#### **FORTY-FIFTH DAY**

#### [DELEGATE HANSHAW, MR. SPEAKER, IN THE CHAIR]

The House of Delegates was called to order by the Honorable Roger Hanshaw, Speaker.

Prayer was offered and the House was led in recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of Thursday, February 22, 2024, being the first order of business, when the further reading thereof was dispensed with and the same approved.

#### Reordering of the Calendar

Pursuant to the action of the Committee on Rules, Delegate Kimble announced that Com. Sub. for H. B. 4864 and Com. Sub. for H. B. 5345, on First Reading, Special Calendar, had been transferred to the House Calendar; H. B. 4855, on Second Reading, House Calendar, had been transferred to the Special Calendar; and H. B. 4700 and H. B. 5237, on First Reading, House Calendar had been transferred to the Special Calendar.

#### **Committee Reports**

Delegate Ellington, Chair of the Committee on Education submitted the following report, which was received:

Your Committee on Education has had under consideration:

**H. C. R. 77**, To study on the cost of an alternative school in each county, that doesn't have an alternative school.

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

**Com. Sub. for H. C. R. 77** - "To request that the Joint Committee on Government and Finance study the costs associated with establishing an alternative education program at elementary, middle, and high school levels in each county that does not yet provide that option,"

With the recommendation that the committee substitute be adopted, but that it first be referred to the Committee on Rules.

In accordance with the former direction of the Speaker, the resolution (Com. Sub. for H. C. R. 77) was referred to the Committee on Rules.

Delegate Linville, Chair of the Committee on Technology and Infrastructure, submitted the following report, which was received:

Your Committee on Technology and Infrastructure has had under consideration:

H. B. 5583, Relating of movement of oversized vehicles on roadways,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

Com. Sub. for H. B. 5583 - "A Bill to amend and reenact §17C-17-11 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to the Commissioner of the Division of Highways to issue a special permit, issued pursuant to this section, with the specifics of the permit to be determined by the Commissioner of the Division of Highways, authorizing and allowing a vehicle to travel with a nondivisible load exceeding the maximum specified in this chapter, or otherwise not in conformity with the provisions of this chapter hauling loads to travel during night, holidays, holiday weekends, Saturdays, and Sundays,"

With the recommendation that the committee substitute do pass.

Delegate Linville, Chair of the Committee on Technology and Infrastructure, submitted the following report, which was received:

Your Committee on Technology and Infrastructure has had under consideration:

**H. B. 5213**, To allow Gold Star spouses to receive one free Gold Star vehicle registration for personal use,

**H. B. 5437**, Relating to time limits imposed on the Division of Highways to grant a highway entrance permit,

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 4258** - "A Bill to amend and reenact §17-4-8 and §31-2A-2 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to use of state road for rail crossing; requiring cooperation between the rail company and the Division of Highways when construction or maintenance activities are conducted by the company; and requiring railroad companies to provide alternative entry and exit ways in certain circumstances,"

With the recommendation that the committee substitutes each do pass.

Delegate Criss, Chair of the Committee on Finance, submitted the following report, which was received:

**H. B. 5594**, Exempting West Virginia University and Marshall University from contracts, agreements, or memorandums of understanding with spending units in state government with exceptions,

Your Committee on Finance has had under consideration:

H. B. 4709, Relating to vocational and technical education programs,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

- **Com. Sub. for H. B. 4709** "A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article, designated §18-21A-1, §18-21A-2 and §18-21A-3, all relating to establishing a four-year pilot program to provide participating middle schools with an elective course to better prepare fifth through eighth grade students to take advantage of West Virginia's career and technical education programs and to improve students' college and career readiness prior to high school; requiring the state board of education to promulgate a legislative rule, and, if necessary, an emergency rule, to implement the provisions of the pilot program; setting forth what is to be included within the provisions of the rule; and requiring by July 1, 2025, and annually thereafter for the duration of the pilot program, a report from the State Superintendent of Schools to the Legislative Oversight Commission on Education Accountability,"
  - H. B. 5289, To allow for the implementation of Plasma Games in West Virginia public schools,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

- **Com. Sub. for H. B. 5289** "A Bill to amend said code by adding thereto a new article, designated §21A-12-1, relating to establishing a partnership between Workforce West Virginia through its Division of Workforce Development and the West Virginia State Board of Education for the implementation of an educational, interactive platform designed to help students with instruction in the science technology engineering and math (STEM) field with a focus on chemistry and related careers to high schools and technical schools in the state; providing funding; and establishing an implementation plan and reporting."
- **H. B. 5405**, Providing additional professional development and support to West Virginia educators through teacher and leader induction and professional growth,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5405** - "A Bill to amend and reenact §18-9A-10 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended; and to amend and reenact §18A-3C-3 of said code, all relating to increasing support and professional development for educators; including numbers of full-time equivalent teachers less than fully certified for teaching an academic core subject for which they are employed; utilizing state aid funding formula allocations to support teacher and leader induction and professional growth; authorizing retention of additional funding beginning with the 2024 – 2025 school year by Department of Education for continued support and expansion of the regional professional cadres program; and adding additional requirements to county boards of education plan for comprehensive system of support for improving professional practice,"

H. B. 5514, Enhancing training requirements for county boards of education members,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

Com. Sub. for H. B. 5514 - "A Bill to amend and reenact §18-5-1a and §18-5-4 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to county boards of education members; increasing the number of annual training hours for county board members; modifying the subjects on which county board members must be trained; authorizing the State Board to require board members to complete additional training upon request from the State Superintendent; adding ex officio members to the county board member training standards review committee; requiring the State Superintendent to make an annual report to the Legislative Oversight Commission on Education Accountability relating to county board member training; increasing compensation for attending meetings; reducing the number of meetings board members may be compensated to attend; and prohibiting county board members from receiving compensation if training requirements are not met,"

H. B. 5595, Relating to shortened procedure for road condition claims,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

Com. Sub. for H. B. 5595 - "A Bill to amend and reenact §14-2-17a of the Code of West Virginia, as amended, all relating to the shortened procedure for road condition claims; establishing process by which the Clerk of the Claims Commission, the Claims Commission, and the Division of Highways expedite certain road condition claims; and requiring the Division of Highways create a line item in the budget to expediate payment for certain road condition claims,"

And,

**H. B. 5604**, Relating to procurement by state spending units,

And reports back a committee substitute therefor, as follows:

#### **Unfinished Business**

- **H. C. R. 8**, Judy Brothers Memorial Bridge; coming up in regular order, as unfinished business, was reported by the Clerk, and adopted.
- **H. C. R. 66**, U.S. Army SP4 Lonnie "Bill" Walker Memorial Bridge; coming up in regular order, as unfinished business, was reported by the Clerk, and adopted.
- **H. C. R. 67**, Kenneth R. Lucas Memorial Bridge; coming up in regular order, as unfinished business, was reported by the Clerk.

At the request of Delegate Kimble, and by unanimous consent, the bill was postponed one day.

#### Third Reading

**S. B. 172**, Revising requirements of local school improvement councils; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 269), and there were--yeas 93, nays 4, absent and not voting 3, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Hamilton, Hansen, Pushkin and Young.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Fluharty and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (S. B. 172) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**S. B. 658**, Supplementing and amending appropriations to Department of Administration, Public Defender Services; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

On the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken **(Roll No. 270)**, and there were-yeas 97, nays none, absent and not voting 3, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Fluharty and Ross.

So, a majority of the members elected to the House of Delegates having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (S. B. 658) passed.

Delegate Kimble moved that the bill take effect from its passage.

On this question, the year and nays were taken (Roll No. 271), and there were--year 98, nays none, absent and not voting 2, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson and Ross.

So, two thirds of the members elected to the House of Delegates having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (S. B. 658) takes effect from its passage.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 4191**, Relating to requirements imposed on social media companies to prevent corruption and provide transparency of election-related content made available on social media websites; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

Delegates Campbell, Ferrell, Hornby, Steele, Willis and Winzenreid requested to be excused from voting under the provisions of House Rule 49.

The Speaker ruled that the Delegates were members of a class of persons possibly to be affected and did not excuse the Members from voting.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 272), and there were--yeas 61, nays 35, absent and not voting 4, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5031**, Relating to human trafficking; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was reported by the Clerk.

At the request of Delegate Kimble, and by unanimous consent, the bill was postponed one day.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5043**, Relating to requirements, prohibitions and regulation of foreign principals or agents of foreign principals, lobbying by or on behalf of such foreign principals or their agents; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 273), and there were--yeas 95, nays none, absent and not voting 5, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Bridges, Fehrenbacher, Heckert and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5043) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5180**, Removing requirements to submit certain evidence on behalf of home schooled children; on third reading, coming up in regular order, with amendment pending and the right to amend, was reported by the Clerk.

At the request of Delegate Kimble, and by unanimous consent, the bill was postponed one day.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5235**, To double the criminal penalty for anyone found guilty of sexual assault on a minor; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 274), and there were--yeas 98, nays none, absent and not voting 2, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5235) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5395**, Relating to judicial review of Board decisions; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 275), and there were--yeas 97, nays none, absent and not voting 3, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Kirby and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5395) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5520**, Relating to juvenile competency; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 276), and there were--yeas 95, nays 1, absent and not voting 4, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Lewis.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Cooper, Hornby and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5520) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5561**, Relating to permitting the electronic execution of trusts.; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 277), and there were--yeas 93, nays none, absent and not voting 7, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, W. Clark, Cooper, Foggin, Hornby, Linville and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5561) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5569**, Requiring an appraiser to pay for a background check required by the AMC as a condition of being added to the AMCs panel of appraisers; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 278), and there were--yeas 94, nays none, absent and not voting 6, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Cooper, Foggin, Hornby, Ross and Williams.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5569) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5582**, Modifying exceptions for real estate appraisal licensure; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 279), and there were--yeas 96, nays none, absent and not voting 4, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Cooper, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5582) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5593**, Relating to the creation, composition, qualifications, and compensation of the State Board of Risk and Insurance Management; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

Delegate Green requested to be excused from voting under the provisions of House Rule 49.

The Speaker ruled that the Delegate was a member of a class of persons possibly to be affected and did not excuse the Member from voting.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 280), and there were--yeas 92, nays 1, absent and not voting 7, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5593) passed.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5621**, Prohibiting the termination of employment of an employee who defends themselves from an attack inside workplace; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 281), and there were--yeas 91, nays 5, absent and not voting 4, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Coop-Gonzalez, Dillon, Hite, Hornby and Steele.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Cooper, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5621) passed.

On motion of Delegate Akers, the title of the bill was amended to read as follows:

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5621** - "A Bill to amend and reenact §55-7-22 of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, relating to employment protections for employees who are physically attacked, or in reasonable apprehension of being physically attacked, by another person, who is not an employee co-worker, at their place of employment and who uses reasonable and proportionate force to defend themselves or others shall not be subject to adverse actions by their employer, including, but not limited to, termination of their employment solely for the act of such use of reasonable and proportionate force; relating to permissive use of deadly force against an attacker in their place of employment, without a duty to retreat, if the person reasonably believes that he or she or another is in imminent danger of death or serious bodily harm from which he or she or another can only be saved by the use of deadly force against the intruder or attacker."

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5647**, Increasing and maintaining the bracketed tax rates on the privilege of establishing or operating a health maintenance organization; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (**Roll No. 282**), and there were--yeas 93, nays 2, absent and not voting 5, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Coop-Gonzalez and Dillon.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Cooper, Linville, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5647) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5662**, Relating to adding "person in a position of trust" to certain crimes; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 283), and there were--yeas 97, nays none, absent and not voting 3, with the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (Com. Sub. for H. B. 5662) passed.

On motion of Delegate Kelly, the title of the bill was amended to read as follows:

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5662** - "A Bill to amend and reenact §61-8D-2, §61-8D-2a, §61-8D-3, §61-8D-3a, §61-8D-4, and §61-8D-4a of the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, all relating to murder of a child by refusal or failure to supply necessities, or by delivery, administration or ingestion of a controlled substance; death of a child by a parent, guardian, or custodian or other person by child abuse; child abuse resulting in injury; child abuse resulting in risk of injury; female genital mutilation; child neglect resulting in injury; child neglect creating risk of injury; child neglect resulting in death."

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5690**, Creating a West Virginia Task Force on Artificial Intelligence; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 284), and there were--yeas 95, nays 2, absent and not voting 3, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Navs: Burkhammer and Ridenour.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5690) passed.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

**H. B. 5694**, Relating to the Firearms Industry Nondiscrimination Act; on third reading, coming up in regular order, was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill, the yeas and nays were taken (Roll No. 285), and there were--yeas 96, nays 1, absent and not voting 3, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Rowe.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Riley and Ross.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the Speaker declared the bill (H. B. 5694) passed.

On motion of Delegates Phillips, the title of the bill was amended to read as follows:

**H. B. 5694** - "A Bill to amend the Code of West Virginia, 1931, as amended, by adding thereto a new article, designated §5A-13-1, §5A-13-2, §5A-13-3, §5A-13-4, §5A-13-5, and §5A-13-6, all relating to the Firearms Industry Nondiscrimination Act; establishing the short title; defining terms; establishing application of act to certain government contracts; prohibiting governmental entities from entering into contracts with any financial institution that discriminates against any firearm entity or firearm trade association; providing that any such prohibited contracts are void; providing an exception for sole-source providers; prohibiting financial institutions who do business or contract with this state from discriminating against a firearm entity or firearm trade association; specifying the applicability of the prohibition; providing a private right of action; stating available remedies in private rights of action; providing for enforcement by the Attorney General; providing that an enforcement action by the Attorney General does not prohibit a private civil action; specifying available remedies in actions brought by the Attorney General; requiring the Attorney General to submit names of financial institutions who violate this law to the Governor and to request that the state terminate any business relationship with those financial institutions, providing a statute of limitations for actions; and providing a safe harbor for financial institutions."

*Ordered*, That the Clerk of the House communicate to the Senate the action of the House of Delegates and request concurrence therein.

#### **Second Reading**

- **S. B. 600**, Revising criteria for receiving reenlistment or retention bonus; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time and ordered to third reading.
- **H. B. 4855**, Require Division of Purchasing to write contracts in an unbiased manner; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time.

At the request of Delegate Kimble, and by unanimous consent, the bill was advanced to third reading with the right to amend, and the rule was suspended to permit the offering and consideration of amendments on that reading.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 4967**, Relating to the administration of the Voluntary Remediation and Redevelopment Act to provide new liability protections for persons and companies who wish to purchase and redevelop former industrial properties; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time and ordered to engrossment and third reading.

- **Com. Sub. for H. B. 4999**, Creating exception to spousal privilege; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time and ordered to engrossment and third reading.
- **H. B. 5039**, Relating to authorizing the West Virginia Division of Motor Vehicles to enforce administrative penalties for the civil offense of refusing a secondary chemical test; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time.

Delegate Nestor moved to amend the bill on page 1, by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

#### ARTICLE 5. SERIOUS TRAFFIC OFFENSES.

- §17C-5-7. Refusal to submit to tests; revocation of license or privilege; consent not withdrawn if person arrested is incapable of refusal; hearing.
- (a) If any person under arrest, as specified in §17C-5-4 of this code, refuses to submit to a secondary chemical test, the test shall not be given.
- (b) Upon requesting that a person submit to the secondary test, designated pursuant to §17C-5-4 of this code, the person shall be given the written and verbal warnings set forth in §17C-5-4(e) of this code. After the person under arrest is given the required written and verbal warnings, the person shall have the opportunity to submit to, or refuse to submit to, the secondary test. A refusal to submit to the secondary test is considered final after 15 minutes have passed since the refusal: *Provided*, That during the 15 minutes following the refusal, the arresting officers shall permit the person under arrest to revoke his or her refusal and shall provide the person with the opportunity to submit to the test upon request. After the 15 minutes have passed following a refusal to submit to the secondary test, the arresting officer has no further duty to provide the person with an opportunity to take the secondary test.
- (c) The officer shall, within 48 hours of the refusal, sign and submit to the Commissioner of the Division of Motor Vehicles and the court having jurisdiction over the charge filed against the person pursuant to §17C-5-2 of this code, a written statement that: (1) He or she had probable cause to believe the person had been driving a motor vehicle in this state while under the influence of alcohol, controlled substances, or drugs; (2) the person was lawfully placed under arrest for an offense relating to driving a motor vehicle in this state while under the influence of alcohol, controlled substances, or drugs; (3) the a person under arrest or in custody for a violation of §17C-5-2 of this code refused to submit to the secondary chemical test designated in the manner provided in §17C-5-4 of this code; and (4) (2) the person was given the verbal warnings and the written statement required by subsection (b) of this section and §17C-5-4 of this code. An officer, by signing the statement required by this subsection, makes an oath or affirmation that the information contained in the statement is true and that any copy of the statement that he or she files is a true copy. The form for the written statement required by this section shall contain, upon its face, a warning to the officer signing that to willfully sign a statement containing false information is false swearing and is a misdemeanor.
- (d) Any person who is unconscious or who is otherwise in a condition rendering him or her incapable of refusal shall be considered not to have withdrawn his or her consent for a test of his or her blood or breath as provided in §17C-5-4 of this code and the test may be administered

although the person is not informed that his or her failure to submit to the test will result in the revocation of his or her license to operate a motor vehicle in this state for the period provided for in this section.

(e) The amendments made to this section during the 2020 2024 regular session of the Legislature shall become effective on July 1, 2020 2024.

## §17C-5-7a. Suspension of license to operate a motor vehicle for refusal of secondary test; refusal review hearing.

- (a) For the purposes of this section, the term "refusal review hearing" refers to a hearing to review a person's alleged refusal to submit to a secondary chemical test, as documented in a statement submitted to the court by a law-enforcement officer pursuant to §17C-5-7 of this code.
- (b) Effective July 1, 2020 2024, the court shall enter an order finding that a person charged with a violation of §17C-5-2 of this code did refuse to submit to a secondary chemical test, as required by §17C-5-4 of this code, subject to the following:
- (1) At the person's first pre-trial conference or initial preliminary hearing the Court shall conduct a refusal review hearing. appearance before the court, the court shall advise the person that his or her license to operate a motor vehicle shall be revoked for the applicable period provided in subsection (e) of this section, unless the person requests a refusal review hearing within the 30 days following the first appearance;
- (2) If the person does not request a refusal review hearing within 30 days following the first appearance the court shall enter an order finding that a person charged with a violation of §17C-5-2 of this code did refuse to submit to a secondary chemical test; and
- (3) If the person requests a refusal review hearing within 30 days following the first appearance, the court shall conduct the review and enter the appropriate order, as provided in subsection (c) of this section.
  - (c) Refusal review hearing. —
- (1) The court shall schedule and conduct a refusal review hearing if the person, named in a statement submitted to the court by a law-enforcement officer pursuant to §17C-5-7, requests the hearing within 30 days following his or her first appearance before the court During the refusal review hearing, the court shall review the statement documenting the person's refusal to submit to the secondary chemical test, along with any testimony or evidence presented by the person or law-enforcement officer during the hearing.
- (2) Based on the hearing, the court shall enter an order finding that the person did refuse to submit to a secondary chemical test, if the court determines, by a preponderance of the evidence, that:
- (A) The arresting law-enforcement officer had reasonable grounds to believe the arrested person had committed a violation of §17C-5-2 of this code;
- (B) The law-enforcement officer requested the arrested person to submit to the chemical test or tests designated pursuant to §17C-5-4 of this code;

- (C) At the time the test was requested, the law-enforcement officer administered the required written and verbal warnings required by §17C-5-4 and §17C-5-7 of this code; and
- (D) The arrested person refused to submit to the chemical test or tests requested by the lawenforcement officer.
- (3) (2) If the court determines, by a preponderance of the evidence, that one or more of the required conditions listed in subdivision (2) (1) of this subsection did not occur, the court shall enter an order finding that the person did not refuse to submit to the secondary chemical test. If the court enters such an order, the Commissioner of the Division of Motor Vehicles may not revoke the person's license to operate a motor vehicle based on the alleged refusal to submit to a secondary chemical test.
- (d) The clerk of the court in which the charges are pending shall immediately transmit any order entered pursuant to this section to the Commissioner of the Division of Motor Vehicles.
- (e) Upon receipt of an order provided pursuant to this section finding that a person did refuse to submit to a secondary chemical test, The Commissioner of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall revoke the person's license to operate a motor vehicle as follows:
- (1) For the first refusal to submit to the designated secondary chemical test, the commissioner shall enter an order revoking the person's license to operate a motor vehicle in this state for a period of one year or for a period of 45 days, with an additional one year of participation in the Motor Vehicle Alcohol and Drug Test and Lock Program in accordance with the provisions of §17C-5A-3a of this code.
- (2) If the person's license to operate a motor vehicle has previously been revoked under the provisions of this section, the commissioner shall, for the refusal to submit to the designated secondary chemical test, enter an order revoking the person's license to operate a motor vehicle in this state for a period of 10 years: *Provided*, That the license may be reissued in five years in accordance with the provisions of §17C-5A-3 of this code.
- (3) If the person's license to operate a motor vehicle has previously been revoked more than once under the provisions of this section, the commissioner shall, for the refusal to submit to the designated secondary chemical test, enter an order revoking the person's license to operate a motor vehicle in this state for a period of life.
- (f) A copy of each order entered pursuant to this section shall be forwarded to the person by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, and shall contain the reasons for any revocation and shall specify the revocation period imposed pursuant to this section.
- (g) A revocation ordered pursuant to this section shall run concurrently with the period of any suspension or revocation imposed in accordance with §17C-5A-2 of this code."

Delegate Linville moved to mend the amendment on page 5, section 7a, beginning after line 65, by inserting the following:

"(h) The courts of competent jurisdiction shall semi-annually report to the Division of Motor Vehicles the aggregate number of implied consent refusal hearings held, the number of implied consent refusals alleged by police officers, and the dispositions thereof. Additionally, in the event that a lack of enforcement of the implied consent law results in the diminishment of federal funding

from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Federal Highway Administration, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration or any other source, the Department of Transportation and Division of Highways shall cause the apportionment of resources devoted to the jurisdiction of the courts so responsible to be diminished commensurately"

On the adoption of the amendment by Delegate Linville, the year and nays were demanded, which demand was sustained.

The yeas and nays having been ordered, they were taken (Roll No. 286), and there were-yeas 38, nays 55, absent and not voting 7, with the yeas and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Chiarelli, McGeehan, C. Pritt, Riley, Ross and Ward.

So, a majority of the members present not having voted in the affirmative, the amendment was rejected.

On the adoption of the amendment by Delegate Nestor, the yeas and nays were demanded, which demand was sustained.

The yeas and nays having been ordered, they were taken (Roll No. 287), and there were-yeas 75, nays 18, absent and not voting 7, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

Nays: Akers, Burkhammer, Cannon, Criss, Espinosa, Ferrell, Foster, Gearheart, Hardy, Heckert, Holstein, Hornby, Linville, Lucas, Petitto, Pinson, Statler and Worrell.

Absent and Not Voting: Anderson, Chiarelli, Crouse, McGeehan, Riley, Ross and Ward.

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the amendment was adopted.

The bill was then ordered to engrossment and third reading.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5093**, Relating to revision of orders concerning distribution of marital property; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time and ordered to engrossment and third reading.

**Com. Sub. for H. B. 5105**, To eliminate the vaccine requirements for public virtual schools; on second reading, coming up in regular order, was read a second time.

An amendment sponsored by Delegate Hornby, was reported by the Clerk.

And,

A competing amendment sponsored by Delegate Pushkin, was subsequently reported by the Clerk on page 3, section 4, lines 54 and 55, by striking out the words "West Virginia Secondary

School Athletics Commission sponsored athletics" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "public school extracurricular and co-curricular activities";

and,

On page 3, section 4, lines 57 and 58, by striking out the words "West Virginia Secondary School Athletics Commission sponsored athletics" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "public school extracurricular and co-curricular activities".

Whereupon,

Delegate Hornby obtained unanimous consent that the amendment he offered be withdrawn.

The question of adoption of the amendment by Delegate Pushkin was put.

Subsequently, the yeas and nays were demanded, which demand was sustained, and the Speaker permitted a roll call vote.

The yeas and nays having been ordered, they were taken (Roll No. 288), and there were-yeas 32, nays 63, absent and not voting 5, with the yeas and the absent and not voting being as follows:

So, a majority of the members present not having voted in the affirmative, the amendment was rejected.

Delegate Kirby moved to amend the bill on page 3, section 4, after line 58, by inserting the following language:

"(I) Notwithstanding any other provisions in this code, no provision of this section shall apply to any child whose parents or guardians present a letter stating that a child cannot be vaccinated for religious reasons and an exemption from the requirements of this section shall be granted."

On the adoption of the amendment, the yeas and nays were demanded, which demand was sustained.

The yeas and nays having been ordered, they were taken (Roll No. 289), and there were-yeas 58, nays 37, absent and not voting 5, with the nays and the absent and not voting being as follows:

So, a majority of the members present having voted in the affirmative, the amendment was adopted.

Delegate Pushkin moved to amend the bill on page 1, by striking out everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

### "ARTICLE 3. PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF COMMUNICABLE AND OTHER INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

## §16-3-4. Compulsory immunization of school children; information disseminated; offenses; penalties.

- (a) Whenever a resident birth occurs, the commissioner shall promptly provide parents of the newborn child with information on immunizations mandated by this state or required for admission to a public, private and parochial school in this state or a state-regulated child care center.
- (b) Except as hereinafter provided, a child entering school or a state-regulated child care center in this state must be immunized against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough.
- (c) No child or person may be admitted or received in any of the schools of the state or a state-regulated child care center until he or she has been immunized against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio,, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough or produces a certificate from the commissioner granting the child or person an exemption from the compulsory immunization requirements of this section.
- (d) Any school or state-regulated child care center personnel having information concerning any person who attempts to be enrolled in a school or state-regulated child care center without having been immunized against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough shall report the names of all such persons to the commissioner.
- (e) Persons may be provisionally enrolled under minimum criteria established by the commissioner so that the person's immunization may be completed while missing a minimum amount of school. No person shall be allowed to enter school without at least one dose of each required vaccine.
- (f) County health departments shall furnish the biologicals for this immunization for children of parents or guardians who attest that they cannot afford or otherwise access vaccines elsewhere.
- (g) Health officers and physicians who provide vaccinations must present the person vaccinated with a certificate free of charge showing that they have been immunized against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough, or he or she may give the certificate to any person or child whom he or she knows to have been immunized against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough.
- (h) The commissioner is authorized to grant, renew, condition, deny, suspend or revoke exemptions to the compulsory immunization requirements of this section, on a statewide basis, upon sufficient medical evidence that immunization is contraindicated or there exists a specific precaution to a particular vaccine.

- (1) A request for an exemption to the compulsory immunization requirements of this section must be accompanied by the certification of a licensed physician stating that the physical condition of the child is such that immunization is contraindicated or there exists a specific precaution to a particular vaccine.
- (2) The commissioner is authorized to appoint and employ an Immunization Officer to make determinations on request for an exemption to the compulsory immunization requirements of this section, on a statewide basis, and delegate to the Immunization Officer the authority granted to the commissioner by this subsection.
- (3) A person appointed and employed as the Immunization Officer must be a physician licensed under the laws of this state to practice medicine.
- (4) The Immunization Officer's decision on a request for an exemption to the compulsory immunization requirements of this section may be appealed to the State Health Officer.
- (5) The final determination of the State Health Officer is subject to a right of appeal pursuant to the provisions of article five, chapter twenty-nine a of this code.
- (i) A physician who provides any person with a false certificate of immunization against chickenpox, hepatitis-b, measles, meningitis, mumps, diphtheria, polio, rubella, tetanus and whooping cough is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.
- (j) A child attending virtual public school shall be exempt from the requirements of this section, except if that child participates in public school extracurricular and co-curricular activities."

On the question of adoption of the amendment by Delegate Pushkin, the same was put and the amendment was rejected.

The bill was then ordered to engrossment and third reading.
