AN ACT to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new section, designated §18B-3C-7a; and to amend and reenact §18B-3C-8 of said code, all relating to community and technical colleges; name changes for certain community and technical colleges; and modifying the location requirement for certain community and technical college headquarters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a new section, designated §18B-3C-7a; and that §18B-3C-8 of said code be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:

ARTICLE 3C. COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGE SYSTEM.

§18B-3C-7a. Bridgemont Community and Technical College; Kanawha Valley Community and Technical College; Mountwest Community and Technical College. (a) The Community and Technical College at West
 Virginia University Institute of Technology is hereafter
 named "Bridgemont Community and Technical College".
 Any reference in this code to the Community and Techni cal College at West Virginia University Institute of
 Technology means Bridgemont Community and Technical
 College.

8 (b) Marshall Community and Technical College is
9 hereafter named "Mountwest Community and Technical
10 College". Any reference in this code to Marshall Commu11 nity and Technical College means Mountwest Community
12 and Technical College.

13 (c) West Virginia State Community and Technical
14 College is hereafter named "Kanawha Valley Community
15 and Technical College". Any reference in this code to
16 West Virginia State Community and Technical College
17 means Kanawha Valley Community and Technical College
18 lege.

§18B-3C-8. Legislative findings and intent; statewide network of independently accredited community and technical colleges; operations and administration.

1 (a) Legislative findings. –

(1) The Legislature has enacted legislation, beginning
with Enrolled Senate Bill No. 653, passed during the two
thousand regular session, and continuing with Enrolled
Senate Bill No. 703, passed during the two thousand one
regular session, Enrolled House Bill No. 2224, passed
during the two thousand three regular session, and
Enrolled Senate Bill No. 448, passed during the two
thousand four regular session, the purpose of which is to
strengthen the state's community and technical colleges,
clarify their core mission and establish essential conditions to be met, and ensure the most effective delivery of

13 services to business, industry, and West Virginia citizens14 in every region of the state.

(2) The primary goal of the Legislature is to create a
statewide network of independently accredited community
and technical colleges that focuses on technical education,
work force training, and lifelong learning for the Twentyfirst Century, consistent with the goals, objectives, priorities and essential conditions established in articles one,
one-d and three-c of this chapter.

(3) A necessary precedent to accomplishing the legislative goal is to change the way that leaders at all levels of education, including institutional governing boards, view community and technical colleges. Specifically, that the mission of community and technical colleges is different from that of traditional four-year colleges in what they seek to accomplish and how they can achieve it effectively and that the state can not compete successfully in today's information-driven, technology-based economy if community and technical colleges continue to be viewed as addons or afterthoughts attached to the baccalaureate institutions.

34 (b) Legislative intent. –

(1) Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature that the
statewide network of independently-accredited community and technical colleges as a whole and each independent community and technical college individually provide
the following types of services as part of the core institutional mission:

41 (A) Career and technical education certificate, associate
42 of applied science, and selected associate of science degree
43 programs for students seeking immediate employment,
44 individual entrepreneurship skills, occupational develop45 ment, skill enhancement and career mobility;

(B) Transfer education associate of arts and associate of
science degree programs for students whose educational
goal is to transfer into a baccalaureate degree program
with particular emphasis on reaching beyond traditional
college-age students to unserved or underserved adult
populations;

(C) Developmental/remedial education courses, tutorials,
skills development labs, and other services for students
who need to improve their skills in mathematics, English,
reading, study skills, computers and other basic skill areas;

56 (D) Work force development education contracted with57 business and industry to train or retrain employees;

58 (E) Continuing development assistance and education 59 credit and noncredit courses for professional and self-60 development, certification and licensure, and literacy 61 training; and

(F) Community service workshops, lectures, seminars,
clinics, concerts, theatrical performances and other
noncredit activities to meet the cultural, civic and personal
interests and needs of the community the institution
serves.

67 (2) It is further the intent of the Legislature that each
68 community and technical college focus special attention
69 on programmatic delivery of their core mission services to
70 unserved and underserved populations to achieve estab71 lished state objectives. These include the following as
72 highest priorities:

(A) Increasing the number of adults age twenty-five andabove who participate in post-secondary education;

(B) Developing technical programs that meet the docu-mented occupational needs of West Virginia's employers;

(C) Providing work force development programs byimplementing the Adult Career Pathways Model, whichprovides opportunities for the following:

(i) Adults to earn certifications through the completionof skill-sets;

(ii) Ordered progression from skill-sets and certifications
to one-year certificate programs and progression from
one-year certificate degrees to Associate of Applied
Science Degree programs, and

(iii) Students to exit at any stage of completion in order
to enter employment with the option of continuing the
pathway progression at a later time and/or on a part-time
basis.

90 (D) Offering programs in various time frames other than
91 the traditional semester delivery model and at different
92 locations, including work sites, convenient to working
93 adults;

94 (E) Providing technical programs in modules or 95 "chunks", defined in competencies required for employ-96 ment, and tied to certification and licensing requirements.

97 (F) Entering into collaborative programs that recognize
98 high-quality training programs provided through labor
99 unions, registered apprenticeships, and industry-spon100 sored training programs with the goal of enabling more
101 adults to earn a college credential;

102 (G) Developing innovative approaches to improve the
103 basic and functionalliteracy rates of West Virginians in all
104 regions of the state;

(H) Developing "bridge programs" for disadvantaged
youth and adults to enable them to acquire the skills
necessary to be successful in education and training
programs that lead to high-skills, high-wage jobs; and

(I) Providing access to post-secondary education throughthe delivery of developmental education for those individ-

111 uals academically under-prepared for college-level work.

(c) In fulfillment of the purposes and intent defined in subsections (a) and (b) of this section, there is continued a statewide network of independently accredited community and technical colleges serving every region of the state. Each free-standing and independent community and technical college is strongly encouraged to serve as a higher education center for its region by brokering with other colleges, universities and providers, in-state and outof-state, both public and private, to afford the most coordinated access to needed programs and services by students, employers and other clients, to achieve the goals, objectives, and essential conditions established in articles one, one-d, and three-c of this chapter, and to ensure the most efficient use of scarce resources.

126 (d) Statewide network of independently accredited 127 community and technical colleges. –

128 (1) By July 1, 2009, each governing board of a commu-129 nity and technical college which became independent on 130 July 1, 2008, shall make a determination by majority vote 131 of the board whether to keep the current name for its 132 respective institution or to select a new name. If a govern-133 ing board chooses to select a new name, any reference in 134 this code to that institution by a name in use prior to July 135 1, 2009, means the institution under the name designated 136 by its board of governors.

137 (2) The statewide network of independently accredited
138 community and technical colleges is comprised of the
139 following independent state institutions of higher educa140 tion under the jurisdiction of the council:

141 (A) Blue Ridge Community and Technical College. –

142 Blue Ridge Community and Technical College is an 143 independently accredited state institution of higher 144 education. The president and the governing board of the 145 community and technical college are responsible for 146 maintaining independent accreditation and adhering to 147 the essential conditions pursuant to section three of this 148 article.

149 (B) Bridgemont Community and Technical College. -

(i) Bridgemont Community and Technical College is an
independently accredited state institution of higher
education which may maintain an association with West
Virginia University Institute of Technology, a division of
West Virginia University, or directly with West Virginia
University, subject to the provisions of section twelve of
this article. The president and the governing board of the
community and technical college are responsible for
maintaining independent accreditation and adhering to
the essential conditions pursuant to section three of this
article.

161 (ii) West Virginia University Institute of Technology may 162 continue associate degree programs in areas of particular 163 institutional strength which are closely articulated to its 164 baccalaureate programs and missions or which are of a 165 high-cost nature and can best be provided in direct 166 coordination with a baccalaureate institution. Any such 167 program shall be delivered under the authority of the 168 council and through contract with the community and 169 technical college. The terms of the contract shall be 170 negotiated between the governing boards of the commu-171 nity and technical college and West Virginia University 172 Institute of Technology or directly with West Virginia 173 University, as appropriate. The final contract may not be 174 implemented until approved by the council except that 175 any contract between the community and technical college 176 and West Virginia University Institute of Technology or

177 West Virginia University related to program delivery 178 under the terms of this section in effect on July 1, 2008, 179 shall continue in effect until July 1, 2009, unless amended 180 or revoked before that date by mutual agreement of the 181 contract parties with approval by the council. Such a 182 program shall be evaluated according to the benchmarks 183 and indicators for community and technical college 184 education developed by the council. If the council deter-185 mines that the program is making insufficient progress 186 toward accomplishing the benchmarks, the program shall 187 thereafter be delivered by the community and technical 188 college.

189 (iii) Dual credit course delivery agreements. –

(I) Nothing in this article alters or abrogates any agreement in place on the effective date of this section between
West Virginia University Institute of Technology and
Bridgemont Community and Technical College relating to
delivery of dual credit courses as defined in section two,
article one of this chapter;

196 (II) The community and technical college may deliver
197 technical courses that are part of a certificate or associate
198 degree program as early entrance or dual credit courses for
199 high school students; and

(III) Subject to an agreement between the baccalaureate
institution and the community and technical college, the
latter may deliver early entrance and dual credit courses
as defined in section two, article one of this chapter to
students in high schools which are not served by the
baccalaureate institution.

206 (C) Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical 207 College. –

208 Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College209 is a free-standing state institution of higher education

210 seeking independent accreditation. The president and the
211 governing board of Eastern Community and Technical
212 College are responsible for achieving independent accredi213 tation and adhering to the essential conditions pursuant to
214 section three of this article.

215 (D) Mountwest Community and Technical College. –

(i) Mountwest Community and Technical College is an
independently accredited state institution of higher
education which may maintain an association with
Marshall University subject to the provisions of section
twelve of this article. The president and the governing
board of the community and technical college are responsible for maintaining independent accreditation and
adhering to the essential conditions pursuant to section
three of this article.

225(ii) Marshall University may continue associate degree 226 programs in areas of particular institutional strength 227which are closely articulated to its baccalaureate pro-228 grams and missions or which are of a high-cost nature and 229 can best be provided in direct coordination with a bacca-230 laureate institution. Any such program shall be delivered 231 under the authority of the council and through contract 232with Mountwest Community and Technical College. The 233 terms of the contract shall be negotiated between the 234 governing boards of the community and technical college and Marshall University. The final contract may not be 235236 implemented until approved by the council except that 237 any contract between the community and technical college 238 and Marshall University related to program delivery under 239 the terms of this section in effect on July 1, 2008, shall 240 continue in effect until July 1, 2009, unless amended or 241 revoked before that date by mutual agreement of the 242 contract parties with approval by the council. Such a 243 program shall be evaluated according to the benchmarks 244 and indicators for community and technical college

education developed by the council. If the council determines that the program is making insufficient progress
toward accomplishing the benchmarks, the program shall
thereafter be delivered by Mountwest Community and
Technical College.

250 (iii) Dual credit course delivery agreements. –

(I) Nothing in this article alters or abrogates any agreement in place on the effective date of this section between
Marshall University and Mountwest Community and
Technical College relating to delivery of dual credit
courses as defined in section two, article one of this
chapter;

(II) The community and technical college may deliver
technical courses that are part of a certificate or associate
degree program as early entrance or dual credit courses for
high school students; and

261 (III) Subject to an agreement between the baccalaureate
262 institution and the community and technical college, the
263 latter may deliver early entrance and dual credit courses
264 as defined in section two, article one of this chapter to
265 students in high schools which are not served by the
266 baccalaureate institution.

267 (E) New River Community and Technical College. -

(i) New River Community and Technical College is an
independently accredited state institution of higher
education which may maintain an association with
Bluefield State College subject to the provisions of section
twelve of this article. The community and technical
college is headquartered in or near Beckley and incorporates the campuses of Greenbrier Community College
Center of New River Community and Technical College
and Nicholas Community College Center of New River
Community and Technical College.

(ii) The president and the governing board of New River
Community and Technical College are responsible for
maintaining independent accreditation and adhering to
the essential conditions pursuant to section three of this
article.

283(iii) Bluefield State College may continue associate 284 degree programs in areas of particular institutional strength which are closely articulated to its baccalaureate 285 programs and missions or which are of a high-cost nature 286 287 and can best be provided through direct coordination with 288 a baccalaureate institution. Any such program shall be 289 delivered under the authority of the council and through 290 contract with the community and technical college. The 291 terms of the contract shall be negotiated between the 292 governing boards of the community and technical college 293 and Bluefield State College. The final contract may not be 294 implemented until approved by the council except that 295 any contract between the community and technical college 296 and Bluefield State College related to program delivery 297 under the terms of this section in effect on the July 1, 2008, 298 shall continue in effect until July 1, 2009, unless amended 299 or revoked before that date by mutual agreement of the 300 contract parties with approval by the council. Such a 301 program shall be evaluated according to the benchmarks 302 and indicators for community and technical college 303 education developed by the council. If the council deter-304 mines that the program is making insufficient progress 305 toward accomplishing the benchmarks, the program shall 306 thereafter be delivered by New River Community and 307 Technical College.

(iv) Bluefield State College may continue the associate
of science degree in nursing which is an existing nationally
accredited associate degree program in an area of particular institutional strength and which is closely articulated
to the baccalaureate program and mission. The program
is of a high-cost nature and can best be provided through

direct administration by a baccalaureate institution. This
program may not be transferred to New River Community
and Technical College or any other community and
technical college as long as the program maintains national accreditation and is seamlessly coordinated into the
baccalaureate program at the institution.

(v) New River Community and Technical College participates in the planning and development of a unified effort
involving multiple providers to meet the documented
education and work force development needs in the region.
Nothing in this subdivision prohibits or limits any existing, or the continuation of any existing, affiliation between Mountain State University, West Virginia University Institute of Technology and West Virginia University.
The objective is to assure students and employers in the
area that there is coordination and efficient use of resources among the separate programs and facilities,
existing and planned, in the Beckley area.

332 (F) Pierpont Community and Technical College. -

(i) Pierpont Community and Technical College is an
independent state institution of higher education seeking
independent accreditation. The president and the governing board of Pierpont Community and Technical College,
assisted by the president and governing board of Fairmont
State University, are responsible for the community and
technical college achieving independent accreditation and
adhering to the essential conditions pursuant to sections
three and thirteen of this article.

(ii) Fairmont State University may continue associate
degree programs in areas of particular institutional
strength which are closely articulated to their baccalaureate programs and missions or which are of a high-cost
nature and can best be provided in direct coordination
with a baccalaureate institution. Any such program shall
be delivered under the authority of the council and

349 through contract with the community and technical 350 college. The terms of the contract shall be negotiated 351 between the council and the governing board of Fairmont 352 State University. The final contract may not be imple-353 mented until approved by the council except that any 354 contract between the community and technical college and 355 Fairmont State University related to program delivery 356 under the terms of this section in effect on July 1, 2008, 357 shall continue in effect until July 1, 2009, unless amended 358 or revoked before that date by mutual agreement of the 359 contract parties with approval by the council. Such a 360 program shall be evaluated according to the benchmarks 361 and indicators for community and technical college 362 education developed by the council. Such a program shall 363 be evaluated according to the benchmarks and indicators 364 for community and technical college education developed 365 by the council. If the council determines that the program 366 is making insufficient progress toward accomplishing the 367 benchmarks, the program shall thereafter be delivered by 368 the community and technical college.

369 (iii) Dual credit course delivery agreements. -

(I) Nothing in this article alters or abrogates any agreement in place on the effective date of this section between
Fairmont State University and Pierpont Community and
Technical College relating to delivery of dual credit
courses as defined in section two, article one of this
chapter;

(II) The community and technical college may deliver
technical courses that are part of a certificate or associate
degree program as early entrance or dual credit courses for
high school students; and

(III) Subject to an agreement between the baccalaureate
institution and the community and technical college, the
latter may deliver early entrance and dual credit courses
as defined in section two, article one of this chapter to

384 students in high schools which are not served by the 385 baccalaureate institution.

386 (G) Southern West Virginia Community and Technical
387 College. – Southern West Virginia Community and
388 Technical College is an independently-accredited, free389 standing state institution of higher education. The
390 president and the governing board of Southern West
391 Virginia Community and Technical College are responsible
392 for maintaining independent accreditation and adhering
393 to the essential conditions pursuant to section three of this
394 article.

(H) West Virginia Northern Community and Technical
College. – West Virginia Northern Community and
Technical College is an independently-accredited, freestanding state institution of higher education. The
president and the governing board of the community and
technical college are responsible for maintaining independent accreditation and adhering to the essential
conditions pursuant to section three of this article.

403 (I) Kanawha Valley Community and Technical 404 College. –

405 (i) Kanawha Valley State Community and Technical 406 College is an independently accredited state institution of 407 higher education which may maintain an association with 408 West Virginia State University subject to the provisions of 409 section twelve of this article. The president and the 410 governing board of the community and technical college 411 are responsible for maintaining independent accreditation 412 and adhering to the essential conditions pursuant to 413 section three of this article.

(ii) West Virginia State University may continue associate degree programs in areas of particular institutional
strength which are closely articulated to its baccalaureate
programs and missions or which are of a high-cost nature

418 and can best be provided in direct coordination with a 419 baccalaureate institution. Any such program shall be 420 delivered under the authority of the council and through 421 contract with the community and technical college. The 422 terms of the contract shall be negotiated between the 423 governing boards of the community and technical college 424 and West Virginia State University. The final contract 425 may not be implemented until approved by the council 426 except that any contract between the community and 427 technical college and West Virginia State University 428 related to program delivery under the terms of this section 429 in effect on July 1, 2008, shall continue in effect until July 430 1, 2009, unless amended or revoked before that date by 431 mutual agreement of the contract parties with approval by 432 the council. Such a program shall be evaluated according 433 to the benchmarks and indicators for community and 434 technical college education developed by the council. If 435 the council determines that the program is making insuffi-436 cient progress toward accomplishing the benchmarks, the 437 program shall thereafter be delivered by the community 438 and technical college.

439 (iii) Dual credit course delivery agreements. –

(I) Nothing in this article alters or abrogates any agreement in place on the effective date of this section between
West Virginia State University and Kanawha Valley
Community and Technical College relating to delivery of
dual credit courses as defined in section two, article one of
this chapter;

(II) The community and technical college may deliver
technical courses that are part of a certificate or associate
degree program as early entrance or dual credit courses for
high school students; and

(III) Subject to an agreement between the baccalaureate
institution and the community and technical college, the
latter may deliver early entrance and dual credit courses

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453 as defined in section two, article one of this chapter to 454 students in high schools which are not served by the 455 baccalaureate institution.

456 (J) West Virginia University at Parkersburg. -

(i) West Virginia University at Parkersburg is an independently accredited state institution of higher education
which may maintain an association with West Virginia
University subject to the provisions of section twelve of
this article. The president and the governing board of the
community and technical college are responsible for
maintaining independent accreditation and adhering to
the essential conditions pursuant to section three of this
article.

466 (ii) Any contract between the community and technical
467 college and West Virginia University related to program
468 delivery under the authority of the council or related to
469 delivery of baccalaureate programs, in effect on July 1,
470 2008, shall continue in effect unless amended or revoked
471 by mutual agreement of the contract parties with approval
472 by the council.

(iii) In recognition of the unique and essential part West
Virginia University at Parkersburg plays in providing
education services in its region, the community and
technical college may continue delivering baccalaureate
degree programs offered at the institution on the effective
date of this section, may implement additional baccalaureate programs with the approval of the commission and is
strongly encouraged:

481 (I) To continue and expand its role as a higher education482 center pursuant to subsection (c) of this section; and

(II) To broker from West Virginia University and other
higher education institutions, as appropriate, additional
baccalaureate level degree programs the community and

486 technical college determines are needed in its service 487 region.

(III) Any baccalaureate degree programs offered at the
community and technical college shall be delivered under
the authority of the commission. The program shall be
evaluated according to the benchmarks and indicators for
baccalaureate education developed by the commission.
