount spent with a given vendor, within any 12-month period, does not exceed a bid threshold without the proper level of documentation and bidding. Agencies must indicate "not to exceed" an amount of \$25,000, which will allow the State Auditor's Office to determine if the involvement of the Purchasing Division and Attorney General's Office is required

Since 2001, HMRRA has entered into multiple purchases that may fall under the Purchasing Division's authority. A total of almost \$10 million of expenditures and purchases may have been processed under the WV Purchasing Division. Instead, HMRRA was the sole overseer of these transactions.

The \$10 million dollars in purchases and expenditures subsequently have been subject to possibly less stringent controls than would have been imposed had they been overseen by the WV State Purchasing Division. This has the potential to increase risk of improper contract monitoring, prevention of inner dealings on purchases and contracts, inadequate bidding processes, and lack of proper record keeping procedures.

The following table is a detailed list compiled from information provided to us by HMRRA, of the transactions we have identified as falling under the authority of WV State Purchasing Division Handbook, Section 3.2 and may have subsequently been processed by the WV State Purchasing Division:
