1 A BILL to amend and reenact §16-5H-2, §16-5H-5 and §16-5H-7 of the Code of West Virginia,
 2 1931, as amended, all relating to the regulation of chronic pain clinics; updating definitions;
 3 deleting an exemption; and clarifying the process for hearing notices upon appeal.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

1 That §16-5H-2, §16-5H-5 and §16-5H-7 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended,
 2 be amended and reenacted, all to read as follows:

ARTICLE 5H. CHRONIC PAIN CLINIC LICENSING ACT.

§16-5H-2. Definitions.

1 (a) AChronic pain@ means pain that has persisted after reasonable medical efforts have
 2 been made to relieve the pain or cure its cause and that has continued, either continuously or
 3 episodically, for longer than three continuous months. For purposes of this article, Achronic pain@
 4 does not include pain directly associated with a terminal condition. ~~or with a progressive disease~~
 5 ~~that, in the normal course of progression, may reasonably be expected to result in a terminal~~
 6 ~~condition~~

7 (b) ADirector@ means the Director of the Office of Health Facility Licensure and
 8 Certification within the Office of the Inspector General.

9 (c) AOwner@ means any person, partnership, association or corporation listed as the
 10 owner of a pain management clinic on the licensing forms required by this article.

11 (d) APain management clinic@ means all privately owned pain management clinics,
 12 facilities or offices not otherwise exempted from this article and which meets both of the following
 13 criteria:

14 (1) Where ~~in any month~~ more than fifty percent of patients of the ~~prescribers or dispensers~~
 15 clinic are prescribed or dispensed opioids or other controlled substances specified in rules
 16 promulgated pursuant to this article for chronic pain resulting from ~~nonmalignant~~ conditions that
 17 are not terminal; and

18 (2) The facility meets any other identifying criteria established by the secretary by rule.

19 (e) APhysician@ means an individual authorized to practice medicine or surgery or
 20 osteopathic medicine or surgery in this state.

21 (f) APrescriber@ means an individual who is authorized by law to prescribe drugs or drug
 22 therapy related devices in the course of the individual=s professional practice, including only a
 23 medical or osteopathic physician authorized to practice medicine or surgery; a physician assistant
 24 or osteopathic physician assistant who holds a certificate to prescribe drugs; or an advanced
 25 nurse practitioner who holds a certificate to prescribe.

26 (g) ASecretary@ means the Secretary of the West Virginia Department of Health and
 27 Human Resources. The secretary may define in rules any term or phrase used in this article which
 28 is not expressly defined.

§16-5H-5. Exemptions.

1 (a) The following facilities are not pain management clinics subject to the requirements of
 2 this article:

3 ~~(1) A facility that is affiliated with an accredited medical school at which training is provided~~
 4 ~~for medical or osteopathic students, residents or fellows, podiatrists, dentists, nurses, physician~~
 5 ~~assistants, veterinarians or any affiliated facility to the extent that it participates in the provision of~~
 6 ~~the instruction;~~

7 ~~(2) (1)~~ A facility that does not prescribe or dispense controlled substances for the treatment
 8 of chronic pain;

9 ~~(3) (2)~~ A hospital licensed in this state, a facility located on the campus of a licensed
 10 hospital that is owned, operated or controlled by that licensed hospital, and an ambulatory health
 11 care facility as defined by section two, article two-d, chapter sixteen of this code that is owned,
 12 operated or controlled by a licensed hospital;

13 ~~(4) (3)~~ A physician practice owned or controlled, in whole or in part, by a licensed hospital

14 or by an entity that owns or controls, in whole or in part, one or more licensed hospitals;

15 ~~(5)~~ (4) A hospice program licensed in this state;

16 ~~(6)~~ (5) A nursing home licensed in this state;

17 ~~(7)~~ (6) An ambulatory surgical facility as defined by section two, article two-d, chapter
18 sixteen of this code; and

19 ~~(8)~~ (7) A facility conducting clinical research that may use controlled substances in studies
20 approved by a hospital-based institutional review board or an institutional review board accredited
21 by the association for the accreditation of human research protection programs.

22 (b) Any facility that is not included in this section may petition to the secretary for an
23 exemption from the requirements of this article. All such petitions are subject to the administrative
24 procedures requirements of chapter twenty-nine-a of this code.

§16-5H-7. Suspension; revocation.

1 (a) The secretary may suspend or revoke a license issued pursuant to this article if the
2 provisions of this article or of the rules promulgated pursuant to this article are violated. The
3 secretary may revoke a clinic=s license and prohibit all physicians associated with that pain
4 management clinic from practicing at the clinic location based upon an annual or periodic
5 inspection and evaluation.

6 (b) Before any such license is suspended or revoked, however, written notice shall be
7 given to the licensee. ~~stating the grounds of the complaint, and the date, time and place set for~~
8 ~~the hearing on the complaint, which date shall not be less than thirty days from the time notice is~~
9 ~~given~~ The notice shall be sent by certified mail to the licensee at the address where the pain
10 management clinic concerned is located. The licensee shall be entitled to be represented by legal
11 counsel at the hearing.

12 (c) If a license is revoked as herein provided, a new application for a license shall be
13 considered by the secretary if, when and after the conditions upon which revocation was based
14 have been corrected and evidence of this fact has been furnished. A new license shall then be

15 granted after proper inspection has been made and all provisions of this article and rules
16 promulgated pursuant to this article have been satisfied.

17 (d) All of the pertinent provisions of article five, chapter twenty-nine-a of this code shall
18 apply to and govern any hearing authorized and required by the provisions of this article and the
19 administrative procedure in connection therewith.

20 (e) Any applicant or licensee who is dissatisfied with the decision of the secretary as a
21 result of the hearing provided in this section may, within thirty days after receiving notice of the
22 decision, appeal the decision to the circuit court of Kanawha County, in term or in vacation, for
23 judicial review of the decision.

24 (f) The court may affirm, modify or reverse the decision of the secretary and either the
25 applicant or licensee or the secretary may appeal from the court's decision to the Supreme Court
26 of Appeals.

27 (g) If the license of a pain management clinic is revoked or suspended, the designated
28 physician of the clinic, any other owner of the clinic or the owner or lessor of the clinic property
29 shall cease to operate the facility as a pain management clinic as of the effective date of the
30 suspension or revocation. The owner or lessor of the clinic property is responsible for removing
31 all signs and symbols identifying the premises as a pain management clinic within thirty days.

32 (h) Upon the effective date of the suspension or revocation, the designated physician of
33 the pain management clinic shall advise the secretary and the Board of Pharmacy of the
34 disposition of all drugs located on the premises. The disposition is subject to the supervision and
35 approval of the secretary. Drugs that are purchased or held by a pain management clinic that is
36 not licensed may be deemed adulterated.

37 (i) If the license of a pain management clinic is suspended or revoked, any person named
38 in the licensing documents of the clinic, including persons owning or operating the pain
39 management clinic, may not, as an individual or as part of a group, apply to operate another pain
40 management clinic for five years after the date of suspension or revocation.

- 41 (j) The period of suspension for the license of a pain management clinic shall be prescribed
42 by the secretary, but may not exceed one year.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to update definitions and exemptions and clarify hearing notice procedures.
