COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE

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Senate Bill No. 158

(By Senators Beach and Stollings)

[Originating in the Committee on Government Organization; reported March 21, 2013.]

A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article, designated §17-4A-1, §17-4A-2 and §17-4A-3, all relating to creation of the Complete Streets Act; promoting consideration by the Division of Highways of complete streets policies for all streets, roads and highways and other transportation infrastructure facilities under the jurisdiction of the Division of Highways; providing for model complete streets policies for use by Division of Highways, counties and municipalities; providing instances when the

Division of Highways need not consider complete street policies; creating a Complete Streets Advisory Board; providing for reimbursement of mileage expenses of board members; and requiring annual reports.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a new article, designated §17-4A-1, §17-4A-2 and §17-4A-3, all to read as follows:

ARTICLE 4A. COMPLETE STREETS ACT.

§17-4A-1. Complete Streets.

(a) Vehicular, public transportation, bicycle and
 pedestrian modes are integral to the transportation system of
 this state. The Division of Highways may view all
 transportation improvements as opportunities to improve
 safety, access and mobility for all travelers.

6 (b) All transportation projects receiving federal or state
7 funds should strive to improve safety, access and mobility for
8 users of all ages and abilities, defined to include pedestrians,

[Com. Sub. for Com. Sub. for S. B. No. 158 9 bicyclists, public transportation vehicles and their 10 passengers, motorists, movers of commercial goods, persons 11 with disabilities, older adults and children.

(c) Accommodation of all users should be considered in 12 13 planning, design. construction, reconstruction, the rehabilitation, maintenance and operations of any state, 14 county or local transportation facilities receiving funds from 15 the Division of Highways. The Division of Highways is 16 encouraged to create a safe, comprehensive, integrated and 17 18 connected network to accommodate all users in a manner that is suitable to the rural, suburban or urban context. 19

(d) The Division of Highways is encouraged to use the
latest and best design standards as they apply to bicycle,
pedestrian, transit and highway facilities, which may include,
but are not limited to, the latest editions of:

(1) A Policy on Geometric Design of Highways and
Streets, from the American Association of State Highway
and Transportation Officials;

- (2) Designing Walkable Urban Thoroughfares: A Context
 Sensitive Approach: An ITE Recommended Practice, from
 the Institute of Transportation Engineers;
 (3) Guide for the Development of Bicycle Facilities, from
- 31 the American Association of State Highway and32 Transportation Officials;
- 33 (4) Guide for the Planning, Design and Operation of
 34 Pedestrian Facilities, from the American Association of State
 35 Highway and Transportation Officials;
- 36 (5) Public Rights-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines, from37 the U. S. Access Board; and
- 38 (6) Other relevant federal, state or local guidance as39 appropriate.
- 40 (e) The Division of Highways may provide assistance to
 41 and coordinate with regional and local agencies in
 42 developing and implementing complementary complete
 43 streets policies. In the development of projects within
 44 municipal boundaries, the Division of Highways and

[Com. Sub. for Com. Sub. for S. B. No. 158 45 municipality may share expertise in multimodal 46 transportation planning.

47 (f) The Division of Highways is encouraged to modify its procedures, documents, training systems and performance 48 measures in a timely manner to ensure the needs of all users 49 of the transportation system are included in all phases of the 50 projects. The Division of Highways is encouraged to create 51 an implementation plan, including a schedule and a regional 52 and local government and public outreach plan, in 53 consultation with the advisory board as outlined in section 54 55 three of this article.

§17-4A-2. Exceptions.

(a) Accommodation of all users of a transportation
 facility need not be considered in the planning, designing,
 construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, maintenance or
 operations of any state, county or local transportation
 facilities receiving funds from the Division of Highways if
 the commissioner determines that:

- (1) Use of a transportation facility by pedestrians, 7 bicyclists or other users is prohibited by law; 8 (2) The cost of new accommodation would be 9 disproportionate to the need or probable use; 10 11 (3) There is a demonstrated absence of future need as 12 determined by factors such as current and future land use, current and projected user volumes, population density and 13 crash data: 14
- 15 (4) The time-sensitive or expedited nature of the project16 would be adversely affected; or
- 17 (5) The project has already moved beyond the initial18 planning stage at the time this article goes into effect.
- (b) The commissioner is encouraged to consult local and
 regional plans and leaders, as appropriate, in assessing
 exceptions.
- (c) Documentation of any granted exceptions may be
 made publicly available and shared with the advisory board
 as established in section three of this article.

- (a) A Complete Streets Advisory Board to the Division
 of Highways is established to:
- 3 (1) Provide and facilitate communication, education and
 4 advice between the Division of Highways, counties,
 5 municipalities, interest groups and the public;
- (2) Make recommendations to the Division of Highways, 6 counties and municipalities for restructuring procedures, 7 8 updating design guidance, providing educational opportunities to employees and creating new measures to 9 track the success of multimodal planning and design; and 10 (3) Submit to the Joint Committee on Government and 11 12 Finance, through the Division of Highways, an annual report as outlined herein. 13

14 (b) The advisory board shall consist of sixteen members,15 designated as follows:

16 (1) The Commissioner of Highways or his or her17 designee;

- 18 (2) The Secretary of the Department of Transportation or19 his or her designee;
- 20 (3) The Secretary of the Department of Health and21 Human Resources or his or her designee; and
- 22 (4) Thirteen members that serve at the will and pleasure
- 23 of the Governor and appointed by the Governor as follows:
- 24 (A) One member who is a licensed engineer with25 expertise in transportation or civil engineering;
- 26 (B) One member representing the American Planning27 Association;
- 28 (C) One member representing a state association of29 counties;
- 30 (D) One member representing state association of31 municipalities;
- 32 (E) One member representing a major regional or local33 public transportation agency;
- 34 (F) One member representing a national association of35 retired persons;

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36	(G) One member representing an organization interested
37	in the promotion of bicycling;
38	(H) One member representing an organization interested
39	in the promotion of walking and health;
40	(I) One member representing an organization
41	representing persons with disabilities;
42	(J) One member representing an automobile and/or
43	trucking organization; and
44	(K) Three members of the general public interested in
45	promoting complete streets policies, one representing each
46	congressional district, as determined by the Governor.
47	(c) The Commissioner of Highways shall serve as the
48	first chair of the board. The board shall meet at least twice
49	a year and at the call of the chair or a majority of the
50	members. The members of the board shall annually elect one
51	of its members to serve as chair after the first year.

52 (d) The initial terms of appointment for members53 appointed by the Governor shall be as follows: Three

54 members appointed to a term of one year, three members appointed to a term of two years, three members appointed 55 to a term of three years and four members appointed to a 56 Thereafter each member shall be 57 term of four years. appointed for four years. A member shall serve until his or 58 her successor is appointed. In the case of a vacancy the 59 appointee shall serve the remainder of the unexpired term. 60 Members of the board may succeed themselves and shall 61 serve without compensation. The members appointed by the 62 Governor are entitled to be reimbursed in a manner 63 consistent with the guidelines of the Travel Management 64 65 Office of the Department of Administration for actual and necessary mileage expenses incurred while attending official 66 meetings of the board. 67

(e) On December 1, 2013, and on December 1 every year
thereafter, the board shall submit an annual report to the
Governor, the Commissioner of Highways and the Joint
Committee on Government and Finance on the status of
implementation of section one of this article.

75 (A) A summary of actions taken by the Division of Highways in the preceding year to improve the safety, access 76 and mobility of roadways pursuant to section one of this 77 article; 78

(B) Modifications made to or recommended for 79 protocols, guidance, standards or other requirements to 80 facilitate complete streets implementation; 81

of the development of multimodal 82 (C) Status performance indicators; 83

84 (D) Any information obtained on the use made of bicycle, pedestrian, transit and highway facilities together 85 with the existing target level of use for these modes, if any; 86 87 (E) Available crash statistics by mode, age, road type and 88 location and other relevant factors; and

89 (F) Other related information that may be requested by the Governor or Legislature. 90

- 91 (2) The Division of Highways may assist the board in the
- 92 preparation of the board's annual report.
