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10	A BILL to amend and reenact $\$15-5-6$ of the Code of West Virginia,
11	1931, as amended, relating to providing emergency assistance
12	to small businesses during existence of a state of emergency;
13	authorizing promulgation of an emergency rule by Director of
14	the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, in
15	consultation with the secretaries of the Department of
16	Commerce and the Department of Revenue establishing the
17	criteria under which assistance to small businesses may be
18	provided; providing factors to be considered or required in
19	establishing criteria; providing for recovery by the state for
20	certain assistance.
21	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That \$15-5-6 of the Code of West Virginia, one thousand nine hundred thirty-one, as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

1 ARTICLE 5. DIVISION OF HOMELAND SECURITY AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT.

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§15-5-6. Emergency powers of Governor.

3 The provisions of this section shall be operative only during 4 the existence of a state of emergency. The existence of a state of 5 emergency may be proclaimed by the Governor or by concurrent resolution of the Legislature if the Governor in such proclamation, 6 or the Legislature in such resolution, finds that an attack upon 7 8 the United States has occurred or is anticipated in the immediate future, or that a natural or man-made disaster of major proportions 9 10 has actually occurred or is imminent within the state, and that the safety and welfare of the inhabitants of this state require an 11 12 invocation of the provisions of this section. Any such emergency, 13 whether proclaimed by the Governor or by the Legislature, shall terminate upon the proclamation of the termination thereof by the 14 15 Governor, or the passage by the Legislature of a concurrent 16 resolution terminating such emergency.

17 So long as such state of emergency exists, the Governor shall 18 have and may exercise the following additional emergency powers:

(a) To enforce all laws and rules relating to the provision of
 emergency services and to assume direct operational control of any
 or all emergency service forces and helpers in the state;

(b) To sell, lend, lease, give, transfer or deliver materials or perform functions relating to emergency services on such terms and conditions as he or she shall prescribe and without regard to

the limitations of any existing law and to account to the State
 Treasurer for any funds received for such property;

(c) To procure materials and facilities for emergency services 3 by purchase, condemnation under the provisions of 4 chapter 5 fifty-four of this code or seizure pending institution of 6 condemnation proceedings within thirty days from the seizing 7 thereof and to construct, lease, transport, store, maintain, renovate or distribute such materials and facilities. Compensation 8 9 for property so procured shall be made in the manner provided in chapter fifty-four of this code; 10

(d) To obtain the services of necessary personnel, required during the emergency, and to compensate them for their services from his or her contingent funds or such other funds as may be available to him or her;

(e) To provide and compel the evacuation of all or part of the population from any stricken or threatened area within the state and to take such steps as are necessary for the receipt and care of such evacuees;

(f) To control ingress and egress to and from a disaster area, the movement of persons within the area and the occupancy of premises therein;

(g) To suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business or the orders, rules or regulations of any state agency, if strict

1 compliance therewith would in any way prevent, hinder or delay 2 necessary action in coping with the emergency;

3 (h) To utilize such available resources of the state and of 4 its political subdivisions as are reasonably necessary to cope with 5 the emergency;

6 (i) To suspend or limit the sale, dispensing or transportation
7 of alcoholic beverages, explosives and combustibles;

8 (j) To make provision for the availability and use of 9 temporary emergency housing; and

10 (k) To provide immediate emergency financial assistance to 11 small businesses located in the areas of the state where the state 12 of emergency is determined to exist as may be necessary and proper 13 to promote the continuity of the local economy. For each emergency under this section, the Governor shall direct the Director of the 14 Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, in 15 consultation with the secretaries of the Department of Commerce and 16 17 the Department of Revenue, to promulgate an emergency rule under article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code establishing the 18 19 criteria under which the assistance to small businesses may be 20 provided under the circumstances of the emergency. The factors to 21 be considered in establishing the criteria shall include, but not 22 be limited to:

23 <u>(1) Determining the period of time during which assistance is</u>
24 <u>available;</u>

1 (2) Determining the nature of the losses for which assistance
2 is available;

3	(3) Determining the types of small businesses that are
4	eligible for the assistance when considering that only the most
5	vulnerable of businesses should be eligible given the nature of the
6	emergency and given the availability of insurance coverage;
7	(4) Determining the financial eligibility which each type of
8	small business must meet to receive assistance and the
9	documentation that must be submitted in support of an application
10	for assistance, which financial eligibility shall be confirmed by
11	the State Tax Division upon request made under the rule;
12	(5) Determining the maximum amount of assistance available for
13	<u>each individual small business;</u>
14	(6) Determining the aggregate amount of assistance available
15	for all small businesses for losses incurred as the result of the
16	emergency;
17	(7) Determining the type or types of assistance that is made
18	available, including but not limited to, grants, loans, the
19	appropriate rate of return, if any, that should be assessed on any
20	loan, deferral of payment of payroll taxes or consumer sales tax
21	collections, or other types of assistance as may be directed by the
22	Governor given the nature of the emergency;
23	(8) Designating the agencies responsible for administering the

24 <u>assistance made available under the rule;</u>

1 <u>(9) Providing requirements for recovery by the state for any</u> 2 <u>assistance provided pursuant to a rule authorized by this section</u> 3 <u>either by subrogation or by assignment of any right of the</u> 4 <u>applicant for recovery against third parties held liable for</u> 5 damages incurred and arising out of the emergency; and

6 <u>(10) Providing for the effective widespread dissemination of</u> 7 <u>information about, and aid in processing applications for,</u> 8 financial assistance to small businesses under the rule.

9 (1) The state has the right of subrogation against any 10 proceeds received by the recipient of assistance under any rule 11 authorized by this section for losses incurred as the result of the 12 emergency. At the time an application for assistance is made, the 13 application shall include a statement that explains that the state 14 has the right of subrogation against any proceeds received by the applicant for losses incurred as the result of the emergency and 15 16 the legal implications of subrogation;

17 (m) Assignment of rights.-

18 (1)Submission of an application for assistance under any rule 19 authorized by this section is, as a matter of law, an assignment of 20 the right of the applicant or his or her legal representative to 21 recover from third parties for causes of action available to the 22 applicant arising from the emergency. 23 (2) At the time an application for assistance is made, the

24 application shall include a statement that explains that the

1	applicant has assigned all of his or her rights to recovery from
2	third parties for causes of action available to the applicant
3	arising from the emergency and the legal implications of making
4	this assignment.
5	(3) This section does not prevent the recipient or his or her
6	legal representative from maintaining an action for injuries or
7	damages sustained by the recipient against any third-party for
8	causes of action available to the applicant arising from the
9	emergency.
10	(4) The state shall be legally subrogated to the rights of the
11	recipient against the third party.
12	(5) The state shall have a priority right to be paid first out
13	of any assistance payments made to the applicant for any assistance
14	authorized by any rule authorized by this section.
15	(6) A recipient is considered to have authorized all
16	third-parties to release to the state information needed by the
17	state to secure or enforce its rights as assignee under this
18	subsection.
19	(k)(n) To perform and exercise such other functions, powers
20	and duties as are necessary to promote and secure the safety and
21	protection of the civilian population.
22	No provision of this section abrogates any other right of
23	action, whether in common law or otherwise, by or in behalf of the

state or its duly elected statewide constitutional officers or any other state official or agency, arising from the emergency. No powers granted under this section may be interpreted to authorize any action that would violate the prohibitions of section

5 nineteen-a of this article.
