10	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$3-1-2$ of the Code of West Virginia,
11	1931, as amended; to amend and reenact $\$3-4-18$ and $\$3-4-19$ of
12	said code; and to amend and reenact $\$3-4A-9$ and $\$3-4A-20$ of
13	said code, all relating to elections; general provisions and
14	definitions; bringing older contradicting language still
15	remaining in said code into conformity with current code
16	sections; and to reestablish a definition for "independent
17	voter" as the presently cited definition is no longer in said
18	code.
19	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
20	That §3-1-2 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
21	be amended and reenacted; that $\$3-4-18$ and $\$3-4-19$ of said code be
22	amended and reenacted; and that $\$3-4A-9$ and $\$3-4A-20$ of said code
23	be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:
24	ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND DEFINITIONS.

25 §3-1-2. Scope of chapter; definitions.

1 Unless restricted by the context, the provisions of this 2 chapter shall apply applies to every general, primary and special 3 election in which candidates are nominated or elected or in which 4 voters pass upon any public question submitted to them, except that 5 the provisions hereof shall be construed to be operative in 6 municipal elections only in those instances in which they are made 7 expressly so applicable.

8 Unless the context clearly requires a different meaning, as 9 herein used:

10 "Voter" shall mean means any person who possesses the 11 statutory and Constitutional qualifications for voting;

12 <u>"Independent" means any registered voter who declined to state</u>
13 <u>a preference for party affiliation on their voter registration or</u>
14 <u>who listed a party affiliation which is not qualified as a</u>
15 <u>political party as defined in section eight</u>, <u>article one of this</u>
16 <u>chapter</u>.

17 "Election" shall mean means the procedures whereby the voters 18 of this state or any subdivision thereof elect persons to fill 19 public offices, or elect members of a Constitutional convention, or 20 vote on public questions;

21 "Any election" or "all elections" shall include <u>includes</u> every 22 general, primary or special election held in this state, or in any 23 of its subdivisions, for the purpose of nominating or electing 24 federal or state officers, or county, city, town or village

1 officers of any subdivision now existing or hereafter created, or 2 for the purpose of electing members of a Constitutional convention, 3 or for voting upon any public question submitted to the people of 4 the state or any of the aforesaid subdivisions;

5 "Office" shall be construed to mean "public office" which 6 shall include: (1) Any elective office provided for by the 7 Constitution or laws of the United States or of this state to which 8 a salary or other compensation attaches; and (2) membership in a 9 Constitutional convention.

10 "Candidate" shall mean means any person to be voted for at an 11 election;

12 "Public question" shall mean means any issue or proposition, 13 now or hereafter required by the governing body of this state or 14 any of its subdivisions to be submitted to the voters of the state 15 or subdivision for decision at elections;

16 The term "minor" as used in article four, section one of the 17 State Constitution and as used in this chapter shall mean means a 18 person who has not become eighteen years of age.

19 ARTICLE 4. VOTING MACHINES.

20 §3-4-18. Conducting voting machine elections generally; duties of 21 election officials.

22 (1) The election officers shall constantly and diligently 23 maintain a watch in order to see that $\frac{no}{a}$ person $\frac{votes}{votes}$ does not 24 <u>vote</u> more than once and to prevent any voter from occupying the

1 voting machine for more than three minutes.

2 (2) In primary elections before a voter is permitted to use 3 the voting machine, the election officer representing the party to 4 <u>of</u> which the voter belongs shall adjust the machine so that the 5 voter will be able to vote only for the candidates who are seeking 6 nomination on the ticket of the party with which the voter is 7 affiliated,

(3) If the machine is so constructed as to require adjustment after one person has voted before another person can vote, the election officers shall so adjust it after each person has voted. (4) The election officers shall issue to each voter when he signs the poll book a card or ticket numbered to correspond to the number on the poll book of such voter, and in the case of a <u>unless</u> the voter requests an alternative ballot of a political party which has determined such a voter may participate in its primary election voting. indicating the party affiliation of such voter, which numbered card or ticket shall be presented to the election officer in charge of the machine

19 §3-4-19. "Independent" voting in primary elections.

If at any primary elections nonpartisan candidates for office and public questions are submitted to the voters and on which candidates and questions persons registered as "independent" are are entitled to vote, as provided in section <u>eighteen five(b)(3)</u> of article two of this chapter, the election officers shall adjust the

1 voting machines, if mechanically possible to do so, so that such 2 "independent" voters may vote only those portions of the voting 3 machine ballot relating to the nonpartisan candidates and the 4 public questions submitted, <u>unless the voter requests an</u> 5 <u>alternative ballot of a political party which has determined such</u> 6 <u>a voter may participate in its primary election voting.</u>

7 If the voting machines cannot be so adjusted for the 8 "independent" voters, then such "independent" voters, under the 9 close supervision of two commissioners of the election of different 10 political party affiliation, shall be permitted to use the voting 11 machines for voting only those parts of the ballot relating to such 12 nonpartisan candidates and public questions so submitted to the 13 voters, <u>unless the voter requests an alternative ballot of a</u> 14 <u>political party which has determined such a voter may participate</u> 15 in its primary election.

In lieu of using the voting machines, such "independent" 17 voters may request official printed ballots. relating to such 18 nonpartisan candidates and public questions. Such <u>These</u> ballots, 19 when signed on the back by the poll clerks as in other elections, 20 shall be voted and folded by the "independent" voter and shall be 21 delivered to one of the election commissioners who shall secure 22 same in a sealed or locked container until canvassed and counted in 23 the same manner as provided for handling and recording absent voter 24 ballots as provided in the section next hereafter.

1 ARTICLE 4A. ELECTRONIC VOTING SYSTEMS.

2 §3-4A-9. Minimum requirements of electronic voting systems.

An electronic voting system of particular make and design may 4 not be approved by the State Election Commission or be purchased, 5 leased or used by any county commission unless it meets the 6 following requirements:

7 (1) It secures or ensures the voter absolute secrecy in the 8 act of voting or, at the voter's election, provides for open 9 voting;

10 (2) It is constructed to ensure that no <u>a</u> person, except in 11 instances of open voting as provided in this section, can <u>may not</u> 12 see or know for whom any voter has voted or is voting;

(3) It permits each voter to vote at any election for all persons and offices for whom and which he or she is lawfully sentitled to vote, whether or not the name of any person appears on a ballot or ballot label as a candidate; and it permits each voter to vote for as many persons for an office as he or she is lawfully neutitled to vote for; and to vote for or against any question upon which he or she is lawfully entitled to vote. The automatic tabulating equipment used in electronic voting systems is to reject choices recorded on any ballot if the number of choices exceeds the number to which a voter is entitled;

(4) It permits each voter to deposit, write in, affix upon a24 ballot, card, envelope or other medium to be provided for that

1 purpose, ballots containing the names of persons for whom he or she 2 desires to vote whose names do not appear upon the ballots or 3 ballot labels;

4 (5) It permits each voter to change his or her vote for any
5 candidate and upon any question appearing upon the ballots or
6 ballot labels up to the time when his or her ballot is deposited in
7 the ballot box or his or her ballot is cast by electronic means;
8 (6) It contains a program deck consisting of cards that are
9 sequentially numbered or consisting of a computer program disk,
10 diskette, tape or other programming media containing sequentially
11 numbered program instructions and coded or otherwise protected from
12 tampering or substitution of the media or program instructions by
13 of unauthorized persons and capable of tabulating all votes cast in
14 each election;

15 (7) It contains two standard validation test decks approved as 16 to form and testing capabilities by the State Election Commission; 17 (8) It correctly records and counts accurately all votes cast 18 each for the candidate and for and against each question appearing 19 upon the ballots or ballot labels;

(9) It permits each voter at any election other than primary
21 elections by one mark or punch to vote a straight party ticket, as
22 provided in section five, article six of this chapter;

(10) It permits each voter in primary elections to vote only 24 for the candidates of the party for which he or she is legally

1 permitted to vote and precludes him or her from voting for any 2 candidate seeking nomination by any other political party <u>unless</u> 3 <u>that political party has determined such a voter may participate in</u> 4 <u>its primary election voting</u>, permits him or her to vote for the 5 candidates, if any, for nonpartisan <u>nomination nominations</u> or 6 election and permits him or her to vote on public questions;

7 (11) It, where applicable, is provided with means for sealing 8 or electronically securing the vote recording device to prevent its 9 use and to prevent tampering with ballot labels, both before the 10 polls are open or before the operation of the vote recording device 11 for an election is begun and immediately after the polls are closed 12 at after the operation of the vote recording device for an election 13 is completed;

14 (12) It has the capacity to contain the names of candidates 15 constituting the tickets of at least nine political parties and 16 accommodates the wording of at least fifteen questions;

17 (13) (A) Direct recording electronic voting machines must 18 generate a paper copy of each voter's votes vote that will be 19 automatically kept within a storage container, that is locked, 20 closely attached to the direct recording electronic voting machine, 21 and inaccessible to all but authorized voting officials, who will 22 handle such storage containers and such paper copies contained 23 therein in accordance with section nineteen of this article.

24 (B) The paper copy of the voter's vote shall be generated at

1 the time the voter is at the voting station using the direct 2 recording electronic voting machine.

3 (C) The voter may examine the paper copy visually or through 4 headphone readout, and may accept or reject the printed copy.

5 (D) The voter may not touch, handle or manipulate the printed 6 copy manually in any way.

7 (E) Once the printed copy of the voter's votes is accepted by 8 the voter as correctly reflecting the voter's intent, but not 9 before, it will automatically be stored for recounts or random 10 checks and the electronic vote will be cast within the computer 11 mechanism of the direct recording electronic voting machine.

12 (F) Direct recording electronic voting machines with a 13 mandatory paper copy shall be approved by the Secretary of State. 14 The Secretary of State may promulgate rules and emergency rules to 15 implement or enforce this subsection pursuant to the provisions of 16 section five, article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.

17 (14) Where vote recording devices are used, they shall:

18 (A) Be durably constructed of material of good quality and in 19 a workmanlike manner and in a form which makes it safely 20 transportable;

(B) Be constructed with frames for the placing of ballot labels that the labels upon which are printed the names of candidates and their respective parties, titles of offices office and wording of questions are reasonably protected from mutilation, disfigurement

1 or disarrangement or are constructed to ensure that the screens upon 2 which appear the names of the candidates and their respective 3 parties, titles of offices and wording of questions are reasonably 4 protected any from modification;

5 (C) Bear a number that will identify it or distinguish it from 6 any other machine;

7 (D) Be constructed to ensure that a voter may easily learn the 8 method of operating it and may expeditiously cast his or her vote 9 for all candidates of his or her choice and upon any public 10 question;

(E) Be accompanied by a mechanically or electronically operated instruction model which shows the arrangement of ballot labels, aparty columns or rows, and questions;

14 (F) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 15 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 16 touch: be constructed to provide for the direct electronic 17 recording and tabulating of votes cast in a system specifically 18 designed and engineered for the election application;

19 (i) Be constructed to provide for the direct electronic
20 recording and tabulating of votes cast in a system specifically
21 designed and engineered for the election application;

(G) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of touch, (ii) Be constructed to prevent any voter from voting for more

1 than the allowable number of candidates for any office, to include 2 an audible or visual signal, or both, warning any voter who attempts 3 to vote for more than the allowable number of candidates for any 4 office or who attempts to cast his or her ballot prior to its 5 completion and are constructed to include a visual or audible 6 confirmation, or both, to the voter upon completion and casting of 7 the ballot;

8 (H) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 9 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 10 touch, (iii) Be constructed to present the entire ballot to the 11 voter, in a series of sequential pages, and to ensure that the voter 12 sees all of the ballot options on all pages before completing his 13 or her vote and to allow the voter to review and change all ballot 14 choices prior to completing and casting his or her ballot;

(I) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of touch, (iv) Be constructed to allow election commissioners to spoil a ballot where a voter fails to properly cast his or her ballot, has departed the polling place and cannot be recalled by a poll clerk to complete his or her ballot;

21 (J) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 22 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 23 touch, (v) Be constructed to allow election commissioners, poll 24 clerks, or both, to designate, mark or otherwise record provisional

1 ballots;

2 (K) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 3 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 4 touch, (vi) Consist of devices which are independent, nonnetworked 5 voting systems in which each vote is recorded and retained within 6 each device's internal nonvolatile electronic memory and contain an 7 internal security, the absence of which prevents substitution of any 8 other device;

9 (L) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 10 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 11 touch, (vii) Store each vote in no fewer than three separate, 12 independent, nonvolatile electronic memory components and that each 13 device contains comprehensive diagnostics to ensure that failures 14 do not go undetected;

(M) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of touch, <u>(viii)</u> Contain a unique, embedded internal serial number for auditing purposes for each device used to activate, retain and record votes;

(N) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 22 touch, (ix) Be constructed to record all preelection, election and 23 post-election activities, including all ballot images and system 24 anomalies, in each device's internal electronic memory and are to

1 be accessible in electronic or printed form;

2 (0) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon 3 which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of 4 touch, (x) Be constructed with a battery backup system in each 5 device to, at a minimum, prevent the loss of any votes, as well as 6 all preelection, election and post-election activities, including 7 all ballot images and system anomalies, stored in the device's 8 internal electronic memory and to allow voting to continue for two 9 hours of uninterrupted operation in case of an electrical power 10 failure; and

(P) For electronic voting systems that utilize a screen upon which votes may be recorded by means of a stylus or by means of touch, <u>(xi)</u> Be constructed to prevent the loss of any votes, as well as all preelection, election and post-election activities, including ballot images and system anomalies, stored in each device's internal electronic memory even in case of an electrical and battery power failure.

18 §3-4A-20. "Independent" voting in primary elections.

19 If at any primary elections, nonpartisan candidates for office 20 and public questions are submitted to the voters on which persons 21 registered as "independent" are entitled to vote, as provided in 22 section eighteen <u>five(b)(3)</u>, article two of this chapter, the 23 election officers shall provide a vote recording device, where 24 applicable, or the appropriate ballot to be marked by an

1 electronically sensible pen or ink, or by means of a stylus or by 2 means of touch, so that "independent" voters may vote only those 3 portions of the ballot relating to the nonpartisan candidates and 4 the public questions submitted, or shall provide a ballot containing 5 only provisions for voting for those candidates and upon those 6 issues submitted common to the ballots provided to all voters 7 regardless of political party affiliation, or both, <u>unless the voter</u> 8 <u>requests an alternative ballot of a political party which has</u> 9 determined such a voter may participate in its primary election.

In counties utilizing electronic voting systems in which votes In are recorded by perforating, if vote recording devices are not 2 available for the "independent" voters, provisions are to be made afor sealing the partisan section or sections of the ballot or ballot labels on a vote recording device using temporary seals, thus permitting the independent voter to vote for the nonpartisan section or sections of the ballot or ballot labels, <u>unless the voter</u> requests an alternative ballot of a political party which has determined such a voter may participate in its primary election. After the "independent" voter has voted, the temporary seals may be removed and the device may then be used by partisan voters.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to bring older contradicting language still remaining in the code into conformity with current code sections and to reestablish a definition for "independent

voter" as the presently cited definition is no longer in the code.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
