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10	A BILL to repeal §16-5W-1, § §16-5W-2, §16-5W-3, §16-5W-4, §16-5W-5, §16-5W-6, §16-5W-7,
11	and §16-5W-8, of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, and to amend and reenact
12	§30-5-7, of said code, relating the authority of the Board of Pharmacy to maintain an official
13	prescription paper program; and allowing pharmacy interns to administer certain
14	immunizations.
15	Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:
16	That §16-5W-1, §16-5W-2, §16-5W-3, §16-5W-4, §16-5W-5, §16-5W-6, §16-5W-7, and
17	§16-5W-8, of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be repealed and that §30-5-7 of said
18	code be amended and reenacted to read as follows:
19	ARTICLE 5. PHARMACISTS, PHARMACY TECHNICIANS, PHARMACY INTERNS
20	AND PHARMACIES.
21	§30-5-7. Rule-making authority.
22	(a) The board shall propose rules for legislative approval, in accordance with the provisions
23	of article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, to implement the provisions of this article, and

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1 articles two, three, eight, nine and ten of chapter sixty-A including:

2	(1) Standards and requirements for a license, permit and registration;
3	(2) Educational and experience requirements;
4	(3) Procedures for examinations and reexaminations;
5	(4) Requirements for third parties to prepare, administer or prepare and administer
6	examinations and reexaminations;
7	(5) The passing grade on the examination;
8	(6) Procedures for the issuance and renewal of a license, permit and registration;
9	(7) A fee schedule;
10	(8) Continuing education requirements;
11	(9) Set standards for professional conduct;
12	(10) Establish equipment and facility standards for pharmacies;
13	(11) Approve courses and standards for training pharmacist technicians;
14	(12) Regulation of charitable clinic pharmacies;
15	(13) Regulation of mail order pharmacies: Provided, That until the board establishes
16	requirements that provide further conditions for pharmacists whom consult with or who provide
17	pharmacist care to patients regarding prescriptions dispensed in this state by a mail order pharmacy,
18	the pharmacist in charge of the out-of-state mail order pharmacy shall be licensed in West Virginia
19	and any other pharmacist providing pharmacist care from the mail order pharmacy shall be licensed

(22) Registration and control of the manufacture and distribution of controlled substanceswithin this state.

(25) Procedures for denying, suspending, revoking, reinstating or limiting the practice of a
licensee, permittee or registrant;

5 (32) Establish and maintain an official prescription paper program; and

6 (32)(33) Any other rules necessary to effectuate the provisions of this article.

7 (b) The board may provide an exemption to the pharmacist-in-charge requirement for the8 opening of a new retail pharmacy or during a declared emergency;

9 (c) The board, the Board of Medicine and the Board of Osteopathic Medicine shall jointly 10 agree and propose rules concerning collaborative pharmacy practice for legislative approval in 11 accordance with the provisions of article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of the code;

(d) The board with the advice of the Board of Medicine and the Board of Osteopathic
Medicine shall propose rules for legislative approval in accordance with the provisions of article
three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code to perform influenza and pneumonia immunizations, on a
person of eighteen years of age or older. These rules shall provide, at a minimum, for the following:
(1) Establishment of a course, or provide a list of approved courses, in immunization
administration. The courses shall be based on the standards established for such courses by the
Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in the public health service of the United States
Department of Health and Human Services;

(2) Definitive treatment guidelines which shall include, but not be limited to, appropriate
21 observation for an adverse reaction of an individual following an immunization;

22 (3) Prior to administration of immunizations, a pharmacist shall have completed a board

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approved immunization administration course and completed an American Red Cross or American
 Heart Association basic life-support training, and maintain certification in the same.

3 (4) Continuing education requirements for this area of practice;

4 (5) Reporting requirements for pharmacists administering immunizations to report to the 5 primary care physician or other licensed health care provider as identified by the person receiving 6 the immunization;

7 (6) Reporting requirements for pharmacists administering immunizations to report to the
8 West Virginia Statewide Immunization Information (WVSII);

9 (7) That a pharmacist may not delegate the authority to administer immunizations to any 10 other person; unless administered by a licensed pharmacy intern under the direct supervision of a 11 pharmacist of whom both pharmacist and intern have successfully completed all board required 12 training; and

13 (8) Any other provisions necessary to implement the provisions of this section.

(e) The board, the Board of Medicine and the Board of Osteopathic Medicine shall propose joint rules for legislative approval in accordance with the provisions of article three, chapter twentynine-a of this code to permit <u>a</u> licensed pharmacist or <u>pharmacy intern</u> to administer other immunizations such as Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Herpes Zoster and Tetanus. These rules shall provide, at a minimum, the same provisions contained in subsection (d)(1) through (d)(8) of this section.

(f) All of the board's rules in effect and not in conflict with these provisions, shall remain in
effect until they are amended or rescinded.

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NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to permit the Board of Pharmacy to maintain an official prescription program and to clarify that a pharmacy intern can perform certain immunizations with training.
