10	A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by
11	adding thereto six new sections to article seven, chapter
12	twenty, designated § 20-7-24, §20-7-25, §20-7-26, §20-7-27,
13	\$20-7-28, and $$20-7-29$, all relating to boat, boat dock and
14	marina safety; providing definitions; requiring compliance
15	with certain standards; requiring work by certified
16	electricians; establishing a date for compliance; and
17	providing penalties.
18	PREAMBLE
19 20 21 22 23	THIS LEGISLATION SHALL BE KNOWN AS THE "MICHAEL CUNNINGHAM ACT." WHEREAS, WEST VIRGINIA IS KNOWN FOR ITS BEAUTIFUL AND ABUNDANT WATERWAYS, LAKES AND RIVERS, WHICH PROVIDE A DRAW FOR TOURISM AND A BOOST FOR OUR ECONOMY; AND
24 25 26 27 28 29	WHEREAS, OUR WATERWAYS, LAKES AND RIVERS SHOULD BE A SAFE PLACE FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES TO ENJOY; AND WHEREAS, THERE HAVE BEEN CASES RECENTLY WHERE CHILDREN HAVE DIED BECAUSE THE WATER WHERE THEY WERE SWIMMING WAS ELECTRIFIED BY THE UNGROUNDED AND IMPROPER CONNECTION OF ELECTRICITY TO BOAT DOCKS AND MARINAS; AND

WHEREAS, ELECTRICITY AND WATER CREATE A 1 2 COMBINATION THAT CAN PARALYZE A SWIMMER WHICH CAN RESULT 3 IN THE SWIMMER DROWNING; AND WHEREAS, CHILDREN WHO ARE 4 SWIMMING ARE PARTICULARLY VULNERABLE TO ELECTROCUTION AND 5 SHOCK IN THE WATER; AND 6 WHEREAS, BRINGING BOAT DOCKS AND MARINAS UP TO THE 7 ASSOCIATION NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION AND NATIONAL 8 ELECTRIC CODE STANDARDS FOR MARINAS AND BOATYARDS IS 9 NECESSARY FOR THE PROTECTION AND SAFETY OF ALL OF THOSE WHO ENJOY OUR WATERWAYS, LAKES AND RIVERS FOR RECREATION 10 AND TO PROTECT OUR TOURISM INDUSTRY. 11

- 12 Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
- That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be 13
- amended by adding thereto six new sections, designated § 20-7-

24, \$20-7-25, \$20-7-26 and \$20-7-27, \$20-7-28 and \$20-7-29,

- 18 PART III. THE MICHAEL CUNNINGHAM ACT - BOAT, BOAT DOCK AND
- 19 MARINA SAFETY REQUIREMENTS.
- §20-7-24. Definitions. 20
- 21 As used in Part III of this article:
- (1) "ABYC" means the American Boat and Yacht Council; 22
- 23 (2) "Boat dock" means a man-made structure that protrudes
- 24 into a body of water for the purpose of mooring a boat or for
- 25 other water-related recreation, including boat liveries, and
- 26 that is connected to an electrical power source in any manner:
- 27 Provided, That "boat dock" does not include structures that
- 28 are privately owned and used exclusively by the owner or the
- 29 owner's quests for non-commercial purposes;

1	_(3) "Boat	dock	or	marina	owner	or	operator"	means	any
2	person	who:								

- (A) Has an ownership interest in a boat dock or marina, other than a lienholder; or
 - (B) Operates a boat dock or marina;

- (4) "Ground fault circuit interrupter" means a device that functions to de-energize a circuit, or a portion thereof, within an established period of time when current to ground exceeds a predetermined value that is less than required to operate the over current protective device of the supply circuit;
- (5) "Marina" means a dock including a boat dock or basin providing moorings for motorboats and offering supply, repair or other services, including electrical power supply, for remuneration: *Provided*, That "marina" does not include docks that are privately owned and used exclusively by the owner or the owner's guests for non-commercial purposes;
- (6) "Motorboat" means any vessel propelled by an electrical, steam, gas, diesel or other propelled or driven motor, whether or not the motor is the principal source of propulsion, but does not include a vessel with a valid marine document issued by the United States Bureau of Customs or any federal agency that is the successor to the Bureau of Customs;
 - (7) "Operate" means to navigate or otherwise use a

2	(8) "Owner" means a person, other than a lienholder,
3	having the property in or title to a motorboat. The term
4	includes a person entitled to the use or possession of a
5	motorboat subject to an interest in another person, reserved
6	or created by agreement and securing payment or performance of
7	an obligation, but the term excludes a lessee under a lease
8	not intended as security;
9	(9) "Person" means an individual, partnership, firm,
10	corporation, association or other entity; and
11	(10) "Vessel" means every description of watercraft,
12	other than a seaplane on the water, used or capable of being
13	used as a means of transportation on the water.
14	§20-7-25. Boat Dock and Marina Safety Requirements - Swimming
15	and Signage.
16	All boat dock or marina owners or operators shall install
17	permanent safety signage with print legible at eighty feet of
18	distance and placed to give adequate notice, to persons using
19	the boat dock or marina or swimming near the boat dock or
20	marina, of the electric shock hazard risks of the waters
21	around the boat dock or marina. The signage shall state:
22	"ELECTRIC SHOCK HAZARD RISK: NO SWIMMING WITHIN 100 YARDS OF
23	THE BOAT DOCK".
24	§20-7-26. Boat Dock and Marina Safety

1	Requirements-Electrical Shock and Electrocution.
2	(a) All boat dock or marina owners or operators shall
3	comply with the following requirements to prevent electrical
4	shock, electrocution or injury to users of their facilities
5	and the surrounding areas:
6	(1) All electrical wiring involving 110 AC or 220 AC
7	shall be installed by and maintained by a holder of a valid
8	West Virginia electrician license or master electrician
9	license in accordance with the most recently adopted versions
10	of the National Fire Protection Association's Standards for
11	Marinas and Boatyards (NFPA) 303 and the National Electric
12	<pre>Code (NFPA 70);</pre>
13	(2) Install ground fault circuit interrupters on all boat
14	dock and marina electrical wiring circuits; and
15	(3) Cause annual inspection by a West Virginia certified
16	electrical inspector or master electrician of all sources of
17	electrical supply, including ship-to-shore power pedestals,
18	submergible pumps, and sewage pump-out facilities, that could
19	result in unsafe electrical current in the water: Provided,
20	That the inspection required by this subdivision be done
21	between January 1 and May 1 each year.
22	(c) All work performed on rental motor boats or vessels
23	shall be performed by electricians licensed in West Virginia

who are familiar with ABYC standards or by an ABYC certified

1	electrical technician.
2	§20-7-27. Boat and vessel safety requirements-electrical shock
3	and electrocution.
4	(a) Every vessel shall have aboard all equipment meeting
5	the ABYC standards necessary to ensure the safety of the
6	passengers and the public from electric shock, electrocution,
7	and electric shock drowning.
8	(b) Electrical wiring on a motorboat involving 110 AC or
9	220 AC shall be performed by electricians licensed in West
10	Virginia who are familiar with ABYC standards or by an ABYC
11	certified electrical technician.
12	§20-7-28. Compliance date.
13	Each vessel, motorboat, boat dock and marina shall be in
14	full compliance with this section by August 1, 2014.
15	§20-7-29. Penalties.
16	(a) On or after August 1, 2014, a boat dock or marina
17	owner or operator, or a boat operator who violates this
18	article and the violation does not result in the injury or
19	death of a person, shall, for the first offense, be issued a
20	warning citation with no court appearance or penalty, and for
21	a second or subsequent offense, be fined one hundred dollars
22	<u>(\$100);</u>
23	(b) A boat dock or marina owner or operator who violates

(b) A boat dock or marina owner or operator who violates section twenty-five or twenty-six of this article, and the

violation results in the injury of a person, shall be quilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, and for a second offense or subsequent offense shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or confined in jail for not more than six months or both fined and imprisoned.

(c) A boat dock or marina owner who violates section twenty-five or twenty-six of this article, and the violation results in the death of a person, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be confined in jail for not more than one year, or fined not more than one thousand dollars, or both fined and imprisoned.
