18	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
19	That §49-2E-2 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
20	be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
21	ARTICLE 2E. QUALITY RATING AND IMPROVEMENT SYSTEM.
22	§49-2E-2. Creation of statewide quality rating system; legislative
23	rule required; minimum provisions.

(a) The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human 1 2 Resources shall propose rules for legislative approval in 3 accordance with the provisions of article three, chapter 4 twenty-nine-a of this code to implement a quality rating and 5 improvement system. The quality rating and improvement system 6 shall be applicable to licensed child care centers and facilities 7 and registered family child care homes. If other types of child 8 care settings, such as school-age child care programs, become 9 licensed after the implementation of a statewide quality rating and 10 improvement system, the secretary may develop quality criteria and 11 incentives that will allow the other types of child care settings 12 to participate in the quality rating and improvement system. The 13 rules shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

14 (1) A four-star rating system for registered family child care 15 homes and a four-star rating system for all licensed programs, 16 including family child care facilities and child care centers, to 17 easily communicate to consumers four progressively higher levels of 18 quality child care. One star <u>indicating indicates</u> meeting the 19 minimum acceptable standard and four stars <u>indicating indicate</u> 20 meeting or exceeding the highest standard. The system shall 21 reflect the cumulative attainment of the standards at each level 22 and all lesser levels. *Provided*, That any <u>A</u> program accredited by 23 the National Association for the Education of Young Children or the

1 National Association for Family Child Care, as applicable, shall
2 automatically be awarded four-star status;

3 (2) <u>A requirement that the secretary establish and maintain</u> 4 program standards for registered family child care homes and 5 program standards for all licensed programs, including family child 6 care facilities and child care centers. that are Each <u>set of</u> 7 <u>standards shall be</u> divided into four levels of attributes that 8 progressively improve the quality of child care beginning with 9 basic state registration and licensing requirements at level one 10 through achievement of a national accreditation by the appropriate 11 organization at level four. Participation beyond the first level 12 is voluntary. The program standards shall be categorized using the 13 West Virginia State Training and Registry System Core Knowledge 14 Areas or its equivalent;

(3) Accountability measures that provide for a fair, valid, accurate and reliable assessment of compliance with quality randards, including, but not limited to:

(A) Evaluations conducted by trained evaluators with appropriate early childhood education and training on the selected assessment tool and with a demonstrated inter-rater reliability of eighty-five percent or higher. The evaluations shall include an on-site inspection conducted at least annually to determine whether programs are rated correctly and continue to meet the appropriate

standards. The evaluations and observations shall be conducted on
 at least a statistically valid percentage of center classrooms,
 with a minimum of one class per age group;

4 (B) The use of valid and reliable observation and assessment 5 tools, such as environmental rating scales for early childhood, 6 infant and toddler, school-age care and family child care as 7 appropriate for the particular setting and age group;

8 (C) An annual self-assessment using the proper observation and 9 assessment tool for programs rated at two stars; and

10 (D) Model program improvement planning shall be designed to 11 help programs improve their evaluation results and level of program 12 quality.

(b) The rules required pursuant to this section shall include 14 policies relating to the review, reduction, suspension or 15 disqualification of child care programs from the quality rating and 16 improvement system.

17 (c) The rules shall provide for implementation of the 18 statewide quality rating system effective July 1, 2011, subject to 19 section four of this article.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to remove the requirement that program standards for registered family child care homes and all licensed programs be included as part of the rule to implement the quality rating and improvement system and require, instead, that the secretary establish and maintain these standards.
