13	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
14	That \$18-8-1a of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
15	be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
16	ARTICLE 8. COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.
17	§18-8-1a. Commencement and termination of compulsory school
18	attendance; public school entrance requirements;
19	exceptions.
20	(a) Notwithstanding the provisions of section one of this
21	article, compulsory school attendance begins with the school year
22	in which the sixth birthday is reached prior to September 1 of such
23	the year or upon enrolling in a publicly supported kindergarter
24	program and subject to subdivision (3) of this subsection,
25	continues to the sixteenth seventeenth birthday or for as long as
2.6	the student continues to be enrolled in a school system after the

- 1 sixteenth seventeenth birthday.
- 2 (1) A child may be removed from $\frac{a}{b}$ kindergarten program
- 3 when the principal, teacher and parent or guardian concur that the
- 4 best interest of the child would not be served by requiring further
- 5 attendance: Provided, That the principal shall make the final
- 6 determination with regard to compulsory school attendance in a

- 8 (2) The compulsory school attendance provision of this article

 7 county boards in implementing the requirements of section six of

- 9 (b) Attendance at a state-approved or Montessori kindergarten,
 10 as provided in section eighteen, article five of this chapter, is
 11 deemed school attendance for purposes of this section. Prior to
 12 entrance into the first grade in accordance with section five,
 13 article two of this chapter, each child must have either:
- 14 (1) Successfully completed such publicly or privately
 15 supported, state-approved kindergarten program or Montessori

- (2) Successfully completed an entrance test of basic readiness skills approved by the county in which the school is located. The test may be administered in lieu of kindergarten attendance only under extraordinary circumstances to be determined by the county board.
- (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section and of 23 section five, article two of this chapter and section eighteen, 24 article five of this chapter, a county board may provide for

- 1 advanced entrance or placement under policies adopted by said the
- 2 board for any child who has demonstrated sufficient mental and
- 3 physical competency for such advanced entrance or placement.
- 4 (d) This section does not prevent a student from another state
- 5 from enrolling in the same grade in a public school in West
- 6 Virginia as the student was enrolled at the school from which the
- 7 student transferred.
- 8 (e) Each county school system shall provide a program by which
- 9 any student who has reached ninth grade or higher and has failed to
- 10 achieve one or more credits necessary to permit graduation from
- 11 high school after the expected period of attendance, may earn or
- 12 recover one or more credits to ensure graduation at the appropriate
- 13 time.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to increase the school dropout age for all students from sixteen to seventeen, and to require each county system to provide a program by which a student who has fallen behind in credits necessary to graduate after the expected period of attendance may earn those credits in order to graduate on time.
