1 A BILL to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article,  
 2 designated §16-20-1, §16-20-2, §16-20-3, and §16-20-4, all relating to prohibiting  
 3 discrimination, based on individual’s mental or physical disability, in access to organ  
 4 transplantation; and providing enforcement mechanisms.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:*

**ARTICLE 20. NONDISCRIMINATION IN ACCESS TO ORGAN TRANSPLANTATION.**

**§16-20-1. Legislative Intent.**

1 The Legislature finds that:

2 (1) A mental or physical disability does not diminish a person’s right to health care;

3 (2) The “Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990” prohibits discrimination against persons  
 4 with disabilities, yet many individuals with disabilities still experience discrimination in accessing  
 5 critical health care services;

6 (3) Individuals with mental and physical disabilities have historically been denied life-  
 7 saving organ transplants based on assumptions that their lives are less worthy, that they are  
 8 incapable of complying with post-transplant medical regimens, or that they lack adequate support  
 9 systems to ensure such compliance;

10 (4) Although organ transplant centers must consider medical and psychosocial criteria  
 11 when determining if a patient is suitable to receive an organ transplant, transplant centers that  
 12 participate in Medicare, Medicaid, and other federal funding programs are required to use patient  
 13 selection criteria that result in a fair and nondiscriminatory distribution of organs; and

14 (5) West Virginia residents in need of organ transplants are entitled to assurances that  
 15 they will not encounter discrimination on the basis of a disability.

**§16-20-2. Definitions.**

1 As used in this article:

2 “Disability” has the same meaning set forth in the Americans with Disabilities Act  
 3 Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), as amended by the ADA Amendments Act of 2008,

4 at 42 U.S.C. § 12102.

5 “Anatomical gift” means a donation of all or part of a human body to take effect after the  
6 donor’s death for the purpose of transplantation or transfusion.

7 “Auxiliary aids and services” includes:

8 (A) Qualified interpreters or other effective methods of making aurally delivered materials  
9 available to individuals with hearing impairments;

10 (B) Qualified readers, taped texts, or other effective methods of making visually delivered  
11 materials available to individuals with visual impairments;

12 (C) Provision of information in a format that is accessible for individuals with cognitive,  
13 neurological, developmental, and/or intellectual disabilities;

14 (D) Provision of supported decision-making services; and

15 (E) Acquisition or modification of equipment or devices; and

16 (F) Other similar services and actions.

17 “Covered entity” means:

18 (A) Any licensed provider of health care services, including licensed health care  
19 practitioners, hospitals, nursing facilities, laboratories, intermediate care facilities, psychiatric  
20 residential treatment facilities, institutions for individuals with intellectual or developmental  
21 disabilities, and prison health centers; or

22 (B) Any entity responsible for matching anatomical gift donors to potential recipients.

23 “Organ transplant” means the transplantation or transfusion of a part of a human body into the  
24 body of another for the purpose of treating or curing a medical condition.

25 “Qualified individual” means an individual who, with or without the support networks  
26 available to them, provision of auxiliary aids and services, and/or reasonable modifications to  
27 policies or practices, meets the essential eligibility requirements for the receipt of an anatomical  
28 gift.

29 “Reasonable modifications to policies or practices” may include:

30 (A) Communication with individuals responsible for supporting an individual with post-  
31 surgical and post-transplantation care, including medication;

32 (B) Consideration of support networks available to the individual, including family, friends,  
33 and home and community-based services, including home and community-based services funded  
34 through Medicaid, Medicare, another health plan in which the individual is enrolled, or any  
35 program or source of funding available to the individual, in determining whether the individual is  
36 able to comply with post-transplant medical requirements;

37 “Supported decision-making” includes use of a support person or persons in order to assist  
38 an individual in making medical decisions, communicate information to the individual, or ascertain  
39 an individual’s wishes, including:

40 (A) Inclusion of the individual’s attorney-in-fact, health care proxy, or any person of the  
41 individual’s choice in communications about the individual’s medical care;

42 (B) Permitting the individual to a person of their choice for the purposes of supporting that  
43 individual in communicating, processing information, or making medical decisions;

44 (C) Provision of auxiliary aids and services to facilitate the individual’s ability to  
45 communicate and process health-related information, including use of assistive communication  
46 technology;

47 (D) Provision of information to persons designated by the individual, consistent with the  
48 provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), 42 U.S.C.  
49 § 1301 et seq., and other applicable laws and regulations governing disclosure of health  
50 information;

51 (E) Provision of health information in a format that is readily understandable by the  
52 individual;

53 (F) If the individual has a court-appointed guardian or other individual responsible for  
54 making medical decisions on behalf of the individual, any measures to ensure that the individual  
55 is included in decisions involving his or her own health care and that medical decisions are in

56 accordance with the individual's own expressed interests.

**§16-20-3. Discrimination prohibited.**

1 (a) A covered entity may not, solely on the basis of a qualified individual's mental or  
2 physical disability:

3 (1) Deem an individual ineligible to receive an anatomical gift or organ transplant;

4 (2) Deny medical and related services related to organ transplantation, including  
5 evaluation, surgery, counseling, post-operative treatment and services;

6 (3) Refuse to refer the individual to a transplant center or other related specialist for the  
7 purpose of evaluation or receipt of an organ transplant;

8 (4) Refuse to place an individual on an organ transplant waiting list, or placement of the  
9 individual at a lower-priority position on the list than the position at which he or she would have  
10 been placed if not for his or her disability; or

11 (5) Decline insurance coverage for any procedure associated with the receipt of the  
12 anatomical gift, including post-transplantation care;

13 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, a covered entity may take an individual's  
14 disability into account when making treatment and/or coverage recommendations or decisions,  
15 solely to the extent that the physical or mental disability has been found by a physician or surgeon,  
16 following an individualized evaluation of the potential recipient, to be medically significant to the  
17 provision of the anatomical gift. The provisions of this section shall not be deemed to require  
18 referrals or recommendations for, or the performance of, medically inappropriate organ  
19 transplants.

20 (c) If an individual has the necessary support system to assist the individual in complying  
21 with post-transplant medical requirements, an individual's inability to independently comply with  
22 those requirements shall not be deemed to be medically significant for the purposes of subsection  
23 (b) of this section.

24 (d) A covered entity shall make reasonable modifications in policies, practices, or

25 procedures, when such modifications are necessary to make services such as transplantation-  
 26 related counseling, information, coverage, or treatment available to qualified individuals with  
 27 disabilities, unless the entity can demonstrate that making such modifications would  
 28 fundamentally alter the nature of such services;

29 (e) A covered entity shall take steps necessary to ensure that no qualified individual with  
 30 a disability is denied services such as transplantation-related counseling, information, coverage,  
 31 or treatment because of the absence of auxiliary aids and services, unless the entity can  
 32 demonstrate that taking those steps would fundamentally alter the nature of the services being  
 33 offered or would result in an undue burden;

34 (f) A covered entity shall otherwise comply with the requirements of Titles II and III of the  
 35 Americans with Disabilities Act and ADA Amendments Act of 2008.

36 (g) The provisions of this section apply to each part of the organ transplant process.

**§16-20-4. Enforcement.**

1 (a) The remedy for violations of this article are the same as those available under Titles II  
 2 and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 12131-12189.

3 (b) The court shall accord priority on its calendar and expeditiously proceed with an action  
 4 brought to seek any remedy authorized by law for purposes of enforcing compliance with the  
 5 provisions of this article.

NOTE: The purpose of this bill is to prohibit discrimination, based individual's mental or physical disability, in access to organ transplantation.
