14	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:		
15	That article 9, chapter 64 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931,		
16	as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:		
17	ARTICLE 9. AUTHORIZATION FOR MISCELLANEOUS AGENCIES AND BOARDS TO		
18	PROMULGATE LEGISLATIVE RULES.		
19	§64-9-1. Board of Optometry.		
20	The legislative rule filed in the state register on the		
21	thirtieth day of July, two thousand ten, authorized under the		
22	authority of section fifteen, article eight, chapter thirty, of		

this code, modified by the Board of Optometry to meet the objections of the Legislative Rule-Making Review Committee and refiled in the state register on the twenty-third day of December, two thousand ten, relating to the Board of Optometry (injectable pharmaceutical agents certificate, 14 CSR 11), is authorized with the following amendments:

7 On page two, by inserting a new subsection 5.6, to read as 8 follows:

9 "5.6 The licensee must present proof of hands-on supervised 10 clinical training of a minimum of twenty-five patients for each 11 type of injection and each medication where the licensee actually 12 gave injections to patients under supervision. A log book with 13 dates, medications, route of injection, name of supervising doctor 14 and patient identification by number for review by the Board.";

15 And,

16 On page five, by adding a new section eleven to read as 17 follows: "\$14-11-11. Restrictions.

18 11.1 A certificate holder may not establish a pharmacy in an 19 optometric office or sell injectable pharmaceutical agents 20 prescribed in treatment unless there is a licensed pharmacist on 21 staff or present when the prescription is filled. Nothing in this 22 rule shall prohibit the optometrist from charging a usual and

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- 1 customary fee for performing the injection.
- 2 11.2 A certificate holder may not inject any medication into
 3 a child under the age of 18.
- An injection may not be given to a patient without
 consultation with the patient's osteopathic or allopathic physician
 in order to identify and minimize potential adverse reactions and
 drug interactions.
- 8 11.4 Retrobulbar and Periocular injections are prohibited.

9 11.5 A certificate holder may not inject any of the 10 following drug categories:

- 11 11.5.1 Chemotherapy drugs;
- 12 11.5.2 Immunosuppressive drugs;
- 13 11.5.3 Intravenous steroids;
- 14 11.5.4 Intravenous dyes;
- 15 11.5.5 Controlled substances from Schedules II thru V;
- 16 11.5.6 Antivirals or Antifungal Agents;
