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10	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$5H\mathcal{H}$	
11	Virginia, 1931, as amended, all relating to permitting a death	
12	benefit to the families of law-enforcement officers who die in	
13	the performance their duties.	
14	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:	
15	That $\$5H-1-1$ and $\$5H-1-2$ of the Code of West Virginia, 1931,	
16	as amended, all to read as follows:	
17	ARTICLE 1. WEST VIRGINIA FIRE, AND EMS AND LAW-ENFORCEMENT	
18	OFFICER SURVIVOR BENEFIT ACT.	
19	<pre>§5H-1-1. Title and legislative intent.</pre>	
20	(a) This article is known as the "West Virginia Fire, and EMS	
21	and Law-Enforcement Officer Survivor Benefit Act."	
22	(b) It is the intent of the Legislature to provide for the	
23	payment of death benefits to the surviving spouse, designated	

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1 beneficiary, children or parents of firefighters, and EMS and law-2 enforcement personnel killed in the performance of their duties.

3 §5H-1-2. Death benefit for survivors.

4 (a) In the event a firefighter, or EMS <u>or law-enforcement</u> 5 provider is killed in the performance of his or her duties, the 6 department chief, within thirty days from the date of death shall 7 submit certification of the death to the Governor's office.

8 (b) This act includes both paid and volunteer fire, and EMS 9 <u>and law-enforcement</u> personnel acting in the performance of his or 10 her duties of any fire, or EMS <u>or law-enforcement</u> department 11 certified by the State of West Virginia.

12 (c) A firefighter, or EMS <u>or law-enforcement</u> provider is 13 considered to be acting in the performance of his or her duties for 14 the purposes of this act when he or she is participating in any 15 role of a fire, or EMS <u>or law-enforcement</u> department function. 16 This includes training, administration meetings, fire or EMS 17 incidents, service calls, apparatus, equipment or station 18 maintenance, fundraisers and travel to or from such functions.

(d) Travel includes riding upon <u>or in</u> any apparatus <u>or vehicle</u> which is owned or used by the fire, or EMS <u>or law-enforcement</u> department, or any other vehicle going to or directly returning from a firefighter's home, place of business or other place where he or she shall have been prior to participating in a fire, or EMS or law-enforcement department function or upon the authorization of

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1 the chief of the department, agency head or other person in charge. 2 (e) Certification shall include the name of the certified 3 fire, or EMS or law-enforcement program, the name of the deceased 4 firefighter, or EMS or law-enforcement provider, the name and 5 address of the beneficiary and the circumstances that qualify the 6 deceased individual for death benefits under this act. Upon 7 receipt of the certification from the certified fire, or EMS or 8 law-enforcement program, the state shall, from moneys from the 9 State Treasury, General Fund, pay to the certified fire, or EMS or 10 <u>law-enforcement</u> program the sum of \$50,000 in the name of the 11 beneficiary of the death benefit. Within five days of receipt of 12 this sum from the state, the fire, or EMS or law-enforcement 13 program certified by the state shall pay the sum as a benefit to 14 the surviving spouse, or designated beneficiary. If there is no 15 surviving spouse or designated beneficiary, to the minor children 16 of the firefighter, or EMS or law-enforcement provider killed in 17 the performance of duty. When no spouse, designated beneficiary, 18 or minor children survive, the benefit shall be paid to the parent 19 or parents of the firefighter, or EMS or law-enforcement provider. 20 It is the responsibility of the certified fire or EMS program to 21 document the surviving spouse or beneficiary for purposes of 22 reporting to the Governor's office.

(f) Any death ruled by a physician to be a result of an injury sustained during any of the above mentioned performance of fire

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1 department, EMS or law-enforcement duties will be eligible for this
2 benefit, even if this death occurs at a later time.

3 (g) Those individuals who are both firefighters and EMS 4 personnel covered by this article are eligible for only one death 5 benefit payment.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit a \$50,000 death benefit to the families of law-enforcement officers who die while performing their duties. The bill adds law-enforcement officers to firefighters and EMS personnel who already qualify for survivor benefits.
