1 A BILL to amend and reenact §15-2B-2, §15-2B-3, §15-2B-5, §15-2B-6, §15-2B-9 and §15-2B-
2 11 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to amend said code by adding
3 thereto a new section, designated §15-9B-4, all relating to DNA evidence; requiring the
4 collection of DNA samples from individuals arrested for certain felony crimes for inclusion
5 in and search of the DNA Databank; defining terms; providing that DNA samples shall be
6 taken by buccal swab rather than drawing blood; authorizing certain cooperative
7 agreements; requiring qualified arrestees to submit to a DNA sample collection during the
8 arrest intake; requiring a DNA sample be taken of any person convicted of a felony
9 offense; authorizing the use of the DNA sample in accordance with this article; authorizing
10 law-enforcement and corrections employees to use reasonable force to obtain a DNA
11 sample when an individual refuses; limiting liability when a person obtaining a DNA sample
12 acts in good faith and deeming the sample taken in accordance with this article; setting
13 forth a process for handling samples taken in error; requiring Superintendent of the State
14 Police to submit emergency and legislative rules detailing the collection of DNA samples
15 from qualifying arrestees; setting forth a process for expungement of the DNA sample;
16 stating that any database match is not invalidated by a failure to or delay in expunging
17 records; expanding authority of the sexual assault forensic examination commission;
18 requiring the commission to authorize a sub-group to establish protocols and propose
19 legislative rules regarding the submission of sexual assault forensic examination kits in a
20 timely manner from health care providers to law-enforcement agencies and from law-
21 enforcement agencies to the West Virginia State Police or the Marshall University Forensic
22 Science Center with certain restrictions and requirements; authorizing promulgation of
23 emergency rules with certain restrictions; requiring the rules to address testing of the kits,
24 return of the kits and retention of the kits; permitting certain repackaging of kits not
25 associated with an open case file; and ensuring that the changes and associated rules do
26 not create a claim or right to relief by any person.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

1 That §15-2B-2, §15-2B-3, §15-2B-5, §15-2B-6, §15-2B-9 and §15-2B-11 of the Code of
2 West Virginia, 1931, as amended, be amended and reenacted; and that said code be amended
3 by adding thereto a new section, designated §15-9B-4, all to read as follows:

ARTICLE 2B. DNA DATA.

§15-2B-2. Policy.

1 It is the policy of this state to assist federal, state and local criminal justice and law-
2 enforcement agencies in the identification, detection and exclusion of individuals who are subjects
3 of the investigation or prosecution of violent crimes, sex-related crimes and other crimes against
4 the person. In furtherance of such assistance, the Legislature finds:

5 That the analysis of DNA contained in biological evidence that may be recovered from a
6 crime scene facilitates such identification, detection and exclusion;

7 That the comparison of DNA data recovered from a crime scene with existing DNA records
8 maintained in a central DNA database further facilitates such identification, detection and
9 exclusion; and

10 That requiring individuals arrested or convicted of certain crimes to ~~provide a blood sample~~
11 submit to a for DNA analysis with the resulting DNA records maintained in a central DNA database
12 will likewise further facilitate the aforementioned identification, detection and exclusion and may
13 serve to discourage recidivism.

14 Therefore, the Legislature finds that assisting federal, state and local criminal justice and
15 law-enforcement agencies through the use and development of DNA analysis is of the utmost
16 importance and urgency in this state and that a DNA identification system shall be established as
17 described in this article.

§15-2B-3. Definitions.

1 As used in this article:

2 (1) "Arresting authority" means the law-enforcement officer who arrests the individual or

3 an authorized representative of the agency responsible for the arrest.

4 (4) (2) "CODIS" means the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Combined DNA Index
5 System that allows the storage and exchange of DNA records submitted by federal, state and
6 local forensic DNA laboratories. The term "CODIS" includes the National DNA Index System
7 administered and operated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

8 (2) (3) "Conviction" includes convictions by a jury or court, guilty plea, or plea of nolo
9 contendere.

10 (3) (4) "Criminal justice agency" means an agency or institution of a federal, state or local
11 government, other than the office of public defender, which performs as part of its principal
12 function, relating to the apprehension, investigation, prosecution, adjudication, incarceration,
13 supervision or rehabilitation of criminal offenders.

14 (4) (5) "Division" means the West Virginia State Police."

15 (5) (6) "DNA" means deoxyribonucleic acid. DNA is located in the nucleus of cells and
16 provides an individual's personal genetic blueprint. DNA encodes genetic information that is the
17 basis of human ~~heredity~~ relationships and forensic identification.

18 (6) (7) "DNA record" means DNA identification information stored in any state DNA
19 database pursuant to this article. The DNA record is the result obtained from DNA typing tests.
20 The DNA record is comprised of the characteristics of a DNA sample which are of value in
21 establishing the identity of individuals. The results of all DNA identification tests on an individual's
22 DNA sample are also included as a "DNA record".

23 (7) (8) "DNA sample" means the cells collected through a buccal swab, also known as a
24 buccal smear, that is collected from the inside of a person's cheek and is a tissue, fluid or other
25 ~~bodily sample,~~ suitable for testing, provided pursuant to this article or submitted to the division
26 laboratory for analysis pursuant to a criminal investigation.

27 (8) (9) "FBI" means the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

28 (9) (10) "Interim plan" means the plan used currently by the Federal Bureau of

29 Investigation for Partial Match Protocol and to be adopted under the management rules of this
30 article.

31 ~~(40)~~ (11) "Management rules" means the rules promulgated by the West Virginia State
32 Police that define all policy and procedures in the administration of this article.

33 ~~(44)~~ (12) "Partial match" means that two DNA profiles, while not an exact match, share a
34 sufficient number of characteristics to indicate the possibility of a biological relationship.

35 (13) "Qualified arrestee" means any individual arrested for a felony crime of violence
36 against the person or a felony offense where the victim was a minor child, as those phrases are
37 defined in section twenty-seven, article five, chapter twenty-eight of this code.

38 (14) "Qualified offender" means any person convicted of a qualifying offense.

39 ~~(42)~~ (15) "Qualifying offense" means any felony offense as described in section six of this
40 article or any offense requiring a person to register as a sex offender under this code or the federal
41 law. For the purpose of this article, a person found not guilty of a qualifying offense by reason of
42 insanity or mental disease or defect shall be required to provide a DNA sample in accordance
43 with this article.

44 ~~(43)~~ (16) "Registering Agency" means the West Virginia State Police.

45 ~~(44)~~ (17) "State DNA database" means all DNA identification records included in the
46 system administered by the West Virginia State Police.

47 ~~(45)~~ (18) "State DNA databank" means the repository of DNA samples collected under the
48 provisions of this article.

§15-2B-5. Authority of division to enter into cooperative agreements.

1 The division may enter into cooperative agreements with public or private agencies or
2 entities to provide a service or facility associated with the administration of the DNA database and
3 databank. In the event the division enters into any agreements for the purposes of: (1) Testing of
4 qualified arrestee or qualified offender samples for CODIS; (2) criminal paternity cases; or (3)
5 criminal casework; or (4) identification of human remains for the Office of Chief Medical Examiner

6 using nuclear DNA technology, the division is authorized to only enter into such agreements with
7 the Marshall University Forensic Science Center.

**§15-2B-6. DNA sample required for DNA analysis upon conviction; DNA sample required
for certain prisoners.**

1 (a) Any qualified arrestee who is eighteen years of age or older and is arrested by an
2 authorized arresting authority shall submit to a DNA sample collection during the intake process.

3 The DNA sample shall be used for DNA analysis as described in this article.

4 ~~(a) (b) Any person convicted of an offense described in section one, four, seven, nine,~~
5 ~~nine-a (when that offense constitutes a felony), ten, ten-a, ten-b, twelve, fourteen or fourteen-a,~~
6 ~~article two, chapter sixty-one of this code or section twelve, article eight of said chapter (when~~
7 ~~that offense constitutes a felony), a felony offense, shall provide a DNA sample to be used for~~
8 DNA analysis as described in this article. Further, any person convicted of any offense described
9 in article eight-b or eight-d of said chapter sixty-one of this code shall provide a DNA sample to
10 be used for DNA analysis as described in this article.

11 ~~(b) (c) Any person presently incarcerated in a state correctional facility or in jail in this state~~
12 after conviction of any offense listed in subsection (a) of this section shall provide a DNA sample
13 to be used for purposes of DNA analysis as described in this article.

14 ~~(c) (d) Any person convicted of a violation of section five or thirteen, article two, chapter~~
15 ~~sixty-one of this code, section one, two, three, four, five, seven, eleven, twelve (when that offense~~
16 ~~constitutes a felony) or subsection (a), section thirteen, article three of said chapter, section three,~~
17 ~~four, five or ten, article three-e of said chapter or section three, article four of said chapter, shall~~
18 provide a DNA sample to be used for DNA analysis as described in this article.

19 ~~(d) (e) Any person convicted of an offense which constitutes a felony violation of the~~
20 ~~provisions of article four, chapter sixty-a of this code; or of an attempt to commit a violation of~~
21 ~~section one or section fourteen-a, article two, chapter sixty-one of this code; or an attempt to~~
22 commit a violation of article eight-b of said chapter sixty-one of this code shall provide a DNA

23 sample to be used for DNA analysis as described in this article.

24 ~~(e)~~ (f) The method of taking the DNA sample is subject to the testing methods used by the
25 West Virginia State Police Crime Lab or the Marshall University Forensic Science Center. The
26 DNA sample will be collected using a postage paid DNA collection kit provided by the West
27 Virginia State Police.

28 ~~(f)~~ (g) When a person required to provide a DNA sample pursuant to this section refuses
29 to comply, the state shall apply to a circuit court for an order requiring the person to provide a
30 DNA sample. Upon a finding of failure to comply, the circuit court shall order the person to submit
31 to DNA testing in conformity with the provisions of this article.

32 ~~(g) The West Virginia State Police may, where not otherwise mandated, require any~~
33 ~~person convicted of a felony offense under the provisions of this code, to provide a DNA sample~~
34 ~~to be used for the sole purpose of criminal identification of the convicted person who provided the~~
35 ~~sample: *Provided*, That the person is under the supervision of the criminal justice system at the~~
36 ~~time the request for the sample is made. Supervision includes prison, the regional jail system,~~
37 ~~parole, probation, home confinement, community corrections program, and work release.~~

38 (h) On the effective date of the amendments to this section enacted during the regular
39 session of the Legislature in 2011, any person required to register as a sex offender in this state
40 and who has not already provided a DNA sample in accordance with this article, shall provide a
41 DNA sample as determined by the registration agency in consultation with the West Virginia State
42 Police Laboratory. The registering agency is responsible for the collection and submission of the
43 sample under this article.

44 (i) When this state accepts a person from another state under any interstate compact, or
45 under any other reciprocal agreement with any county, state or federal agency or any other
46 provision of law whether or not the person is confined or released, the transferred person must
47 submit a DNA sample, if the person was convicted of an offense in any other jurisdiction which
48 would be considered a qualifying offense as defined in section six if committed in this state, or if

49 the person was convicted of an equivalent offense in any other jurisdiction. The person shall
50 provide the DNA sample in accordance with the rules of the custodial institution or supervising
51 agency. If the transferred person has already submitted a DNA sample that can be found in the
52 national database, the accepting agency is not required to draw a second DNA sample.

53 (j) If a person convicted of a qualifying offense is released without giving a DNA sample
54 due to an oversight or error or because of the person's transfer from another jurisdiction, the
55 person shall give a DNA sample for inclusion in the state DNA database after being notified of
56 this obligation. Any such person may request a copy of the court order requiring the sample prior
57 to the collection of the DNA sample.

58 (k) Duly authorized law-enforcement and corrections personnel may employ reasonable
59 force in cases where an individual refuses to provide a DNA sample required under this article,
60 and no such employee shall be civilly or criminally liable for the use of such reasonable force in
61 the collection of the required DNA sample.

62 (l) A DNA sample obtained in good faith shall be deemed to have been obtained in
63 accordance with the requirements of this article and its use in accordance with this chapter is
64 authorized. Once an error is determined to have occurred, the DNA record will be removed from
65 CODIS and the DNA sample destroyed unless the individual has another qualifying offense or
66 offenses.

67 (m) Persons authorized to collect DNA samples are not civilly or criminally liable for the
68 collection of a DNA sample pursuant to this article if they perform these duties in good faith and
69 in a reasonable manner according to generally accepted medical or other professional practices.

**§15-2B-9. Procedures for withdrawal of blood sample for DNA analysis and for conducting
analysis.**

1 (a) The Superintendent of the West Virginia State Police shall promulgate an emergency
2 rule and propose a legislative rule pursuant to chapter twenty-nine-a of this code establishing the
3 procedure that an arresting authority shall use to obtain a DNA sample on a qualified arrestee.

4 ~~(a)~~ (b) Upon incarceration, the Division of Corrections, regional jails and felon facilities
5 shall ensure that the DNA sample is collected from all persons qualified offenders convicted of an
6 offense described in section six of this article. When any person convicted of an offense described
7 in section six is not incarcerated, the sheriff in the county where the person is convicted shall
8 ensure that the DNA sample is collected from the person: *Provided*, That a DNA sample may be
9 collected at a prison, regional facility or local hospital unit when so ordered by the sentencing
10 court or other location determined by the sheriff.

11 ~~(b)~~ (c) The Superintendent of the West Virginia State Police shall promulgate a legislative
12 rule pursuant to chapter twenty-nine-a of this code establishing which persons may ~~withdraw~~
13 ~~blood and further establishing procedures to withdraw blood. At a minimum, these procedures~~
14 ~~shall require that when blood is withdrawn for the purpose of DNA identification testing, a~~
15 ~~previously unused and sterile needle and sterile vessel shall be used, the withdrawal shall~~
16 ~~otherwise be in strict accord with accepted medical practices and in accordance with any~~
17 ~~recognized medical procedures employing universal precautions as outlined by the Centers for~~
18 ~~Disease Control and Prevention. No civil liability attaches to any person when the blood was~~
19 ~~drawn according to recognized medical procedures employing the universal precautions. No~~
20 ~~person is relieved of liability for negligence in the drawing of blood for purposes of DNA testing~~
21 collect DNA samples.

22 ~~(e)~~ (d) The Superintendent of the West Virginia State Police shall ~~promulgate legislative~~
23 ~~rules~~ propose rules for legislative approval pursuant to chapter twenty-nine-a of this code
24 governing the procedures to be used in the collection of DNA samples, submission, identification,
25 analysis and storage of DNA samples and typing results of DNA samples submitted under this
26 article which shall be compatible with recognized federal standards.

27 ~~(d)~~ (e) The agency having control, custody or supervision of qualifying arrestees or
28 persons convicted for qualifying offenses may, in consultation with and approval of the West
29 Virginia State Police Laboratory, promulgate rules or policies specifying the time and manner of

30 collection of the DNA samples as well as any other matter necessary to carry out its
31 responsibilities under this article.

32 ~~(e) The agency or institution having custody, control or providing supervision of persons~~
33 ~~convicted for qualifying offenses, as appropriate, is authorized to contract with third parties to~~
34 ~~provide for the collection of the DNA samples described in section six of this article.~~

35 (f) A person, convicted of a qualifying offense and not incarcerated in a facility described
36 in subsection ~~(a)~~ (b) of this section, who has been put on notice of his or her obligation to provide
37 a DNA sample and has not submitted a court ordered DNA sample at the request of a law-
38 enforcement agency, shall be responsible for notifying the agency designated in the court order
39 and complying with that agency's directives for submitting a DNA sample. The person shall have
40 thirty days from the receipt of the court order to comply unless there is a documented exception
41 from the agency responsible for the DNA sample collection. A person refusing to comply with a
42 court order directing that person submit a DNA sample may be considered in contempt.

43 (g) Any court sentencing a person convicted of a qualifying offense to probation, on or
44 after the effective date of the amendments to this section enacted during the regular session of
45 the Legislature in 2011, shall order, as a condition of such probation, that the convicted person
46 report to the local sheriff's department to provide a DNA sample within thirty days.

§15-2B-11. Expungement.

1 (a) Any qualifying arrestee whose DNA record has been included in the state DNA
2 database in accordance with this article may apply for expungement on the grounds that the arrest
3 on which the authority for searching and including the person's DNA record or DNA profile was
4 based has resulted in the charge being dismissed or has resulted in acquittal or no charge was
5 filed within the statute of limitations for the offense. Upon receipt of a written application for
6 expungement and any other information necessary to ascertain the validity of the request, the
7 division shall expunge the DNA records and identifiable information in the database pertaining to
8 the arrestee sample of the person and destroy the arrestee DNA sample from the person, unless

9 the division determines that the person has otherwise become obligated to submit a DNA sample.

10 ~~(a)~~ (b) Any person convicted of a qualifying offense whose DNA record or profile has been
11 included in the state database and whose DNA sample is stored in the state databank or the
12 state's designated DNA typing, testing and research laboratory may apply for expungement on
13 the grounds that the felony conviction that resulted in the inclusion of the person's DNA record or
14 profile in the state database or the inclusion of the person's DNA sample in the state databank
15 has been reversed and the case dismissed. The person ~~requesting~~ applying for expungement,
16 either individually or through an attorney, may apply to the court for expungement of the record.
17 A copy of the application for expungement shall be served on the prosecuting attorney for the
18 judicial district in which the felony conviction was obtained not less than twenty days prior to the
19 date of the hearing on the application. A certified copy of the order reversing and dismissing the
20 conviction shall be attached to an order of expungement.

21 ~~(b)~~ (c) Upon receipt of an order of expungement, the division shall purge the DNA record
22 and all other identifiable information from the state database and the DNA sample stored in the
23 state databank covered by the order. If the individual has more than one entry in the state
24 database and databank, then only the entry covered by the expungement order shall be deleted
25 from the state database or databank.

26 (d) Any identification, warrant, probable cause to arrest or arrest based upon a database
27 match is not invalidated due to a failure to expunge or a reasonable delay in expunging records.

ARTICLE 9B. SEXUAL ASSAULT EXAMINATION NETWORK.

§15-9B-4. Submission, testing and retention of sexual assault forensic examination kits.

1 (a) The commission shall create a sub-group of persons with subject matter expertise to
2 establish best-practice protocols for the submission of sexual assault forensic examination kits by
3 the health care providers to the relevant law-enforcement agency. The commission may propose
4 rules for legislative approval, in accordance with article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code,
5 detailing the best-practice protocols. If the Legislature approves of the legislative rules, then Local

6 Sexual Assault Forensic Examination Boards shall follow those rules. If legislative rules detailing
7 the best-practice protocols are not proposed and approved, then Local Sexual Assault Forensic
8 Examination Boards may adopt the best-practice protocols or use it as a guide to set out a system
9 for submitting the sexual assault forensic examination kits from the health care provider to the
10 relevant law-enforcement agency.

11 (b) The commission shall propose rules for legislative approval, in accordance with article
12 three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, that require law-enforcement agencies in possession of
13 a sexual assault forensic examination kit to forward the sexual assault kit to the West Virginia
14 State Police or the Marshall University Forensic Science Center, at the direction of the West
15 Virginia State Police, for a DNA analysis of the sexual assault kit. The rule shall set forth the
16 process and requirements for submissions, including a defined timeline for submission of kits in
17 law enforcement possession as of the effective date of this section and the time limits for the
18 submission of future kits. The rule shall require the West Virginia State Police or the Marshall
19 University Forensic Science Center to perform a DNA analysis of the any sexual assault
20 examination kits pursuant to a defined timeline, to enter the resulting DNA record into the DNA
21 database created pursuant to article two-b of this chapter, and to return the sexual assault kit to
22 the law-enforcement agency that made the submission. The rule shall also set forth protocols for
23 the law-enforcement agency to secure the sexual assault kit following the DNA analysis and set
24 standards for retention of the evidence to ensure it will preserve the DNA evidence.

25 (c) If there is a nonreport, where a sexual assault kit is submitted to Marshall University
26 Forensic Science Center but the kit is not connected to an open case file, the kit shall be preserved
27 in its original packaging for two years. After two years, the Marshall University Forensic Science
28 Center may archive the kit by opening the packaging, discarding any unusable contents, and
29 repackaging the remaining contents in a manner that allows easier storage that retains the ability
30 to test the usable contents in the future if an open case file associated with the contents arises.

31 (d) The failure of any law-enforcement agency to comply with any time limit specified in

32 this section or the rules created at the direction of this section does not create, and may not be
33 construed as creating, any basis or right to appeal, claim for or right to post conviction relief, or
34 claim for or right to a new trial or any other claim or right to relief by any person.

35 (e) The commission may promulgate emergency rules pursuant to the provisions of
36 section fifteen, article three, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code, in order to implement this section:
37 Provided, That the emergency rules may not permit the destruction of any DNA evidence.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to allow law enforcement to obtain DNA samples from arrestees for certain criminal offenses, to expand DNA sample collection to all those convicted of a felony offense, and to increase the preservation, submission and testing of certain DNA evidence.

Strike-throughs indicate language that would be stricken from a heading or the present law and underscoring indicates new language that would be added.
