

WEST VIRGINIA STATE FLAG

The design for the present state flag was adopted by the Legislature March 7, 1929, (S. J. R. 18). The change was made for the reason that the design in use at that time was "impractical of manufacture, making the cost of purchase thereof prohibitive to the schools of the state and others desiring to purchase said flag." The design and proportions of the flag, as set out in the resolution, are as follows:

The proportions of the flag of the state of West Virginla shall be the same as those of the United States ensign; the fleld shall be pure white, upon the center of which shall be emblazoned in proper colors, the coat-of-arms of the state of West Virginia, upon which shall appear the date of the admission of the state into the Union, and the motto "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Always Freemen). Above the coat-of-arms of the state of West Virginia there shall be a ribbon lettered, "State of West Virginia," and arranged appropriately around the lower part of the coat-of-arms of the state of West Virginia a wreath of rhododendron maximum in proper colors. The fleld of pure white shall be bordered by a strip of blue on four sides. The flag of the state of West Virginia when used for parade purposes shall be trimmed with gold colored fringe on three sides and when used on ceremonial occasions with the United States flag as regards fringe, cord, tassels and mountings.

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

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, article one, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration, are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year.

Each board is given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers have power to administer oaths.

Every applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of twenty dollars, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge five dollars for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof.

All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board.

Each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificates it issues.

An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked, has the right of appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Members, unless otherwise specified, are allowed ten (\$10.00) dollars per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and are entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January.

The secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

(References are to the 1931 code.)

BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF ACCOUNTANTS

Created 1911; non-partisan; composed of three certified public accountants who have been in active practice in West Virginia for at least five years; appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate; term, three years; elects own officers; members eligible for reappointment; duties, to conduct examinations of applicants for certificates as certified public accountants; self-sustaining from examination fees. (Code 30-9.)

Created by Chapter 4, Acts 1931; to consist of three members, to be appointed by the Governor for a term of two years, and to serve without compensation; bi-partisan; board to have general supervision and control over all airports and landing fields used for commercial purposes and over all state, county and municipal airports, schools of aviation and all other phases of aerial activities.

Created in 1923; consists of the Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture and the Director of the Agricultural Extension Division of the West Virginia University, ex-officio; board to meet at the seat of government at least four times each year at regular intervals, to consider the conditions and needs of the agricultural interests of the state and to prevent overlapping, duplication or interference of, by or with the work of one department of agriculture with that of the other. Consists of five members, appointed by the governor, with the consent of the senate, for a term of five years; must be architects of not fewer than ten years active practice in West Virginia; all members eligible for reappointment; non-partisan. This board examines all applicants for the practice of architecture in the state and registers successful applicants. (Code, 30-12.)

(Code, 16-1 and 30-16 as amended by chap. 2, acts 1933, Regular Session.)

PUBLIC LAND CORPORATION OF WEST VIRGINIA

Consists of the Governor, as chairman, the Commissioner of Agriculture as secretary, the Auditor as State Commissioner of Forfeited Lands, the Attorney General, and the Director of the Engineering Experimental Station at West Virginia University, with no additional compensation authorized for their

services; vested with the title of the state in public lands; may acquire from individuals or the state commissioner of forfeited lands, by purchase, lease or agreement, any lands that may be necessary for the public use; empowered to sell, purchase or excitange lands or stumpage; income to be used for the liquidation of obligations incurred by the corporation, after which all income to be paid into the general school fund. (Chap. 54, Acts 1933, first extraordinary session.)

(Code, 5-4 and 23-3.)

COMMISSION ON UNIFORM STATE LAWS

Created under Chapter 5, Acts 1931; to consist of three members, to be appointed by the Governor from a list of seven recommended by the executive council of the West Virginia Bar Association; bi-partisan; to be members of the judiciary or of the bar of this state, in good standing; vacancies filled by the Governor upon like recommendation; to serve without compensation for services, but to receive actual disbursements for expenses; term of office, four years; eligible to reappointment; to meet at least once in two years at the state capitol and to select from their number a chairman and secretary for the term of two years; commission to promote uniformity in state laws, where uniformity may be deemed desirable and practicable; to report to each regular session of the legislature.

STATE WATER COMMISSION



No. 464, January 24, 1933); consists of the State Commissioner of Health, the Chairman of the Public Service Commission and the Chairman of the West Virginia Conservation Commission; duties, to prevent the pollution of the waters of the state, including rivers, streams, water courses, ponds and lakes. ARTICLE I

RELATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES

1. The State of West Virginia Is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

INTERNAL GOVERNMENT AND POLICE

2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved to the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

CONTINUITY OF CONSTITUTIONAL OPERATION

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in times of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despotism.

REPRESENTATIVES TO CONGRESS

4. For the election of representatives to congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each dictrict shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

THE STATE

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Common. wealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz:

The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; and all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over, the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became part of the state.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Pulnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 23, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871, Mingo County, erected since the adoption of the constitution and not included in the above list of Counties, was erected from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

POWERS OF GOVERNMENT IN CITIZENS

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

REQUISITES OF CITIZENSHIP

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

EQUAL REPRESENTATION

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto shall, as far as practicable, be preserved.

PROVISIONS REGARDING PROPERTY

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens, as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

TREASON, WHAT CONSTITUTES-PENALTY

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

"MONTANI SEMPER LIBERI"-STATE SEAL

7. The present seal of the State with its motto, "Montant Semper Libert," shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

WRITS, COMMISSONS, OFFICIAL BONDS-INDICTMENTS

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, "Against the peace and dignity of the State."

ARTICLE III

BILL OF RIGHTS

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

MAGISTRATES SERVANTS OF PEOPLE

2. All power is vested in and consequently derived from, the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them

RIGHTS RESERVED TO PEOPLE

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms that is the best, which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such a manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

WRIT OF HABEAS CORPUS

4. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, ex-post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

EXCESSIVE BAIL NOT REQUIRED

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offence. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

UNREASONABLE SEARCH AND SEIZURES PROHIBITED

6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

FREEDOM OF SPEECH AND PRESS GUARANTEED

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

RELATING TO CIVIL SUITS FOR LIBEL

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

PRIVATE PROPERTY, HOW TAKEN

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purposes of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporations, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: Provided, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

SAFEGUARDS FOR LIFE, LIBERTY AND PROPERTY

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

POLITICAL TESTS CONDEMNED

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves of their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law, of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

MILITARY SUBORDINATE TO CIVIL POWER

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

RIGHT OF JURY TRIAL

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interests and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 182, and adopted at the next election. Prior to being amended the section read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and cests, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law."]

TRIALS OF CRIMES-PROVISIONS IN INTEREST OF ACCUSED

14. Trials of crimes, and misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, tho accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the

character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GUARANTEED

15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or bellef, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contract as he shall please.

RIGHT OF PUBLIC ASSEMBLY HELD INVIOLATE

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

COURTS OPEN TO ALL-JUSTICE ADMINISTERED SPEEDILY

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

CONVICTION NOT TO WORK CORRUPTION OF BLOOD OR FORFEITURE

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

HEREDTARY EMOLUMENTS, ETC., PROVIDED AGAINST

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

PRESERVATION OF FREE GOVERNMENT

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

ARTICLE IV

ELECTIONS AND OFFICERS

1. The *male citizens of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

MODE OF VOTING BY BALLOT

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

^{*}Stricken out by adoption of Federal female suffrage amendment.

VOTER NOT SUBJECT TO ARREST ON CIVIL PROCESS

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads; or, except in time of war or public danger, to render military service.

PERSONS ENTITLED TO HOLD OFFICE—AGE REQUIREMENTS

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any State, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

OATH OR AFFIRMATION TO SUPPORT THE CONSTITUTION

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

PROVISIONS FOR REMOVAL OF OFFICIALS

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general laws, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

GENERAL ELECTIONS, WHEN HELD-TERMS OF OFFICIALS

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments, in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, Acts 1883, p. 137, and ratified at the next election. The original section provided that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of State officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. As a consequential amendment the term of office of members of the Legislature was made to begin on the first day of November, as in the original article.]

FURTHER PROVISIONS REGARDING STATE'S OFFICERS AND AGENTS

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

IMPEACHMENT OF OFFICIALS

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment. The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment, shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

FIGHTING OF DUELS PROHIBITED

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Constitution, either in, or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, be incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this State.

SAFEGUARDS FOR BALLOTS

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot.

REGISTRATION LAWS PROVIDED FOR

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 472, and adopted at the next election. The original section read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election, because his name is not, or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."]

ARTICLE V

DIVISION OF POWERS

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

LEGISLATURE

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates. The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia,"

COMPOSITION OF SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty, and the House of Delegates of ninety-four members.]

SENATORS AND DELEGATES—TERMS OF OFFICE

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected, shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one-half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

DIVISION OF STATE INTO SENATORIAL DISTRICTS

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial Districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the census of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

[There are now fifteen senatorial districts, as provided by Acts 1901, Ch. 101.]

SENATORIAL DISTRICTS DESIGNATED

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marion, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the Sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy Grant, and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1901 (Acts 1901, ch. 10), the number of Senatorial Districts was increased to fifteen, the number of Senators to thirty, and the countles re-arranged into districts.]

PROVISION FOR DELEGATE REPRESENTATION

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three-fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall, at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a Delegate District.

[By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. Since the general election of 1916, the House of Delegates consists of ninety-four members, each county having at least one member. See Ch. 30, p. 270, Acts 1915, Regular Session.]

AFTER CENSUS, DELEGATE APPORTIONMENT

7. After every census the Delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every Delegate District, and of every county not included in a delegate district, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this divison, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate

District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District and county not included in a Delegate District, shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

DESIGNATION OF DELEGATE DISTRICTS

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now no delegate districts, each county having at least one member.]

FURTHER APPORTIONMENTS

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire. Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor. Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marion, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three delegates.

To Ohio County, four delegates,

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment and Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has six delegates.]

ARRANGEMENT OF SENATORIAL AND DELEGATE DISTRICTS

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

ADDITIONAL TERRITORY MAY BE ADMITTED INTO STATE

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

SENATORS AND DELEGATES REQUIRED TO BE RESIDENT OF DISTRICTS

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or county from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

ELIGIBILITY TO SEAT IN LEGISLATURE

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

BRIBERY CONVICTION FORFEITS ELIGIBILITY

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be eligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

SENATORS AND DELEGATES NOT TO HOLD CIVIL OFFICE FOR PROFIT

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

OATH OF SENATORS AND DELEGATES

16. Menibers of the Legislature, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, towit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

MEMBERS OF LEGISLATURE PRIVILEGED FROM CIVIL ARREST

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same; and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

TIME OF ASSEMBLY OF LEGISLATURE

18. The Legislature shall assemble at the seat of government, biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.

CONVENING OF LEGISLATURE BY GOVERNOR

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three-fifths of the members elected to each house.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT

20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

PROVISIONS FOR ASSEMBLING OF LEGISLATURE OTHER THAN AT THE SEAT OF GOVERNMENT

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

*LENGTH OF LEGISLATIVE SESSION

22. All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

CONCERNING ADJOURNMENT

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

RULES GOVERNING LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The cldest delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and have taken his seat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and have taken his seat.

AUTHORITY TO PUNISH MEMBERS

25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offence.

*[This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each House."

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, (Acts 1919, p. 498), at the general election in November, 1920, it was amended to read: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days, from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon, a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular sessions shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house."

Under Joint Resolution No. 9, Acts 1927, page 350, at the general election in November, 1928, this section was again amended to read as given in the text. Vote on the amendment (1928): For ratification 275,374; against ratification \$5.123; majority, 190,251.]

PROVISIONS FOR UNDISTURBED TRANSACTION OF BUSINESS

26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety, and the undisturbed transactions of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

ACCOUNTING FOR STATE MONIES

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is or shall be to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

ORIGINATION OF BILLS

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

REQUIREMENT FOR READING OF BILLS

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: *Provided*, In all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read in each house.

ACTS TO EMBRACE BUT ONE OBJECT-TIME OF EFFECT

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its titlo only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under the Constitution, shall take effect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

HOW BILLS MAY BE AMENDED

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one House, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journals; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

"MAJORITY" DEFINED

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either house of the Legislature," or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS

33. *The members of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of five hundred dollars per annum and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate, shall each receive an additional compensation of two dollars per day for each day they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever.

[*The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by joint resolution of January 13, 1919, Acts 1919 p. 456, and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. The only change made in section 33 was to strike out the words "four dollars per day" and insert "five hundred dollars per annum."]

DISTRIBUTION OF LAWS AND JOURNALS PROVIDED FOR—CONTRACTS FOR PRINTING

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and brinting paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

STATE NOT TO BE MADE DEFENDANT IN ANY COURT

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity.

LOTTERIES PROHIBITED

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

TERMS OF OFFICE NOT TO BE EXTENDED AFTER ELECTION

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

SALARIES OF OFFICIALS CANNOT BE INCREASED DURING OFFICIAL TERM

38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of !aw; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their surcties be released from any debt or liability due the State: Provided. The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

LOCAL LAWS NOT TO BE PASSED IN ENUMERATED CASES

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for Granting divorces:

Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways; Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds; Locating, or changing county seats;

Regulating or changing county or district affairs;

Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;

Regulating the practice in courts of justice;

Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;

Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;

The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting; The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;

Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;

Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;

Changing the law of descent;

Regulating the rate of interest;

Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;

Releasing taxes; releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and ali other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

LIMITING POWERS OF COURT OR JUDGE

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

EACH HOUSE TO KEEP JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one-tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

APPROPRIATION BILLS TO BE SPECIFIC

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

BOARD OR COURT OF REGISTRATION OF VOTERS PROHIBITED

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any board or court of registration of voters.

ELECTION OF LEGISLATIVE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered on its journals.

BRIBERY AND ATTEMPT TO BRIBE-PUNISHMENT

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or falling to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold

as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses: Provided, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

MANUFACTURE AND SALE OF LIQUOR PROHIBITED-EXCEPTIONS

46. On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: Provided, however, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, securities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Laws may be passed regulating or prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State." The amendment as above set forth was proposed by Senate joint resolution No. 6 adopted February 9, 1911, Acts 1911, p. 289, (see also Acts 1911, ch. 15), and was adopted at the general election of 1912.] The following is the vote, by counties, on the "State prohibition amendment"—1912.

INCORPORATION OF RELIGIOUS DENOMINATIONS PROHIBITED

47. No charter of incoproration shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purposes of such church, or religious denomination.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. Provided, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and Provided, further, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

PROPERTY OF MARRIED WOMEN

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their husbands.

PLAN OF PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

THE BUDGET SYSTEM

51 The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

SUB-SECTION A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

SUB-SECTION B

First: Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the sessions at which the budget is to be submitted, the board of public works, which shall consist of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of free schools and commissioner of agriculture, shall submit to the Legislature

two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years. Each budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) the revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as to the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the board of public works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

Second: Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations; (1) for the Legislature as certified to the board of public works in the manner hereinafter provided; (2) for the executive department; (3) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

Third: The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations," and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The board of public works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each House the budgets and a bill for all the proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each House shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The board of public works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct and oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officer of both Houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiciary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein; Provided, however. That the salary or compensation of any public officers shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both houses shall be a law immediately without further action by the governor.

Fourth: The governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the board of public works for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either House of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

SUB-SECTION C-

SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATION BILLS

Neither House shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a

supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenues available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each house by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall be presented to the governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of section ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

SUB-SECTION D-GENERAL PROVISIONS

First: If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the governor may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such bill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

Sccond: The board of public works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such times as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each House, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the board of public works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The board of public works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

Third: The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its provisions.

Fourth: In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratified by the people, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

[This section—added to Article VI—was authorized to be submitted by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1 adopted May 23, 1917 (Acts 1917, p. 69, ex. sess.) and was ratified by a vote of the people at the general election held on the fifth day of November, 1918, as an amendment to the Constitution known as "The Budget Amendment."]

ARTICLE VII

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

1. The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be, ex-oficio Reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office, respectively, shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General, reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

ELECTION

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 459, and adopted at the next election. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."]

CERTIFICATION OF ELECTION RETURNS-CONTESTS

3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed "to the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and ratified at the next election. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed."]

ELIGIBILITY

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and adopted at the next election. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall be incligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected."]

CHIEF EXECUTIVE-FOWERS

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall

recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subjects to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

EXTRAORDINARY LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

GOVERNOR TO NOMINATE CERTAIN OFFICERS

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for; and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

RECESS VACANCIES-HOW FILLED

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nominated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

GOVERNOR'S POWER OF REMOVAL

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

EXECUTIVE MAY REMIT FINES AND FORFEITURES

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

GOVERNOR COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF MILITARY FORCES

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called in the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

OFFICIAL BOND OF STATE OFFICERS

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

HOW BILLS BECOME LAWS

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the House in which it originated, which House shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that House agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that House, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each House shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

RESPECTING APPROPRIATIONS OF MONIES

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the House in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each House according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

VACANCY IN GOVERNORSHIP, HOW FILLED

16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

VACANCIES IN OTHER EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officer of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation: and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution of February 15, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 460, and ratified at the next election. The only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line, and by substitution of the word "prescribed" for the word "provided."]

EXECUTIVE HEADS TO MAKE REPORTS

18. The subordinate officers of the Executice Department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature; and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

SALARIES OF OFFICIALS

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by joint resolution adopted February 13, 1901, Acts 1901, p. 459, and ratified at the next election. This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services, a salary or twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred; the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand, and the Attorney General thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."]

ARTICLE VIII

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by joint resolution of March 6, 1879, Acts 1879, p. 175, and ratified at the next election.]

SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS

2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of *four jūūges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

[*The supreme court of appeals consists of five judges, by the provisions of the "Judicial Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution, and Acts 1903, ch. 19, amending and re-enacting section 1 of chapter 113 of Warth's Code of 1899.]

SCOPE OF JURISDICTION

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of habcas corpus, mandamus, and prohibition. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment or qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator; or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy toils or taxes; and, also, in cases of quo warranto, habeas corpus, mandamus, certiorari, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has

been a conviction for felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

BINDING AUTHORITY OF DECISIONS

4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

REVERSAL OR AFFIRMANCE OF JUDGEMENTS

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

WRIT OF ERROR, SUPERSEDEAS AND APPEAL

6. A wirt of error, superscdcas, or appeal shall be allowed only by the supreme court of appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the supreme court of appeals.

PROVISIONS FOR FILLING SUPREME COURT VACANCIES

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the supreme court of appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

OFFICERS OF SUPREME COURT

8. The officers of the supreme court of appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

TERMS OF SUPREME COURT

9. There shall be at least two terms of the supreme court of appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by taw.

CIRCUIT COURTS

10. The State shall be divided into *thirteen circuits. For the circuit here-lnafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuits in which they may respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the

^{[*}Now twenty-four.]

office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the supreme court of appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportloned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

TERMS OF CIRCUIT COURT

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

CIRCUIT COURT JURISDICTION

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by mandamus, prohibition and ccrtiorari. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of habcas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appellate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or supersedicas may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whether supervisory, original, appellate or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

DIVISION OF STATE INTO CIRCUITS

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marion and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth: the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth.

[By various acts of the legislature, authorized by section 14 following, the above division has been changed and the number of circuits increased to twenty-four.]

RE-ARRANGEMENT OF STATE INTO CIRCUITS

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any such session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

SPECIAL TERMS AND JUDGES OF CIRCUIT COURTS

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit courts, where from any cause the judge shall fail to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

SALARIES OF AND LIMITATIONS ON JUDGES

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The *salary of a judge of the supreme court of appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: Provided, That Ohio county may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowance shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession of law or hold any other office, appointment or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

HOW JUDGES MAY BE REMOVED

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodily infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two-thirds of all the members elected to each House must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each House. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly in the supreme court of appeals.

REGARDING PARTICIPATION IN CIVIL WAR

20. No citizen of the State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable in any proceeding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgments or decrees heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

^{[*}Under the judicial amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1901, page 462, and ratified in 1902, the salaries of the judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals were fixed by legislative enactment at ten thousand dollars per annum: however, under the provisions of section 5-C of chapter 20 of the Acts of 1932 (extraordinary session), such salaries were fixed at eight thousand dollars per annum.]

PARTS OF COMMON LAW EFFECTIVE

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of the State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

COUNTY COURTS

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

TERMS OF OFFICE OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, except at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

POWERS OF COUNTY COURTS

24. The county courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: Provided, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall in all cases of contest judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the reular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature under and by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

REMOVAL OF CAUSES

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect, together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in, tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

CLERK OF COUNTY COURT

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

DISTRICTING OF COUNTY

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

JURISDICTION OF A JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpsit, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest, does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend throughout their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgment of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

RE-FORMATION OF COUNTY COURTS

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county

voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such case all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

INCOMPATIBLE OFFICES

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

ARTICLE IX

COUNTY ORGANIZATION

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

CONSTABLES, CORONERS AND OVERSEERS OF THE POOR

2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

SHERIFFS—CONSECUTIVE TERMS PROHIBITED

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor; nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

MALFEASANCE AND MISFEASANCE IN OFFICE

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

COMMISSIONING OF OFFICERS NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in this Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

COMPENSATION—DEPUTIES

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

CONSERVATORS OF THE PEACE

7. The President of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

FORMATION OF NEW COUNTIES

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an era of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

ARTICLE X

TAXATION AND FINANCE

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the state, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including live stock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty per cent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty per cent the maxiumu rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the legislature among the levying units of the state in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, ail cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including live stock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempted from taxation. The legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time, and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the state now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property may, by law, be exempted from taxation. The

Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations."

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 10th. 1932, Acts, 1932 (extraordinary session), chapter 9, page 16, and was ratified at the general election of 1932.

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools, Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES OF PUBLIC MONIES

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor;

nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

LIMITATION ON CONTRACTION OF STATE DEBT

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State, to suppress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

POWER OF TAXATION

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

CREDIT OF STATE NOT TO BE GRANTED IN CERTAIN CASES

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

DUTIES OF COUNTY AUTHORITIES IN ASSESSING TAXES

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars' valuation, except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS OF COUNTIES, ETC.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: Provided, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

MUNICIPAL TAXES TO BE UNIFORM

9. The Legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

6. . . .

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ARTICLE XI

CORPORATIONS

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: *Provided*, That nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

CORPORATE LIABILITY FOR INDEBTEDNESS

2. The Stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

EXCLUSIVE PRIVILEGES PROHIBITED

3. All exisiting charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: *Provided*, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any bona fide contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

RIGHTS OF STOCKHOLDERS

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

STREET RAILROADS

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

BANKS

6. The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders.

RAILROADS

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by sultable penalties the provisions of this section.

ROLLING STOCK CONSIDERED PERSONAL PROPERTY

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any rail-road company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

RAILROADS PUBLIC HIGHWAYS

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to all persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discriminations between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

STATIONS TO BE ESTABLISHED

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

COMPETING LINES-LEGISLATIVE PERMISSION

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

RIGHT OF EMINENT DOMAIN

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

EDUCATION

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF FREE SCHOOLS

2. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor: *Provided*, The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS

3. The Legislature may provide for county superintendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

EXISTING PERMANENT AND INVESTED SCHOOL FUND

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accrulng to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands;

and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the state of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir; and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporations; monies that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent. interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund"; Provided, That all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

SUPPORT FOR FREE SCHOOLS

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

LEVIES FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlement with the county court; which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

MIXED SCHOOLS PROHIBITED

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

CERTAIN ACTS PROHIBITED

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or prots of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law; Provided, That nothing herein shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

CREATION OF INDEPENDENT FREE SCHOOL DISTRICTS

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question,

APPROPRIATION FOR STATE NORMAL SCHOOLS

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

LEGISLATURE TO FOSTER GENERAL SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvements; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provisions for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

LAND TITLES

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

LAND ENTRY PROHIBITED

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

FORFEITED LANDS

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited. waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said States at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all State taxes charges or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865, and have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

WASTE AND UNAPPROPRIATED LANDS

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter memtioned be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

FORMER OWNER'S PRIVILEGE

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be fiied in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter.

LAND BOOKS-TAXES

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with State tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vesetd in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with State tax on any part of the land, such part thereof shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: Provided, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENTS

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention, until, at least, one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

HOW AMENDMENTS ARE MADE

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either House of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each House, be agreed to on its third reading, by two-thirds of the

members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published, at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

Amendments to the Constitution

THE JUDICIAL AMENDMENT

(House Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1901, p. 462. Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on this amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; Majority, 29,966.)

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amenoment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

THE IRREDUCIBLE SCHOOL FUND AMENDMENT

(House Joint Resolution No. 28, Acts 1901, p. 465. Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,694; against ratification, 24,763; Majority, 31,931.)

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of the free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund, shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT OF 1920

(Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, Acts 1919, p. 502. Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689; against ratification, 130,569; Majority, 118,120.)

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the state, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT OF 1928

(Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17, Acts 1927, p. 361. Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; against ratification, 92,885; Majority, 267,712.)

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing, or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

NINETEEN THIRTY-THREE

(The year 1933 will take its place in history as one of vast change in government, a period that saw the end of an old order, the beginning of a new. Believing it to be of historical importance, the Blue Book presents as an innovation a "thumb-nail" sketch of those stirring days.)

Begun when the days of the depression were darkest, strung through with one crisis in government after another, the year 1933 takes its place in history as a period of far-flung transformation in the state government of West Virginia.

The state paralleled the nation as a setting for momentous, often dramatic, changes during the year 1933. An old government passed and a new one took over the reins at Charleston. With the new government (but not because of it) came new and devastating problems and, born out of the great necessity of the times for drastic action, came new and revolutionary ways of meeting them. The problems and the ways of meeting them, in fact, took the center of the stage; and the mere presence of new faces in public places was scarcely more than coincident to the dramatic and important happenings of the year.

Looking forward into 1934 as the old year passed, West Virginia faced many of the problems—still unsolved—that made life difficult in 1933. Although some of the answers seemed far away as the year ended, there was a note of hope, a wealth of experience that had been lacking when '33 began.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR

Any appraisal for their relative value of the governmental problems, innovations and changes of 1933 will be a task for the historian of the future. No historian of West Virginia, however, will forget that 1933 saw a new amendment in the state constitution so altering the system of taxation and local government that despite three sessions of the legislature in a single year, the tax situation at its close still was "unfinished business"—an unsolved problem. Whether he writes of the state or the nation he will recall the unemployment of 1933, setting in motion the vast machineries of relief and recovery, themselves of vital importance in the patchwork of the year. He will recall the establishment at Charleston of a Civil Works Administration, Public Works Administration. Federal Reemployment Service and the state headquarters of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation—each a large recovery unit in itself, with a network of sub-offices over the state.

He will no doubt place prominently in the list of events the legalizing of beer and the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, creating a new situation for West Virginia as they did for the nation at large. Perhaps he will view with especial interest the stirring period of the bank moratorium, a unique chapter in the history of the state and nation in the wake of which followed changes in banking practice, laws and ideas.

With it all, he will be bound to recall the background against which the drama played: the first completely Democratic administration at the State Capitol in forty years.

THE TAX PROBLEM

Peculiarly that of the state of West Virginia, the tax problem arose indirectly from the tax amendment voted into the constitution in 1932 and directly from the supreme court's interpretation of it in 1933. Other states had their relief worries, and their banking and liquor problems. West Virginia had these, and the tax problem too.

The tax amendment did not loom in the role of a menace to local government until, under an interpretation by the supreme court, it was painfully apparent that twelve million dollars of public revenue had been shorn away from the amount previously anticipated. Few people realized that the court was really pronouncing its history-making interpretation of the amendment on March 7th

when it decided the Shinnston case. The court said then that the town could not go ahead and vote a bond issue and exceed the limitations imposed by the amendment to take care of it, and that the limitations could only be exceeded to prevent the impairment of a contract. The Shinnston bond issue was only contemplated so the court's decision merely resulted in abandonment of the issue. What was not then understood was that levies for millions of dollars of bond issues already owing by counties, towns, districts and the state likewise were to come inside the limits.

EXCESS LEVIES

Acting in the belief that past bonded debts were an obligation by contract, the legislature in the spring passed the famous House Bill No. 314, authorizing the several units of government to exceed the amendment's limitations for the payment of bond requirements. Nobody paid much attention to the passage of the act, either, but when the levying bodics met in August and almost without exception laid special "excess" levies for indebtedness, a murmur began in the press that reached its climax in the filing of the first tax amendment suit. But that is getting ahead of the story.

Even as the legislature and the governor interpreted the amendment, it accomplished an important curtailment in the amount of revenue available by direct levies. To meet the situation in government resulting from this Governor Kump called the legislature into the first special session of 1933—in April—to effect two important changes in the governmental structure and to pass a huge indirect revenue bill. The reorganizations were the distinct centralization of the school and the road systems, the former through the creation of a county-unit system of schools and abolishment of the district system, the latter by placing the entire road system, including county roads, under a one-man state road commission.

INDIRECT TAXES

Probably a larger sum was raised by indirect taxation under the revenue bill than by any other legislation in the history of the state. In all it was expected to bring in about ten million dollars, chiefly through the state's first income tax law, a modified sales tax and certain privilege taxes on business. It, too, was described as a necessary result of the tax amendment and it, too, became a law. With the road and school systems reorganized, ten million dollars flowing in from indirect revenue and levying bodies ready to lay their excess levies for debts, the house of government appeared to be in order and officials turned again to other matters of state.

But, from the governor to the smallest town official in West Virginia's tiniest community, the state's officialdom was jolted out of its composure on September 19th, the day the supreme court passed on the meaning of the tax amendment in words nobody could misunderstand and took away twelve million dollars from the several units of government. The court's decision upset all plans that had been made for a comfortable government in West Virginia. In simple, direct language it said the excess levies were out, that debts had to be paid first from revenues raised inside the limits of the amendment, and that if anything then remained it could be used for current running expenses. The limits could be exceeded only if the entire amount raised within them would not take care of indebtedness.

Under the court's ruling, not only was the amount of revenue available reduced, but the collection of any taxes by the direct levy route, until a new enabling act was written by the legislature, was prevented. To write a new enabling act, and accomplish several other purposes, Governor Kump called the legislature together for the third time in a year on November 21st, the session extending into the year 1934.

A NEW ACT

The first product of the second special session was a new enabling act that provided for the collection of taxes by the state's assumption of the bonded indebtedness of counties and districts, contracted for schools and roads. It was

a new principle, obviously at odds with certain constitutional provisions, but enacted as an emergency solution to a vexing problem. The act was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court with even more dispatch than had been shown in passing on the first act. It was an unwelcome Christmas present for the wearied legislature, and left the final solution of the tax problem something to be accomplished during 1934.

RELIEF

For West Virginia as for most other states, the relief that a benevolent federal government provided the poor and the unemployed was a far-reaching event of 1933. The year was young as the old RFC machinery got under way in earnest and the sight of groups of workmen, repairing roads and performing other tasks on public property, became a familiar one. With the new plan of grants of immense sums to the states for relief purposes, the state welfare department, once a cog of comparatively lesser importance in the machinery of government, overnight became a vital unit. Supervised by a committee of private citizens named by the governor, the welfare department administered the government relief funds for the state. As at first operated, the RFC plan called for the submission by counties of applications for relief funds for certain specified periods of time. The funds were sent to the governor, for the counties, in allotments stipulated by the federal government, and distributed among the RFC workmen by county representatives of the state RFC set-up. The funds were used for two purposes: to pay those who were employed on RFC projects, and to provide livings for persons unable to work.

THE CWA PLAN

With minor changes, relief was administered under this plan until late in the year, when with dramatic suddenness the civil works plan was substituted for it. In the course of a few days the old order was overthrown and a new one, on a vaster scale, took its place. The principal change was that definite projects were to be inaugurated and carried out instead of the haphazard system of providing work merely for work's sake, and a higher wage scale was to be put in effect. For those unable to work, the old direct relief system remained. To carry out the civil works plan, the state relief administration became the civil works administration, and the welfare department—augmented by an increased force—became its executive arm. County welfare boards became civil works boards.

OTHER AGENCIES

There were agencies other than the RFC and the CWA for aiding the unemployed during 1933. They included the Public Works plan, under which communities might borrow funds from the federal government to build public improvements which would provide employment, and the Federal Re-employment Service which established offices in every county to supply workmen on civil works projects and in private employment. Still another recovery agency was the West Virginia Home Owners' Loan corporation, set up by the federal government for the benefit of home owners faced with the loss of their homes to mortgage holders.

Functioning in their respective ways, the parts of one great whole, they wrote an important chapter in the history of 1933.

BEER AND REPEAL

The liberal trend on the liquor question that had its inception in 1932 attained its two logical objectives in 1933 in repeal and legalizing of beer, and West Virginia was well to the fore in acting upon both.

It was on January 18th that the first state beer bill was placed before the legislature by Senator Clyde Beecher Johnson, but it was March 18th before such a measure (the Beacom beer bill) became law. And even then three more months impended before the law was due to go into effect. Long before that

period was up, however, Congress modified the national prohibition laws to legalize 3.2 per cent beer, effective early in April, and almost two months before West Virginia's 3.05 law was slated to go into effect. The agitation for legal beer in West Virginia at once and of 3.2 content instead of 3.05 was considerable. Assembling April 10th in special session, the legislature two days later passed a 3.2 law and it was signed by the Governor April 13th.

On January 24th, the house of delegates, by a substantial majority, adopted a resolution memorializing Congress to submit to the states the question of repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. Congress did so, and on February 20th the legislature named a joint committee to draft a bill to provide for West Virginia's vote on the question. On March 10th a bill calling an election for June 27th was passed, and the West Virginia battle on repeal had begun.

Despite sporadic and occasionally feverish attempts in both camps to stimulate interest, the campaign was quiet, orderly and unmarked by anything out of the ordinary. A light vote was cast and when the returns were counted, repeal had carried by a margin of 80,000 votes and West Virginia had become the sixteenth state to ratify the new Twenty-first amendment to the constitution of the United States.

As a footnote to national repeal, the legislature submitted to the voters of the state, to be decided in November of 1934, the question of state repeal. That the repeal amendment to be submitted in 1934 was destined to be changed before the time for a vote was plainly indicated when the year ended, with several alternative proposals pending before the legislature.

NEW FACES

Control of every branch of the state government was taken over by the Democratic party in 1933,—the first completely Democratic administration at the state capital in forty years. State history was being made when seven elected state officials, all Democrats, replaced seven Republicans, and a legislature Democratic in both branches replaced a legislature whose senate had been Republican and whose house had been Democratic.

ETCETERA

Banks: However quickly they may be forgotten, the days of the bank moratorium early in 1933 were stirring while they lasted. Out of them has grown a system of banks and banking in West Virginia which resulted, towards the close of the year, in 100 per cent eligibility for West Virginia banks in the federal deposit insurance system and an outlook for stability probably unsurpassed in the state's history.

Business: Business, which, according to the experts, touched bottom early in 1933, was unmistakably on the upward trend in West Virginia as the year ended. Steady gains in employment were reported as the year drew to its close, while retail sales during the Christmas season of 1933 were, in many localities, the highest since 1929.

Politics: In the one election of importance in the state during the year 1933, Andrew Edmiston, Democrat, of Weston, was elected to congress from the Third District over former governor Howard M. Gore, Republican, of Clarksburg. The special election was held November 28th for the purpose of filling the vacancy caused by the death of Representative Lynn S. Hornor. Death also removed former United States Senator Guy D. Goff from the political scene.

Thus 1933. The beginning of recovery; a "new deal" in state government, as well as national; repeal, beer, death and taxes. No matter whatever else impends, the year will find a large place in the history of our state and country.

RULES OF THE SENATE

- 1. The President of the Senate may appoint a President pro tempore, who during the absence of the President shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. The President having taken the chair, and a quorum being present the journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end that any mistake may be corrected that may have been made in the entries.
- 2. The presiding officer of the Senate may call a member to the chair who shall exercise his functions for the time being, but no member by virtue of such appointment, shall preside for a longer period than three days.
- 3. The presiding officer of the Senate shall have the regulation of such parts of the Capitol and of its passages as are, or may be, set apart for the use of the Senate, its officers and committees.
- 4. No person except members of the House of Delegates, their Clerks, the heads of the executive departments, the Governor's private secretary, ex-members of the Legislature, Judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals, and Circuit Court Judges shall be admitted within the Senate Chamber.

Duties of the Clerk

- 5. The Journal of the Senate shall be dally drawn up by the Clerk and after being examined by the President shall be read the succeeding day. It shall be printed under the supervision of the clerk and delivered to the members without delay. After the printed journal has been approved and fully marked for corrections the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith, and from the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto ten copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy weight bond paper, with blank lines at the end of each day's proceedings for the signature of the President and the Clerk, and these shall be the official Journals of the Senate. They shall be bound in flexible bindings and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the Senate of West Virginia," with designation of regular or extra session and the year. After being signed by the proper officers two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History and one with the Clerk of the House of Delegates.
- 6. The Clerk of the Senate shall not suffer any records or papers to be taken from the table, or out of his custody, by any person except a chairman of a committee but he may deliver any bill or paper, directed to be printed, to the printer of the Senate, or to any member of the Senate on taking his receipt for the same.
- 7. The Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates may interchange messages between the hours of adjournment and that of meeting on the following day, so that said message may be read immediately after the usual order of the day.

Powers of the Senate Over its Members

- 8. A majority of the Senaors shall be necessary to proceed to business; two members may adjourn, and three members may order a call of the Senate, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the Senate, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been twice called.
- 9. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund. And this rule shall apply, as well to the first convention of the Senate at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session, after the hour has arrived to which the Senate stood adjourned.
- 10. No Senator shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the

Committee on Priviliges and Elections, and reported to the Senate, unless by order of the President of the Senate.

11. The Senate may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)

12. The Senate may punish by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 26.)

Privileges of Members

- 13. Every member, when speaking, shall stand in his own place, and address the President and when he has finished, take his seat.
- 14. Every member within the Bar, when a question is put, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the Senate excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting must be made before the Senate divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.
- 15. If a member be called to order, for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the Senate for words spoken in debate, if any member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exceptions to them have been taken.
- 16. No member of the Senate, or other person except the Clerk and his assistants, shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called or counted.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject, without leave of the Senate; nor more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- 18. While the President is reporting or putting a question none shall entertain private discourse, read, stand up, walk into, out of, or across the Senate Chamber.
- 19. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Chair, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his views, in preference to any other member.
- 20. While the President is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.
- 21. During any debate, any Senator, though he has spoken to the matter, may arise and speak to the orders of the Senate if they be transgressed, in case the President does not; but if the President stands up at any time, he is first to be heard.
- 22. If any member of the Senate absent himself from the service thereof without leave, except in case of his sickness or other unavoidable cause which may prevent his attendance, the Senate may by order or resolution, direct his absence to be entered on the Journal.
- 23. No member of the Senate shall absent himself from its service without leave first obtained.
- 24. At the commencement of each session the following standing committees shall be appointed, to consist of not less than five nor more than nine members, except the Committees on Forestry and Conservation and on Public Buildings and Humane Institutions which shall each consist of not less than eleven, and not more than fifteen members, the Committee on Roads and Navigation which shall consist of seventeen members and the Committees on Judiciary and on Finance, which shall each consist of eighteen members.

And there shall also be appointed on the part of the Senate five members of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills.

25. All standing committees shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, unless otherwise directed, and the chairman of each committee shall be designated by the President of the Senate.

The chairman of each standing committee of the Senate shall cause to be kept for the purpose, a record of every meeting of such committee, wherein shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each committee meeting, and every hearing had before the committee.
 - (b) The attendance of members of the committee at each meeting thereof.
- (c) The name of any person appearing before the committee, and the interest represented by him.

Any member of such standing committee may cause a notation to be made upon the record aforesaid of the reason for his absence at any former meeting of the committee; and in the absence of any such explanatory note, the presumption shall be that his absence was without resonable cause.

All meetings of the committee, other than executive sessions, shall be open to the public.

On the adjournment of each session of the Legislature, the chairman of the respective committees shall deliver to the Clerk of the Senate the record book herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of such Clerk to preserve the same among the archives of his office.

- Select committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members unless the Senate shall direct otherwise.
- 27. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall report in all cases of privileges and contested elections, the principles and reasons on which their resolutions are founded.
- 28. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall examine the oaths taken by each member, and the evidence of their election, and report to the Senate.
- 29. The Committee to Examine the Clerk's Office shall see that all papers belonging thereto are properly filed, labeled and put away in the presses, and the books belonging to the office are chronologically arranged, and shall make report thereof to the Senate at each session.

Committee of the Whole

30. When the Senate shall resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the chair and appoint a chairman to preside in the Committee.

31. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the Senate. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in the Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the Senate, except so far as reported to the Senate by the chalrman of the committee.

Order of Business

- 32. The first two hours of each daily session of the Senate after the sixth order of business, to-wit: The consideration of unfinished business of the preceding day and resolutions lying over from the previous day, shall be called the "afternoon hour," and shall be devoted to the consideration of the business then on the calendar, unless the Senate, by a two-thirds vote of all the members present, suspend this rule.
 - I. To read the Journal.
 - To dispose of Communications from the House of Delegates and the Executive.
 - III. To receive reports from Standing Committees.
 - IV. To receive reports from Select Committees.
 - V. To receive bills, resolutions, motions and petitions.
 - VI. To act upon unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, and no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
 - VII. Senate and House Bills on third reading.
- VIII. Senate and House Bills on second reading.
- IX. Senate and House Bills on first reading.
- 33. All bills originating in the Senate shall be read on three separate days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays, on each bill, this rule be dispensed with.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)
- 34. In the title of all bills to amend chapters or sections of the Code, or acts passed since the Code was adopted, the several committees to whom they are referred, or by whom they originated, shall insert the subject matter of the chapter.
- 35. All engrossed bills shall be fully and distinctly read when put upon their passage.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)
- 36. All bills or business originating in the Senate, shall be considered in the order in which they are introduced and all bills and resolutions received from the House of Delegates shall be introduced in the order in which they are received, unless in either case the Senate otherwise directs.
- 37. All joint resolutions and all other resolutions, except those requiring a committee to inquire and report, shall lie on the table one day at least, after they are introduced.
- 38. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 42.)
- 40. All bills reported from the House of Delegates shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading. All bills introduced on leave shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry, and if the committee report a bill different from the one introduced such bill shall be received and treated by the senate as the original bill, and shall be read a first time and printed, unless in any of the aforesaid cases the Senate shall direct otherwise.
- 41. Before reading each bill the Clerk shall state whether it is the first, second or third reading of the bill.
- 42. On the demand of any two members when a bill is being read for amendment, it shall be read section by section, and when the amendments which may

be moved shall be disposed of, the question, unless the Senate otherwise order. shall be taken on ordering the bill to be engrossed and read the third time. If a bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments thereto have been made, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform to the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted, and shall be the engrossed bill. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill. All Senate bills so ordered shall be jacketed, endorsed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the House and returned to the Senate without amendments, or if amended, and the amendments should be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a House bill on second reading if the same be amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full in typewriting on slips of paper, and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the House, and all amendments shall appear in the Senate Journal.

43. When a bill or resolution of the House of Delegates is passed or rejected by the Senate, the fact of its passage or rejection, with the bill or resolution, shall be communicated to the House of Delegates.

Petitions

- 44. No petition of a private nature, having been once rejected, shall be acted on a second time, unless it be supported by new evidence, nor shall any such petition, after a third rejection, be again acted upon.
- 45. No petition shall be received claiming a sum of money or praying the settlement of unliquidated accounts, unless it be accompanied with a certificate of disallowance from the Executive or Auditor, containing the reason why it was rejected. But this order shall extend to no person applying for a pension.
- 46. When any petition, or bill founded on one, is rejected, such petition shall not be withdrawn, but the petitioner or member presenting the petition, or any member from the county or corporation in which the petitioner resides, may, with leave, withdraw any document filed therewith, and a list of all the documents so withdrawn shall be preserved by the Clerk. All petitions not finally acted on may, with the accompanying documents, be in like manner withdrawn after the expiration of the session at which they were presented.
- 47. No petition shall be read in the Senate unless particularly required by some member, but every member presenting one shall announce the name of the petitioner and the nature of the application, and that, in his opinion, no similar application had been previously made by the same petitioner. He shall also endorse on the back of his petition his own name, as a pledge that it is drawn in respectful language, whereupon it shall be delivered to the Clerk, by whom it shall be laid before the proper committee.

Messages

48. Messages may be introduced in any stage of business except when a question is being put by the presiding officer, while the yeas and nays are being called by the Clerk, or while the ballots are being counted.

Motions

- 49. When a bill or joint resolution is put upon its passage, the President shall propound the question, "Shall the bill (or joint resolution as the case may be) pass?" On the passage of every bill or joint resolution the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and be entered on the Journal. When the bill is on a second reading, and the question is upon striking out, the President shall propound the question: "Shall these words be stricken out?"
- 50. When the question is pending, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, for the previous question, to lie on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to adjourn the question to a different day, to commit or amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.

- 51. On the first reading of a bill, no motion shall be in order except to reject the bill, and if the committee shall have reported adversely to the bill, the President, immediately after its first reading, shall propound the question: "Shall the bill be rejected?" When the Senate refuses to reject the bill the question shall be: "Shall the bill be ordered to its second reading?" This question shall be duly put by the chair and acted upon by the Senate.
- 52. The question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the Senate, and cannot during the session be drawn again into debate unless reconsidered, and it shall be in order to reconsider any vote only within two legislative days next after the one upon which such vote was taken. A motion to reconsider shall be in order only when made by a Senator who voted with the prevailing side, and when the vote was not taken by ayes and nays all Senators will be conclusively presumed to have voted with the prevailing side.
- 53. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question in reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

Division of the Question

- 54. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided; but on motion to strike out and insert, it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question, but the rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition; nor prevent a subsequent motion to simply strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.
 - 55. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

Previous Question

56. There shall be a motion for the previous question, which being ordered by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been asked and ordered. The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions or may be made to embrace and authorize motions and amendments and include the bill to its engrossment and third reading and then, on renewal and second of said motion, to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order pending a motion for or after the previous question shall have been ordered on its passage, for the President to entertain and submit a motion to commit with or without instructions to a standing or select committee; and a motion to lay upon the table shall be in order on the second and third reading of a bill.

A call of the Senate shall not he in order after the previous question is ordered, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a quorum is not present.

All incidental questions or orders arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether an appeal or otherwise, without debate.

Yeas and Nays

- 57. When the yeas and nays are ordered, or a call of the Senate is directed, the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order.
- 58. The yeas and nays on any question shall, at the desire of one-tenth of the members present, be entered on the Journal and any member may enter any protest on the Journal upon the determination of any question. After the yeas and nays shall have been taken, and before they are counted or entered on the Journal, the Clerk shall read over the names of those who voted in the affirmative and those who voted in the negative, at which time any member shall have the right to correct any mistake committed in enrolling his name.
- 59. When a bill or joint resolution passed by the Senate shall be amended by the House of Delegates, the question on agreeing to the bill or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on by yeas and nays in the Senate, and

the result entered upon its Journal. In all such cases the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)

- 60. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)
- 61. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered upon the Journal.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 44.)

Executive Session

- 62. When nominations shall be made in writing by the Governor to the Senate, a future day shall be assigned, unless the Senate unanimously direct otherwise, for taking them into consideration.
- 63. When acting on the nominations of the Governor, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Clerk, his assistants, the Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper, and all such officers shall be sworn to secrecy.
- 64. All confidential communications made by the Governor to the Senate and all proceedings thereon, shall be by the members thereof kept secret until the Senate shall, by unanimous affirmative vote of the members present, remove the injunction of secrecy.
- 65. All information and remarks touching the character or qualification of any person nominated by the Governor to office, shall be kept secret. The Legislative proceedings and the executive proceedings of the Senate shall be kept and recorded in separate books.

Constitutional Amendment


66. When an amendment to be proposed to the Constitution is under consideration, the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate shall not be requisite to decide any question for amendments, or extending to the merits, being short of the final question.

Adjournment

- 67. When the Senate adjourns each day, it shall stand adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m. the next day, unless the Senate otherwise direct.
- 68. When the Senate adjourns each day, every member shall keep his seat until the President leaves the chair.

Parliamentary Practice

- 69. The Rules of Parliamentary Practice comprised in "A Manual of General Parliamentary Law, with Suggestions for General Rules," by Thos. B. Reed, shall govern the Senate in all cases not provided for by the rules of the Senate or in the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Delegates. In any case not governed by the said manual of said rules, the Senate shall be governed by the practice in the Congress of the United States.
- 70. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate present.
- 71. Any bill, resolution or business may, by a vote of the majority of the members present, be withdrawn from the committee to which it had been referred or be taken from the table, and placed upon the regular or special calendar of the Senate in such order of business as the Senate may direct.

RULES OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

(Adopted January 11, 1933)

Absence from the House

1. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend, but any member who conscientiously believes that the seventh day of the week ought to be observed as the Sabbath shall be excused from attending upon the House on that day.

Adjournment

- (a) Motion to adjourn, and to fix time to which the House shall adjourn always in order.—Rule 65.
 - (b) Motion to adjourn put without debate.-Rule 66.

Amendment of Rules

(a) One day's notice required .- Rule 56.

Amendments

- 2. No motion on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- 3. A motion to amend a pending amendment may be received, but until it is disposed of no other motion to amend will be in order. But pending such amendment, a motion to amend in the nature of a substitute, and a motion to amend that substitute, may be received, but shall not be voted upon until the original matter is perfected.
- 4. If a substitute for a bill or resolution be offered, a motion to amend the original bill, or resolution shall have precedence.
- 5. If a motion be made to strike out part of a bill or resolution, a motion to amend the part proposed to be stricken out shall have precedence.
- 6. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time proposed shall be first put, and the question shall be put on names in the order they were nominated.
- 7. No amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill after engrossment.
- 8. After commitment of a bill and report thereof to the House, it may be amended; but the amendments (if any) reported by the committee, shall be disposed of before any other amendment is considered, unless it be an amendment to an amendment.

- 9. When a House bill or House joint resolution shall be amended by the Senate, the question on agreeing to the bill or resolution as amended shall be again voted on by yeas and nays, and the result entered on the Journal, and in such a case the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall be necessary.—(Const., art. 7, sec. 31.)
- (a) When bill recommitted and amended, question shall again be put on the engrossment of the bill.—Rule 13.
 - (b) Reading of bill for amendment on second reading .- Rule 19.
- (c) If a motion to strike out certain words be lost, it shall not preclude a motion to strike out part of the same words or a motion to amend, or strike out and insert.—Rule 45.

Note-Laying on the table a motion to amend the Journal, does not carry the Journal with it.

Appeals

Debate upon, limited .- Rule 88.

Ayes and Nays

May be demanded by one-tenth of members.—Rule 96.

Ballots

No ballot permitted .- Rule 18.

Bills

- 10. Bills may be introduced by any member on leave being granted, or by any standing committee of the House at any time during the session of the Legislature, in conformity with the order of business regulating the procedure of the House.
- 11. All bills introduced by motion for leave shall be referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and all such bills shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry. If the committee report a bill different from one so introduced, such bill shall be received and treated by the House as the original bill, but the committee report and the journal of the House shall show the bill amendment in committee by a re-draft thereof.
- 12. Before any bill is read by the Clerk, he shall state to the House whether it is on first, second or third reading.
- 13. A bill may be recommitted at any time before its passage. Should such recommitment take place after its engrossment, and an amendment be reported and agreed to by the House, the question shall be again put on the engrossment of the bill.
- 14. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with. Upon any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutionai rule, in order that the bill may be read twice or three times on the same day, and upon the first or second reading of any bill, there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill, may, upon such reading, be read by its title. *Provided*, in all cases, that there be readings on each bill, and that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)
- 15. In the passage of a bill by the House, a motion may be made that it take effect from its passage, or at some time other than ninety days after its passage; and if said motion be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to the House, taken by yeas and nays, the Clerk shall communicate that fact to the Senate along with the bill.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 30.)
 - (a) No amendment by way of rlder.—Rule 7.
 - (b) Amendments after commitment.—Rule 8.

Bills-First Reading

16. The first reading of a bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be, "Shall the bill be rejected?". If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, it shall be regarded as ordered to its

second reading, unless the House otherwise specially direct. All bills reported from the Senate shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading.

17. On the first reading of a bill, it may at any stage of the reading be rejected on motion. If the committee to which the bill was referred shall have reported adversely to the bill, the Speaker shall, immediately after the same is reported by its title, propound the question, "Shall the bill be rejected?"

Bills-Second Reading

- 18. No bill shall be put upon its second reading until the same shall have been printed and delivered to the members of the House at least one day previous to such reading, unless in cases of emergency.
- 19. On the second reading of a bill on the demand of any two members, it shall be read section by section for amendment, and when the amendments as may be moved are disposed of, the question, unless the House otherwise order, shall be, if a House bill, "Shall the bill be engrossed and ordered to the third reading?" If a House bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments have been made thereto, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to confrom with the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted and shall be the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. All House bills ordered to their engrossment and third reading shall be jacketed and engrossed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the blll is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the Senate and returned to the House without amendment, or if amended and the amendment or amendments be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a Senate bill on second reading, if the same be amended by the House and passed on as amended, the amendment, or amendments shall be noted in full on slips of paper in typewriting and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the Senate. and all amendments shall also appear in the House Journal.

Clerk

- 20. It shall be the Clerk's duty to read to the House all papers ordered to be read; to call the roll and note and report the absentees, when a call of the House is ordered; to call the roll and note the answers of members, when a question is taken by yeas and nays; to assist, under the direction of the Speaker, in taking the count when any vote of the House is taken; to notify committees of their appointment and the business referred to them; to superintend the execution of all printing ordered by the House, and to report to the Speaker, to be submitted to the House, every failure of the printer to execute the same properly and promptly.
- 21. The Clerk shall have the custody of all records and papers of the House, and shall not allow them to be taken from the table or out of his possession without the leave of the House, unless to be delivered to committees to whom they may have been referred. He shall endorse on bills and papers brief notes of proceedings had thereon by the House and preserve the same in convenient files for reference.

Committee of the Whole

- 22. When the House shall resolve to go into the Committee of the Whole the Speaker shall leave his chair and appoint a Chairman to preside in the Committee.
- 23. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the House. The rules of the House shall be observed by the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rules limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the yeas and nays. The proceedings in Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the House except so far as reported to the House by the Chairman of the Committee.

Committees

- 24. The following standing committees, to be appointed at the commencement of each session, shall consist of not less than five nor more than fifteen members, except the Committee on Taxation and Finance, which shall consist of twenty-one members, and the Committee on Roads, which shall consist of seventeen members, namely:
 - On Elections and Privileges.
 - On the Judiciary.
 - On Federal Relations.
 - On Taxation and Finance.
 - On Military Affairs.
 - On Prohibition and Temperance.
 - On Education.
 - On Counties, Districts and Municipal Corporations,
 - On Banks and Corporations.
 - On Roads.
 - On Forfeited and Unappropriated Lands.
 - On Claims and Grievances.
 - On Humane Institutions and Public Buildings.
 - On Printing and Contingent Expenses.
 - On the Executive Offices and Library.
 - On Forestry and Conservation.
 - On Arts, Science and General Improvements.
 - On the Penitentiary.
 - On Mines and Mining.
 - On Agriculture.
 - On State Boundaries.
 - On Railroads.
 - On Labor.
 - On Medicine and Sanitation,
 - On Game and Fish.
 - On Insurance.
 - On Rules.
 - On Redistricting.
- 25. The Committee on Elections and Privileges shall examine and report upon all the certificates, and other evidences referred to them, touching the right of persons claiming to have been elected members of this House, or to any office for the State at large; and also upon other petitions and matters touching elections and returns, or relating to the privileges of members and officers of the House, or witnesses attending the House or any committee thereof, as shall be referred to them.
- 26. The Committee on Taxation and Finance, shall, as soon as possible, after the commencement of the regular session, report the general tax and appropriation bill with an estimate of the probable revenue and expenditures of the two years, and of the public debt. They shall from time to time report such measures for equalizing and reducing taxation, supplying revenue and facilitating the collection thereof, reducing the public expenditure, and providing for the principal and interest of the public debt as may seem to them expedient; and they shall further examine into and report upon all matters and propositions relating to taxation and finance as shall be referred to them by the House.

All motions directing payment of money to be referred to Committee on Taxation and Finance.—Rule 68.

- 27. All claims against the State, which may be presented to the House, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims and Grievances, unless otherwise ordered by the House.
- 28. The Committee on Executive Offices and Library shall examine the several public offices and library, and report whether their books and accounts are properly kept; whether the public money has been disbursed according to law; and diligence used in the collection of revenue; and whether the money

received is properly accounted for. They shall report from time to time such measures as may seem to them necessary to add to the economy of the executive offices and the accountability of their officers.

- 29. Every committee, by a majority of their number, may elect a chairman, but if no such election be made, the first named member of the committee, if it be appointed by the Speaker, shall act as chairman.
- 30. Every committee shall meet at such time as they may appoint, or on the call of the chairman or any two of its members.
- 31. The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. All committees shall submit their reports to the House in writing.
- 32. No committee shall sit without special leave while the House is in session.
- 33. Special committees shall consist of five members, unless otherwise ordered by the House.
 - 34. A majority of a committee shall be a quorum thereof.
- 35. The Speaker shall name the members who are to serve upon committees, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Debate .

- 36. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Speaker, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his view in preference to any other member.
- 37. When a member is about to speak to debate, or deliver any matter to the House he shall first rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, and avoid all personalities and indecorous or disrespectful language.
- 38. When a member arises and addresses the Chair, the Speaker shall recognize him by name; but no member in debate shall designate another by name.
- 39. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the person to speak; but in all cases the member who shall first rise and address the Chair shall speak first.
- 40. No one shall disturb or interrupt a member who is speaking, without his permission, except to call to order if he be transgressing the rules.
- 41. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the House.
- 42. When the Speaker is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter, may speak to the question before the negative is put.

Division of House

43. When the question is put and the Speaker shall have doubt as to the result of the vote, or a division be called for, the House shall divide, and those in the affirmative of the question shall rise from their seats and remain standing until they are counted, and afterwards those in the negative. The count may be made by the Speaker, or if he so desires, by the Clerk, or two members, one from each side, to be named for that purpose by the Speaker. When the result is ascertained the Speaker shall rise and state the decision of the House. Any member may call for a division.—Rule 97.

Division of Question

- 44. Any member may call for a division of any question pending, before the vote thereon is taken, if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition will remain for the decision of the House, but the member calling for the division of a question shall state in what manner he proposes it shall be divided.
- 45. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed divisible, and though a motion to strike out be lost, it shall not preclude a motion to strike out part of the same words or a motion to amend or to strike out and insert.

Doorkeeper

46. The doorkeeper shall attend the House while in session, and under the direction of the Speaker execute the orders of the House respecting the admission and the exclusion of persons from the Hall. He shall, when required by the Speaker, aid in the enforcement of order.

Election of Officers

- 47. The House, at the commencement of each session, shall elect its Speaker, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper.
- 48. In the election of officers by the House, the vote shall be given viva voce, and a majority of the whole number of votes given shall be necessary to elect. If, upon any vote there be no election, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped, and any votes thereafter given to such person shall not be taken into the counting to affect the result in any way. But if two or more have the lowest and equal number of votes they may be voted for again. No question before the House, or in committee of the whole, shall be voted on by ballot.

Floor

Who entitled to privilege of .- Rule 72.

Indefinite Postponement

- 49. When a question is postponed indefinitely, the same shall not be acted on again during the session.
- 50. The Janitor, under the direction of the Speaker, shall have care of the Hall and committee rooms of the House, and keep the same, at all times, in a neat and proper condition.

Journal

- 51. The Clerk of the House, under the direction of the Speaker, shall keep a full and correct Journal of the proceedings; and it shall be the duty of the Speaker to examine the Journal dally before it is read and cause all errors and omissions therein to be corrected.
- When the Journal has been read to the end that any mistake made in the entry may be corrected, if no objection is made, it shall stand approved, but if objections be made the first question of the House shall be to dispose of the same, and when such objections are disposed of and the Journal corrected, as the House may order, it shall stand as approved. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for correction, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith. From the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto six copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy weight bond paper, with blank lines at the end of each day's proceedings for the signatures of the Speaker and Clerk, and these shall be the official Journal of the House. They shall be bound in flexible binding, and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the House of Delegates of West Virginia," with designation of regular or special session, as the case may be, and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the Senate.
- 53. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to furnish a copy of each day's proceedings of the Journal to the printer, to be printed and distributed without delay.
- 54. Every written motion made to the House shall be inserted in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn on the same day it is submitted.

Lie on the Table

(a) Motion to lie on the table not debatable.—Rule 66.

(b) When a resolution is presented containing no reference of subject to committee it shall lie on the table for one day.—Rule 67.

(c) When motion to take from table in order.—Rule 76.

Manual and Rules

55. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "A Manual of General Parliamentary Law with Suggestion for General Rules" by Thomas B. Reed, shall govern the House of Delegates in all cases not provided for by the Rules of the House, or in the joint rules of the House and Senate. In any case not governed by said rules or Manual, the House shall be governed by the practice in the House of Representatives of the United States.

56. No standing rule or order of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, unless the same is reported by the Committee on Rules when either may be done by a

majority vote of the members present.

Meeting of the House

57. The House, unless it shall be otherwise directed by special order, shall meet every day, except Sunday, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

58. There shall be appointed by the Speaker an Official Chaplain of the House whose duty it shall be to be present at the convening of each day's session for the purpose of opening the House with prayer. His compensation shall be fixed by the Committee on Taxation and Finance.

Messages

59. The Speaker shall take the chair and call the House to order precisely at the hour of meeting, and, if a quorum be present, cause the Journal of the preceding day to be read.

60. When a message from the Executive or the Senate is announced, other business shall be suspended until it is received, unless the House be at the time actually engaged in taking a vote on some question, in which case it shall be received as soon as the result of the vote is announced. When received, it shall lie on the table to be disposed of in its turn, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Motions and Resolutions

· 61. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a specific day, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely, which motions shall severally have precedence in the order in which they are here arranged.

62. When a motion is made it shall be stated by the Speaker, or being in writing, shall be handed to the Chair, and read aloud by the Clerk, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the House; it may be withdrawn by the mover before any order of the House respecting the same has been made.

63. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any member desires it.

64. When a motion is made to commit any subject to a special committee, a motion to commit the same to the Committee of the Whole, or a standing committee, shall have precedence.

65. A motion to adjourn, and a motion to fix the time to which the House shall adjourn, shall always be in order if the mover be entitled to the floor.

66. The motion to adjourn and to lie on the table shall be put without debate.
67. When a resolution is presented, containing no reference of the subject thereof to a committee, it shall lie on the table for one day, to come up under

the eighth order of business, unless a majority of the House order otherwise.
68. Every motion or resolution directing the appropriation or payment of money shall, unless otherwise ordered by the House, be referred without debate. to the Committee on Taxation and Finance.

Oaths

69. The Speaker or Clerk shall have authority to administer any oaths required by the business of the House.

Resolutions Lying Over

Resolutions, not of inquiry, shall lie over one day .- Rule 67.

Order and Decorum

- 70. While the Speaker is putting any question, or ascertaining the result, no one shall walk out of or across the House, nor when a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.
- 71. If a member speaking or otherwise transgress the rules of the House, the Speaker, shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case, the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed, if any member object, without leave of the House, and if the case require it, shall be liable to the censure of the House.
- 72. No member or other person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called; and no person, except members, exmembers and officers of the Judiciary, shall be admitted upon the floor of the House, except by permission of the Speaker.
- 73. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table. And no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the exception to them was taken.

Speaker to preserve order.-Rule 87.

Order of Business

- 74. The order of business for each day shall be:
 - I. To read, correct and approve the Journal.
- II. To receive and consider reports of standing committees.
- III. To receive and consider reports of select committees.
- 1V. To receive and consider messages from the Executive.
- V. To receive messages from the Senate, and consider amendments, proposed by the Senate, to bills passed by the House.
- VI. To receive resolutions and petitions.
- VII. Bills introduced on motion for leave and referred to appropriate committees.
- VIII. To act on unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, but no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
 - IX. House and Senate Bills on third reading.
 - X. House and Senate Bills on second reading.
 - XI. House and Senate Bills on first reading.
- XII. The order of the day, unless a subject was made the order of the day for a particular hour, in which case it may be called for by any member when the hour arrives.
- XIII. Miscellaneous Business.
- 75. All questions relating to priority of business shall be decided without debate.
- 76. A bill or resolution laid on the table may be taken up by a vote of the House at any time after the seventh order of business is disposed of.

Petitions

77. The member who presents a petition or memorial, or offers a resolution on which a vote of the House is taken, shall be named in the Journal.

Previous Question

78. If the previous question be demanded by not less than seven members, the Speaker shall without debate, put the question, "Shall the main question be now put?" If this question be decided in the affirmative by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, all further debate shall cease and the vote be at once taken on the proposition pending before the House. When the House refuses to order the main question, the consideration of the subject shall be resumed as if the previous question had not been demanded.

79. The previous question shall not be admitted in the Committee of the

Whole.

Printing Documents

80. Documents printed by order of the House shall be printed in pages of the same size as those of the Journal; and a copy of every such document, bound up with one Journal, shall be furnished by the printer to each member of the House at the close of the session, or as soon as possible thereafter; and twenty additional copies bound as aforesaid, shall be delivered to the Clerk of the House, to be distributed as the House may order.

Printing of bllls before second reading .- Rule 18.

Reconsideration

- 81. A question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the House and cannot again be drawn into debate during the same session, unless reconsidered. But it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding legislative day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such a motion, if seconded, shall take precedence of all other questions except a motion to adjourn, and shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House; and if the House decides to reconsider, any member may thereafter call the subject up for consideration.
- 82. When a majority of members present vote in the affirmative on any question, but the question be lost because it is one in which the concurrence of a greater number than a majority of a quorum is necessary to an affirmative decision, any member may move for a reconsideration.

Resolutions

See "Motions and Resolutions."

Rules

See "Manual and Rules," and Rules 55 and 56.

Sergeant-at-Arms

- 83. The Sergeant-at-Arms shall give bond, with surety, in the penalty of two thousand dollars, payable to the State of West Virginia, and conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of his office; such bond to be approved by the Speaker and filed with the Clerk of the House for safe keeping.
- 84. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the House while in session; to aid in the enforcement of order, under the direction of the Speaker; to execute the commands of the House, from time to time, together with all such process issued under its authority as may be directed to him by the Speaker.
- 85. The Sergeant-at-Arms, under the direction of the Speaker, shall superintend the distribution by the pages of all documents and papers to be distributed to the members.

86. It shall also be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to keep the accounts for pay and mileage of members, officers and attaches, to prepare and sign warrants or requisitions for the same, and if required by any member, who shall endorse his warrant or requisition for that purpose, to draw the money thereon and pay over the same to the member entitled thereto.

Speaker

- \$7. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to preserve order and decorum while the House is in session; to enforce the rules and orders of the House, to prescribe the order in which business shall come up for consideration, subject to the rules and orders of the House; to announce the question of business before the House when properly requested by any member; to receive all messages and other communications; to put to vote all questions which are properly moved; to announce the result of all votes and to authenticate, when necessary, the acts and proceedings of the House.
- 88. The Speaker shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House. He may speak to questions of order in preference to other members, and may make the concluding speech on any appeal from his decision, notwithstanding he may have before spoken on the question; but no other member shall speak more than once on such appeal without leave of the House.
- 89. When properly requested by a member, he shall inform the House upon any point of order or practice pertinent to the business before it.
- 90. If there be any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the Speaker or Chairman of the Committee of the Whole may order the same to be cleared.
- 91. The Speaker, subject to the orders of the House, may assign convenient seats within the bar to stenographers and reporters wishing to take down the proceedings.
- 92. The Speaker may name any member to perform the duties of the Chair, but no one by virtue of such appointment, shall act as Speaker for more than three days.
- 93. If the Speaker be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the House, it shall be called to order by the Clerk, and a Speaker pro tem appointed by the House.
- 94. The Speaker shall, as soon as practical after his election, appoint for the House such number of Committee Clerks, Floor Pages, Journal Pages and other attaches as the House may by resolution direct, and may at his discretion, remove any person so appointed and appoint another in his stead. He may also appoint, without resolution, a Private Secretary, and a stenographer to himself.

The Clerk of the House in addition to the Assistant Clerks, provided for by section 18 of chapter 12 of the Code, may appoint a stenographer to himself, and such other assistants as the House may by resolution direct and shall have power at any time to remove such appointees from office and appoint others in their stead at his discretion.

- All resolutions relating to the appointment of persons mentioned in this section, or prescribing the salary or pay of such persons, shall originate in and come from the Committee on Rules.
- 95. The Speaker may, from time to time, designate such times as he may deem necessary for the consideration of bills of a local nature, and such bills shall be placed on a special calendar.

Voting

96. On the passage of every bill, and joint resolution, and when the yeas and nays on any question are called for by one-tenth of those present, the Speaker shall direct the roll to be called, and every member shall answer aye or no, when his name is called. Before the result is announced the Clerk shall read to the House the names of those who voted in the affirmative, and then those who voted in the negative, at which time any member may correct a mistake committed in taking down his vote. The result shall then be announced, and the Yeas and nays entered on the Journal, but if the House so orders, the announcement of the result and the entry of the yeas and nays entered upon the Journal

may be postponed to the succeeding day, with liberty to absent members at any time before the result is announced by the Speaker, to appear and vote are or no, in the presence of the House; and any member may, in the presence of the House, change his vote before the result is announced.

97. Upon calls of the House, in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the

members, shall be called alphabetically.

- 98. Every question shall be first put in the affirmative and then in the negative; each member present shall vote on every question, and the Speaker shall declare whether the yeas or nays have it, which declaration shall stand as the judgment of the House, unless a member call for a division, in which event the Speaker shall divide the House.
- 99. Every member within the bar, when a question is put, shall vote, unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the House excuses him. A motion to excuse a member from voting must be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.
- 100. No member shall vote on any question in the result of which he is immediately and particularly interested; and, except in the case provided for in the ninety-sixth rule, no member shall vote if he was not within the bar when the question was put, unless leave be given him by the House.

 - (b) Voting on bills amended by Senate.-Rule 9.





JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

Messages Between the Houses

1. When a message is sent by one house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the Doorkeeper thereof, if it be in session, and then be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person by whom it may be sent, but no message shall be received during a call of the roll. But the Clerk of one house may communicate a message to the Clerk of the other after adjournment, and any message so sent shall be received by the house to which it is sent whenever it may be in session.

Introduction of Bills

2. No bill, other than an appropriation bill, shall be introduced in either House after the fiftieth day of the session unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill, and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each House present and voting.

Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills

After a bill has been passed by both houses, the type from which it was originally printed shall be corrected as to any typographical errors that may not theretofore have been corrected and to meet any amendments that may have been made by either house since the last printing of the bill, and after the type has been so corrected fifty copies of the bill shall be printed (except charter bills, of which only twenty-five of each bill shall be printed), on eight by ten heavy bond paper for the use of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, one of which copies, when properly authenticated, shall become the Enrolled Bill. The Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates, to be appointed by the presiding officer of each house, whose duty it shall be to compare carefully all bilis and joint resolutions passed by both houses, with the enrollment thereof, and to correct any errors or omissions they may discover and to make report to their respective houses each day of the correctly enrolled bills or joint resolutions. They shall be authenticated by the signature of the chairman of the House Committee and the chairman of the Senate Committee, composing such Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, but in the absence of such chairman another member of the committee may act in his stead, and they shall require all bills and joint resolutions before such authentication to be free from interlineations or erasures and destroy any previous enrollment containing any interlineations or erasures. After enrolled bills and joint resolutions are authenticated as aforesaid, they shall be signed by the Speaker of the House and by the President of the Senate.

Bills and Joint Resolutions

- 4. It shall be in order for the Committee on Enrolled Bills to report at any time.
- 5. After a bill shall have thus been signed in each house, it shall be presented by the said committee to the Governor, for his approbation (it being first endorsed on the back of the roll, certifying in which house the same originated, which endorsement shall be signed by the clerk of the house in which the same originated and the date it takes effect, which endorsement shall be signed by the Clerk of the House of Delegates), and shall be entered on the Journal of each house. The same committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor; which time shall also be carefully entered on the Journal of each house.
- 6. Where a bill or joint resolution, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed.
- 7. After each house shall have adhered to their disagreement the bill or resolution respecting which they have disagreed shall be lost.
 - 8. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Delegates

shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the Capitol building for refreshments and like purposes, when the Legislature is in session.—(Joint Resolution No. 8, Acts 1881.)

Action of Governor on Bills

- 9. Every bill disapproved by the Governor shall be returned by him to the house in which it originated, with his objections thereto unless the Legislature shall, by its adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after said adjournment.
- 10. Every bill approved by the Governor shall, within five days after it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State and the fact of said approval communicated by the Governor to the house in which said bill originated.
- 11. Every bill which shall be neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor, shall immediately after the expiration of five days from the time it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall forthwith engross thereon a certificate to the following effect: "I certify that the foregoing act, having been presented to the Governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the legislature in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the State, has become a law without his approval," and shall date and sign the same.
- 12. Upon each bill returned to either house of the Legislature with the objections of the Governor, the Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates shall engross the action of their respective houses on the reconsideration and passage of said bill, and sign the same.

Manner of Printing the Journal and Bills

- 13. In printing the daily Journals of the proceedings of each house there shall be printed at the top of each page, except the first, the date of the Journal and on the last page of each day's Journal shall be printed the calendar for the next day.
- 14. At the top of the first page of each bill, preceding the title and number thereof, there shall be printed the name of the person by whom or the committee by which it was introduced, and the date when introduced; and at the top of each page, except the first, shall be printed the number of the bill.

Counting Votes for State Officers

15. As soon as the Senate is informed that the House of Delegates is ready to proceed, as provided by section three of article seven of the Constitution, to open and publish the returns of the elections for State officers, the Senate, preceded by their president and other officers, shall repair in a body to the hall of the House of Delegates. Upon their arrival the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Delegates, shall announce the presence of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall then address the Speaker of the House, stating that & majority of the Senate have assembled in the hall of the House of Delegates to be present at the opening and publishing of the returns of the elections for State The Speaker of officers, held on the.....day of..... the House of Delegates shall invite the President of the Senate to a seat upon his right, and the other members of the Senate and officers thereof to take seats assigned them, and after announcing that a majority of the House of Delegates is present, shall then open and publish the returns of said election, proceeding by counties in alphabetical order, the Clerks of the two houses each taking down the returns as announced by the Speaker, to be entered upon the Journal of the House; and when completed and estimated, the Speaker shall announce the votes received by each person voted for, for each of said offices, and those receiving the largest number of votes shall be by him declared duly elected; and the Senate shall then return to its hall; and if any two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the two houses shall immediately proceed to choose one of such persons for said office by a joint vote, as provided by Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution.

THE WEST VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE, 1933

The legislature convened in regular session on January 11, 1933, adjourning sixty-two days later, there being an extension of two days at the end of the constitutional sixty-day period.

During the session, 176 bills were introduced in the Senate and 569 in the House. A total of 143 bills were passed by the Senate and House, seven being vetoed by the Governor. One bill (Ceredo-Kenova Independent School District) was passed over Governor Conley's veto.

The first extraordinary session of the legislature lasted fifty-five days, beginning on April 10th and ending on June 3rd. During the session, 66 Senate Bills and 225 House Bills were introduced, a total of 124 being passed by both Senate and House. Of this number, three were vetoed by the Governor. The second extraordinary session of 1933 began on November 21st and continued into the year 1934. Up to January 20th, 82 Senate Bills and 258 House Bills had been introduced and 58 bills passed by both Senate and House.

House Bill No. 314, passed at the regular session, 1933, relating to the allocation of levies under the "tax limitation amendment," was declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia. A similar measure, House Bill No. 63, passed at the second extraordinary session, 1933-34, was also declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of Appeals. A third bill, House Bill No. 234, was passed by the House and Senate January 19, 1934, and, at the time the forms for the Blue Book were closed, plans were being made for the institution of a suit to test the constitutionality of the act.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Three constitutional amendments will be submitted to the voters of the state at the general election in November, 1934—the repeal of the state prohibtion law, the capitation tax amendment, and the so-called "lame-duck amendment."

The prohibition amendment provides for the repeal of Section 46 (state prohibition statute) of the constitution and authorizes the legislature to regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor, but especially forbids the consumption and sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

The capitation tax amendment provides for the levying by the legislature of an annual tax of one dollar on each inhabitant of the state who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons who are afflicted with bodily infirmities may be exempted from the payment of the tax. The amendment further provides that the payment of tax and the presentation of a receipt therefor may be made a qualification for voting in all elections in such manner as the legislature may by law direct.

The "lame-duck amendment" provides that the terms of office of the governor, secretary of state, state superintendent of free schools, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. Under the present law their terms commence on the fourth day of March after their election.

The West Virginia state law library, consisting of law books and legal periodicals only, is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the capitol building.

The library is in charge of the state law librarian, appointed by the Supreme Court.

The books of the library consist of text-books purchased, and reports of other states as well as many foreign countries, all except text books coming in by exchange for West Virginia reports provided for by the state law librarian, as consecutive volumes of the reports of West Virginia and elsewhere are published.

The state law librarian, from West Virginia reports furnished him by the superintendent of public printing, supplies all judges of courts, state officers and some of the other law libraries of the state with copies of these reports.

The law governing the state law library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the supreme court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers, and members and officers of the legislature during the session of that body.

It is also provided that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the place where the library is kept.

The law further provides that no book or paper shall be taken from the library until the person authorized to take the same shall sign a receipt therefor in a book to be kept by the state law librarian for that purpose.

A provision is also made, that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library at the place where it is kept."



MORONI ORSON LITZ, (R), of Welch, was born at Burks Garden, Tazewell County, Virginia; educated in public and private schools, graduating from the University of Virginia in 1902, with the degree of bachelor of laws; practiced law at Welch from the time of his admission to the bar in 1902 until appointed to Supreme Court in 1923; elected to same office in 1924 for a term of twelve years.

HAYMOND MAXWELL, (R), of Clarksburg, was born October 24, 1879, son of Edwin and Loretta (Shuttleworth) Maxwell; graduated from West Virginia University in 1900, with A. B. degree, and from same institution with degree of LL. B. in 1901; married June 28, 1905, to Carrie V. Maxwell; Methodist; Mason; Phi Betta Kappa, Phi Sigma Kappa, Phi Alpha Delta; admitted to the bar in 1901 and practiced law with his father under the firm name of Maxwell & Maxwell; member House of Delegates, 1904-1906; judge Criminal Court, Harrison County, 1909-1912; judge Circuit Court, Fifteenth Judicial Circuit, 1913-1925; appointed judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals in August, 1928, and elected to same office in November, 1928, for a term of twelve years.

THE GREAT SEAL OF THE STATE

When the first Legislature of West Virginia convened in 1863, a joint committee was appointed for the purpose of recommending a seal for use by the state. This committee was composed of Peter G. Van Winkle of Wood County, L. E. Davidson of Taylor County, William L. Crawford of Hancock County, Daniel D. T. Farnsworth of Upshur County, Edwin Maxwell of Harrison County and Greenbury Slack of Kanawha County.

Diss Debar, an educated Frenchman of Saint Clara, Doddridge County, designed the seal, following the suggestions of the members of the committee. The design agreed upon was adopted by the Legislature in September, 1863.





THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND THE WEST VIRGINIA FARMER

After a campaign which has lasted fifteen years, West Virginia has become the 13th state to offer accreditation by the U. S. Government as free from bovine tuberculosis. During this period a million dollars has been expended by county, state and federal government in indemnities and in the cost of carrying on the work. More than 857,000 cattle had to be tested to meet government requirements. To make this million dollar investment pay dividends, it is mandatory that the state continue to provide sufficient funds for the necessary retests, which must be made every third year. About eighteen counties per year are retested.

A vigilant campaign is waged by the Department of Agriculture against rabies. In the past eighteen months, five hundred people had to be given treatment for this disease in Fayette County alone. The vaccine for this work cost \$5,000 not including doctors' fees. The loss of 75 head of cattle was directly chargeable to rabies. In the past three weeks, five more counties, Logan, Mercer, McDowell, Raleigh, and Lincoln, have had outbreaks of this dreaded disease.

Although there has been an increase of thirty per cent in the number of hogs in West Virginia in the past six years, an active fight against hog cholera has decreased the number of cholera outbreaks. This emphasizes the importance of continuing control of such diseases of hogs and other diseases of sheep and poultry.

An animal pathological laboratory is maintained by the department for the purpose of diagnosing these diseases. It is used not only by the farmers, but by private citizens of the state. During the year, 36,859 specimens were examined, such as 27,123 samples of blood from chickens for bacilliary white diarrhea, 7,308 blood samples of cattle for the contagious abortion test, and 1,321 milk tests in connection with the dairy inspection work of the Department.

Active marketing measures in this state have added many dollars to the value of the products of every one of West Virginia's 80,000 farms. For example, more than sixty per cent of the five million dollars' worth of fruit, which is the average annual production of West Virginia, is exported. Every barrel of export fruit must be inspected as to grade and tested for spray residue. Apples must be sprayed while on the trees to control the insects, but the spray must not contain over a specified amount of a certain chemical. Thus the apples are tested to determine the amount used. The shipping point inspection by cooperative arrangement of federal and state departments was organized in West Virginia several years ago and has been a most valuable marketing contribution to the industry not only in West Virginia, but in the entire world.

The tremendous improvement that has been made in the quality of fruit packed for market and grade to show quality is illustrated by the fact that in 1928 only seventy-five per cent of the inspected fruit was found to meet the requirements of the grade under which it was shipped. The effectiveness of this and other illustrations in proper marketing practices is further shown by the work that has been done by cooperative efforts of fruit growers and representatives of the State Department of Agriculture in so checking against the presence of dangerous amounts of arsenic spray on fruit as to meet the rigid requirements that have been recently established by the fruit trade. West

Virginia's service in inspecting fruit and in testing for spray poison residue is recognized as among the best in the country.

Approximately two million dollars every year in farms, farm products and farm machinery is sold through the columns of the Market Bulletin, which, through a circulation of 60,000 copies per issue, establishes direct contact between producers on the farm and the buyer on other farms or in towns and cities.

Another phase of the Department of Agriculture work is insect and plant disease control work. Large sums of money are saved the farmer and market gardens of the state by constant fight against dangerous insects and plant disease. The Mexican bean beetle is an example of the new pests that put in an appearance from time to time. This insect alone has meant losses of hundreds of thousands of dollars to the people of West Virginia, and but for the active campaigns to demonstrate the most effective measures of controlling the pest, losses would have been multiplied.

Feed and fertilizer control work is an important function of the department. Since approximately one hundred million dollars a year is represented in the purchase of stock food alone in West Virginia, the importance of insuring the quality of feeds and fertilizers of all kind is plainly evident. Careful tests of well chosen samples of such material are made by experienced chemists of the Department of Agriculture. Reports show a steady improvement in the quality of such products sold in this state, and prove the value this service renders to the farmers. Feed samples are tested in the department laboratory.

The farmers and gardeners are being saved large sums of money by the testing of seeds offered for sale in the state. Tests show that in 1928 only forty-seven per cent of seed offered for sale was marked correctly. The next year this percentage had increased to sixty-eight per cent and last year eighty-four per cent of all samples collected were found to be correctly marked. In the enforcement of the law during the past year, the laboratory has tested two hundred samples, and has tested three hundred samples for farmers or other individuals in the state.

Milk and cream testing is just one of the many other functions of the Department of Agriculture. The inspection and licensing of plants purchasing milk and cream, and examination of milk tests to determine fitness, is an outstanding service. 137 plants in the state having already been inspected and licensed, and 132 testers licensed to test cream.

Egg grading has also been carried on by the department since 1928, during which time there have been inspected 1,799,130 dozens of eggs, or 150 car loads. Honey produced in West Virginia in 1932 was valued by the department at \$120,000. In addition, the benefits derived by the fruit industry should be figured in the thousands of dollars. Colonles are examined by the department entomologist for the presence of bee diseases, and destroyed if necessary.

Cooperative arrangement with the federal government was made possible to have crop reporting service in this state, which keeps the farmers in touch with general market conditions and enables them to plan their farm production intelligently so that as far as possible it may meet market demands.

THE FOUR-H MOVEMENT IN WEST VIRGINIA



Each county cottage has an old fashioned fireplace, giving opportunity for the idea to come out that the best things America has were planned around and taught to the children in just such chimney corners. Two other log cabins are

here that breathe the very atmosphere of pioneering. Much stone has been used in the construction of the cottages because of "Stonewall" Jackson, and also because of the solidarity of the Four-H ideals. We have gathered all the burr stones of the old mill and adorned our driveway with them, with the express purpose of reminding youth of how their forefathers got their bread. Native flowers and shrubs of all kinds are brought here from every section of the state and planted along the nature trails. Some native deer are also on the grounds. The place is a wild life sanctuary, all for the purpose of building an atmosphere of achievement. Creativeness is the fashion. Doing a masterpiece is the method.

We have set a new standard of producing your own entertainment that far surpasses the movies or talkies by our study work, handcraft, vespers and camp fire services. These services have been used successfully in many other states and also at Camp Vail, of the Eastern States Exposition.

Thousands of boys and girls feel the influence of our sunset vesper service. We have been told by many of them that at sunset, no matter where they are, their thoughts take them to Jackson's Mill. Our vesper service is just a simple worship time of the day which has always been carried out by the boys and girls themselves. These services are made up for the most part of memory songs, quoting favorite scriptures, a prayer and a story.

Boys and girls were taught the art of weaving baskets, and the home communities had an epidemic of it. Leather glove making, the manufacture of maple sugar, rag rugs, blackb rry jam, staging of school house plays and the decorating of furniture have all been carried to every nook and cranny of the state by the boys and girls who have attended camp. Out of the above named activities the Home Industrial shops have grown. "Stonewall" Craft Shops are opening here and there over the state.

Here at Jackson's Mill we propose to do the best work with boys and girls that time, money and human energy will permit us to do. We are using everything that we can find that has anything in it that will intensify and clarify a life challenge. We know that few are the men who can discern the problems of their own generation, much less the problems of a generation ahead of us. Our purpose, then, is to enrich boy and girl life right now.

The West Virginia Four-H Camp is the first great camp established for Four-H boys and girls. We have nothing at the camp of a self perpetuating nature. Everything we do finds expression in the home and community life of each boy and girl. This great commonwealth of West Virginia has charged us with the responsibility of setting forth in a clean and challenging way a four-fold life pattern of citizenship for her youth and we owe a definite duty to every boy and girl within her borders.

WEST VIRGINIA'S PART IN CHICAGO'S "CENTURY OF PROGRESS" EXPOSITION



The Legislature, on June 2nd, 1933, appropriated \$35,000 for West Virginia's part in Chicago's Century of Progress exposition. This was the second lowest appropriation for any state exhibit, yet when it was opened to the public less than sixty days later, it ranked third, according to popular vote.

The members of the West Virginia Century of Progress Commission were: Governor H. G. Kump, chairman ex-officio; A. G. Mathews, President of the West Virginia Senate, chairman; and Senators A. W. Reynolds, Jr., Lee J. Sandridge and A. L. Helmick; R. M. Hiner, Speaker of the House of Delegates, vico chairman; and Mrs. S. W. Price, R. L. McCoy and W. B. Hogg, members of the House of Delegates; Mrs. D. W. Brown, of Huntington, Col. W. T. Williamson, of Charleston, Luther Koontz, of Ciendenin, and J. B. McLaughlin, Commissioner of Agriculture, secretary. Ross B. Johnston was placed in charge of the exhibit by the Commission and L. T. Bengston of Charleston was named architect. A staff of four, which served for several weeks at a time, assisted the director.

It was estimated that a million, eight hundred thousand people visited the exhibit, being an average of more than eighteen thousand a day from the opening date July 28th, until November 12th, when the exposition closed. An estimate shows that West Virginia's exhibit, which so splendidly advertised the state, cost three cents per person, or the price of a postage stamp.

West Virginia alone represented the Appalachian region in the Court of States where twenty-eight states had exhibits. For that reason in particular, its exhibit attracted wide attention as an exponent of the group of states between the Ohio and the Atlantic, including Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, the Carolinas, and West Virginia. The exhibit emphasized the geographical location of the state as the hub of a circle of a 500 mile radius



within which half the people of America live and which embraces more than half the nation's buying power.

Visitors to the Fair were attracted by the inviting entrance to the West Virginia exhibit, with its electric blue letters identifying the state's Hall of Fame. Rough hewn logs outlined the two colorful dioramas of New River Gorge and Seneca Rocks on either side of the main entrance, while overhead a bower of green leaves reminded one of the thousands of acres of virgin forests awaiting the visitors' inspection.

Inside one was struck with the quiet beauty of that West Virginia scene with its native woods, beautiful murals, glistening crystal and colorful china. Deep restful chairs and soft indirect lighting added to the attractiveness of the exhibit.

A great block of coal weighing 6,000 pounds, encased in West Virginia plate glass and bearing the inscription, "West Virginia Can Supply the World's Coal for 100 Years," faced the entrance and formed the unique information desk.

The entire interior surface was built of native woods, red oak floors, black walnut lower wall, white walnut or butternut upper wall, maple cove and chestnut ceiling. The tile at the entrance, the plate glass and the mirrors in the display cabinets and the comfortable furniture were all from the home state.

Seven dioramas or models formed spots of interest in the Lower wall. These were: "The World's Chemical Center," in the Kanawha Valley; "Nature's Treasure Chest," showing the oil, gas and coal resources; "Rich Bluegrass Lands," emphasizing the state's agricultural advantages; "Lazy Days in the Hills," depicting in marvelous blues and greens the recreational charm of the state; historic and scenic Harper's Ferry, where Virginia, Maryland and West Virginia unite at one of the most charming spots in the East; and, White Sulphur Springs, the summer White House of early presidents, and an internationally known health resort and recreation center for two centuries.

In a frieze above the dioramas were thirty transparencies featuring outstanding beauty spots in the state. These were supplemented by a series of sixty colored views which appeared at intervals on a large map of West Virginia, occupying the entire north wall of the exhibit, as various routes over the state were outlined in gay colored lights. This pictorial map was one of the most interesting in the Court of States and hundreds of requests for copies of it were received.

The attention of the visitor was next caught by six large murals on the upper wall which harmoniously carried out the thought of the tourist attractions, natural resources and historic landmarks.

These murals painted by William Grauer of Cleveland were "The First Battle of the Revolution at Point Pleasant 1774"; "The First Land Battle of the Civil War at Philippi"; "Health and Recreation at West Virginia's Mineral Springs and Camp"; "West Virginia's Natural Resources Encourage Varied Industry"; "Agriculture Offers Her Product to World Markets," and "Fine Hardwood Forests Clothe West Virginia Hills."

A display of glassware and pottery, said to be the most complete at the Fair, and representing more than a score of the nation's leading factories which are located in West Virginia, called forth much favorable comment. Many West Virginians expressed surprise at the quantity and beauty of these products.

A unique inlaid table containing 3,700 different pieces of 22 native woods attracted the attention of many. This table was made by a man at the West Virginia Penitentiary.

In one corner the visitor saw a display of West Virginia homecraft, the handiwork of the unemployed in the mining areas of the state, made under the direction of the American Society of Friends, as a part of their rehabilitation project.

Thousands of requests for information regarding the state were forwarded to the State Department of Agriculture, and many trips through the state outlined for those interested in returning to their homes through scenic West Virginia.

West Virginia Day, August 26th, was a success, and the pageant, "Great Moments of History on West Virginia Soil," played before an audience of 15,000, furthered the interest already aroused.



SCHOOL ORGANIZATION IN WEST VIRGINIA

West Virginia has a new school system. The Extraordinary Session of the Legislature in adopting a County Unit Bill (May 22, 1933) abolished independent and magisteral school districts and the officers of these units. There were 344 magisterial districts and 54 independent districts. Replacing them are the fifty-five counties of the State that are now fifty-five school districts for elementary and high school purposes.

In each county there are five members of the County Board of Education. The initial members were appointed by the State Superintendent of Free Schools, and will serve until their successors are elected and qualified. Of the first five elected (Nov., 1934), three shall serve for four years and two shall serve for two years. Thereafter each member shall serve four years. The boards shall have complete control of the schools within the county, with power to close any school or schools that are unnecessary and transfer the children to other schools. Board members serve for a salary of \$50.00 a year.

The County Superintendents in office when the bill was enacted remain

The County Superintendents in office when the bill was enacted remain in office until the expiration of their terms. Those serving in the future, elected by the board, must have a bachelor's degree, including eight hours' credit in school administration and two years' experience. They shall be executive officers of the boards, make recommendations of teachers, serve as secretaries of boards, and perform such other duties as the board may direct. The salary, which is fixed by the County Board of Education, is paid in part by the county and in part by the State. The State pays 20¢ per pupil in average daily attendance for the preceding year.

Under the School Fund Bill that sets up a teacher load of 18, 22, 25, 30 and 38 per teacher, varying with the density of population in the various counties of the State, the Legislature must provide basic salaries for four months of \$55, \$70, \$75, \$85 and \$90 for second grade, first grade, short course, standard normal, and collegiate elementary certifi-

cates respectively; and \$80, \$90 and \$110 in high school for standard normal certificate, A. B. and A. M. degrees respectively. This bill provides further that each district may, after it has raised its maximum amount for school fund purposes and has met other requirements, share the Equalization Fund to complete the minimum term, or such part thereof as funds will permit. The Legislature placed an item in the budget for these two funds, of \$5,500,000 for each of the two school years 1933-34 and 1934-35, and directed that license tax on chain stores and other revenues for general school fund supplement this budget item.

In addition to basic salaries the district shall pay for experience as follows: one year, \$3.00 per month; two years \$5.00 per month; three years \$7.50 per month; four years \$10.00 per month; five to ten years \$15.00 per month; more than ten years \$20.00 per month. "Boards of Education may fix higher salaries for principals of elementary and high

schools consistent with the extra duties and responsibilities."

Under the new organization high standards of certificates are required, consolidation is encouraged, better supervision provided and more nearly equal opportunities offered to all children of all the people. The third grade elementary certificate on examination and first grade and second grade temporary certificates on high school education were eliminated. The lowest certificate authorized is a second grade temporary which calls for forty semester hours of credit beyond the high school, eight of which must be in elementary education.

For the first year the number of teachers employed was reduced by 1,026, many schools were consolidated, and many transportation projects put into effect without the construction of new buildings. Many children are happy in the additional educational opportunities brought to them.

WEST VIRGINIA AND CONSERVATION

By T. M. CHEEK, Acting Director CONSERVATION COMMISSION OF WEST VIRGINIA

The management of the wild life resources of West Virginia touches many problems, ranging from the adjustment of relationship and differences between large groups of people down to the management and care of game birds, game animals, fish and frogs.

For many years past, West Virginia, as well as other states, has asserted title to all wild life within its borders on behalf of all of the people. In recent years the United States Government has taken similar action with reference to migratory birds on behalf of all of the people of the Nation. This right to do so has been sustained in a number of courts of last resort. How these great natural resources shall be managed has largely been controlled by law and there seems to be a growing tendency in the direction that the officers and managers of the conservation work are given broader powers and more authority to make rules and regulations as to how best to preserve and perpetuate all of our wild life.

The Legislature, at its first extraordinary session, 1933, appreciated the wisdom of making available that portion of these resources classed as game and fish by enacting a very comprehensive and far-reaching conservation law. Ownership carries with it the responsibility of management and this costs money, therefore, under the law the State rightly takes the position that if a portion of the citizens of the State wish to appropriate a part of this property which belongs to all the people, it should pay for the privilege. It is on this principal that the issuance of hunting and fishing licenses is based. A hunting and fishing license is a special tax upon those citizens who wish to exercise property rights over game by reducing a limited portion of it to their possession. They are in no way, however, relieved from a general tax (county, city and state) levied upon all the citizens of the State. It is logical, therefore, to assume that this license tax should be used directly for the benefit of our wild life population rather than diverting it to other channels. While it is a great source of satisfaction to every sportsman who is a purchaser of a hunting and fishing license that the conservation work in West Virginia has been supported so far by revenue derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. I believe, nevertheless, that no object is more worthy of all the people than the safeguarding and proper use of the State's natural resources, and it should be stressed that only about forty per cent of such revenue can fairly be classed as game; the song, insectivorous and other non-game birds and mammals make up the other sixty per cent. These too should receive equal care and attention, but the hunters, fishers and trappers are no more interested in this sixty per cent than are many thousands of other nature lovers; therefore, it is reasonable to contend that part of the costs of managing this sixty per cent should be financed out of funds from the general levy.

The conservation work, in the strictest sense, calls for much the same methods as would be employed in operating a manufacturing plant, a farm, an orchard or ranch. The object is to produce economically the largest possible amount of the most desirable resources while holding in check as far as possible that which is not so desirable, namely, predators. Most of the latter are picturesque and interesting and should be held in check but never exterminated.

Two things are essential if our wild life is expected to increase during the

coming years, namely, food and cover. One of these essentials is being cared for by a Department of the Conservation Commission, namely, the Department of Forestry, which consists of a chief forester, five district foresters, approximately one hundred and seventy rangers and observers.

The Commission owns and operates forty-three observation towers which are placed on high mountains and during the spring and fall fire season they are manned by keen-eyed observers who detect forest fires quickly. The alarm is sounded to the various rangers and wardens of that vicinity and usually the fire is quickly suppressed. There are no estimates available as to how many thousands of wild birds and animals are destroyed annually by forest fires, but it is an undisputed fact that the protection of our forests and fields from the ravages of fire does protect the cover which is most necessary to wild life.

To overcome the second great essential the commission must have the cooperation of all sportsmen's clubs in feeding our wild birds and animals during severe winters. The friendly farmer can be of valuable service by leaving a little grain in the fields unharvested.

In the march of civilization we as a people have not taken into consideration to any great extent our natural resources such as wild animals, wild birds and

flowers and our wild life is now confronted with many destructive agenciesthat are a distinct advantage to our citizens but a hindrance to our wild life, such as high tension electric wires, high fences and automobiles. The latter accounts for the deaths of thousands of fur-bearing animals, particularly rabbits.

Many of our leading industries have so polluted some of our streams that habitation by game and fish is impossible. Others have only partially been polluted but there still remains several thousand miles of fine fishing waters in West Virginia practically unpolluted. The commission in the past has encountered many difficulties in laying out a long distance plan for mass production by artificial methods of restocking both cold and warm water streams with fish in sufficient numbers to restock annually this vast network of unpolluted streams in the State.

It was demonstrated many years ago that trout could be artificially propagated and to meet the ever growing demand of the nimrods in and out of the State, the department has invested at the Averlil Nursery at Edray, West Virginia, upward of \$35,000.00 which is practically complete and it is the plan of the department to finish this project early next spring. When completed, it should produce a quarter of a million trout fingerlings annually.

We also have a fifty-year lease on a tract of land near Petersburg, in Grant County, which has been producing from one to two hundred and fifty thousand fingerling trout annually. In addition to the trout nurseries the commission owns and maintains a bass hatchery at Ridge, in Morgan County, which, while small, is one of the most modern of its kind in the east.

It is admitted by many conservationists that the artificial propagation of black bass is yet in its experimental stages.

The commission has for many years been experimenting in game management on a three hundred and twenty-five acre game farm at French Creek, in Upshur County, and have been fairly successful in the raising and planting of native wild turkey and Virginia white-tailed deer. Our program for 1934 calls for extensive improvements and beautification of this game farm. It is hoped that the commission will be able to completely rejuvenate this farm and turn it into more or less of a state park where a pair of all game birds and game animals may be kept for educational and scientific purposes. It is planned to set aside a portion of this farm to demonstration planting. This will be carried on under the supervision of the Forestry Department.

The commission has no intention of abandoning the raising of wild turkey and deer but specifications and plans call for a larger output of both turkey and deer next year.

We also own nineteen acres of land and a small modern tree nursery at Green Bottom, in Cabell County, which is producing annually around one million trees. Several hundred thousand trees from this nursery have already been transplanted on Seneca and Watoga State Forests, which are located in Pocahontas County.

In addition to the regular work of the Conservation Commission we have nine reforestation camps located in the State, seven on private cooperative land, doing work principally along the lines of fire prevention and protection. The two camps on state-owned land are busily engaged in the building of motor-truck trails, telephone line construction, thinning timber, planting trees. building recreation cabins for citizens and tourists. Two lakes are also under construction, one on each of the state forests. These conservation camps are also clearing off small patches of ground at strategic points which will be planted with buckwheat, corn, millet, Korean Lespedeza and other seed which will be left as food for the wild life now on these forests.

An entirely new bookkeeping system has been installed and the moneys derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses are allocated on the books and are being spent strictly in conformity with the law.

A new form of hunting and fishing license will be inaugurated for the year 1934. Each purchaser of a license will be given a badge which will be serially numbered and which is to be worn on the outer garment and plainly visible for the examination of any warden or officer of the law. A place in back of this button is provided to carry a fishing and hunting license.

I believe that we should place the rights of the citizens of the State to the use and enjoyment of her natural resources, particularly with reference to this department, above every other consideration, knowing that the whole matter transcends everything that savors of selfishness or gain, and I also believe that no game or fish should be put out for stocking lands which may later be posted against public hunting and fishing. Our past years of exploitation must be followed by years of rehabilitation, if this State is to continue progressive and prosperous. As a general proposition the State of West Virginia has a splendid code of game, fish and forestry laws which will grow in favor as they are better understood and public sentiment permits them to be more rigidly enforced.

WEST VIRGINIA'S FOREST HISTORY AND STATUS

Originally West Virginia's fifteen million acres of land area were clothed in a magnificent mantle of virgin forest, varying in type and species composition from the river bottoms of the Ohio and the Kanawha to the spruce forests of the higher mountains.

This great natural resource has been steadily depleted since the arrival of the first white settlers. First, by the clearing of land for farms; second, by the river logger who drove logs down the various tributaries of the Ohio to mills near Cincinnati; third, by the operation of innumerable sawmills supplied by railroad logging for the production of lumber and many other forest products; and last, but not least, by the ravages of unchecked forest fires over a long period of years. Today our stand of merchantable saw timber susceptible of commercial lumber operation upon any considerable scale consists of less than one half million acres.

Nine million acres, or sixty per cent of the total land area of our State, is estimated to be potential forest land, unsuited by virtue of its soil quality and typography, to the uses of agriculture or to any other known use save that of growing timber. The renewal of a stand of timber capable of conversion into various forms of forest products, upon the rugged slopes of our mountains is obviously a matter of distinct importance to the economic future of the State. Our mineral resources, such as coal, oil and gas, once depleted, cannot be replaced but, in time, if a nucleus of seed-bearing trees is left standing upon cutover land and adequate fire protection is provided, our timber resources can be reproduced, providing a basic raw material whose conversion and fabrication will serve to provide material for local construction and consumption, for exploitation and export, resulting in the maintenance of taxable property and the creation of industrial payrolls.

Our forests provide both food and shelter for the major portion of our game birds and animals and constitute a primary factor in the flood control of our streams and the checking of soil erosion.

If the natural scenic beauty of our mountains is to be preserved, if the recreational advantages of hunting and fishing, enjoyed by many of our citizens are to be maintained and extended, if due consideration is to be given to the economic welfare of future generations of West Virginians, then forest conservation must precede and accompany future forest exploitation.

Forest Fire Protection in West Virginia

The Conservation Commission of West Virginia, through its Division of Forestry, cooperating with the United States Forest Service, under the Clark-McNary Act, and with the associated forest landowners of the Central West Virginia Forest Fire Protective Association, the Southern West Virginia Forest Fire Protective Association, and numerous independent cooperators is responsible for the administration of forest fire protection of five and one-half million acres of forest land. The field organizatiin of the Division of Forestry consists of a State Forester, five District Foresters and a Nursery Superintendent, operating during periods of fire hazard forty-three forest fire observation towers and approximately four hundred and fifty miles of state-owned telephone line, employing forty-three tower observers and one hundred and thirty-five rangers.

Forest experts have estimated that seventy per cent of natural reforestation consists of forest fire protection which, in turn, may properly be sub-divided into three phases as follows:

1. Fire Prevention—By means of education of the public through distribution of appropriate literature, illustrated lectures, exhibition of fire warning posters and prosecution of violations of the forest fire laws.

- 2. Fire Detection—Accomplished through the medium of the forty-three forest fire towers, by systematic ranger patrols and by reports from the general public.
- 3. Fire Suppression—Carried out under the direct supervision of rangers employed during fire seasons by the Conservation Commission, using fire fighters, summoned by the rangers and paid by the various County Courts.

The efficiency of forest fire protective agencies has increased by leaps and bounds since organized protection was inaugurated through the founding of the two associations in 1913 and 1916 and since the creation of the Game, Fish and Forestry Commission in 1921, as is evidenced by the fact that, in 1916, the average area burned per fire was 377 acres, whereas the average area burned per fire in 1933 is less than 25 acres.

The state-operated system of fire detection and fire suppression has become quite efficient, but much remains to be accomplished along the lines of fire prevention.

The Conley State Forest Nursery, at Lesage, West Virginia, has an annual capacity of approximately one million transplants of deciduous and coniferous species. The State Forest Nursery does not grow ornamental trees or shrubs but confines its efforts to the production of forest tree species which are supplied at cost to landowners desiring plants exclusively for reforestation purposes.

Civilian Conservation Corps Camps Under Supervision of the Conservation Commission of West Virginia

Under the Emergency Conservation Act of March 31st, 1933, West Virginia has been allotted eighteen C. C. C. camps, nine of which are situated upon federal-owned lands of the Monongahela National Forest and under the direct supervision of the United States Forest Service, while of the remaining nine camps two are situated upon Seneca and Watoga State Forests, in Pocahontas County, and seven are situated upon privately-owned cooperative lands in Pocahontas, Webster, Greenbrier, Kanawha, Wyoming, Boone and Logan Counties, and are under the supervision of the Conservation Commission insofar as work in the forests is concerned.

This broad conservation measure, sponsored by President Roosevelt, is proving its worth, both as an unemployment relief measure and as to the tangible results secured through the efforts of the men in the woods.


The projects undertaken are too numerous and too diverse for discussion in this brief article. Of chief importance are:

Telephone line construction and maintenance
Motor truck trail construction and maintenance
Pack trail construction
Fire tower erection
Forest fire fighting
Forest stand improvement
Tree disease eradication and control
Construction of two artificial lakes

Much has already been done and much more will be accomplished through this medium to insure the future of our forests.

The results attending the efforts of C. C. camps under state supervision have attracted favorable comment upon the part of various Federal inspectors. Camp Wyoming, near Pineville, in Wyoming County, was awarded the Gold Medal for the Fifth Corps Area, including the states of West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana, in a contest sponsored by the Army and Navy Journal and involving neatness of appearance, interior military administration and forestry work completed.

The nine camps furnish employment and subsistence to some 1800 young men between the ages of eighteen and twenty-five and require a supervisory personnel of ninety-six, including office and clerical force, camp superintendents, foremen, mechanics and blacksmiths,

THE MINGO WHITE OAK

On Trace Fork of Pigeon Creek, in Mingo County, within two hundred yards of State Route No. 52, stands the largest white oak tree in West Virginia, if not the largest in the Appalachian Mountains.

From increment borings, the present age of this patriarch of our mountain forests is estimated to be 577 years. It was an acorn one hundred and thirty-five years before Columbus discovered America.

The Mingo Monarch inevitably shows some of the effects of age but is today in a fairly thrifty condition. It stands upon a rolling bench or terrace, towering above a grove of thrifty young trees of various species, and the surrounding terrain is susceptible of development into a very attractive park. In fact it is now used to some extent as a picnic ground.

The two corporations owning the two acres of land surrounding the tree have indicated a willingness to deed the land to the Conservation Commission, and, if such conveyance is executed while labor from the Civilian Conservation Corps Camps is available, the Conservation Commission will endeavor to convert the area into a State Park for the recreational use of the public.

The tree is now surrounded by an eight foot cyclone wire fence, erected in order to protect it from mutilation by curiosity seekers.

Plans for conversion into a park would include construction of a rustic bridge, foot trails, rustic tables and benches, waste disposal pits and other conveniences.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois. Length, 968 miles; 277 miles on boundary of West Virginia.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Parkersburg, West Virginia. Length, 185 miles.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers just above Kanawha Falls in Fayette County, West Virginia Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Point Pleasant, Mason County, West Virginia Length, 95 miles.

New River

Source in central part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River. Length, 335 miles; in West Virginia, 85 miles.

Greenbrier River

Coal River

Source in central part of Ralcigh County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River near St. Albans, Kanawha County, West Virginia. Length, 88 miles.

Guyandot River

Source in southern part of Raleigh County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Guyandot, near Huntington, Cabell County, West Virginia. Length, 150 miles,

Big Sandy River

Formed by the junction of Tug Fork and Levisa Fork at Louisa, Kentucky, Ft. Gay, Wayne County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Kenova, Wayne County, West Virginia. Length, 27 miles.

Tug Fork

Source in southeastern part of McDowell County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Levisa Fork to form Big Sandy River at Louisa, Kentucky. Length, 120 miles. Length on boundary between Virginia, Kentucky and West Virginia, 80 miles.

Ohio River-Project depth available is 9 feet.

Big Sandy River and Levisa and Tug Forks, West Virginia and Kentucky—Project depth of 6' is available from the Ohio River to Louisa, Kentucky, 27 miles, and thence to Cox Branch on Levisa Fork and to Bear Branch on Tug Fork, 17 and 12 miles respectively, above Louisa.


MAXIMUM STAGES

The flood of September, 1878, produced the maximum stages at points on the Kanawha River, except at Charleston. In the Monongahela River Basin the flood of July, 1888, caused the maximum stages at points in West Virginia. On the Ohio River the maximum stages at points in West Virginia, except at

Wheeling, occurred during the flood of March, 1913. The records of maximum stages at points on the three rivers are summarized in the following table:

THE MINERAL RESOURCES OF WEST VIRGINIA

Nature has chosen the little State of West Virginia as a vast storehouse for many useful minerals. For years this State has been one of the leaders in the production of minerals in the United States, and for years natural gas from this State has had a greater value than from any other State in the Union. West Virginia is "nip and tuck" with Pennsylvania for the honor of being the leader in bituminous coal production. The reserves of coal, clay, limestone, building material, sand and gravel are almost unlimited. There are yet large supplies of natural gas in West Virginia. Petroleum reserves have diminished, but extensive areas of the State are available for the secondary recovery of petroleum, which will probably result in a revival of the industry in the future.

There are no rare metallic metals in West Virginia. No traces of gold, silver or platinum have been found, and in all probability, never will be. Traces of copper and lead have been found, but these occurrences are not of commercial size. Iron ore in numerous varieties has a wide-spread occurrence, but the value of Michigan ores, because of their quantity and high metallic iron content, make West Virginia ores non-commercial at the present time.

Although West Virginia is a mountainous state and railroad and highway construction is more expensive than it is in some of the neighboring states, all of the areas which contain industrial minerals are served by excellent mode of transportation. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad serves the northeastern, northern, central and western parts of West Virginia. The main line of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad enters the State near White Sulphur Springs and extends northward through the Pocahontas, New River and Kanawha coal fields. The N. & W. and Virginian Railroads serve the famous high and low volatile coal fields in southern West Virginia.

The Monongahela River is slack water from the state line to Fairmont. The Ohio, of course, is slack water all of its distance, and navigation on the Kanawha to Kanawha Falls is possible. Practically every city and hamlet in West Virginia is now connected with roads which are passable during all seasons. Thousands of miles of macadam and concrete roads have been completed in the past ten years.

West Virginia is fortunate in having many streams which are suitable for hydroelectric development. Coal is cheap and available for standby plants. Several hydroelectric plants are now under construction. Cheap power means a further expansion of West Virginia's mineral development and the founding of new and additional industries.

The four major West Virginia minerals, in order of their importance are: Coal, Natural Gas, Petroleum, Clay Products.

Stratigraphy

Practically all of the outcropping rocks in West Virginia are of sedimentary origin. The total maximum thickness of rocks, if they had not been partially or wholly eroded, and had the maximum thicknesses of all series occurred at one place, would be 10.33 miles, or 54,545 feet. The youngest consolidated rocks are those of the Dunkard Series, of Permo-Carbonlforous Age, which occur

mainly in the northwestern quarter of the State, with a maximum thickness of 1180 feet in Wetzel County. The oldest outcropping rocks are those of Archean or Algonkian Age, below the Cambrian, along the Blue Ridge Mountains on the Virginia border in Jefferson County. Igneous rocks are known only in the southeastern corner of Jefferson County along the Blue Ridge where basalt lava has been altered to greenstone, and in Pendleton County in Bull Pasture Mountain where an igneous dike of altered and extremely weathred volcanic breccia occurs. As a general rule the rocks thicken from north to south and from west to east.

Structure

Some 120 anticlines and about an equal number of synclines have been named, mapped, and described in West Virginia. The locations of many minor folds are also shown on the County Maps of the Survey but as they are of only local significance names for them were deemed unwarranted. Many of these anticlines and synclines in the western half of the State west of the highly folded mountainous area to the east have been productive of oil and gas in commercial quantities.


The oil and gas sands of the western part of the State outcrop in the eastern counties and the underlying older rocks are exposed.

THE DAVID REGER FOSSIL TREE PARK

Near the City of Elkins, and along State Route 56, is the David Reger Fossil Tree Park. This is one of the most unusual parks in the world.

Ages ago, when the Appalachian mountains were formed, a part of this vast area was a large fold now known as the Deer Park Anticline. This mountain was over a mile high. Through the long ages, the water has eroded more than four thousand feet of the mountain, and in the middle there was exposed a rock

formation known as the Elkins Sandstone. This is a part of the Chemung rocks of the Devonian series.

This formation contains fossilized trees that have retained their original size and shape. There are many of them, and in fact the formation, which is known to be more than fifty miles in length, contains trees the entire distance.


These trees were discovered in 1927 by David Reger, of the State Geological Survey. They had been exposed for many years. It was commonly known that there was a petrified tree in the river at Elkwater. It had been seen, but no one with a technically trained mind had examined the same. Geologist Reger soon identified the trees and placed them in the same formation as the stone trees that had been found in New York. But they had never before been found in such numbers or over such a wide area.

Howard M. Gore, then Governor of West Virginia, established this particular area as a state park. It is owned by the State Road Commission and can be kept intact throughout the years.

The trees vary from small to large. One tree measures ten feet and six lnches in diameter. The long pressure has made most of the fossil remains oblique, but the long diameter is the true diameter of the tree.

The trees belong to the fern family and had fern like leaves and a root system. Thus we see that while these are the only remains known of early trees, they were very similar in size and form to those of this age. The rocks where the trees are found were formed long ages before the coal measures. They are estimated to be from three to five hundred million years old.

There are many exposures of the trees and, in addition to the ones which may be seen in the Davis Reger Park, fine specimens of the large trees and their shapes may be seen on the east side of the Black Fork Bridge at Parsons, in Tucker County.

HISTORICAL

AN EPITOME OF WEST VIRGINIA HISTORY

In 1669-70 Governor Norborne Berkeley, of Virginia, who was heavily interested in the fur trade, sent John Lederer on three expeditions westward of the mountains. He claimed to have seen the mountains that now form the boundary between Virginia and West Virginia. Major-General Wood, in 1670, was commissioned "for the finding out the ebbing and flowing of the waters on the other side of the mountains." In this quest Captain Thomas Batts and four men discovered the New River and penetrated as far as the falls of the Great Kanawha by 16 September, 1761. Cobied Author subsequently constrated to the Indian village of 1761. Gabriel Arthur subsequently penetrated to the Indian village of

Moneton along the lower Great Kanawha valley.
In 1716, Governor Spottswood led a party of thirty cavaliers, who may have penetrated to the region of Pendleton County. Out of this expedition grew the "Knights of the Golden Horseshoe." By 1725, John Van Meter, from New York, is found exploring the valley of the South Branch of the Potomac. His accounts carried to the east led to an influx of settlers who mingled with others from Pennsylvania. In 1726, Morgan ap Morgan erected his home on the site of Bunker Hill, Berkeley County, and became the first recorded settler in present West Virginia. The next year a settlement sprang up at the Packhorse Ford, now Shepherdstown. By 1730 there were settlers in the lower Potomac Valley. In 1732 Joist By 1730 there were settlers in the lower Potomac Valley. In 1732 Joist Hite came with several contemporaries and by 1735 settlers were along the South Fork of the Potomac. All of this region was a part of the land embraced in the "Northern Neck" grant to Lord Fairfax, whose surveyors in 1746 planted the celebrated Fairfax stone at the head of the North Branch of the Potomac to mark the western limits.

More adventurous settlers moved over the mountains. Jacob Marlin and Stephen Sewell are on the site of Marlinton, by 1749. Robert Files and David Tygart located later near present Beverly, and by 1764 John and Samuel Pringle are found at Turkey Run, Upshur County.

In 1768, following the retreat of the French from the Ohio regions, the Six Nations sold the land to the English. Other Indian tribes claimed the country, but within historic times no Indians occupied West

claimed the country, but within historic times no Indians occupied West Virginia. Numerous evidences of previous occupancy of the Indians and of the Mound Builders, an earlier race, are to be found all over the State, but more especially along the Ohio River. The encroachment of the whites, and the settlement of this region, led to conflicts that lasted many years. Dunmore's War, in 1774, was marked by the battle of Point Pleasant, 10 October, between troops under General Andrew Lewis, and Indians under Chief Cornstalk. This was really the forerunner of the Revolution.

With the opening of the American Revolution, troops from along the Potomac were among the first to reach Washington at Boston. A considerable number of citizens from western Virginia were in all major engagements from Boston to Yorktown. Among these were several men who achieved distinction in action and in rank. Others followed George Rogers Clark in his conquest of the west from the British and Indian allies. And it may be said that the attack on Fort Henry, now Wheeling, 10 September, 1782, was the last battle of the Revolution. Indian warfare, however, continued until Wayne's Treaty in 1795. By this time settlement of western Virginia had reached far into the more remote regions of the interior, and along the Ohio River.
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The history of western Virginia from 1795 until 1861 is largely a history of controversy with eastern Virginia. While made up largely of a population derived from the Piedmont regions, mixed with settlers from Maryland and Pennsylvania, the two sections were unlike in many social, political and economic inclinations. In the War of 1812, and the War with Mexico, the western region took no small part, herein making some contacts of a helpful nature. Nature, however, had erected a barrier that left one region sloping to the sea, and the other bundled away in a sea of forests and hills that reached the waters of the Ohio on the west.

Men in public life, and many of a more gentler vocation, complained that western Virginia was democratic and eastern Virginia aristocratic. In all this time western Virginia furnished one Governor of the State,—Joseph Johnson, of Harrison County. The idea of a separate state reached back to the proposed Westsylvania, in the days of the Continental Congress. The western counties complained also that they were governed by the eastern counties. The citizens were not satisfied with the slow building of roads across the mountains to the Ohio, and the other small evidences of public works. The foundation of the Trans-Allagheny Lunatic Asylum at Weston was the sole evidence of a public institution west of the mountains prior to 1860. Delegates went to Constitutional Conventions, and worked hand in hand with able men from lower Virginia, but nothing that was done sufficed to stem the

tide toward a separate state existence.

The crisis came during the secession movement in 1861, in the opening days of the Civil War. The Virginia Convention, in session at Richmond in April, 1861, passed the Ordinance of Secession, most of the delegates from the western counties opposing, and submitted it to the people. Meetings held in the western region from November, 1860, to May, 1861, indicated that this section was not in full sympathy with the cause of the South. A convention, made up of representatives from twenty-six counties, met in Wheeling, 13 May, 1861, and started a movement toward a new state government. Western Virginia counties voted 40,000 against secession and 4,000 for secession. The Second Wheeling Convention, made up of delegates and members of the Virginia Assembly, met 11 June. This convention declared the Ordinance of Secession void, and likewise declared the offices of the State of Virginia vacant. They then proceeded to form a "re-organized" government of Virginia, with Francis H. Pierpont as Governor. The "re-organized" Assembly or Legislature, as it was called, elected John S. Carlile and Waitman T. Willey, as senators, who were in turn received at Washington.

who were in turn received at Washington.

A convention was held 25 November, 1861, at Wheeling, at which forty-one counties were represented. Here a constitution for a new state was formed, and this was ratified by the people in April, 1862. It was first called "Kanawha," but the name of West Virginia was adopted. The "re-organized" or "restored" government of Virginia consented to the formation of a new state from its own territory. On 31 December, 1862, after making a provision for the gradual abolition of slavery, Congress consented to the admission of West Virginia to the Union. On 20 April, 1863, President Lincoln issued a proclamation, and on 20 June, 1863, the thirty-fifth state was admitted to the Union.

With the opening of the war, Federal troops from Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois moved in over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, to Clarksburg and Grafton, and from these ponits converged upon the region in and around Randolph County. The Confederates had in the meantime advanced from the east and occupied the Greenbrier Valley and the headwaters of the Tygarts Valley and Cheat Rivers. A skirmish at Philippi, June 6, 1861, was one of the earliest of the war. This was followed by engagements at Rich Mountain, Laurel Hill, and Carricks Ford.

The Kanawha Valley was likewise occupied early by both Federals and Confederates, who first met at Scary Creek a few miles below Charleston on June 17, 1861. On 10 September an engagement was fought at

Carnifex Ferry, and later in the year skirmishes took place along the Greenbrier River. The eastern panhandle, notably around Harpers Ferry and Martinsburg, was the scene of active military operations. It may be said, however, that the Confederates early lost control of the state. In August, 1863, General A. G. Jenkins, with five hundred fifty men, penetrated as far as the Ohio and later was followed by Generals William E. Jones and John D. Imboden, who with a large command swept across the center of the State to the headwaters of the Little Kanawha. On November 6, 1863, the battle of Droop Mountain was fought, the most notable during the war. There were other smaller skirmishes and raids to the close of the war. West Virginia, however, as compared to eastern Virginia and other southern states, suffered but little. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad was one of the great objects of military operations by the Confederacy, but it remained in use, and with but little damage throughout the war. West Virginia furnished over 29,000 soldiers to the Federal army, and over 8,000 to the Confederate army. Major General Jesse Reno, the hero of South Mountain, was the highest ranking Federal officer from the State, and Lieutenant-General Thomas J. (Stonewall) Jackson was the highest ranking officer from the State

in the Confederate army.

The close of the Civil War brought many perplexing problems. The State had only one railroad, the Baltimore and Ohio, and a few transmontane state roads. Transportation, mountains and unabridged rivers, still prevented the social contact of the present day. To this was added all the political ills that came out of the war. Laws had been passed by the Legislature confiscating the property of the Confederates. All Confederate soldiers and sympathizers with the Confederacy were disfranchised from voting and holding office. At one time it was reported that 29,316 were disfranchised, many of whom were among the best people of the new State. The election of 1870, however, overthrew the Union Republican party, and control of state affairs went to the Democrats. A new Constitution was framed the next year, which was adopted by the people in August, 1872. This settled the question of franchise. The Democrats retained control of the State until 1896, when the Republicans carried the elections. In 1916, with the election of John J. Cornwell, a break took place in the Republican control for a period of four years, but which was resumed in 1920, with the election of E. F. Morgan. This control continued until 1932, when Hon. H. G. Kump, Democrat, was elected.

Political changes following the Civil War did not, however, cause any change of heart on the part of the sturdy people of the State. There came into being a period of years of wonderful social and industrial progress. The Trans-Allegheny Asylum at Weston was completed. By 1868 the little group of schools at Morgantown became West Virginia University. Marshall College and West Liberty, long esablished, took on new life. Fairmont, Glenville, Shepherd College and Concord schools were in operation by 1872. Other state institutions were established. The capital of the State was established at Wheeling, but in 1870 enterprising citizens of Charleston moved it to the Great Kanawha Valley. Not to be outdone Wheeling took it back in 1875, and in 1877 an election was held to get rid of the "capitol on wheels," or "boats" as the case might be. In 1885 Charleston became the permanent seat of government. The second capitol building erected in Charleston was destroyed by fire 3 January, 1921, and out of the "ashes" came the magnificent structure now occupied.

The State by 1870 began to wake up industrially. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, by 1873, connected the Ohio River at Huntington with the sea coast. This gave two great cross state routes of travel, one of which continued to the west by train, and the other by boat. Under the leadership of men like J. N. Camden and Henry Gassaway Davis a network of railroads spread out along the Ohio River, and far into the heart of the State. Over them went millions of feet of lumber, and on this came a tremendous development of coal fields, notably in the

Monongahela basin, and in the Charleston, Williamson, Bluefield regions. Oil, which had been produced as early as 1859 at Burning Springs, on the Little Kanawha, was the forerunner of a great oil and gas develop-ment through many sections of the State. To these must be added the manufacturing industries that preceded or kept pace with this development, reaching back to the primitive potters wheels, glass works, and

ment, reaching back to the primitive potters wheels, glass works, and salt refineries of the very closing days of Indian warfare.

In 1898, in the opening days of the Spanish-American War, West Virginia sent two regiments into the field at the first call of President McKinley. In the struggle to set Cuba free, it was Lieutenant Colonel Andrew S. Rowan, a native of Monroe County, who "carried the message" to Garcia. And far away in the Philippines, George Markley, a boy from Weston, became the hero of the massacre of Ballangigi.

The part taken by West Virginia in the World War is still fresh in the memory of our citizens. By June 15, 1917, a total of 127,994 men were

memory of our citizens. By June 15, 1917, a total of 127,994 men were registered for military service. It subsequently developed that there were 325,266 men of military age in the State. The State had two regiments of the National Guard, known as the 1st and 2nd Regiments of ments of the National Guard, known as the 1st and 2nd Regiments of Infantry. The 2nd had just completed a period of nine months service on the Mexican Border. These two units became part of the 38th Division. In all, nearly 60,000 male citizens of West Virginia saw service in various military and naval branches. Over eleven hundred lost their lives on foreign soil, and over six hundred died while in training. Many were killed and wounded in action on every battlefield from Cantigny, Chateau-Thierry, and St. Mihiel, to the Meuse-Argonne. No state gave more in proportion to her ability than West Virginia.

With the close of the World War as with the Civil War there came a

With the close of the World War, as with the Civil War, there came a period of readjustment. A remarkable development in the field of industry and commerce followed, which later has sought a more natural level. But with the energy which has always characterized the people of the hills of West Virginia, the future presages much of achievement, and no member of the United States has left behind a more honorable

history.

HISTORY OF COUNTIES

Barbour County

Established in 1843; named in honor of Philip Pendleton Barbour, a distinguished jurist of Virginia. County seat, Philippi (established in 1844). Scene of the first land engagement of the Civil War, the Federal troops, on June 3, 1861, commanded by General B. F. Kelly, surprising and routing the Confederate forces under Colonel George A. Porterfield.

Berkeley County

Established in 1772; named for Sir Established in 1772; named for Sir William Berkeley, Baron Botetourt, colonial governor of Virginia from 1768 to 1770. County seat, Martinsburg, named in honor of Colonel Thomas Bryan Martin. At Bunker Hill, in this county, in 1726, Morgan Morgan founded the first permanent settlement in western Virginia. In commemoration of this event, the State of West Virginia. in 1924, erected a monument at the grave of Morgan Morgan, the founder of the settlement.

Boone County

Established in 1847; named for Daniel Boone, the famous hunter and explorer. County seat, Madison.

Braxton County

Established in 1836; named for Carter Braxton, Virginia statesman and signer of the Declaration of Independence. County scat, Sutton, Originally known as Newville. Established as Suttonville in 1826, the name being changed to Sutton in 1837.

Brooke County

Established in 1796; named for Robert Brooke, Governor of Virginia (1794-1796). County seat, Wellsburg. Bethany, one of the towns of the county, noted as home of Alexander Campbell, founder of Christian Church and location of Bethany College.

Cabell County

Established in 1809; named in honor of William H. Cabell, Governor of Virginia from 1805 to 1808. County seat, Huntington. Established in 1871, named for Collis P. Huntington, the then president of the Chesapeake and Ohio Rallway. The county seat was moved from Barboursville to Huntington in the early nineties. Marshall College, a state normal school established in 1838 as Marshall Academy and then as a college in 1858, located at Huntington.

Calhoun County

Established in 1856; named for John C. Calhoun, the eminent statesman from South Carolina. County seat, Grantsville.

Clay County

Established in 1858; named in honor of Henry Clay, Kentucky statesman. County seat, Clay, (formerly known as Henry and Clay Court House).

Doddridge County

Established in 1845; named for Philip Doddridge, a distinguished lawyer and statesman of western Virginia, County seat, West Union.

Fayette County

Established in 1831; named in hon-or of Marquis de La Fayette. County seat, Fayetteville, established in 1837.

Gilmer County

Established in 1845; named for Thomas Walker Gilmer, governor of Virginia in 1840, later a representative in Congress and Secretary of the Navy in President Taylor's cabinet County seat, Glenville. (originally Stewart's Creek or Hartford, the name being changed to Glenville in 1856).

Grant County

Established in 1866; named in hon-or of General Ulysses Simpson Grant. County seat, Petersburg.

Greenbrier County

Greenbrier County

Established in 1778; named for the river which drains the county. County seat, Lewisburg. History of town dates back to Fort Union in 1774, although not established as a town by law until 1782. Greenbrier Military School, organized in 1812 as Lewisburg Academy, located at Lewisburg Frankford, unincorporated, was the first permanent settlement in the county. White Sulphur Springs, a popular resort for more than a century, is located in this county.

Hampshire County

Established in 1753 but not organized until 1757: named from the English shire of the same name. Oldest county in West Virginia. County seat. Romney, one of the oldest towns in the State, laid out in 1762 and named for the English town of Romery.

Hancock County

Established in 1848; named for John Hancock, first signer of the Declaration of Independence. The smallest county in the State, (area \$3 square mlles). County seat, New Cumberland. Laid out in 1839, originally being called Vernon.

Hardy County

Established in 1785; named for Samuel Hardy, a distinguished Virginian. County seat, Moorefield, established in 1777.

Harrison County

Established in 1784; named for Ben-Established in 1784; named for Benjamin Harrlson, the distinguished Virginian who was the father of William Henry Harrison, ninth President of the United States and the great grandfather of Benjamin Harrison, twenty-third President. County seat, Clarksburg, named for George Rogers Clark, noted Virginian soldier.

Jackson County

Established in 1831; named in honor of Andrew Jackson, seventh President of the United States. County seat, Ripley, established in 1832.

Jefferson County

Established in 1801; named for Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of Independence and third President of the United States. County seat, Charles Town. Established in 1786 and named for Charles Washington, a brother of the first President. At Shepherdstown (established in 1762), James Rumsey built and experimented with his steamboat. A monument to his memory has been erected here by the State. Harpers Ferry, the lowest point in the State, with an elevation of but 240 feet above sea level was established in 1763 but not incorporated until 1851. It was the scene of the historic raid of John Brown in 1850. scene of the historic raid of John Brown, in 1859, on the government arsenal located there.

Kanawha County

Established in 1788 but not organized until 1789; named for the river Kanawha, which received its name from the Indian tribe that once dwelt in the territory now embraced in the county. County seat, Charleston, located at the junction of the Elk and Kanawha rivers. Established in 1795. Charlesrivers. Established in 1795. Charleston has been the capital city of the state since 1885, having also been the capitol during the five year period. 1870-1875. It is located on the site of Fort Lee, erected in 1788 and was known as Kanawha Court House postoffice until the close of the Civil War.

Lewis County

Established in 1816: named for Colonel Charles Lewis, a famous soldier and leader among the Virginia pioneers, who was killed at the battle of Point Pleasant in 1774. County seat, Weston. Established in 1817 as Preston, subsequently as Fiesherville, and as Weston in 1819. Jackson's Mills, in this county, was the boyhood home of the famous Confederate general, Thomas J. ("Stonewall") Jackson and is the location of the state owned 4-H camp for boys and girls. The 4-H work originated in West Virginia but rapidly spread over the entire country. Established in 1816; named for Colo-

Lincoln County

Established in 1867; named in honor of Abraham Lincoln, the sixteenth President. County seat, Hamlin. Named for Hannibal Hamlin, Vice President of the United States, 1861-

Logan County

Established in 1824; named for Logan, the Indian chieftain, of the Oneida tribe. County seat, Logan. Established in 1826 as Lawnsville, the name being later changed to Aracoma and still later to present name, Logan.

Marion County

Established in 1842; named in honor of General Francis Marion, known in history as "The Swamp Fox." County seat, Fairmont. Established in 1820, as Middletown, name changed to Fairmont in 1842.

Marshall County

Established in 1835; named for the eminent jurist, John Marshall, for thirty-four years Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court. County seat, Moundsville. Established in 1832. Named from Mammoth Grave Creek Mound, sixty-nine feet high and nino hundred feet in circumference at the base, which is situated in the city.

Mercer County

Established in 1837; named in honor of General Hugh Mercer, of Revolu-tionary War fame. County seat, Princeton.

Mineral County

Established in 1866; takes its name from its mineral resources. County seat, Keyser. Nancy Hanks, mother of Abraham Lincoln, born on Mike's Run, near Keyser, Monument erected to her memory.

Mingo County

Established in 1895 (youngest county in the state); named for the Indian tribe of which Logan was chief. County seat, Williamson.

Monongalia County

Established in 1776; named for the Monongahela River. County seat, Morgantown. Established as a town in 1785 but the home of Zackwell Morgan had been designated as a seat of justice at an earlier date. Location of West Virginia University.

Monroe County

Established in 1799; named for James Monroe, fifth President of the United States. County seat, Union.

Morgan County

Established in 1820; named in honor of General Daniel Morgan, a Revolutionar War leader. County seat, Berkeley Springs. Established in 1776 under the name of Bath, which is still its corporate name, the town being

known by the postoffice name of Berkeley Springs. Noted for its medicinal springs, now owned by the state, the curative value of the waters having been known since 1747.

McDowell County

Established in 1858; named for James McDowell, Governor of Virginia, 1843-1846. County seat, Welch.

Nicholas County

Established in 1818; named for Wilson Cary Nicholas, Governor of Virginia, 1814-1817. County scat, Summersville. Established in 1820, and incorporated in 1860.

Ohio County

Established in 1776; named for the county's principal river. County seat, Wheeling. It was twice the Capitol of Wheeling. It was twice the Capitol or West Virginia, from the state's formation to April 1, 1870, and again from May 1, 1875, to May 1, 1885. West Liberty, established in 1787, was the county seat from 1776 to 1797. West Liberty State Teacher's College, a county institution was established at Liberty State Teacher's College, a state institution, was established at West Liberty in 1870 and was a continuation of the West Liberty Academy, founded in 1838. Wheeling is located on site of Fort Henry, scene of last battle of the Revolution, fought September 1782. It was established as Zanesburg in 1793 and changed to Wheeling in 1795.

Pendleton County

Established in 1788; named for Edmund Pendleton, a distinguished statesman and jurist of Virginla. County seat. Franklin, (established in 1794). In 1758, at Fort Upper Tract and Fort Seybert, occurred two Indian massacres, the Indians being led by Killbuck, a Shawnee chieftain. Spruce Knob, in this county is the highest point in the state, its elevation being 4,860 feet.

Pleasants County

Established in 1851; named in honor of James Pleasants, who represented Virginia in the United States Senate and was its Governor 1822-1825. County seat, St. Marys.

Pocahontas County

Established in 1821; named for Pocahontas, the Indian princess. County seat, Marlinton. First settled in 1749, being known as Marlin's Bottom until 1887, when the present town was laid out. Huntersville, unincorporated, was the county seat from 1822 to 1891, when the county seat from 1822 to 1891, when the county seat was moved to Marlinton. The site of the Battle of Droop Mountain, the most extensive Civil War conflict in the state which occurred on November 6, 1863, in this county, was acquired by the state in 1929, and is now a Battlefield Park.

Preston County

Established in 1818; named in honor of James Patton Preston, thirteenth Governor of Virginia. County seat, Kingwood. Established in 1811.

Putnam County

Established in 1848; named in honor of General Israel Putnam, the New England soldier and patriot. County seat, Winfield. Laid out in 1848 and named for General Winfield Scott, of Mexican war fame,

Raleigh County

Established in 1850; named for Sir Walter Raleigh, the English adventurer and soldier. County seat, Beckley, (chartered in 1837).

Randolph County

Established in 1786; named in honor of Edmund Jennings Randolph, a distinguished jurist and Governor of Virginia, 1786-1789. Largest county in the state, with an area of 1,036 square miles. County seat, Elkins. Established in 1889. Named for founder, Stephen Benton Elkins, United States Senator from West Virginia from 1895 until his death in 1911. The town of Beverly was the county seat until 1898.

Ritchie County

Established in 1843. Named for Thomas Ritchie, a distinguished journalist of Richmond. Virginia. County seat, Harrisville. Established in 1832, and incorporated in 1869.

Roane County

Established in 1856; named in honor of Judge Spencer Roane, a distinguished jurist of Virginia. County seat, Spencer. Settled in 1812; later known as New California and established under its present name in 1858.

Summers County

Established in 1871; named in honor of George W. Summers, a distinguished jurist of Kanawha County. County seat, Hinton. Established in 1873 and incorporated in 1880.

Taylor County

Established in 1844; named for John Taylor, a Virginia soldier and statesman, 1750-1824. County seat. Grafton. Location of only National Cemetery. Pruntytown, established in 1801, was the original county seat, losing this honor to Grafton in the 1880's.

Tucker County

Established in 1856; named for Henry St. George Tucker (1780-1848), an eminent jurist and statesman of Virginia. County seat, Parsons. St. George was the county seat until 1890.

Tyler County

Established in 1814; named in honor of John Tyler, eighth Governor of Virginia and father of John Tyler, tenth President of the United States. County seat. Middlebourne. Established in 1813, the present incorporation dating from 1871.

Upshur County

Established in 1851; named for Abel Parker Upshur, an eminent statesman and jurist of Virginia. County seat, Buckhannon. Established in 1816. Location of Wesleyan College.

Wayne County

Established in 1842; named in honor of General Anthony Wayne, of Revolutionary War fame. County seat, Wayne.

Webster County

Established in 1860, (the last county in West Virginia to be erected before the separation from Virginia); named in honor of the New England orator and statesman, Daniel Webster. County seat, Webster Springs (Addison).

Wetzel County

Established in 1846; named for Lewis Wetzel, a famous frontier character and Indian fighter. County seat, New Martinsville. Established in 1838.

Wirt County

Established in 1848; named for William Wirt. a Marylander, who gained fame as an author, orator and lawyer, in his adopted state of Virginia. County seat, Elizabeth, settled in 1796.

Wood County

Established in 1793; named in honor of James Wood. Governor of Virginia. County seat, Parkersburg. Blennerhasset Island, near Parkersburg, in the Ohio River is well known because of Harman Blennerhassett's participation in Aaron Burr's conspiracy.

Wyoming County

Established in 1850; named from the Wyoming tribe of Indians. County seat, Pineville.



GASOLINE TAX

On April 27, 1923, the Legislature of West Virginia passed an Act effective July 26, 1923, imposing a tax of two cents per gallon on gasoline sold in West Virginia.

At the extraordinary session of 1925, on June 4th, a new gasoline tax law was passed, effective July 1, 1925, imposing a license tax on producers and sellers of gasoline—\$25.00 annually for wholesalers or distributors, and \$5.00 annually for retailers; and also an excise tax at the rate of three and one-half cents per gallon on gasoline sold or used in West Virginia. This act repealed the 1923 Act, the former act remaining effective only for the collection of all taxes and penalties accruing thereunder up to and including June 30, 1925.

On April 25, 1927, the Legislature of 1927, at the regular session, passed a new gasoline tax law, in effect from passage, which increased the excise tax from three and one-half to four cents per gallon, effective July 1, 1927. This act reduced the annual license tax on wholesalers or distributors from \$25.00 to \$5.00, and the license tax on retail dealers from \$5.00 to \$1.00. It also repealed the 1925 Act, but teft that act in full effect for the collection of all taxes and penalties accruing thereunder up to and including June 30, 1927.

Under the provisions of these acts collections have been made and requisitions for refund have been issued as follows:



NOTE—The foregoing statement contains complete detailed information relating to gasoline tax collections based on eash receipts and disbursements. Payments are credited to the months in which deposited and refunds are delited to the months in which the requisitions are issued. Payments are due within thirty days after the close of the month. Payments in most cases are mailed on or about the last of the month. If they are not received until after the close of the month, they become receipts for the following month. To illustrate: A payment on sales in July is due August 30th. The remittance is mailed August 30th and received September 1st. In this statement the remittance is credited to September.

In some previous editions of the West Virginia Legislative Hand Book the figures given were based on accruals. Where that hasis is used the tax is credited to the month or year during which the gasoline was sold regardless of when collected.

SPECIAL ELECTION IN THIRD CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT

Lynn S. Hornor, (D), of Clarksburg, Representative in Congress from the Third Congressional District, died September 23, 1933, after an illness which lasted several months.

On October 3, 1933, Governor H. G. Kump issued a proclamation calling for a special election on November 28, 1933, to fill the vacancy.

Howard M. Gore, of Clarksburg, former Governor of West Virginia, was nominated by the Republican party, which met in convention at Clarksburg on October 27th, and on the following day, October 28th, Andrew Edmiston, Jr., of Weston, was nominated for the office by the Democratic party in convention assembled in the same city.

At the special election held on November 28, 1933, Edmiston was elected by a majority of 5,636. Oath of office was administered in the House of Representatives on the opening day of Congress, January 3, 1934.

REPEAL OF 18TH AMENDMENT

By a majority of 82,086, West Virginia voted on June 27, 1933, to repeal the eighteenth amendment. The vote was for delegates to a convention at Charleston July 25th, held for the purpose of passing upon the question of repeal. The entire slate of candidates pledged to vote for ratification of the repeal amendment was chosen at the election. The following were candidates for delegate to the convention:

Repeal of the eighteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States became effective on December 5, 1933, conventions in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Utah voting for repeal on that date. Utah was the last of the necessary thirty-six states to vote for repeal.

The repeal amendment was rejected by the voters of North Carolina and South Carolina. The popular vote in North Carolina was 293,484 against repeal, to 120,190 for repeal. In South Carolina the vote was 37,539 to 33,897.

The question of repeal has not been submitted to the voters in the following states: Georgia, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma and South Dakota.

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DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL PLATFORM

(Adopted at Chicago, June 30, 1932)

The Democratic Party solemnly promises by appropriate action to put into effect the principles, policies and reforms herein advocated and to eradicate the policies, methods and practices herein condemned.

We Advocate:

 An immediate and drastic reduction of governmental expenditures by abolishing useless commissions and offices, consolidating departments and bureaus and eliminating extravagance, to accomplish a saving of not less than 25% in the cost of Federal Government, and we call upon the Democratic Party in the States to make a zealous effort to achieve a proportionate result.

(2) Maintenance of the National Credit by a Federal budget annually balanced on the basis of accurate executive estimates within revenues. raised by a system of taxation, levied on the principal of ability to pay.

(3) A sound currency to be preserved at all hazards, and an international monetary conference called on the invitation of our Government to consider the rehabilitation of silver and related questions.

(4) A competitive tariff for revenue, with a fact finding tariff commission free from executive interference, reciprocal tariff agreements with other nations, and an international economic conference designed to restore international trade and facilitate exchange.

Unemployment Relief

(5) Extension of Federal credit to the States to provide unemployment relief wherever the diminishing resources of the States make it impossible for them to provide for the needy; expansion of the Federal program of necessary and useful construction affected with a public interest, such as flood control and waterways, including the St. Lawrence, Great Lakes deep waterways; the spread of employment by a substantial reduction in the hours of labor, the encouragement of the shorter week by applying that principle in Government service; advance planning of public works.

(6) Unemployment and old-age insurance, under State laws.

Agriculture

(7) For the restoration of agriculture, the nation's basic industry, better financing of farm mortgages, through reorganized farm bank agencies at low rates of interest, an amortization plan, giving preference to credits for the redemption of farms and homes sold under foreclosure; extension and development of the farm cooperative movement, and effective control of crop surpluses so that our farmer may have the full benefit of the domestic market; enactment of every constitutional measure that will aid the farmers to receive for basic farm commodities. prices in excess of cost.

National Defense

(8) A navy and an army adequate for national defense, based on a survey of all facts affecting the existing establishments, that the people in time of peace may not be burdened by an expenditure fast approach-

ing a billion dollars annually.

(9) Strict and impartial enforcement of the anti-trust laws to prevent monopoly and unfair trade practices and revision thereof for the better protection of labor and the small producer and distributor; the removal of government from all fields of private enterprise, except where necessary to develop public works and natural resources in the common interest. Conservation development and use of the nation's water power in the public interest.

Protection of Investors

(10) Protection of the investing public by requiring to be filed with the government and carried in advertisements of all offerings of foreign and domestic stocks and bonds true information as to bonuses, commissions, principal invested and interest of sellers.

Regulation to the full extent of the Federal power of:

(a) Holding companies which sell securities in interstate commerce;
(b) Rates of utility companies operating across State lines;
(c) Exchanges trading in securities and commodities.
(11) Quicker methods of realizing on assets for the relief of depositors of suspended banks and a more rigid supervision of national banks for the protection of depositors and the prevention of the use of their moneys in speculation to the detriment of local credits.

The severance of affiliated securities companies and the divorce of the investment banking from commercial banks; and further restriction of federal reserve banks in permitting the use of federal reserve facilities

for speculative purposes.

The War Veterans

(12) The full measure of justice and generosity for all war veterans who have suffered disability caused by or resulting from actual service

in time of war, and for their dependents.

Peace with all the world and (13) A firm foreign policy including: the settlement of international disputes by arbitration; no interference in the international affairs of other nations; the sanctity of treaties, and the maintenance of good faith and of good will in financial obligations; adherence to the world court with the pending reservations; the pact of Paris abolishing war as an instrument of national policy to be made affective by provisions for consultation and conference in case of threatened violation of treaties; international agreement for reduction of armaments; and converging with nations of the western hemisphere armaments; and cooperation with nations of the western hemisphere to maintain the spirit of the Monroe doctrine. We oppose cancellation of the debts owing to the United States by foreign nations.

(14) Independence for the Philippines; ultimate statehood for Porto Rico; the employment of American citizens in the operation of the

Panama canal.

(15) Simplification of legal procedure and reorganization of the judicial system to make the attainment of justice speedy, certain and at

(16) Continuous publicity of political contributions and expenditures, strengthening of the corrupt practices act, and severe penalties for misappropriation of campaign funds.

Prohibition Repeal

(17) We favor the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

To effect such repeal, we demand that the congress immediately propose a constitutional amendment to purely representative conventions in

the states called to act solely on that proposal.

We urge the enactment of such measures by the several states as will actually promote temperance, effectively prevent the return of the saloon and bring the liquor traffic into the open under complete supervision and control by the states.

We demand that the federal government effectively exercise its power to enable the states to effectually protect themselves against importation

of intoxicating liquors in violation of their laws.

Pending repeal, we favor immediate modification of the Volstead Act to legalize the manufacture and sale of beer and other beverages of such alcoholic content as is permissible under the Constitution and to provide therefrom a proper and needed revenue.

We Condemn:

- (1) The improper and excessive use of money in political activities.
- (2) Paid lobbies of special interests to influence members of congress and other public servants by personal contact.
- (3) Action and utterance of high officials designed to influence stock exchange prices.
- (4) The open and covert resistance of administrative officials to every effort made by congressional committees to curtail the extravagant expenditures of the government, and to revoke improvident subsidies granted to favored interests.
- (5) The extravagance of the Farm Board, its disastrous action which made the government a speculator in farm products, and the unsound policy of restricting agricultural production to the demands of domestic markets.
- (6) The usurpation of power by the state department in assuming to pass upon foreign securities offered by international bankers, as a result of which billions of dollars in questionable bonds have been sold to the public upon the implied approval of the federal government.
- (7) The Hawley-Smoot tariff law, the prohibitive rates of which have resulted in retaliatory action by more than forty countries, created international economic hostilities, destroyed international trade, driven our factories into foreign countries, robbed the American farmer of his foreign markets and increased his cost of production.

Conclusion .

To accomplish these purposes and to recover economic liberty we pledge the nominees of this convention and the best effort of a great party whose founder announced the doctrine which guides us now, in the hour of our country's need, -- "equal rights to all, special privileges to none."

DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Bluefield Aug. 11, 1932)

THE DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

The Democratic Party recognizes the heavy responsibility of leadership in times of financial disaster and economic distress, such as now prevail within the United States. Yes, remembering that in other such days, a Jefferson, a Jackson, or a Wilson brought order out of disorder, Democracy welcomes the opportunity for service, and approaches the campaign with confidence and assurance, and the knowledge that its nominees are fully competent to cope with existing conditions.

The Democracy of West Virginia approves the platform adopted by the

National Democratic Convention in Chicago, and commends it in its

entirety to the electorate of the State.

It congratulates the citizenry on its opportunity to follow the compe-

tent leadership of Franklin D. Roosevelt and John N. Garner.

It approves the record of M. M. Neely in the United States Senate and the record of Joe L. Smith and Lynn S. Hornor, in the House of Representatives. It also presents to the State a splendid Congressional ticket to be elected in November.

It endorses and commends the program of the Democratic Party in the legislative session of 1931, and respectfully submits that had the Republican Senate then joined with the Democratic House in its constructive and economic plan, that millions of dollars would have been saved to the State and the extraordinary session of 1932 would have been unnecessary. We heartily endorse the record of the Democratic House of Delegates that passd more wholesome, progressive legislation than was ever before passed by either house in the history of the State; it exposed nepotism, waste and extravagance, misfeasance and malfeasance, of years of Republican rule; it originated and passed the classification amendment, enabling the people to bring about less and more equitable taxation; it is now refusing to impose more taxes on a tax-ridden people, at the behest of a Republican Governor, or take care of a Republican deficit of millions that could not possibly have existed under an economical administration of the affairs of the State; it is combining, abolishing, cutting and eliminating, to the end that reasonable economy may be enthroned at Charleston. What this House of Delegates has done is an index of what the Democratic Party pledges itself to do if placed in control of the State Government.

It recognizes in Judge H. G. Kump, nominee for Governor, a man of rare ability and one who, if entrusted with office, will bring honor to the State and reflect credit on the party.

It furthermore presents an entire State ticket composed of men, competent and trustworthy, and who will bring efficiency to the various State Departments of government.

Indictment of Republican Leadership

Whenever any organization, whether directing private enterprise or administering affairs of State, loses the confidence of those whose interests it guides, then, that organization is without hope, and the only remedy lies in the replacement of its directing heads, and subordinate officers, with new leaders surrounded by new advisers.

The Republican Party in West Virginia, under its present leadership, is in such position, and is not in accord with its rank and file. Its record of iniquities under the administration of Governor Conley is without

parallel in the history of the State.

It has been wasteful; it has been extravagant; and it has been incompetent. Today it stands indicted in the court of public opinion for total disregard of public trust.

Its shortcomings are too many to enumerate, but that the people may

have some examples by which to form conclusions, the Democratic Party specifically charges the Republican administration as being guilty of:

Nepotism.

Improper and irregular loaning of the irreducible school fund.

Payment of exorbitant legal fees for work required to be performed by the Attorney General and prosecuting attorneys.

An indefensible deficit in the public treasury.

Squandering and misappropriating public funds.

Mismanagement of public school system and directing it for the benefit of private interest and for the advancing of political favor.

Creating and maintaining useless departments and commissions.

Maintaining an excessive and incompetent personnel in many of the

Departments of the State Government.
Using all departments of the State Government primarily to promote the interest of the Republican officeholders and to perpetuate them in

Exorbitant and unwarranted expenditure of public funds for traveling

and entertainment.

Unwarranted expenditures of public funds for the furnishing and equipping, beyond all needs, of the offices of department heads and the offices of their subordinates.

Democratic Position.

The Democratic Party pledges itself that if entrusted with power it will initiate and carry forward a program that will free the State from

the evils of Republican leadership.

That it will sponsor such constructive legislation, and apply in practice such principles as will best promote the economic and social life of the State, wisely develop its resources and through the process of a "new deal" in all things, secure to the people confidence and happiness and ever remember that as between human rights and property rights that human rights are and ever shall be pre-eminent.

To carry out such a program there are certain fundamentals upon

which the party sets forth and declares its position,

Tax Plan.

We commend the action of the Democratic House of Delegates at the regular session of 1931, in adopting for submission to a vote of the people, and transmitting to the Republican Senate for its concurrence, which was refused, an amendment to the Constitution of the State prowhich was refused, an amendment to the constitution of the state providing for a limitation of levies upon property for taxation, and also authorizing a feasible income tax; and also for having likewise at the extraordinary session of 1932, adopted for submission an amendment of the same purport and effect, which was concurred in by the Senate and which will be submitted for approval at the November election, and we favor the ratification of such Democratic amendment.

The rates fixed for taxtion by said proposed amendment may greatly reduce the revenues and thereby necessitate rigid economy in all departments of government. However, if the revenues are so reduced that with the utmost economy, we should not be able to pay expenses and take care of the two and one-half million deficit left us as a legacy by the inefficient outgoing administration, resort may then be had if necessary, to a wise and properly adjusted income tax, or other form of taxation.

As a part of any tax plan, we pledge our party to such reduction in expenditures and such economies, that, in the event new taxes are necessary, the proceeds thereof will be in lieu of and not in addition to present taxes.

Local Self-Government

We favor the widest extension of local self-government. We believe that the several governmental units should be permitted to control their local affairs without unwarranted dictation by the state government.

Agriculture.

Agriculture is West Virginia's primary industry, therefore, the Democratic party pledges anew to sponsor laws that will further its success and promote prosperity in farming communities. It will lend its aid to efficient production, and to modern and economic methods of marketing.

Other Industries.

Business and manufacturing must be encouraged, and laws made so liberal and elastic that West Virginia will be attractive to all forms of industry, that with the continued exhaustion of natural resources, the wealth of the State will be retained in other forms.

Conservation of Forests and Streams.

The Democratic Party recognizes in our heritage of forests, streams and wild life, climate, mountain scenery and outdoor recreational advantages a great natural resource. These are greatly enhanced by the fact that so great a part of the population of these United States is now brought within a few hours' drive of our borders by the development of roads. The direct revenue from gasoline road tax and license fees, to the state and the indirect income to our people from the tourist trade is now no mean consideration. We commit the party to a sane and progressive policy of conservation of this great natural resource.

Reorganization of State Government.

In recent years many states have reorganized their governments in keeping with modern methods and have saved millions of dollars annu-

ally to taxpayers.

The Democratic Party, if brought to power, will institute a study looking to a complete reorganization of West Virginia state government, along lines of economy and efficiency, and will advocate such legislation as is necessary to give effect thereto.

Education.

The Democratic Party believes in the public education of the youth of the State, but it believes in the operation of the school system in the interest of the youth and not for political expediency. Education should have special attention in the proposed study for the reorganization of the State government.

Labor and Capital.

The Democratic Party believes in all protection and safeguards to labor, and a fair opportunity for capital. Each is a component part of a proven system, and each equally essential to the life of the other, and to the welfare of the State.

Women.

We declare for equality of women in all political and governmental matters, and pledge ourselves to a fair consideration of the rights of women to offices best suited to their qualifications. We oppose the exploitation of women in industry and stand for such conditions of work as will best preserve their health and safety. We favor an equal wage for equal service.

Equal Rights.

We favor equal rights and privileges for all citizens regardless of race or color.

Conclusion.

Standing fearlessly upon the statements of fact herein recited, and the principles and program herein pledged, the Democratic Party invites the support and approval of all citizens and to their judgment it solemnly commits its cause.

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REPUBLICAN NATIONAL PLATFORM

Introduction

We, the representatives of the Republican Party, in convention assembled, renew our pledge to the principles and traditions of our party and dedicate it anew to the service of the Nation.

We meet in a period of widespread distress and of an economic depression that has swept the world. The emergency is second only to that of a great war. The human suffering occasioned may well exceed that

of a period of actual conflict.

The supremely important problem that challenges our citizens and governments alike is to break the back of the depression, to restore the economic life of the Nation and to bring encouragement and relief to the thousands of American families that are solely afflicted.

The people themselves, by their own courage, their own patient and resolute effort in the readjustments of their own affairs can and will work out the cure. It is our task as a party, by leadership and a wise

determination of policy to assist that recovery.

To that task we pledge all that our party possesses in capacity, leadership, resourcefulness and ability. Republicans collectively and individually in Nation and State hereby enlist in a war which will not end until the promise of American life is once more fulfilled.

Leadership.

For nearly three years the world has endured an economic depression of unparalleled extent and severity. The patience and courage of our people have been severely tested, but their faith in themselves, in their institutions, and in their future remains unshaken. When victory comes, as it will, this generation will hand on to the next a great heritage unimpaired.

This will be due in large measure to the quality of the leadership that this country has had during this crisis. We have had in the White House a leader,—wise, courageous, patient, understanding, resourceful, ever-present at his post of duty, tireless in his efforts, and unswervingly

faithful to American principles and ideals.

At the outset of the depression, when no man could foresee its depth and extent, the President succeeded in averting much distress by securing agreement between industry and labor to maintain wages and by stimulating programs of private and governmental construction. Throughout the depression unemployment has been limited by the systematic use of part-time employment as a substitute for the general discharge of employes. Wage scales have not been reduced except under compelling necessity. As a result there have been fewer strikes and less social disturbance than during any similar period of hard times.

The suffering and want occasioned by the great drought of 1930 were mitigated by the prompt mobilization of the resources of the Red Cross and of the government. During the trying winters of 1930-31 and 1931-32 a nation-wide organization to relieve distress was brought into being under the leadership of the President. By the spring of 1931 the possibility of a business upturn in the United States was clearly discernible when, suddenly, a train of events was set in motion in Central Europe which moved forward with extraordinary rapidity and violence, threatening the credit structure of the world, and eventually dealing a serious blow to this country.

The President foresaw the danger. He sought to avert it by proposing a suspension of inter-governmental debt payments for one year, with the a suspension of inter-governmental debt payments for one year, with the purpose of relieving the pressure at the point of greatest intensity. But the credit machinery of the nations of Central Europe could not withstand the strain, and the forces of disintegration continued to gain momentum until in September Great Britain was forced to depart from the gold standard. This momentous event, followed by a tremendous raid on the dollar, resulted in a series of bank suspensions in this country, and the hoarding of currency on a large scale.

Again the President acted. Under his leadership the National Credit Association came into being. It mobilized our banking resources, saved scores of banks from failure, helped restore confidence, and proved of inestimable value in strengthening the credit structure.

inestimable value in strengthening the credit structure.

By the time the Congress met, the character of our problems was clearer than ever. In his message to Congress, the President outlined a constructive and definite program which in the main has been carried

out; other portions may yet be carried out.

The Railroad Credit Corporation was created. The capital of the Federal Land Banks was increased. The Reconstruction Finance Corporation came into being, and brought protection to millions of depositors, policy holders and others. Legislation was enacted enlarging the discount facilities of the Federal Reserve System; and, without reducing the legal reserves of the Federal Reserve Banks, releasing a billion dollars of gold, a formidable protection against raids on the dollar, and a greatly enlarged basis for an expansion of credit. An earlier distribution to depositors in closed banks has been brought about through the action of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Above all, the national credit has been placed in an impregnable position by provision for adequate revenue and a program of drastic curtailment of expenditures. All of these measures were designed to lay a foundation for the resumption of business and increased employment. But delay and the constant introduction and consideration of new and unsound measures has kept the country in a state of uncertainty and fear, and offset much of the good otherwise accomplished.

The President has recently supplemented his original program. To provide for distress, to stimulate the revival of business and employment, and to improve the agricultural situation, he recommended extending the authority of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to enable it:

(a) To make loans to political subdivisions of public bodies or private corporations for the purpose of starting construction of income-producing or self-liquidating projects which will at once increase employment;

(b) to make loans upon security of agricultural commodities so as to insure the carrying of normal stocks of those commodities, and thus stabilize their loan value and price levels;

(c) to make loans to the Federal Farm Board to enable extension of loans to farm cooperatives and loans for export of agricultural commodities to quarters unable otherwise to purchase them;

(d) to loan up to \$300.000,000 to such states as are unable to meet the

calls made upon them by their citizens for distress relief.

The President's program contemplates an attack on a broad front, with far-reaching objectives, but entailing no danger to the budget. The Democratic program, on the other hand, contemplates a heavy expenditure of public funds, a budget unbalanced on a large scale, with a doubtful attainment of at best a strictly limited objective.

We strongly endorse the President's program.

Unemployment and Relief.

True to American traditions and principles of government the administration has regarded the relief problem as one of state and local responsibility. The work of local agencies, public and private, have been co-ordinated and enlarged on a nation-wide scale under the leadership of the President. Sudden and unforeseen emergencies such as the drought have been met by the Red Cross and the government. The United States Public Health Service has been of inestimable benefit to stricken areas.

There has been magnificent response and action to relieve distress by citizens, organizations and agencies public and private throughout the

To provide against the possible failure of local and state agencies, the President has urged the Congress to create an emergency relief fund to be loaned temporarily to any State on a showing of actual need and temporary failure of its financial resources.

The Republican Party endorses this record and policy and is opposed to the Federal Government entering directly into the field of private

charity and direct relief to the individual.

Public Economy

Constructive plans for financial stabilization cannot be completely organized until our National, State and Municipal Governments not only balance their budgets, but curtail their current expenses as well to a level which can be steadily and economically maintained for some years to come.

We urge prompt and drastic reduction of public expenditure and resistance to every appropriation not demonstrably necessary to the performance of the essential functions of government, national or local.

The Dollar

The Republican Party established and will continue to uphold the gold standard and will oppose any measure which will undermine the government's credit or impair the integrity of our national currency. Relief by currency inflation is unsound in principle and dishonest in results. The dollar is impregnable in the marts of the world today and must remain so. An ailing body cannot be cured by quack remedies. This is no time to experiment upon the body politic or financial.

Banks and the Banking System

The efficient functioning of our economic machinery depends in no small measure on the aid rendered to trade and industry by our banking system. There is need of revising the banking laws so as to place our banking structure on a sounder basis generally for all concerned and for the better protection of the depositing public there should be more stringent supervision and broader powers vested in the supervising authorities. We advocate such a revision.

One of the serious problems affecting our banking system has arisen from the practice of organizing separate corporations under and controlled by the same interests as banks, but participating in operations which the banks themselves are not permitted legally to undertake. We favor requiring reports of and subjecting to thorough and periodic examination all such affiliates of member banks until adequate information has been acquired on the basis of which this problem may definitely be solved in a permanent manner.

International Conference

We favor the participation of the United States in an international conference to consider matters relating to monetary questions, including the position of silver, exchange problems, and commodity prices, and possible cooperative action concerning them.

Home Loan Discount Bank System for the Benefit of Home Owners of the United States

The present Republican Administration has initiated legislation for the creation of a system of Federally supervised Home Loan Discount Banks, designed to serve the home owners of all parts of the country and to encourage home ownership by making possible long term credits for homes on more stable and more favorable terms.

There has arisen in the last few years a disturbing trend away from home ownership. We believe that everything possible should be done by governmental agencies, national, state and local, to reverse this tendency; to aid home owners by encouraging better methods of home financing; and to relieve the present inequitable tax burden on the home. In the field of national legislation we pledge that the measures creating a home loan discount system will be pressed in Congress until adopted.

Agriculture

Farm distress in America has its root in the enormous expansion of agricultural production during the war, the deflation of 1919, 1920, and the dislocation of markets after the war. There followed, under Republican administrations, a long record of legislation in aid of the cooperative organization of farmers and in providing farm credit. The position of agriculture was gradually improved. In 1928 the Republican Party pledged further measures in aid of agriculture, principally tariff protection for agricultural products and the creation of a Federal Farm Board "clothed with the necessary power to promote the establishment of a farm marketing system of farmer-owned and controlled stabilization corporations."

Almost the first official act of President Hoover was the calling of a special session of Congress to redeem these party pledges. They have been redeemed.

The 1930 Tariff Act increased the rates on agricultural products by thirty per cent, upon industrial products only twelve per cent. That act equalized, so far as legislation can do so, the protection afforded the farmer with the protection afforded industry and prevented a vast flood of cheap wool, grain, livestock, dairy and other products from entering the American market.

By the Agricultural Marketing Act, the Federal Farm Board was created and armed with broad powers and ample funds. The object of that act, as stated in its preamble, was—"To promote the effective merchandising of agricultural commodities in interstate and foreign commerce so that . . . agriculture will be placed on the basis of economic equality with other industries. . . . By encouraging the organization of producers into effective association under their own control . . . and by promoting the establishment of a farm marketing system of producer-owned and producer-controlled cooperative associations.

The Federal Farm Board, created by the Agricultural Marketing Act, has been compelled to conduct its operations during a period in which all commodity prices, industrial as well as agricultural, have falien to disastrous levels. A period of decreasing demand and of national calamities such as drought and flood has intensied the problem of agriculture. Nevertheless, after only a little more than two years' efforts the Federal Farm Board has many achievements of merit to its credit. It has increased the membership of cooperative farm marketing associations to coordinate efforts of the local associations. By cooperation with other Federal agencies, it has made available to farm marketing associations a large volume of credit, which, in the emergency, would not have otherwise been available. Larger quantities of farm products have been handled cooperatively than ever before in the history of the cooperative movement. Grain crops have been sold by the farmer through his association directly upon the world market.

Due to the 1930 Tariff Act and the Agricultural Marketing Act, it can truthfully be stated that the prices received by the American farmer for his wheat, corn, rye, barley, oats, flaxseed, cattle, butter and many other products, cruelly low though they are, are higher than the prices received by the farmers of any competing nation for the same products.

The Republican Party has also aided the American farmer by relief of the sufferers in the drought-stricken areas through loans for rehabilitation and through road building to provide employment, by the development of the inland waterway system, by the Perishable Product Act, by the strengthening of the extension system, and by the appropriation of \$125,000,000 to recapitalize the Federal Land Banks and enable them to extend time to worthy borrowers.

The Republican Party pledges itself to the principle of assistance to cooperative marketing associations, owned and controlled by the farmers themselves, through the provisions of the Agricultural Marketing Act,

which will be promptly amended or modified as experience shows to be necessary to accomplish the objects set forth in the preamble of that act.

Tariff and the Marketing Act

The party pledges itself to make such revision of tariff schedules as economic changes require to maintain the parity of protection to agriculture with other industry.

The American farmer is entitled not only to tariff schedules on his

products but to protection from substitutes therefor.

We will support any plan which will help to balance production against demand, and thereby raise agricultural prices, provided it is economically sound, and administratively workable without burdensome bureaucracy.

The burden of taxation borne by the owners of farm land constitute one of the major problems of agriculture. President Hoover has aptly and truly said—"Taxes upon real property are easiest to enforce and are the least flexible of all taxes. The tendency under pressure of need is to continue these taxes unchanged in times of depression, despite the decrease in the owner's income. Decreasing price and decreasing income results in an increasing burden upon property owners. . . which is now becoming almost unbearable. The tax burden upon real estate is wholly out of proportion to that upon other forms of property and income. There is no farm relief more needed today than tax relief."

The time has come for a reconsideration of our tax systems, Federal, state and local, with a view to developing a better coordination, reducing duplication, and relieving unjust burdens. The Republican Party pledges

itself to this end.

More than all else, we point to the fact that, in the administration of executive departments, and in every plan of the President for the coordination of national effort and for strengthening our financial structure, for expanding credit, for rebuilding the rural credit system and laying the foundations for better prices, the President has insisted upon the interest of the American farmer.

The fundamental problem of American agriculture is the control of production to such volume as will balance supply with demand. In the solution of this problem the cooperative organization of farmers to plan production, and the tariff, to hold the home market for American farmers, are vital elements. A third element equally as vital is the control of the acreage of land under cultivation, as an aid to the efforts of the farmer

to balance production.

We favor a national policy of land utilization which looks to national needs, such as the administration has already begun to formulate. Such a policy must foster reorganization of taxing units in areas beset by tax delinquency, and divert lands that are submarginal for crop production to other uses. The national welfare plainly can be served by the acquisition of submarginal lands for watershed protection, grazing, forestry, public parks, and game preserves. We favor such acquisitions.

The Tariff

The Republican Party has always been the staunch supporter of the American system of a protective tariff. It believes that the home market, built up under that policy, the greatest and richest market in the world, belongs first to American agriculture, industry and labor. No pretext can justify the surrender of that market to such competition as would destroy our farms, mines and factories, and lower the standard of living which we have established for our workers.

Because many foreign countries have recently abandoned the gold standard, as a result of which the costs of many commodities produced in such countries have, at least for the time being, fallen materially in terms of American currency, adequate tariff protection is today particularly essential to the welfare of the American people. The tariff Commission should promptly investigate individual commodities so affected

by currency depreciation, and report to the President any increase in duties found necessary to equalize domestic with foreign costs of

production.

To fix the duties on some thousands of commodities, subject to highly complex conditions, is necessarily a difficult technical task. It is unavoidable that some of the rates established by legislation should, even at the time of their enactment, be too low or too high. Moreover, a subsequent change in costs or other conditions may render obsolete a rate that was before appropriate. The Republican Party has, therefore, long supported the policy of a flexible tariff, giving power to the President, after investigation by an impartial commission and in accordance with prescribed principles, to modify the rates named by the Congress.

We commend the President's veto of the measure, sponsored by Democratic Congressmen, which would have transferred from the President to the Congress the authority to put into effect the findings of the Tariff Commission. Approval of the measure would have returned tariff making to politics and destroyed the progress made during ten years of effort to lift it out of log-rolling methods. We pledge the Republican Party to a policy which will retain the gains made and enlarge the

present scope of greater progress.

We favor the extension of the general Republican principle of tariff protection to our natural resource industries, including the products of our farms, forests, mines and oil wells, with compensatory duties on the manufactured and refined products thereof.

Veterans

Our country is honored whenever it bestows relief on those who have faithfully served its flag. The Republican Party, appreciative of this solemn obligation and honor, has made its sentiments evident in Congress

Increased hospital facilities have been provided, payments in compensation have more than doubled, and in the matter of rehabilitations, pensions, and insurance, generous provision has been made. The administration of laws dealing with the relief of veterans and their dependents has been a difficult task, but every effort has been made to carry service to the veteran and bring about not only a better and generous interpretation of the law, but a sympathetic consideration of the many problems of the veteran.

We believe that every veteran incapacitated in any degree by reason of illness or injuries attributable to service in defense of his country should be cared for and compensated, so far as compensation is possible, by a grateful nation, and that the dependents of those who lost their lives in war or whose death since the war in which service was rendered is traceable to service causes, should be provided for adequately. Legislation should be in accord with this principle.

lation should be in accord with this principle.

Disability from causes subsequent and not attributable to war and the support of dependents of deceased veterans whose death is unconnected with war, have been to some measure accepted obligations of the nation

as a part of the debt due.

A careful study should be made of existing veterans legislation with a view to eliminating inequalities and injustices and effecting all possible economies, but without departing from our purpose to provide on a sound basis full and adequate relief for our service disabled men, their widows and orphans.

Foreign Affairs

Our relations with foreign nations have been carried on by President Hoover with consistency and firmness but with mutual understanding and peace with all nations. The world has been overwhelmed with economic strain which has provoked extreme nationalism in every quarter, has overturned many governments, stirred the springs of suspicion and

distrust, and tried the spirit of international cooperation, but we have held to our own course steadily and successfully. The party will continue to maintain its attitude of protecting our national interests and policies wherever threatened but at the same time promoting common understanding of the varying needs and aspirations of other nations and going forward in harmony with other peoples without alliances or foreign partnerships. The facilitation of world intercourse, the freeing of commerce from unnecessary impediments, the settlement of international difficulties by conciliation and the methods of law, and the elimination of war as a resort of national policy have been and will be our party program.

Friendship and Commerce

We believe in and look forward to the steady enlargement of the principles of equality of treatment between nations great and small, the concession of sovereignty and self-administration to every nation which is capable of carrying on stable government and conducting sound and orderly relationships with other people, and the cultivation of trade and intercourse on the basis of uniformity of opportunity of all nations. In pursuance of these principles, which have steadily gained favor in

In pursuance of these principles, which have steadily gained favor in the world, the administration has asked no special favors in commerce, has protested discriminations whenever they arose, and has steadily cemented this procedure by reciprocal treaties guaranteeing equality for trade and residence. The historic American policy known as the "most favored nation principle" has been our guiding program and we believe that policy to be the only one consistent with a full development of international trade, the only one suitable for a country having as wide and diverse a commerce as America and the one most appropriate for us in view of the great variety of our industrial, agricultural and mineral products and the traditions of our people. Any other plan involves bargains and partnerships with foreign nations and as a permanent policy is unsuited to America's position.

Conditions on the Pacific

Events in the Far East, involving the employment of arms on a large scale in a controversy between Japan and China, have caused world-wide concern in the past year and sorely tried the bulwarks erected to insure peace and pacific means for the settlement of international disputes. The controversy has not only threatened the security of the nations bordering the Pacific, but has challenged the maintenance of the policy of the Open Door in China and the administration and political integrity of that people, programs which upon American initiation were adopted more than a generation ago and secured by international treaty. The President and his Secretary of State have maintained throughout the controversy a just balance between Japan and China, taking always a firm position to avoid entanglement in the dispute but consistently upholding the established international policies and the treaty rights and interests of the United States, and never condoning developments that endangered the obligation of treaties or the peace of the world. Throughout the controversy our government has acted in harmony with the governments represented in the League of Nations, always making it clear that American policy would be determined at home but always lending a hand in the common interest of peace and order.

In the application of the principles of the Kellogg Pact the American Government has taken the lead, following the principle that a breach of the Pact or a threat of infringment thereof was a matter of international

concern wherever and however brought about.

As a further step the Secretary of State, upon the instruction of the President, adopted the principle later enlarged upon in his letter to the Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate that this government would not recognize any situation, treaty or agreement

brought about between Japan and China by force and in defiance of the covenants of the Kellogg Pact. This principle, associated as it is with the name of President Hoover, was later adopted by the Assembly of the nations at Geneva as a rule for the conduct of all those governments. The principle remains today as an important contribution to international law and a significant moral and material barrier to prevent a nation obtaining the fruits of aggressive warfare. It thus opens a new pathway to peace and order.

We favor enactment by Congress of a measure that will authorize our government to call or participate in an international conference in case of any threat of non-fulfillment of Article 2 of the Treaty of Paris

(Kellogg-Briand Pact).

Latin America

The policy of the Administration has proved to our neighbors of Latin America that we have no imperialistic ambitions but that we wish only to promote the welfare and common interest of the independent nations in the Western Hemisphere. We have aided Nicaragua in the solution of its troubles and our marines are remaining in that country, in greatly reduced numbers at the request of the Nicaraguan government, only to supervise the coming election. After that they will all be returned to the United States. In Haiti, in accord with the recommendations of the Forbes Commission, appointed by the President, the various services of supervision are being rapidly withdrawn and only those will be retained which are mandatory under the treaties. Throughout Latin America the policy of the Government of the United States has been and will, under Republican leadership, continue to be one of frank and friendly understanding.

World Court

The acceptance by America of membership in the World Court has been approved by three successive Republican Presidents and we commend this attitude of supporting in this form the settlement of international disputes by the rule of law. America should join its influence and gain a voice in this institution, which would offer us a safer, more judicial and expeditious instrument for the constantly recurring questions between us and other nations than is now available by arbitration.

Reduction of Armament

Conscious that the limitation of armament will contribute to security against war, and that the financial burdens of military preparation have against war, and that the manacial burdens of military preparation nave been shamefully increased throughout the world, the administration under President Hoover has made steady efforts and marked progress in the direction of proportional reduction of arms by agreements with other nations. Upon his initiative a treaty between the chief naval powers at London in 1930, following the path marked by the Washington Conference of 1922, established a limitation of all types of fighting ships on a proportionate basis as between the three great naval powers. For the first time, a general limitation of a most costly branch of armament was successfully accomplished.

In the Geneva disarmament conference now in progress America is an active participant, and a representative delegation of our citizens is

aboring for further progress in a cause to which this country has been an earnest contributor. This policy will be pursued.

Meanwhile, maintenance of our Navy on the basis of parity with any nation is a fundamental policy to which the Republican Party is committed. While in the interest of necessary government retrenchment, humanity and relief of the taxpayer we shall continue to exert our full influence upon the nations of the world in the cause of reduction of arms. we do not propose to reduce our navy defenses below that of any other nation.

National Defense

Armaments are relative and, therefore, flexible and subject to change as necessity demands. We believe that in time of war every material resource in the nation should bear its proportionate share of the burdens occasioned by the public need and that it is a duty of government to perfect plans in time of peace whereby this objective may be attained in war. We support the essential principles of the National Defense Act as amended in 1920 and by the Air Corps Act of 1926, and believe that the Army of the United States has through successive reductions, accomplished in the last twelve years, reached the irreducible minimum consistent with the self-reliance, self-respect and security of this country.

Labor and Immigration

We believe in the principle of high wages.

We favor the principle of the shorter work week and shorter work day with its application to government as well as to private employment, as rapidly and as constructively as conditions will warrant.

We favor legislation designed to stimulate, encourage and assist in

home building.

Immigration:

The restriction of immigration is a Republican policy. formulated and enacted into law the quota system which for the first time has made possible an adequate control of foreign immigration. Rigid examination of applicants in foreign countries has prevented the Rigid examination of applicants in foreign countries has prevented the coming of criminals and other undesirable classes, while other provisions of the law have enabled the President to suspend immigration of foreign wage-earners who otherwise, directly or indirectly, would have increased unemployment among native-born and legally resident foreign-born wage-earners in this country. As a result, immigration is now less than at any time during the past one hundred years.

We favor the continuance and strict enforcement of our present laws upon this subject.

upon this subject.

Department of Labor:

We commend the constructive work of the United States Department of Labor.

Labor:

Collective bargaining by responsible representatives of employers and employees of their own choice without the interference of anyone is recognized and approved.

Legislation such as laws prohibiting alien contract labor, peonage labor, and the "Shanghai-ing" of sailors, the eight-hour labor law on government contracts, and in government employment; provision for railroad safety devices, of methods of conciliation, mediation and arbitration in industrial labor disputes, including the adjustment of railroad disputes, the providing of compensation for injury to government employes (the forerunner of Federal Workers' Compensation Acts), and other laws to aid and protect labor are of Republican origin, and have had and will continue to have the unswerving support of the Party.

Employment:

We commend the constructive work of the United States Employment Service in the Department of Labor. This Service was enlarged and its activities extended through an appropriation made possible by the President with the cooperation of the Congress. It has done high service for the unemployed in the ranks of civil life and in the ranks of the former soldiers of the World War.

Freedom of Speech:

Freedom of speech, press and assemblage, are fundamental principles upon which our form of government rests. These vital principles should be preserved and protected.

Public Utilities

Supervision, regulation and control of interstate public utilities in the interest of the public is an established policy of the Republican Party to the credit of which stands the creation of the Interstate Commerce Commission with its authority to assure reasonable transportation rates, sound railway finance and adequate service.

As proof of the progress made by the Republican Party in government

control of public utilities, we cite the reorganization under this Administration of the Federal Power Commission with authority to administer the federal water power act. We urge legislation to authorize this commission to regulate the charges for electric current when transmitted across state lines.

Transportation

The promotion of agriculture, commerce and industry requires co-ordination of transportation by rail, highway, air and water. All should be be subjected to appropriate and constructive regulation.

The public will of course select the form of transportation best fitted to its particular service, but the terms of competition fixed by public authority should operate without discrimination, so that all common carriers by rail, highway, air and water shall operate under conditions of equality.

The railroads constitute the backbone of our transportation system and perform an essential service for the country. The railroad industry is our largest employer of labor and the greatest consumer of goods. The restoration of their credit and the maintenance of their ability to render adequate service are of paramount importance to the public, to their many thousands of employes and to savings banks, insurance companies and other similar institutions, to which the savings of the people have been intrusted.

We should continue to encourage the further development of the merchant marine under American registry and ownership.

Under the present administration the American merchant fleet has been enlarged and strengthened until it now occupies second place among the merchant marines of the world.

By the gradual retirement of the government from the field of ship operations, and marked economies in costs, the United States Shipping Board will require no appropriation for the fiscal year 1933 for ship operations.

Saint Lawrence Seaway

The Republican Party stands committed to the development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Seaway. Under the direction of President Hoover negotiation of a treaty with Canada for this development is now at a favorable point. Recognizing the inestimable benefits which will accrue to the nation from placing the ports of the Great Lakes on an ocean base, the Party reaffirms allegiance to this great project and pledges its best efforts to secure its early completion.

Inland Waterways

The Republican Party recognizes that low cost transportation for bulk commodities will enable industry to develop in the midst of agriculture in the Mississippi Valley, thereby creating a home market for farm products in that section. With a view to aiding agriculture in the Middle

West the present administration has pushed forward, as rapidly as possible, the improvement of the Mississippi Waterway System and we favor a continued vigorous prosecution of these works to the end that agriculture and industry in that great area may enjoy the benefits of these improvements at the earliest possible date.

Highways

The Federal policy to cooperate with the states in the building of roads was thoroughly established when the Federal Highway Act of 1921 was adopted under a Republican Congress. Each year since that time appropriations have been made which have greatly increased the economic value of highway transportation and helped to raise the standards and opportunities of rural life.

We pledge our support to the continuation of this policy in accordance

with our needs and resources.

Crime

We favor the enactment of rigid penal laws that will aid the states in stamping out the activities of gansters, racketeers and kidnapers. We commend the intensive and effective drive made upon these public enemies by President Hoover and pledge our party to further efforts to the same purpose.

Narcotics

The Republican Party pledges itself to continue the present relentless warfare against the illicit narcotic traffic and the spread of the curse of drug addiction among our people. This Administration has by treaty greatly strengthened our power to deal with this traffic.

Civil Service

The merit system has been amply justified since the organization of the Civil Service by the Republican Party. As a part of our govern-mental system it is now unassailable. We believe it should remain so.

The Eighteenth Amendment

The Republican Party has always stood and stands today for obedience to and enforcement of the law as the very foundation of orderly government and civilization. There can be no national security otherwise. The duty of the President of the United States and of the officers of the law is clear. The law must be enforced as they find it enacted by the people. To these courses of action we pledge our nominees.

The Republican Party is and always has been the party of the Constitution. Nullification by non-observance by individuals or state action

threatens the stability of government.

While the Constitution makers sought a high degree of permanence, they foresaw the need of changes and provided for them. Article V limits the proposals of amendments to two methods: (1) Two-thirds of both Houses of Congress may propose amendments; or (2) On application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the states a national convention shall be called by Congress to propose amendments. Thereafter ratification must be had in one of two ways: (1) By the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states; or (2) By conventions held in three-fourths of the several states. Congress is given power to determine the mode of ratification.

Referendums without constitutional sanction cannot furnish a decisive answer. Those who propose them innocently are deluded by false hopes;

those who propose them knowingly are deceiving the people.

A nation-wide controversy over the Eighteenth Amendment now distracts attention from the constructive solution of many pressing national problems. The principle of national prohibition as embodied in the Amendment was supported and opposed by members of both great political parties. It was submitted to the states by members of Congress of different political faith and ratified by state legislatures of different political majorities. It was not then and is now not a partisan political

Members of the Republican Party hold different opinions with respect to it and no public official or member of the Party should be pledged or forced to choose between his party affiliations and his honest convictions

upon this question.

We do not favor a submission limited to the issue of retention or repeal. For the American nation never in its history has gone backward,

and in this case the progress which has been thus far made must be preserved, while the evils must be eliminated.

We, therefore, believe that the people should have an opportunity to pass upon a proposed amendment the provision of which, while retaining in the Federal Government power to preserve the gains already made in dealing with the evils inherent in the liquor traffic, shall allow states to deal with the problem as their citizens may determine, but subject always to the power of the Federal Government to protect those states where prohibition may exist and safeguard our citizens everywhere from the return of the saloon and attendant abuses.

Such an amendment should be promptly submitted to the states by Congress, to be acted upon by state conventions called for that sole purpose in accordance with the provisions of Article V of the Constitution, and adequately safeguarded so as to be truly representative.

Conservation

The wise use of all natural resources freed from monopolistic control is a Republican policy, initiated by Theodore Roosevelt. The Roosevelt, Coolidge and Hoover reclamation projects bear witness to the continua-tion of that policy. Forestry and all other conservation activities have been supported and enlarged.

The conservation of oil is a major problem to the industry and the nation. The administration has sought to bring coordination of effort through the states, the producers and the Federal Government. Progress has been made and the effort will continue.

Negro

For seventy years the Republican Party has been the friend of the American Negro. Vindication of the right of the Negro citizen to enjoy the full benefits of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness is traditional in the Republican Party, and our Party stands pledged to maintain equal opportunity and rights for our Negro citizens. We do not propose to depart from that tradition nor to alter the spirit or letter of that pledge.

We believe that the existing status of self-government which for many years has been enjoyed by the citizens of the Territory of Hawaii should be maintained, and that officials appointed to administer the government should be bona-fide residents of the Territory.

Puerto Rico

Puerto Rico being a part of the United States and its inhabitants American citizens, we believe that they are entitled to a good faith recognition of the spirit and purposes of their Organic Act. We, therefore, favor the inclusion of the Island in all legislative and administrative measures enacted or adopted by Congress or otherwise for the economic benefit of their fellow citizens of the mainland.

We also believe that in so far as possible all officials appointed to administer the affairs of the Island government should be qualified by at

least five years of bona-fide residence therein.

Alaska

We favor the policy of giving to the people of Alaska the widest possible territorial self-government and the selection so far as possible of bona-fide residents for positions in that Territory and the placing of its citizens on an equality with those in the several states.

Welfare Work and Children

The children of our nation, our future citizens, have had the most solicitous thought of our President. Child welfare and protection has been a major effort of this Administration. The organization of the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection is regarded as one of the outstanding accomplishments of this Administration.

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Welfare work in all its phases has had the support of the President and aid of the Administration. The work of organized agencies, local, state and Federal, has been advanced and an increased impetus given by that recognition and help. We approve and pledge a continuation of that policy.

Indians

We favor the fullest protection of the property rights of the American Indians and the provision for them of adequate educational and health facilities.

Reorganization of Government Bureaus

Efficiency and economy demand reorganization of government bureaus. The problem is non-partisan and must be so treated if it is to be solved. As a result of years of study and personal contact with conflicting activities and wasteful duplication of effort, the President is particularly fitted to direct measures to correct the situation. We favor legislation by Congress which will give him the required authority.

Democratic Failure

The vagaries of the present Democratic House of Representatives offer characteristic appalling proof of the existing incapacity of that Party for leadership in a national crisis. Individualism running amuck has displaced party discipline and has trampled underfoot party leadership. A bewildered electorate has viewed the spectacle with profound dismay and deep misgivings. Goaded to desperation by their confessed failure, the party leaders have restored to "pork barrel" legislation to obtain a unity of action which could not otherwise be achieved. A Republican President stands resolutely between the helpless citizen and the disasters threatened by such measures; and the people, regardless of party, will demand his continued service. Many times during his useful life has Herbert Hoover responded to such a call, and his response has never disappointed. He will not disappoint us now.

Party Government

The delays and differences which recently hampered efforts to obtain legislation imperatively demanded by prevailing critical conditions strikingly illustrate the menace to self-government brought about by the weakening of party ties and party fealty. Experience has demonstrated that coherent political parties are indispensable agencies for the prompt and effective operation of the functions of our government under the Constitution. Only by united party action can consistent, well planned and wholesome legislative programs be enacted. We believe that the majority of the Congressmen elected in the name of a party have the right and duty to determine the general policies of that party requiring Congressional action, and that Congressmen belonging to that party are, in general, bound to adhere to such policies. Any other course inevitably makes of Congress a body of detached delegates which, instead of representing the collective wisdom of our people, become the confused voices

of a heterogeneous group of unrelated local prejudicies. We believe that the time has come when Senators and Representatives of the United States be impressed with the inflexible truth that their first concern should be the welfare of the United States and the well-being of all of its people, and that stubborn pride of individual opinion is not a virtue but an obstacle to the orderly and successful achievement of the objects of representative government. Only by cooperation can self-government succeed. Without it, election under a party aegis becomes a false pretense. We earnestly request that Republicans through the Union demand that their representatives in the Congress pledge themselves to these principles, to the end that the insidious influences of party disintegration may not undermine the very foundations of the Republic.

Conclusion

In contrast with the Republican policies and record, we contrast those of the Democratic as evidenced by the action of the House of Representatives under Democratic leadership and control, which includes:

The issuance of fiat currency;

2. Instructions to the Federal Reserve Board and the Secretary of the Treasury to attempt to manipulate commodity prices;

3. The guarantee of bank deposits;

4. The squandering of the public resources and the unbalancing of the budget through pork-barrel appropriations which bear little relation to distress and would tend through delayed business revival to decrease rather than increase employment.

Generally on economic matters we pledge the Republican Party-

1. To maintain unimpaired the national credit.

2. To defend and preserve a sound currency and an honest dollar.

3. To stand steadfastly by the principle of a balanced budget.

4. To devote ourselves fearlessly and unremittingly to the task of eliminating abuses and extravagance and of drastically cutting the cost of government so as to reduce the heavy burden of taxation.

To use all available means consistent with sound financial and economic principles to promote an expansion of credit, to stimulate

business and relieve unemployment.

6. To a thorough study of the conditions which permitted the credit and the credit machinery of the country to be made available without adequate check for wholesale speculation in securities, resulting in runious consequences to millions of our citizens and to the national economy, and to correct those conditions so that they shall not recur.

Recognizing that real relief to unemployment must come through a revival of industrial activity and agriculture to the promotion of which our every effort must be directed, our Party in state and nation undertakes to do all in its power that is humanly possible to see that distress is fully relieved in accordance with American principles and traditions.

No successful solution of the problems before the country today can be expected from a Congress and a President separated by partisan lines, or opposed in purposes and principles. Responsibility cannot be placed unless a clear mandate is given by returning to Washington a Congress and a Chief Executive united in principles and program. The return to power of the Republican Party with that mandate is the duty of every voter who believes in the doctrines of the party and its program as herein stated. Nothing less, we believe, will insure the orderly recovery of the country and that return to prosperous days which every American so ardently desires.

The Republican Party faces the future unafraid!

With courage and confidence in ultimate success, we will strive against the forces that strike at our social and economic ideals, our political institutions.

REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Wheeling, August 12, 1933)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the members of the Republican Party of West Virginia, in convention assembled, reaffirm our faith in the principles of the great party to which we proudly acknowledge our allegiance. We renew our endorsement of the doctrines upon which its policy has been built; doctrines which it has pronounced from time to time for the purpose of developing industry and commerce, and promoting the social and moral advantages of our whole people.

We take pride in the fact that our party was born in a spirit of service to the common man. It was brought into being as a protest against the hideous institution of human slavery. The first great Republican President, the immortal Abraham Lincoln, in his historical address at Cincinnati, appealed to the workers of America in behalf of free labor and a free country, in which every man who worked with his hands should have the right to enjoy the products of his toil, without the permission of a slave master and to enjoy further rights of American citizenship equal to those of any other citizen.

In this spirit, the Republican Party dedicated itself to the cause of the common people; to the task of building in this country a civilization and a manner of living which would open to every worker, however lowly; to the child of every home, however humble, the door to greater privileges and greater means of comfort, than enjoyed by like workers in any other country on the face of the Globe.

The Republican party has, through the Protective Tariff, fostered and sustained, a higher level of wages, a higher average of employment, and a fuller measure of the comforts of life than found among any other people in any part of either the old or the new world. It has given to the American worker benefits in the form of compensation, care of his health and protection in his home, approached by no other working class.

We invite the attention of the working men of West Virginia, and of all our citizens who believe in equality of opportunity for the child of every home, to this essential fact; search the country over; examine the legislation of every state, and you will find that those states which have constantly shown the greatest care for their working people; which have constantly protected their interests through welfare legislation; through progressive child labor laws; through sanitary and safety legislation; through the provision of state hospitalization, have been states whose legislation has been inspired and framed by Republicans. On the other hand, if you look to those states in which the hideous iniquity of child labor still continues to flourish, where wages are lowest, and conditions of labor are worst, you will find that those states are almost invariably Democratic states.

Today, as never before, the welfare of industry, the employment of the great mass of our people, are bound up in maintenance of the protective tariff. Depreciated currencies of other countries have given foreign manufacturers the advantage of competitive markets which are threatening invasion of the industry of the United States. Lower standards of living in Europe and Asia have created, and are creating, a tremendous volume of marketable goods, competitive with those manufactured in the United States, which are today threatening invasion of the American market to the destruction of our own standards of wages, and means of employment. Within the past few months, shipments of iron and steel products from England and Belgium have been sold at the wharves of Detroit and of New Orleans. In every field of manufacture, the American employer is feeling today keener competition from foreign producers, and the American worker is facing a more serious threat from foreign competition.

We hold this is no time to modify, break down or lower the tariff, which is the great protective barrier of American industry in general and West Virginia industry in particular. The iron and steel, the coal, the glass, the potteries, the chemical plants, and other great industries of West Virginia, as well as agriculture, have prospered under the protective tariff. Today, when a period of World readjustment is menacing our industry as never before, we pledge our senators and congressmen, as representatives of West Virginia Republicanism, to secure for every West Virginia industry, every employer, and every worker, the fullest measure of tariff benefits.

We hold that the protective tariff policy of the Republican party is not merely a means of promoting industry, and of creating wealth for employers, but it is a great instrument for the maintenance of a higher culture, and a higher civilization, a broader diffusion among all our people of all the things that make for human welfare.

By a kindly Providence, we have been blessed with a national infrom the Lakes to the Gulf we have a territory unequalled in natural resources; unequalled in all the elements which supply the needs of humanity; in that territory we have one people, speaking one tongue, and living under one fiag. Our trade and commerce flow in unbroken lines across this vast area. This great natural wealth we propose to develop for the benefit of the American people and for me then record develop for the benefit of the American people, and for no other people. We hold if we maintain this great American market for our own people; that if we use the resources which Nature has given us to make more and more useful things to distribute among our own people, that we will create and maintain among the great mass of our workers, the highest measure of comfort, and of physical and mental enjoyment, and moral culture, ever attained by any people on the face of the earth.

That is the high purpose of the protective tariff policy of the Re-

publican party, and to that purpose we pledge our devotion and our con-

tinued efforts.

We rejoice in the renomination of President Hoover and Vice President Curtis, who have proved themselves so admirably equipped for national leadership during the most trying period of the country's his-We particularly laud the firm foreign policy of the Republican administration, and the broad comprehensive reconstruction policies which have set the country on a same path to recovery, and endorse the progressive, vigorous, American platform of our national party.

The Record in West Virginia

We call attention to the fact that the Republican party in West Virginia, true to Republican traditions, has ever been the party of progress. Whatever we have of advanced legislation, and of high public service, has come through the agency of Republican executives and Republican legislators.

There was a time in this state, not many years ago, when the life of a worker in the field, the factory or the mine, was not a matter of state

Passage of the Workmen's Compensation Act by a Republican Legislature under the leadership of a Republican Governor wiped out this great wrong. For the first time in the history of the State, law established the principle that the welfare of the worker and the protection of his life was a matter of State concern. During the eighteen years this Department has been in operation, it has distributed upwards of \$40,000,000 in compensation; money which has gone to injured workmen, to the maintenance and education of orphaned children, to the general pro-

motion of human happiness.

We have now in West Virginia, thanks to Republican vision and progressiveness, a splendid Health Department; a Department which during the past twelve years, in particular, has commanded the respect and commendation of the entire medical profession; a Department which has inspired in nearly every County in the State, special effort in health promotion, and which has contributed in many ways to the general wel-

fare of our citizenship.

Republican administration in West Virginia has multiplied our humane institutions and has increased their efficiency. The present high standards of the Hopemont, Rutherford and Denmar sanitariums; the Weston, the Spencer, the Huntington and the Lakin State Hospitals; the West Virginia Training School, the Children Homes, the Industrial Schools for Boys and the Industrial Home for Girls, the Schools for the Deaf and Blind, are all evidences of the deep concern of West Virginia Republicanism for the happiness and welfare of our people.

We recognize the intelligent interest taken in our humane institutions by the medical fraternity of West Virginia and we invite the cooperation and suggestions of the medical fraternity as to matters relating to the

humanitarian work carried on by the State.

Good Roads

During the past twelve years, the State has spent large sums of money in the development of good roads. More than \$100,000,000 has been expended in the building of a great system of State highways. Construction of these highways over the mountains and through the valleys of our State is a tremenduously difficult and expensive task. Nevertheless, our road system compares favorably with states in which construction is less difficult and in which development has been going on for a much longer period of time. We are attracting in ever increasing numbers, the tourists of the United States, who are enjoying our scenery, becoming acquainted with the advantages of West Virginia and trading with our people.

It is a matter of especial pride that the Road Commission, carrying on this stupendous work, expending this vast sum of money under Republican executives, has done so without a dollar of unlawfully wasted money, being a record of careful and honest management, unsurpassed in the distribution of a like sum of money anywhere in the United States.

A New Cause and a New Battle

Republicanism in West Virginia ever has turned its face to the light. In this spirit, it faces today a new issue and a new problem, in the consideration of which it invites the cooperation of all the citizens of the State; in the meeting of which it asks the assistance of every land owner, and of every person who believes in the encouragement of home owning.

In the primary of May 10, Hon. T. C. Townsend was nominated as the

Republican candidate for Governor by an overwhelming majority.

His selection was not merely the naming of an individual; not merely an expression of preference for one man over another or others. It was the ringing endorsement of a great program of legislative reform announced by our candidate.

It remains for us formally to put that program into the platform of the Republican Party. We hold that our platform, insofar as it touches

these issues, already has been written.

It was written by the voters of West Virginia on May 10.

In announcing his candidacy for the nomination for Governor, our standard bearer laid down this platform:

"First: I favor an amendment to the Constitution of West Virginia that will limit levies so that the total in any one year will not exceed 50 cents on the \$100 on intangible wealth; \$1 on the \$100 valuation upon all farm land and upon homes occupied by their owners; \$1.50 upon all other property situated outside of municipalities; \$2 upon all such property within municipalities.

"Second: I entirely approve the principle that no property of a public utility shall be assessed for taxation at a lower figure than the valuation allowed the same property for rate

making purposes.

"Third: I approve amendment of our present Public Service Commission law increasing the regulatory power of the Commission, providing for a public defender, increasing the power and responsibility of the Commission to initiate rate investigations in the public interest, and such other statutory amend-

ments as may be necessary to increase the public protection.

"Finally: I favor a water power law which will have for its primary object the development of our waterpower resources for the use of West Virginia citizens upon preferential terms, with adequate compensation to the people of the State

for power otherwise disposed of."

This program was debated in every county of the State and in practically every magisterial district of every county. There could be no mistaking its meaning. There could be no mistaking the purpose of T. C. Townsend. Both received the most impressive endorsement in the primary history of West Virginia. We call attention to the fact that of the 239,828 votes cast for the five Republican candidates for the gubernatorial nomination, our standard bearer received 147,210 which was 76,876 more than his closest competitor. We call attention to the further fact that in the opposition party, four candidates who had in substance endorsed the Townsend program, received 150,524 of the 243,604 votes cast. In other words, some sixty-two per cent of the men and women casting ballots in the May primary clearly endorsed these great legislative reforms. Only by a combination of circumstances, which split up the vote was a candidate nominated by our opponents, who has not hitherto endorsed land tax relief through constitutional limitation of levies, and has not expressed himself either by word or action as in favor of the other reforms involved in the Townsend program.

Today, therefore, the issue is clear. The Republican party stands on a platform of land tax relief and statutory protection of the people's rights, and presents a candidate espousing well defined and well understood principles. The Democratic nominee, on the other hand, is without plan or policy that the public is aware of. He has nothing to offer in response to the clearly voiced demand of the people for constitutional limitation of property levies, for equalized rate and tax valuation of utility property, for vitalized utility control, or for legislation which will protect the

citizens of the State in their water power resources.

We endorse in every particular, the great progressive program of legislative reform outlined by our candidate for Governor and pledge the membership of the Republican Party in this State to the support of measures that will write this program into the fundamental and statutory law of West Virginia.

The Amendment

The Legislature of West Virginia, sitting in extra session at the call of a Republican Governor, has voted to submit to the people of West Virginia, for their confirmation, the land tax limitation amendment to the Constitution, contained in the program of legislation outlined by our candidate for Governor. This amendment, and the program of legislation auxiliary thereto will be best translated into constitutional and statutory law by the man and the party that initiated them, and have fought for them. With confidence, therefore, we appeal to the voters of West Virginia without regard to previous party membership to join us in bringing about the enactment of this great reform program, a program that promises relief for the over-taxed farms and homes of West Virginia, and a fairer adjustment of tax burdens upon privileged interests.

Education

The Republican Party reaffirms its faith in, and allegiance to, our great public school system as the one indispensable agency of the state government. Through universal education will come the only permanent solution of our social, political and economic problems. The framers of the State Constitution recognized this fact when they enjoined upon the Legislature the responsibility of providing a sound system of education. The State Constitution in dealing with the question of education says:

1. "The Legislature shall provide by general law for a thorough and

efficient system of free schools."

2. "The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested 'school fund', the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the law thereof; the state capitation tax AND BY GENERAL TAXATION OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY OR OTHERWISE. It shall also provide

for raising in each county or district by authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws."

It is quite clear that the framers of the Constitution never contemplated that property in a district should be required to pay ninety-seven cents out of each dollar spent for purposes of education. It is equally clear that the portion supplied by the county and district was intended merely to supplement the major obligation of the state and this only when the local people are willing to add this supplemental expense by voting upon the question of levy.

The excessive rates of levy placed upon one class of the wealth of the State—that of property—has resulted in the confiscation of farms, homes and other properties. Such a procedure is wholly indefensible and is utterly intolerable. We, therefore, pledge the Republican Party to an enactment of laws which will place an increased proportion of the costs of the minimum school program upon state indirect sources of taxation in keeping with the spirit and purpose of the Constitution, and modern developments.

Our State Administration

We endorse and commend the administration of our Governor, Hon. William G. Conley. We call attention to the fact that the special session of the Legislature, called into being by him to meet a great emergency, has enacted legislation limiting the taxes to be levied by all tax-levying bodies in West Virginia to a total of not more than 85 per cent of the taxes levied in the year of 1931; and furthermore, that this legislative session has, with his approval and earnest support, voted to submit the constitutional amendment for the complete limitation of land taxes to the vote of the people, and has thereby made it possible to speed up by two years' time, the day when this great reform can become effective.

By judicious administration of the State's finances, in spite of the very widespread depression, to a very great extent destroying the bond market, Governor Conley has been able to dispose advantageously of the bonds to be sold for the continuance of our state road program, and has maintained the public credit of the State at the very high mark at which it has been established under Republican administration for the past

thirty years.

We endorse and commend the various departments of the State Government. All of these bodies have functioned with ability, and with

credit to the administration of which they have been a part.

We endorse and commend heartily our various candidates on the state ticket: Auditor, Edgar C. Lawson; Treasurer, W. S. Johnson; Secretary of State, George W. Sharp; Attorney General, Howard B. Lee; Commissioner of Agriculture, Howard M. Gore; and State Superintendent of Schools, W. C. Cook, and in this connection we call attention to the fact that these men, with Governor Conley, sitting as members of the Board of Public Works of the State of West Virginia, have given earnest and conscientious attention to all the complex questions of utility values, and have caused readjustments of the valuations of the various public utility properties of the State, which have resulted in an increase in taxes from those sources to the amount of over one and three quarters millions dollars per year as compared with 1928, and this largely increased revenue from special interests has operated for the benefit of our schools, our hospitals, and for the relief of individual taxpayers.

Our Congressmen

We endorse and commend also our Representative in the United States Senate, Hon. H. D. Hatfield, and call attention to the fact that his services have been recognized by the members of his own party in the United States Senate by selection for the leadership of the committee

in charge of the present senatorial campaign; that he was given the responsible duty of conducting the hearings designed to consider and present to the public, the difficulties of the great coal industry in which West Virginia is so intimately concerned, and finally that his efforts in behalf of West Virginia industries in framing the present tariff laws were influential and powerful in securing for those industries a just measure of the protection which the Republican Party aims to give to every American manufacturer, and to every American working man.

We also particularly commend our Republican members of Congress: Hon. Carl G. Bachmann, Hon. Frank L. Bowman, Hon. Hugh Ike Shott, Hon. Robert L. Hogg, as faithful and loyal representatives of the interests of West Virginia. They have served the State well. We believe they will have the hearty endorsement of the people of West Virginia at the polls in November. We urge the election in the Sixth Congressional District of Hon. J. O. Lakin; and the election in the Third Congressional District of Hon. John M. Wolverton.

Primary Reform

We note with no little concern, the growing unwieldiness of the direct primary as operated in this State. In 1928, our party wrote the following primary plank into its platform:

"The primary election law in West Virginia has revealed a number of weaknesses which should be corrected. We recommend to the Legislature of West Virginia the consideration of

measures that will-

"First: Tend to prevent irresponsible persons and notoriety lovers from indiscriminately cluttering up the primary ballot. A reasonable fee should be charged for the privilege of placing a name upon the primary ballot, both in the State and in the counties. The requirement of such a fee would operate to prevent irresponsible candidacies, and would create a substantial source of revenue both to the State and to the counties:

"Second: Steps should be taken, whenever and however possible, to reduce the length of the primary ballot. The principle of the short ballot both in the State and the counties may well be considered by the Legislature as a step in that

direction.

"Third: Under carefully guarded conditions, option should be given to political communities to choose between nomination by primaries or by conventions. In case where provision is made for a convention, the selection of delegates to the same, and the entire procedure of the convention, should be guarded and protected by law as much as the primaries now are.'

Events, we believe, have abundantly vindicated the judgment then expressed, and we now reaffirm this stand and renew the recommendations then made.

State Prohibition

In 1912, the people of West Virginia wrote into their State Constitution, an amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating

liquors in this State.

This is not, and has not been a party question. Men and women of both parties believe in prohibition; men and women of both parties oppose it. We recognize the fact that the prohibition amendment, as it stands in our State Constitution, is the work of our own citizenship, and can only be changed by our own citizenship. West Virginians may change the prohibitory amendment in West Virginia, but no other than West Virginians can.

Our Pledges Made Good

In our platform, adopted at Fairmont in 1928, we referred to the practice which has grown up in some of the State Departments, and State Institutions of allowing certain departments and institutions the full use of certain fees for work done by them without an adequate accounting, and without control by the State Legislature, which is the only constitutional tax collecting and tax distributing power.

At that time we recommended that our Legislature take steps to cause every dollar paid to any state department, or to any state institution, for services rendered, or for fees, to be rigidly accounted for, to be audited by proper authorities, and finally to be turned into the State

Treasury.

Our state administration, under the leadership of Governor William G. Conley, has effected this very valuable reform; a reform which will tend to assure greater economy of administration, and stricter care of public funds.

State Economy

In our platform adopted at Fairmont in 1928, we promised a program of strict economy in State Government. We call attention to the fact that during the past year the expenses of the State Government have been reduced annually over one million dollars; that the State of West Virginia has operated, so far as its government at Charleston is concerned, more economically per capita than the large majority of the other states in the Union. Economies, which Republican legislators, our Governor, and various department heads have helped frame assure a continuance of this program of saving, and we pledge every effort further to cause scientific reorganization and consolidation of the departments of government, State and local, and call attention to the further fact that but 10 cents on the \$100 valuation of taxable property is levied for state purposes and substantially all the proceeds of this levy is returned to the schools of the State in the way of state aid.

Labor

The Republican Party again pledges itself to the principle of freedom in wage contracts and the right of collective bargaining by friendly and responsible agents, representing both parties, and of their own choosing. We believe that there never can be permanent peace in the industrial world without the recognition of the equal rights of both the employer and the employee, and without a free and full opportunity for their representatives to consider all the questions involved in industry and to arrive at a just and equitable conclusion.

Our Colored Citizens

The Republican Party came into being as a defender of the principles of manhood liberty, and manhood equality before the law. It gave the colored man freedom, and the right of franchise. Its purpose and its program in West Virginia has been to give to the colored race, educational and industrial advantages equal to those enjoyed by any other citizens. Under the protection of the Republican legislation, the Negro race in this State has made splendid progress, and we pledge the Republican Party to the continuance of legislation that will protect its privileges and insure to it a further enjoyment of the advantages of equal and just laws.

In particular we endorse the plan of coordinated educational effort, as embraced at West Virginia University, for adoption at the West Virginia Collegiate Institute for Colored Youth, to the end that professional training may be available to the colored youth of West Virginia. In all public work, including highway employment, we pledge to our colored citizens just and equal opportunities of employment.

Agriculture

We pledge our party's aid to the farmers of this State, especially to cooperative marketing and dissemination of information that will aid them in the exchange among themselves and other states of products produced in West Virginia, and information and aid that will help them to combat destructive pests and diseases of garden products, grains, plants, orchards and live stock. We further favor legislation that will promote the effective merchandising of agricultural commodities in intrastate, interstate and foreign commerce, including a farm to market secondary road system, so that agriculture will be placed on the basis of economic equality with other industries. Toward this end, we unqualifiedly endorse the Republican National Platform.

Veterans

The Republican Party has always been the friend of the defenders of the Nation when in peril. We pledge our representatives in Congress to legislation that will continue the hospitalization and rehabilitation of disabled veterans. We favor legislation that will cut out all "red tape"—and aid the veterans and families of veterans who are incapacitated or disabled by illness or injuries, and especially those whose incapacity or disability is attributable to service in defense of their country.

Road Building

We favor the economic and gradual extension of our road system until every rural community in the State shall have hard surfaced roads that will give them ingress and egress the year around.

Coal Industry

We pledge the Republican Party to use every possible effort to rehabilitate the great coal industry of the State in order that the great army of unemployed in this industry may have profitable employment and those who have made investments in this industry may receive adequate returns.

State Parks

We approve the policy of the Republican Party by which there has been set aside for the common good certain areas known as National Forests,—a policy inaugurated and promulgated by the illustrious Theodore Roosevelt, and since consistently followed; we are gratified that, of lands so set aside, a part of West Virginia is today a National Forest Reserve and, believing that within West Virginia there is scenic beauty thus far unknown to millions of people as our neighbors, which, if known, would attract them within our borders.

Therefore: We believe it to be a wise and progressive policy in the development of this area to secure such funds properly as may be

available for this great state asset.

In this connection, we urge continued and further cooperation between the National and State Governments to the end that the economic, conservative and recreational policy of the Republican Party may be properly carried out and developed, and West Virginia be made known to the world.

The Republican Party realizing that the development of the recreational possibilities of our wonderful State will add to our material as well as our aesthetic wealth pledges itself to foster to the fullest extent the restocking of our streams and forests and their protection under proper laws to the end that West Virginia's last great natural resource, its recreational possibilities, may take its rightful place in our business life.

The Depression

We realize that a period of world-wide depression, such as this, and every other industrial country are going through, causes unrest. One of its immediate effects is to loosen party ties and party moorings. Undoubtedly a very large number of honest and thoughtful men and women, who have hitherto voted the Republican ticket, have raised the question in their own minds as to the advisability of voting for some

kind of a change.

To all of these we beg to say that the period of depression through which we have been going is the legitimate result of the World War, and the over-speculation which followed it. The paralysis of industry is universal. Severe as it has been in this country, it has been more severe this is a world-wide ordeal, and we confidently believe that the business leadership of the Republican Party, the policies which built up the prosperity of this country in the years past and have developed the greatest industrialism and the highest standard of living that are found among men, will furnish the wisdom to lead the American people from the present difficulty, and on to a higher plane of prosperity.

Abraham Lincoln, one of the wisest of men, proclaimed the homely maxim that it was not a good thing to swap horses while crossing a stream. It will not be a good thing for the American people in this year of 1932, when all signs point to an early beginning of better days, to forsake the leadership that so far guided them, and to place in positions of power and influence, untried leaders with new and untried policies. We confidently predict that the sound thought of the American

policies. We considertly predict that the sound thought of the American people, which has always guided this country safely through emergencies, and times of stress, will as in the years past, approve of the policies of the Republican Party and they will register their continued confidence in this great national organization, which has served them so well through so many years of their past history.

We confidently look for the election of Herbert Hoover to the Presidency in November. We look for the election of a Republican Congress, and in the State of West Virginia we look for the election of Thomas C. Townsend to the Governorship, and for a State Administration and Legislature that will translate his policies into the law of the land. West Virginia, originally a part of Virginia, was admitted to the Union as the thirty-fifth State in June, 1863. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 1,729,205, which represents an increase of 265,504, or 18.1 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. The total land area of the State, is 24,022 square miles; water, 148 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 72, as compared with 60.9 in 1920.

The following table shows the population of West Virginia from 1870 to 1930, inclusive, together with the increase in each decade. The population at each census prior to 1870 of that part of Virginia which was latter taken to form West Virginia, was as follows: 1860, 376,688; 1850, 302,313; 1840, 224,537; 1830, 176,924; 1820, 136,808; 1810, 105,469; 1800, 78,592; 1790, 55,573.

Counties and minor civil divisions.—In the tables which follow the population of West Virginia is shown by counties, magisterial districts, cities, towns, and villages, with some comparative figures from previous crasuses Of the counties is West Virginia, 36 have increased in population since 1920 and 19 have decreased.

Gitles of 10,000 or more.—There are 10 cities in the State which had a population of 10,000 or more in 1930. Huntington, with a population of 75,572, is the largest city in the State. Wheeling, with a population of 61,659, is the second city in West Virginia, and is closely followed by Charleston, the capital, with a population of 60,408. Other important cities in the order of their population are Parkersburg, Clarksburg, Fairmont, Bluefield, Morgantown, Martinsburg, and Moundsville. The combined population of Bluefield, W. Va., and the neighboring town of Bluefield, Va., is 23,245.

Minor civil divisions.—The primary divisions of the counties of West Virginia are termed "magisterial districts." These magisterial districts include the secondary divisions, which are incorporated as cities, towns, or villages. The following table shows the population of each county by magisterial districts, cities, towns, and villages for the last three censuses. The population of the secondary divisions is shown in boldface under the population of the magisterial districts in which they are respectively situated. Several of the cities are coextensive with the magisterial districts in which they are located, and some of the larger cities comprise two or more districts or parts of districts. Where an incorporated place occupies parts of two districts, the total population of the place is given in connection with the presentation for the first district.

Wheeling, with a population of 61,659, is the second city in West Virginia, and is closely followed by Charleston, the capital, with a population of 60,408. Other important cities in the order of their populations are Parkersburg, Clarksburg, Fairmont, Bluefield, Morgantown, Martinsburg, and Moundsville. The combined population of Bluefield W.. Va., and the neighboring town of Bluefield, Va., is 23,245.

Farm Population.—The farm population as shown for 1930 comprises all persons living on farms, without regard to occupation. The farm population figures for 1920 include, in addition, those farm lab rers (and their families) who, while not living on farms, nevertheless lived in strictly rural territery outside the limits of any city or other incorporated place. Though the number of additional persons thus included is believed not to have been very great, some allowance should be made for the fact that the 1920 census was taken in January, when considerable numbers of farm laborers and others scually living on farms were temporarily absent, while the 1930 census was taken in April, when by reason of the advancing season the number of persons on the farms was appreciably larger.

Urban and rural areas.—Urban population, as defined by the Census Bureau, is in general that residing in cities and other incorporated places having 2,500 inhabitants or more, the rem-

UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

RFC AND CWA

A total of \$18,371,817.70 was made available up to January 1, 1934, by the RFC and the CWA for use by the unemployed in West Virginia. In addition to this amount, two grants have been made, one for \$76,000, paid to the State Superintendent of Free Schools for educational purposes, and the other for \$6,000, paid to the Craftsman's Association. In addition to these amounts, with payrolls from three counties not yet reported, treasury checks for wages and materials were issued in the total amount of \$2,145,078.84 for the period from November 16, 1933, to January 1, 1934.



FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT

FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT, (D), of Hyde Park, New York, President of the United States, was born January 30, 1882, son of Janes and Sara (Delano) Roosevelt; A. B., Harvard, 1904; Columbia University Law School, 1904-1907; married Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, of New York, March 17, 1905; children—James, Anna, Elliott, Franklin D., John A.; was admitted to the New York bar in 1907; practiced with Carter, Ledyard & Milburn, New York, 1907-1910; member of firm of Roosevelt & O'Connor, 1924-1933; member of New York Senate, 1910, to March 17, 1913 (resigned): Assistant Secretary of Navy, 1913-1920; Democratic nominee for Vice President of the United States in 1920; elected Governor of New York in 1928, and reelected in 1930; Episcopalian; president of the Georgia Warm Spring Foundation; in charge of the inspection of United States naval forces in European waters, July-September, 1918, and of demobilization in Europe, January-February, 1919; member of Naval History Society, New York Historical Society, Holland Society, Alpha Delta Phi, Phi Beta Kappa; Mason, Clubs: Harvard, Knickerbocker, Century, Legal residence: Hyde Park, Dutchess County, New York, Elected President, November 8, 1932.

JOHN NANCE GARNER, (D), of Ulvade, Texas, Vice President of the United States, was elected to the Fifty-eighth, Fifty-ninth, Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, Sixty-fifth, Sixty-sixth, Sixty-second, Sixty-eighth, Sixty-ninth, Seventieth, Seventy-first, and Seventy-second Congresses; elected Speaker of the House December 7, 1931; reelected to the Seventy-third Congress, but resigned, having been elected Vice President of the United States November 8, 1932.




MATTHEW M. NEELY United States Senator

MATTHEW M. NEELY, (D), of Fairmont, was born at Grove, Doddridge Younty, son of Alfred and Mary (Morris) Neely; served in the West Virginia Volunteer Infantry throughout the Spanish-American War; was graduated from the academi and law departments of West Virginia University; admitted to the Marion ounty Bar in 1902, and since that time has been continuously ngaged in the practice of law at Fairmont; was married, October 21, 1903, to Miss Alberta Claire Ramage, of Fairmont; they have two sons—Alfred R. Neely, and John Champ Neely, and one daughter, Corrine Neely; mayor of Fairmont, 190-1910; clerk of the House of Delegates of West Virginia, 1911-1913; was elected to the Sixty-third Congress. October 14, 1913, to fill an unexpired term; reelected to the Sixty-fourth, Sixty-fifth, and Sixty-sixth Congresses; elected United States Senator in 1922; unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1928; again elected to the United States Senate in 1930 for the term expiring in 1937.



Bachman, Republican, 55,023 votes, and Henry L. Franklin, Socialist, 933 votes.




JENNINGS RANDOLPH Congressman from the Second District



Hornor, deceased, defeating Howard M. Gore, (R), by a majority of 5,636.

B.; began the practice of law at Martinsburg, but later moved to Parkersburg, and has practiced there ever since; has served as referee in bankruptcy, and as general counsel for the West Virginia Public Service Commission; married Mary A. McKendree, who was the nominee on the Democratic ticket for Congress in 1930; they have two children—Mildred Elizabeth Johnson and George McKendree Johnson; member of the Sixty-eighth Congress; elected to the Seventy-third Congress from the Fourth Congressional District in 1932, defeating Robert L. Hogg, (R), by a majority of 5, 55 votes.

By an act of the legislature passed September 10, 1863, the State of West Virginia—for the purposes of congressional representation—was divided into three districts, as follows:

First District—Hancock, Brooke, Ohio, Marshall, Wetzel, Tyler, Pleasants, Doddridge, Harrison, Ritchie, Wood, Wirt, Gilmer, Calhoun and Lewis counties. Second District—Taylor, Marion, Monongalia, Preston, Tucker, Barbour, Upshur, Webster, Pocahontas, Randolph, Pendleton, Hardy, Hampshire, Berkeley and Morgan counties.




