## Senate Bill No. 547

(By Senators Palumbo, Beach and Nohe)

[Introduced February 12, 2014; referred to the Committee on Government Organization; and then to the Committee on the Judiciary.]

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A BILL to amend and reenact §8-5-7 of the Code of West Virginia,

1931, as amended, relating to increasing or decreasing the
number of municipal wards or election districts and council
members.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

That §8-5-7 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

## §8-5-7. Certain officers; wards or election districts; residency and other requirements.

- 1 (a) Unless otherwise provided in the charter of a
- 2 municipality, there shall be elected a mayor, a recorder and
- 3 councilmen council members, who together shall form the
- 4 governing body of the municipality.
- 5 (b) When a municipality has not been divided into wards
- 6 or election districts, there shall be at least five <del>councilmen</del>
- 7 council members, but when the municipality has been
- 8 divided into wards or election districts, the governing body
- 9 may, by ordinance, determine the number of <del>councilmen</del>
- 10 council members to be elected from each ward or election
- 11 district. When it is deemed considered necessary, the
- 12 governing body may, by ordinance, increase or decrease the
- 13 number of wards or election districts and change the

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boundaries thereof, such the wards or election districts to be made as nearly equal as may be, in population, and when the municipality shall be is divided into wards or election districts, or there shall be is an increase or decrease in the number of wards or election districts as aforesaid, the governing body may increase or decrease the number of councilmen council members and, in the case of an increase in the number of council members, direct an election to be held at the next regular municipal election in such the additional ward or wards or election district or districts so that each ward or election district may have its full number of <del>councilmen</del> council members residing therein and may have equal representation on the governing body. When a municipality has been divided into wards or election districts, the governing body may, by ordinance, also provide for the election of <del>councilmen</del> council members at large in addition to the councilmen council members to be elected from each ward or election district. The provisions of this subsection shall be are applicable to any municipality except to the

- extent otherwise provided in the charter of such the
   municipality.
- ordinance, the mayor, recorder and councilmen council
  members must be residents of the municipality and must be
  qualified voters entitled to vote for members of its governing
  body. A city manager in a manager form of government need
  only be a resident of the city at the time of his or her
  appointment.

(NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to make clear that municipalities have the power to both increase and decrease the number of voting wards and/or council members serving its governing body.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from the present law, and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.)
