INTRODUCTION

In this edition of the Blue Book an effort has again been made to compile a volume to be used for the most part as a reference book for the state of West Virginia. The arrangement is similar to that used in former editions, the contents being presented insofar as practicable in alphabetical form.

In the municipal section there is shown for the first time condensed information concerning the origin of names of incorporated cities, towns and villages within the state and dates when these various municipalities were originally chartered.

Municipal, county, state and federal registers have been carefully revised and corrected to a date late in the year 1936. It will be noted that a revision has also been made in the areas of all counties, the information being broken down into magisterial districts.

The early history of West Virginia is so closely identified with the history of Virginia that it is deemed a matter of general public interest to include the complete list of all the governors of Virginia from 1584 to and including the administration of John Letcher, who served as governor of that state during the Civil War. This list has been compiled from information furnished by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, Virginia.

In the political section will be found the unofficial general election returns of 1936. The names of circuit judges, assessors, prosecuting attorneys and sheriffs *elect* will also be found in this section.

The editor is deeply appreciative of the cooperation of all public officials and private citizens who have responded so wholeheartedly to requests for information and aid in the compilation of the 1936 edition of the Blue Book.

STATE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Under Chapter 30, article one, Code 1931, all boards of examination and registration are governed by the following general rules, unless otherwise specifically provided:

Each board is required to adopt an official seal, make such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it deems best, and hold at least two meetings each year.

Each board is given power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and its officers have power to administer oaths.

Every applicant for license or registration must transmit with his application an examination fee of twenty dollars, unless a different fee is especially provided by law. Each board is allowed to charge five dollars for each license or certificate issued and the same sum for every duplicate thereof.

All licenses or certificates of registration are required to be numbered serially and to be signed by a majority of the members of the board.

Each board has power to revoke, for cause, the certificate it issues.

An applicant who has been refused a license, or a licensee whose certificate has been revoked, has the right of appeal from the action of the board to the Circuit Court of the county in which he resides.

Members, unless otherwise specified, are allowed ten (\$10.00) dollars per day for each day actually spent in attending sessions of the board or of its committees and in necessary travel, and are entitled to reimbursement for all actual and necessary expenses in carrying out their official duties.

Each board is required to make a report annually to the Governor on or before the first day of January.

The secretary of each board is required to prepare and maintain a complete roster of all persons licensed or registered by it.

(References are to the 1931 code.)

BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF ACCOUNTANTS

Created 1911; non-partisan; composed of three certified public accountants who have been in active practice in West Virginia for at least five years; appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate; term, three years; elects own officers; members eligible for reappointment; duties, to conduct examinations of applicants for certificates as certified public accountants; self-sustaining from examination fees. (Code 30-9.)

STATE BOARD OF AERONAUTICS

Created by Chapter 4, Acts 1981; to consist of three members, to be appointed by the Governor for a term of two years, and to serve without compensation; bi-partisan; board to have general supervision and control over all airports and landing fields used for commercial purposes and over all state, county and municipal airports, schools of aviation and all other phases of aerial activities.

AGRICULTURAL ADVISORY BOARD

Created in 1923; consists of the Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture and the Director of the Agricultural Extension Division of the West Virginia University, ex-offici; board to meet at the seat of government at least four times each year at regular intervals, to consider the conditions and needs of the agricultural interests of the state and to prevent overlapping, duplication or interference of, by or with the work of one department of agriculture with that of the other. (Code, 19-1-9.)

BOARD OF EXAMINERS AND REGISTRATION OF ARCHITECTS

Consists of five members, appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the senate, for a term of five years; must be architects of not fewer than ten years active practice in West Virginia; all members eligible for reappointment; non-partisan. This board examines all applicants for the practice of architecture in the state and registers successful applicants. (Code. 30-12.)

STATE ARMORY BOARD

Consists of the Governor, Secretary of State and State Auditor; duties to approve the selection of all armory sites and plans and specifications, to contract for the erection of all armories, for the purchase of buildings suitable for armories; to have control of all arsenals, armories or other quarters of the national guard, camp grounds and rifle ranges owned by the state; may procure by purchase or condemnation armories, arsenals, camp grounds, etc.; when state reimbursed, may transfer title of camp grounds and rifle ranges to United States.

STATE ATHLETIC COMMISSION

Created under Chapter 3, Acts 1931; to consist of three members to be appointed by the Governor, for a term of three years; bi-partisan; no two to be residents of the same county at the same time; to serve without compensation; the commission to have sole direction, management and jurisdiction over all boxing, wrestling and sparring matches and exhibitions held within the state; to license clubs, corporations or associations to hold such matches or exhibitions and to appoint all referees.

STATE COMMITTEE OF BARBERS AND BEAUTICIANS

Created under Chapter 82, Acts Second Extraordinary Session, 1933; non-partisan; not salaried; composed of the commissioner of health, ex-officio, and four other members to be appointed by the Governor by and with the consent of the senate, for a term of four years, one such member to be an employing barber, one an employee barber, one an employing beautician and one an employee beautician, and one of the four to be a member of the colored race; committee to examine all applicants for certificates of registration, issue certificates, collect examination and registration fees and promulgate rules and regulations covering the operation of barber and beauty shops and schools of barbering and beauty culture.

CARNIFEX FERRY BATTLE GROUND PARK COMMISSION

Created under Chapter 9, Acts 1931; commission to consist of three members, appointed by the Governor for a term of four years; to serve without compensation; commission authorized to examine, survey and locate lines for a state park, in Nicholas County, opposite the mouth of Meadow River, said site to include the location of the battery, rifle pits and terrain upon which the battle of Carnifex Forry was fought in the Civil War; commission is authorized to procure options, contract for the payment of the purchase price, survey and place battle-ground markers at a cost not to exceed five thousand dollars; vacancles on commission to be filled by the Governor.

Bi-partisan; salaried; sustained by appropriation; composed of the State Superintendent of Schools, ex-officio, and six members appointed by the Governor with the consent of the senate; length of term, six years; vacancy filled by appointment by the Governor for unexpired term; offices located at the State Capitol by statute; has general control and management of educational affairs

of all State educational institutions except West Virginia University; State Superintendent is chief executive officer of Board; elects own officers. (Code, 18-2.)

WEST VIRGINIA NEGRO BOARD OF EDUCATION

Composed of the State Superintendent of Schools, ex-officio, the State Supervisor of Negro Schools (secretary) and two members of the Negro race, appointed by the Governor with the consent of the senate; appointees under act take office July 1, 1934, one serving for a term of four years and one for a term of two years, appointees thereafter to serve for a term of four years; salaried; has general control, management and supervision, with the State Board of Education, of Negro schools in the state; act abolishes advisory council to State Board of Education. Created 1897; composed of the Governor, the Treasurer, President of the State University, Commissioner of Agriculture, and Director of the West Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station; has general charge of survey and of all employees; objects of survey, to ascertain quantities and locations of construction materials such as ores, clays, building stones; to classify soils, examine timber lands with reference to utilization, examine physical features with reference to their bearing upon the development of the state; to prepare special geological and economic maps and to ascertain best methods of utilization of natural resources in prevention of waste. PUBLIC LAND CORPORATION OF WEST VIRGINIA

ARTICLE I

Relations to the Government of the United States

1. The State of West Virginia is, and shall remain, one of the United States of America. The Constitution of the United States of America, and the laws and treaties made in pursuance thereof, shall be the supreme law of the land.

Internal Government and Police

2. The government of the United States is a government of enumerated powers, and all powers not delegated to it, nor inhibited to the States, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof. Among the powers so reserved to the States is the exclusive regulation of their own internal government and police; and it is the high and solemn duty of the several departments of government, created by this Constitution, to guard and protect the people of this State from all encroachments upon the rights so reserved.

Continuity of Constitutional Operation

3. The provisions of the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, are operative alike in a period of war as in times of peace, and any departure therefrom, or violation thereof, under the plea of necessity, or any other plea, is subversive of good government, and tends to anarchy and despetism.

Representatives to Congress

4. For the election of representatives to congress, the State shall be divided into districts, corresponding in number with the representatives to which it may be entitled; which districts shall be formed of contiguous counties, and be compact. Each district shall contain, as nearly as may be, an equal number of population, to be determined according to the rule prescribed in the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE II

The State

1. The territory of the following counties, formerly parts of the Commonwealth of Virginia, shall constitute and form the State of West Virginia, viz: The counties of Barbour, Berkeley, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Calhoun, Clay, Doddridge, Fayette, Gilmer, Grant, Greenbrier, Hampshire, Hancock, Hardy, Harrison, Jackson, Jefferson, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Marshall, Mason, McDowell, Mercer, Mineral, Monongalia, Monroe, Morgan, Nicholas, Ohio, Pendleton, Pleasants, Pocahontas, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Randolph, Ritchie, Roane, Summers, Taylor, Tucker, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Webster, Wetzel, Wirt, Wood and Wyoming. The State of West Virginia includes the bed, bank and shores of the Ohio River, and so much of the Big Sandy River as was formerly included in the Commonwealth of Virginia; in all territorial rights and property in, and jurisdiction over the same, heretofore reserved by, and vested in, the Commonwealth of Virginia, are vested in and shall hereafter be exercised by the State of West Virginia. And such parts of the said beds, banks and shores as lie opposite, and adjoining the several counties of this State, shall form parts of said several counties respectively.

[All of the territory of West Virginia was taken from the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the first constitution forty-four of the above named counties were designated as forming the State of West Virginia, and in addition the counties of Berkeley, Hampshire, Hardy, Jefferson, Morgan and Pendleton were to be admitted should the constitution be adopted by a vote of the people of the districts comprising the counties. The districts adopted the constitution and these six counties became part of the state.

The remaining five counties were created by acts of the legislature as follows: Mineral County, from Hampshire County, on February 1, 1866; Grant County, from Hardy County, on February 14, 1866; Lincoln County, from parts of Cabell, Putnam, Kanawha and Boone Counties, on February 21, 1867; Summers County, from parts of Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer and Fayette Counties, on February 27, 1871; and Mingo County, from Logan County, on February 23, 1895.]

Powers of Government in Citizens

2. The powers of government reside in all the citizens of the State, and can be rightfully exercised only in accordance with their will and appointment.

Requisites of Citizenship

3. All persons residing in this State, born, or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, shall be citizens of this State.

Equal Representation

4. Every citizen shall be entitled to equal representation in the government, and, in all apportionments of representation, equality of numbers of those entitled thereto shall, as far as practicable, be preserved.

Provisions Regarding Property

5. No distinction shall be made between resident aliens and citizens as to the acquisition, tenure, disposition or descent of property.

Treason, What Constitutes-Penalty

6. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, or in adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court. Treason shall be punished according to the character of the acts committed, by the infliction of one, or more, of the penalties of death, imprisonment or fine, as may be prescribed by law.

"Montani Semper Liberi"-State Seal

7. The present seal of the State, with its motto, "Montani Semper Liberi," shall be the great seal of the State of West Virginia, and shall be kept by the Secretary of State, to be used by him officially, as directed by law.

Writs, Commissions, Official Bonds-Indictments

8. Writs, grants and commissions, issued under the authority of this State, shall run in the name of, and official bonds shall be made payable to the State of West Virginia. Indictments shall conclude, "Against the peace and dignity of the State."

ARTICLE III

Bill of Rights

1. All men are, by nature, equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, of which, when they enter into a state of society, they cannot, by any compact, deprive or divest their posterity, namely: the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and of pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

Magistrates Servants of People

2. All power is vested in, and consequently derived from the people. Magistrates are their trustees and servants, and at all times amenable to them.

Rights Reserved to People

3. Government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the people, nation or community. Of all its various forms, that is the best which is capable of producing the greatest degree of happiness and safety, and is most effectually secured against the danger of maladministration; and when any government shall be found inadequate or contrary to these purposes, a majority of the community has an indubitable, inalienable and indefeasible right to reform, alter or abolish it in such manner as shall be judged most conducive to the public weal.

Writ of Habeas Corpus

4. The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended. No person shall be held to answer for treason, felony or other crime, not cognizable by a justice, unless on presentment or indictment of a grand jury. No bill of attainder, ex-post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of a contract, shall be passed.

Excessive Bail Not Required

5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted. Penalties shall be proportioned to the character and degree of the offense. No person shall be transported out of, or forced to leave the State for any offense committed within the same; nor shall any person, in any criminal case, be compelled to be a witness against himself, or be twice put in jeopardy of life or liberty for the same offense.

Unreasonable Search and Seizure Prohibited

6. The rights of the citizens to be secure in their houses, persons, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. No warrant shall issue except upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized.

Freedom of Speech and Press Guaranteed

7. No law abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, shall be passed; but the Legislature may, by suitable penalties, restrain the publication or sale of obscene books, papers, or pictures, and provide for the punishment of libel, and defamation of character, and for the recovery, in civil actions, by the aggrieved party, of suitable damages for such libel, or defamation.

Relating to Civil Suits for Libel

8. In prosecutions and civil suits for libel, the truth may be given in evidence; and if it shall appear to the jury, that the matter charged as libelous is true, and was published with good motives, and for justifiable ends, the verdict shall be for the defendant.

Private Property, How Taken

9. Private property shall not be taken or damaged for public use, without just compensation; nor shall the same be taken by any company, incorporated for the purpose of internal improvement, until just compensation shall have been paid, or secured to be paid, to the owner; and when private property shall be taken, or damaged, for public use, or for the use of such corporations, the compensation to the owner shall be ascertained in such manner as may be prescribed by general law: Provided, That when required by either of the parties, such compensation shall be ascertained by an impartial jury of twelve freeholders.

Safeguards for Life, Liberty and Property

10. No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, and the judgment of his peers.

Political Tests Condemned

11. Political tests, requiring persons, as a prerequisite to the enjoyment of their civil and political rights, to purge themselves by their own oaths, of past alleged offenses, are repugnant to the principles of free government, and are cruel and oppressive. No religious or political test oath shall be required as a prerequisite or qualification to vote, serve as a juror, sue, plead, appeal, or pursue any profession or employment. Nor shall any person be deprived by law of any right, or privilege, because of any act done prior to the passage of such law.

Military Subordinate to Civil Power

12. Standing armies, in time of peace, should be avoided as dangerous to liberty. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power; and no citizen, unless engaged in the military service of the State, shall be tried or punished by any military court, for any offense that is cognizable by the civil courts of the State. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, except in the manner to be prescribed by law.

Right of Jury Trial

13. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy exceeds twenty dollars exclusive of interest and costs, the right of trial by jury, if required by either party, shall be preserved; and in such suit before a justice a jury may consist of six persons. No fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any case than according to the rules of the common law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy, exclusive of interest and costs, exceeds twenty dollars, the right of trial by a jury of twelve men, if required by either

party, shall be preserved; except that in appeals from judgments of justices, a jury of a less number may be authorized by law; but in trials of civil cases before a justice no jury shall be allowed and no fact tried by a jury shall in any case be otherwise re-examined than according to the rules of common law." The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of March 7, 1879, and was adopted at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,482; against ratification, 34,073; majority, 22,409.]

Trial of Crimes-Provisions in Interest of Accused

14. Trials of crimes, and misdemeanors, unless herein otherwise provided, shall be by a jury of twelve men, public, without unreasonable delay, and in the county where the alleged offense was committed, unless upon petition of the accused, and for good cause shown, it is removed to some other county. In all such trials, the accused shall be fully and plainly informed of the character and cause of the accusation, and be confronted with the witnesses against him, and shall have the assistance of counsel, and a reasonable time to prepare for his defense; and there shall be awarded to him compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor.

Religious Freedom Guaranteed

15. No man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place or ministry whatsoever; nor shall any man be enforced, restrained, molested or burthened, in his body or goods, or otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief, but all men shall be free to profess, and, by argument, to maintain their opinions in matters of religion; and the same shall, in no wise, affect, diminish or enlarge their civil capacities; and the legislature shall not prescribe any religious test whatever, or confer any peculiar privileges or advantages on any sect or denomination, or pass any law requiring or authorizing any religious society, or the people of any district within this State, to levy on themselves, or others, any tax for the erection or repair of any house for public worship, or for the support of any church or ministry, but it shall be left free for every person to select his religious instructor, and to make for his support such private contract as he shall please.

Right of Public Assembly Held Inviolate

16. The right of the people to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for the common good, to instruct their representatives, or to apply for redress of grievances, shall be held inviolate.

Courts Open to All-Justice Administered Speedily

17. The courts of this State shall be open, and every person, for an injury done to him, in his person, property or reputation, shall have remedy by due course of law; and justice shall be administered without sale, denial or delay.

Conviction Not to Work Corruption of Blood or Forfeiture

18. No conviction shall work corruption of blood or forfeiture of estate.

Hereditary Emoluments, Etc., Provided Against

19. No hereditary emoluments, honors or privileges shall ever be granted or conferred in this State.

Preservation of Free Government

20. Free government and the blessings of liberty can be preserved to any people only by a firm adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, frugality and virtue, and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles.

ARTICLE IV

Elections and Officers

1. The *male citizen of the State shall be entitled to vote at all elections held within the counties in which they respectively reside; but no person who is a minor, or of unsound mind, or a pauper, or who is under conviction of treason, felony, or bribery in an election, or who has not been a resident of the State for one year, and of the county in which he offers to vote, for sixty days next preceding such offer, shall be permitted to vote while such disability continues; but no person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be deemed a resident of this State by reason of being stationed therein.

Mode of Voting by Ballot

2. In all elections by the people, the mode of voting shall be by ballot; but the voter shall be free to vote by either open, sealed or secret ballot, as he may elect.

Voter Not Subject to Arrest on Civil Process

3. No voter, during the continuance of an election at which he is entitled to vote, or during the time necessary and convenient for going to and returning from the same, shall be subject to arrest upon civil process, or be compelled to attend any court, or judicial proceeding, as suitor, juror or witness; or to work upon the public roads or except in time of war or public danger to render military service.

Persons Entitled to Hold Office-Age Requirements

4. No person, except citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected or appointed to any State, county or municipal office; but the Governor and Judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the Attorney General and Senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the State for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens at the time this Constitution goes into operation.

Oath or Affirmation to Support the Constitution

5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, before proceeding to exercise the authority, or discharge the duties thereof, shall make oath or affirmation that he will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, and that he will faithfully discharge the duties of his said office to the best of his skill and judgment; and no other oath, declaration, or test shall be required as a qualification, unless herein otherwise provided.

Provisions for Removal of Officials

6. All officers elected or appointed under this Constitution, may, unless in cases herein otherwise provided for, be removed from office for official misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, or gross immorality, in such manner as may be prescribed by general law, and unless so removed they shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices until their successors are elected, or appointed and qualified.

^{*}The woman suffrage amendment to the Constitution of the United States, declared in force August 26, 1920, provides that "the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

General Elections, When Held-Terms of Officials

7. The general elections of State and county officers, and of members of the legislature, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, until otherwise provided by law. The terms of such officers, not elected, or appointed to fill a vacancy, shall, unless herein otherwise provided, begin, on the first day of January; and of the members of the Legislature, on the first day of December next succeeding their election. Elections to fill vacancies, shall be for the unexpired term. When vacancies occur prior to any general election, they shall be filled by appointments in such manner as may be prescribed herein, or by general law, which appointments shall expire at such time after the next general election as the person so elected to fill such vacancy shall be qualified.

[The original section provided that the general election should be held on "the second Tuesday of October," and the change was made in order that the election of state officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. election of state officers would fall on the same day as the presidential election. The original section also provided that the terms of office of members of the legislature should begin on the first day of November next succeeding their election, but the amendment provided that the term should begin on the first day of December.

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by joint resolution of February 21, 1883, and ratified at the general election in 1884. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 66,181; against ratification, 25,422; majority, 40,759 []

40,759.]

Further Provisions Regarding State's Officers and Agents

8. The Legislature, in cases not provided for in this constitution, shall prescribe, by general laws, the terms of office, powers, duties and compensation of all public officers and agents, and the manner in which they shall be elected, appointed and removed.

Impeachment of Officials

9. Any officer of the State may be impeached for maladministration, corruption, incompetency, gross immorality, neglect of duty, or any high crime or misdemeanor. The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of Impeach-The Senate shall have the sole power to try impeachments and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto. When sitting as a court of impeachment, the President of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or, if from any cause it be improper for him to act, then any other judge of that court, to be designated by it, shall preside; and the Senators shall be on oath or affirmation, to do justice according to law and evidence. Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from oilice and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under the State; but the party convicted shall be llable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law. The Senate may sit during the recess of the Legislature for the trial of impeachments.

Fighting of Duels Prohibited

10. Any citizen of this State, who shall, after the adoption of this Consituation, either in, or out of the State, fight a duel with deadly weapons, or send or accept a challenge so to do, or who shall act as a second or knowingly aid or assist in such duel, shall, ever thereafter, he incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this state.

Safeguards for Ballots

11. The Legislature shall prescribe the manner of conducting and making returns of elections, and of determining contested elections; and shall pass such laws as may be necessary and proper to prevent intimidation, disorder or violence at the polls, and corruption or fraud in voting, counting the vote, ascertaining or declaring the result, or fraud in any manner upon the ballot,

Registration Laws Provided For

12. The Legislature shall enact proper laws for the registration of all qualified voters in this State.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "No citizen shall ever be denied or refused the right or privilege of voting at an election because his name is not or has not been registered or listed as a qualified voter."

The amendment was proposed by joint resolution of February 22, 1901, and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 55,196; against ratification, 25,379; majority, 29,817.]

ARTICLE V

Division of Powers

1. The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Departments shall be separate and distinct, so that neither shall exercise the powers properly belonging to either of the others; nor shall any person exercise the powers of more than one of them at the same time, except that justices of the peace shall be eligible to the Legislature.

ARTICLE VI

Legislature

1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Delegates, The style of their Acts shall be, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia."

Composition of Senate and House of Delegates

2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four, and the House of Delegates of sixty-five members subject to be increased according to the provisions hereinafter contained.

[The Senate is now composed of thirty, and the House of Delegates of ninetyfour members.]

Senators and Delegates—Terms of Office

3. Senators shall be elected for the term of four years, and Delegates for the term of two years. The Senators first elected shall divide themselves into two classes, one Senator from every district being assigned to each class; and of these classes, the first to be designated by lot in such manner as the Senate may determine, shall hold their seats for two years, and the second for four years, so that after the first election, one-half of the Senators shall be elected biennially.

Division of State Into Senatorial Districts

4. For the election of Senators, the State shall be divided into twelve Senatorial Districts, which number shall not be diminished, but may be increased as hereinafter provided. Every district shall elect two Senators, but, where the district is composed of more than one county, both shall not be chosen from the same county. The districts shall be compact, formed of contiguous territory, bounded by county lines, and, as nearly as practicable, equal in population, to be ascertained by the consus of the United States. After every such census, the Legislature shall alter the Senatorial Districts, so far as may be necessary to make them conform to the foregoing provision.

[There are now fifteen senatorial districts, as provided by Acts 1901, Ch. 101.]

Senatorial Districts Designated

5. Until the Senatorial Districts shall be altered by the Legislature as herein prescribed, the counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, shall constitute the first Senatorial District; Marshall, Wetzel and Marlon, the second; Ritchie, Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Calhoun, the third; Tyler, Pleasants, Wood and Wirt, the fourth; Jackson, Mason, Putnam and Roane, the fifth; Kanawha, Clay, Nicholas, Braxton and Webster, the sixth; Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln, Boone, Logan, Wyoming, McDowell and Mercer, the seventh; Monroe, Greenbrier, Summers, Pocahontas, Fayette and Raleigh, the eighth; Lewis, Randolph, Upshur, Barbour, Taylor and Tucker, the ninth; Preston and Monongalia, the tenth; Hampshire, Mineral, Hardy, Grant and Pendleton, the eleventh; Berkeley, Morgan and Jefferson, the twelfth.

[By the provisions of the reapportionment act of 1901 (Acts 1901, ch. 10) the number of Senatorial Districts was increased to fifteen, the number of Senators to thirty, and the counties rearranged in the various districts.]

Provision for Delegate Representation

6. For the election of Delegates, every county containing a population of less than three-fifths of the ratio of representation for the House of Delegates, shall, at each apportionment, be attached to some contiguous county or counties, to form a Delegate District.

[By the provisions of the Acts of 1901, Ch. 10, the House of Delegates consisted of eighty-six members, each county having at least one member. Since the general election of 1916, the House of Delegates has consisted of ninety-four members, each county having at least one member. See Ch. 30, p. 270, Acts 1915, Regular Session.]

Delegate Apportionment After Census

7. After every census the Delegates shall be apportioned as follows: The ratio of representation for the House of Delegates shall be ascertained by dividing the whole population of the State by the number of which the House is to consist and rejecting the fraction of a unit, if any, resulting from such division. Dividing the population of every Delegate District, and of every county not included in a delegate district, by the ratio thus ascertained, there shall be assigned to each a number of Delegates equal to the quotient obtained by this division, excluding the fractional remainder. The additional Delegates necessary to make up the number of which the House is to consist, shall then be assigned to those Delegate Districts, and counties not included in a Delegate District, which would otherwise have the largest fractions unrepresented; but every Delegate District and county not included in a Delegate District shall be entitled to at least one Delegate.

Designation of Delegate Districts

8. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the counties of Pleasants and Wood shall form the first Delegate District, and elect three Delegates; Ritchie and Calhoun the second, and elect two Delegates; Barbour, Harrison and Taylor the third, and elect one Delegate; Randolph and Tucker the fourth, and elect one Delegate; Nicholas, Clay and Webster the fifth, and elect one Delegate; McDowell and Wyoming the sixth, and elect one Delegate.

[There are now no delegate districts, each county having at least one member.]

Further Apportionments

9. Until a new apportionment shall be declared, the apportionment of Delegates to the counties not included in Delegate Districts, and to Barbour, Harrison and Taylor counties, embraced in such district, shall be as follows:

To Barbour, Boone, Braxton, Brooke, Cabell, Doddridge, Fayette, Hampshire, Hancock, Jackson, Lewis, Logan, Greenbrier, Monroe, Mercer, Mineral, Morgan, Grant, Hardy, Lincoln, Pendleton, Putnam, Roane, Gilmer, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Wayne, Wetzel, Wirt, Pocahontas, Summers and Raleigh counties, one Delegate each.

To Berkeley, Harrison, Jefferson, Marlon, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia and Preston counties, two Delegates each.

To Kanawha County, three Delegates.

To Ohio County, four Delegates.

[Many changes have been made in this apportionment. Kanawha County, the largest in population, now has eight delegates.]

Arrangement of Senatorial and Delegate Districts

10. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Delegate Districts, and apportionment of Delegates, shall hereafter be declared by law, as soon as possible after each succeeding census, taken by authority of the United States. When so declared they shall apply to the first general election for members of the Legislature, to be thereafter held, and shall continue in force unchanged, until such Districts shall be altered, and Delegates apportioned, under the succeeding census.

Additional Territory May Be Admitted Into State

11. Additional territory may be admitted into, and become part of this State, with the consent of the Legislature and a majority of the qualified voters of the State, voting on the question. And in such case provision shall be made by law for the representation thereof in the Senate and House of Delegates, in conformity with the principles set forth in this Constitution. And the number of members of which each house of the Legislature is to consist, shall thereafter be increased by the representation assigned to such additional territory.

Residence Requirements for Senators and Delegates

12. No person shall be a Senator or Delegate who has not for one year next preceding his election, been a resident within the District or county from which he is elected; and if a Senator or Delegate remove from the District or County for which he was elected, his seat shall be thereby vacated.

Eligibility to Seat in Legislature

13. No person holding a lucrative office under this State, the United States, or any foreign government; no member of Congress; no person who is a salaried officer of any railroad company, or who is sheriff, constable, or clerk of any court of record, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature.

Bribery Conviction Forfeits Eligibility

14. No person who has been, or hereafter shall be convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crimes, shall be eligible to a seat in the Legislature. No person who may have collected or been entrusted with public money, whether State, county, township, district, or other municipal organization, shall be cligible to the Legislature, or to any office of honor, trust, or profit in this State, until he shall have duly accounted for and paid over such money according to law.

Senators and Delegates Not to Hold Civil Office of Profit

15. No Senator or Delegate, during the term for which he shall have been elected, shall be elected or appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which has been created, or the emoluments of which have been increased during such term, except offices to be filled by election by the people. Nor shall

any member of the Legislature be interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he shall have been elected.

Oath of Senators and Delegates

16. Members of the Legislature before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of West Virginia, and faithfully discharge the duties of Senator (or Delegate) according to the best of my ability;" and they shall also take this further oath, to-wit: "I will not accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any money or other valuable thing, from any corporation, company, or person for any vote or influence I may give or withhold, as Senator (or Delegate), on any bill, resolution, or appropriation, or for any act I may do or perform as Senator (or Delegate)." These oaths shall be administered in the hall of the house to which the member is elected, by a Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals, or of a Circuit Court, or by any other person authorized by law to administer an oath; and the Secretary of State shall record and file said oaths subscribed by each member; and no other oath or declaration shall be required as a qualification. Any member who shall refuse to take the oath herein prescribed, shall forfeit his seat; and any member who shall be convicted of having violated the oath last above required to be taken, shall forfeit his seat and be disqualified thereafter from holding any office of profit or trust in this State.

Members of Legislature Privileged from Civil Arrest

17. Members of the Legislature shall, in all cases except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the session, and for ten days before and after the same: and for words spoken in debate, or any report, motion or proposition made in either house, a member shall not be questioned in any other place.

Time of Assembly of Legislature

18. The Legislature shall assesmble at the seat of government biennially, and not oftener, unless convened by the Governor. The first session of the Legislature, after the adoption of this Constitution, shall commence on the third Tuesday of November, 1872; and the regular biennial session of the Legislature shall commence on the second Wednesday of January, 1875, and every two years thereafter, on the same day.

Convening of Legislature by Governor

19. The Governor may convene the Legislature by proclamation whenever, in his opinion, the public safety or welfare shall require it. It shall be his duty to convene it, on application in writing, of three-lifths of the members elected to each house.

Seat of Government

20. The seat of government shall be at Charleston, until otherwise provided by law.

Provisions for Assembling of Legislature Other Than at the Seat of Government

21. The Governor may convene the Legislature at another place, when, in his opinion, it can not safely assemble at the seat of Government, and the Legislature may, when in session, adjourn to some other place, when in its opinion, the public safety or welfare, or the safety of the members, or their health, shall require it.

*Length of Legislative Session

22. All sessions of the LegIslature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue for a period of sixty days from the date of beginning. But all regular sessions may be extended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house.

Concerning Adjournment

23. Neither house shall, during the session, adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other. Nor shall either, without such consent, adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature is sitting.

Rules Governing Legislative Proceedings

24. A majority of the members elected to each house of the Legislature shall constitute a quorum. But a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, as each house may provide. Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings and be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members. The Senate shall choose, from its own body, a President; and the House of Delegates, from its own body, a Speaker. Each house shall appoint its own officers, and remove them at pleasure. The oldest delegate present shall call the House to order at the opening of each new House of Delegates, and preside over it until the Speaker thereof shall have been chosen and have taken his scat. The oldest member of the Senate present at the commencement of each regular session thereof shall call the Senate to order, and preside over the same until a President of the Senate shall have been chosen and have taken his seat.

Authority to Punish Members

25. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.

Provisions for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

26. Each house shall have power to provide for its own safety, and the undisturbed transactions of its business, and may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of his duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of a member, for words spoken in debate. But such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the sesssion, and shall not prevent the punishment of any offense, by the ordinary course of law.

This section originally read as follows: "No session of the Legislature, after the first, shall continue longer than forty-five days, without the concurrence of

two-thirds of the members elected to each House."

Under the provisions of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted February 12, 1919, and rathled at the general election in 1920, the section was amended to rend as follows: "All sessions of the Legislature, other than extraordinary sessions, shall continue in session for a period not exceeding fifteen days, from date of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless dute of convening, during which time no bills shall be passed or rejected, unless the same shall be necessary to provide for a public emergency, shall be specially recommended by the Governor and passed by a vote of four-fifths of the members elected to each house; whereupon a recess of both houses must be taken until the Wednesday after the second Monday of March following. On reassembling of the Legislature, no bill shall be introduced in either house without a vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each house taken by yeas and nays. The regular sessions shall not continue longer than forty-five days after reconvening, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 160,929; against ratification, 122,744; majority, 38,185.

Under Joint Resolution No. 9, adopted in 1927, and ratified at the general election in 1928, the section was again amended to read as set forth in the text. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 275,374; against ratification, 85,123; majority, 190,251.

85,123; majority, 190,251.

Accounting for State Monies

27. Laws shall be enacted and enforced, by suitable provisions and penalties, requiring sheriffs, and all other officers, whether State, county, district or municipal, who shall collect or receive, or whose official duty it is or shall be to collect, receive, hold or pay out any money belonging to, or which is, or shall be, for the use of the State or of any county, district, or municipal corporation, to make annual account and settlement therefor. Such settlement, when made, shall be subject to exceptions, and take such direction, and have only such force and effect, as may be provided by law; but in all cases such settlement shall be recorded, and be open to the examination of the people at such convenient place or places as may be appointed by law.

Origination of Bills

28. Bills and resolutions may originate in either house, but may be passed, amended or rejected by the other.

Requirement for Reading of Bills

29. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read, on three different days, in each house, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with: *Provided*, in all cases, that an engrossed bill shall be fully and dinstinctly read in each house.

Acts to Embrace But One Object—Time of Effect

30. No act hereafter passed shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be expressed in the title. But if any object shall be embraced in an act which is not so expressed, the act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be so expressed, and no law shall be revived, or amended, by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large, in the new act. And no act of the Legislature, except such as may be passed at the first session under this Constitution, shall take offect until the expiration of ninety days after its passage, unless the Legislature shall by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each house, taken by yeas and nays, otherwise direct.

How Bills May Be Amended

31. When a bill or joint resolution, passed by one House, shall be amended by the other, the question on agreeing to the bill, or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on, by yeas and nays, in the house by which it was originally passed, and the result entered upon its journal; in all such cases, the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to such house shall be necessary.

"Majority" Defined

32. Whenever the words, "a majority of the members elected to either house of the Legislature," or words of like import, are used in this Constitution, they shall be construed to mean a majority of the whole number of members to which each house is, at the time, entitled, under the apportionment of representation, established by the provisions of this Constitution.

Compensation of Members

33. The members of the Legislature shall each receive for his services the sum of five hundred dollars per annum and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route. The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate, shall each receive an additional compensation of two dollars per day for each day

they shall act as presiding officers. No other allowance or emolument than that by this section provided shall directly or indirectly be made or paid to the members of either house for postage, stationery, newspapers, or any other purpose whatever.

[The amendment of sections 22 and 33, Art. VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 3 adopted February 12, 1919, and ratified at the general election November 2, 1920. The only change made in section 33 was to strike out the words "four dollars per day" and insert "five hundred dollars per annum." Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 160,929; against ratification, 122,744; majority, 38,185.]

Distribution of Laws and Journals Provided For-Contracts for Printing

34. The Legislature shall provide by law that the fuel, stationery and printing paper, furnished for the use of the State; the copying, printing, binding and distributing the laws and journals; and all other printing ordered by the Legislature, shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, bidding under a maximum price to be fixed by the Legislature; and no member or officer thereof, or officer of the State, shall be interested, directly or indirectly, in such contract, but all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor, and in case of his disapproval of any such contract, there shall be a reletting of the same in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

State Not to Be Made Defendant In Any Court

35. The State of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity.

Lotteries Prohibited

36. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize lotteries or gift enterprises for any purpose, and shall pass laws to prohibit the sale of lottery or gift enterprise tickets in this State.

Terms of Office Not To Be Extended After Election

37. No law shall be passed after the election of any public officer, which shall operate to extend the term of his office.

Salaries of Officials Not To Be Increased During Official Term

38. No extra compensation shall be granted or allowed to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract made; nor shall any Legislature authorize the payment of any claim or part thereof, hereafter created against the State, under any agreement or contract made, without express authority of law; and all such unauthorized agreements shall be null and void. Nor shall the salary of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, nor shall any such officer, or his or their sureties be released from any debt or liability due the State: Provided, The Legislature may make appropriations for expenditures hereafter incurred in suppressing insurrection, or repelling invasion.

Local Laws Not 'To Be Passed In Enumerated Cases

39. The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say, for

Granting divorces;

Laying out, opening, altering and working roads or highways;

Vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys and public grounds;

Locating, or changing county seats;

Regulating or changing county or district affairs;

Providing for the sale of church property, or property held for charitable uses;

Regulating the practice in courts of justice;

Incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending the charter of any city, town or village, containing a population of less than two thousand;

Summoning or impaneling grand or petit juries;

The opening or conducting of any election, or designating the place of voting; The sale and mortgage of real estate belonging to minors, or others under disability;

Chartering, licensing, or establishing ferries or toll bridges;

Remitting fines, penalties or forfeitures;

Changing the law of descent:

Regulating the rate of interest:

Authorizing deeds to be made for land sold for taxes;

Releasing taxes:

Releasing title to forfeited lands.

The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for the foregoing and all other cases for which provision can be so made; and in no case shall a special act be passed, where a general law would be proper, and can be made applicable to the case, nor in any other case in which the courts have jurisdiction, and are competent to give the relief asked for.

Limiting Powers of Court or Judge

40. The Legislature shall not confer upon any court, or judge, the power of appointment to office, further than the same is herein provided for.

Each House to Keep Journal of Procedings

41. Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and cause the same to be published from time to time, and all bills and joint resolutions shall be described therein, as well by their title as their number, and the yeas and nays on any question, if called for by one-tenth of those present, shall be entered on the journal.

Appropriation Bills To Be Specific

42. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for the officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.

Board or Court of Registration of Voters Prohibited

43. The Legislature shall never authorize or establish any beard or court of registration of voters.

Viva Voce Vote Necessary in Election of Certain Officers

44. In all elections to office which may hereafter take place in the Legislature, or in any county, or municipal body, the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered on its journals.

Bribery and Attempt to Bribe-Punishment

45. It shall be the duty of the Legislature, at its first session after the adoption of this Constitution, to provide, by law, for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary, of any person who shall bribe, or attempt to bribe, any executive or judicial officer of this State, or any member of the Legislature in order to influence him, in the performance of any of his official or public duties; and also to provide by law for the punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary of any of said officers, or any member of the Legislature, who shall demand, or receive, from any corporation, company or person, any money, testimonial, or other valuable thing, for the performance of his official or public duties, or for refusing or falling to perform the same, or for any vote or influence a member of the Legislature may give or withhold as such member; and also to provide by law for compelling any person, so bribing

or attempting to bribe, or so demanding or receiving a bribe, fee, reward, or testimonial, to testify against any person or persons, who may have committed any of said offenses: Provided, That any person so compelled to testify, shall be exempted from trial and punishment for the offense of which he may have been guilty, and concerning which he is compelled to testify; and any person convicted of any of the offenses specified in this section, shall, as a part of the punishment thereof, be forever disqualified from holding any office or position of honor, trust, or profit in this State.

Manufacture and Sale of Liquors

46. The Legislature shall, by appropriate legislation, regulate the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of this State, and any law authorizing the sale of such liquors shall forbid and penalize the consumption and the sale thereof for consumption in a saloon or other public place.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "On and after the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred fourteen, the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of malt, vinous or spiritous liquors, wine, porter, ale, beer or any intoxicating drink, mixture or preparation of like nature, except as hereinafter provided, are hereby prohibited in this State: Provided, however, That the manufacture and sale and keeping for sale of such liquors for medicinal, pharmaceutical, mechanical, sacramental and scientific purposes, and the manufacture and sale of denatured alcohol for industrial purposes may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. The Legislature shall, without delay, enact such laws, with regulations, conditions, secturities and penalties as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this section."

The amendment as set furth above, which became effective March 1, 1935, was proposed by Senate Committee Substitute for Engrossed House Joint Resolution No. 1, adopted March 9, 1933, Acts Regular Session, 1933, p. 532, and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 276,978; against ratification, 237,559; majority, 39,419.]

Incorporation of Religious Denominations Prohibited

47. No charter of incorporation shall be granted to any church or religious denomination. Provisions may be made by general laws for securing the title to church property, and for the sale and transfer thereof, so that it shall be held, used, or transferred for the purpose of such church, or religious denomination.

Homestead Exemption

48. Any husband or parent, residing in this State, or the infant children of deceased parents, may hold a homestead of the value of one thousand dollars, and personal property to the value of two hundred dollars, exempt from forced sale subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. Provided, That such homestead exemption shall in no wise affect debts or liabilities existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and Provided, further, That no property shall be exempt from sale for taxes due thereon, or for the payment of purchase money due upon said property, or for debts contracted for the erection of improvements thereon.

Property of Married Women

49. The Legislature shall pass such laws as may be necessary to protect the property of married women from the debts, liabilities and control of their hughande

Plan of Proportional Representation

50. The Legislature may provide for submitting to a vote of the people at the general election to be held in 1876, or at any general election thereafter, a plan or scheme of proportional representation in the Senate of this State; and if a majority of the votes cast at such election be in favor of the plan submitted to them, the Legislature shall, at its session succeeding such election, rearrange the Senatorial Districts in accordance with the plan so approved by the people.

*The Budget System

51. The Legislature shall not appropriate any money out of the treasury except in accordance with the following provisions:

Sub-Section A

Every appropriation bill shall be either a budget bill, or a supplementary appropriation bill, as hereinafter mentioned.

Sub-Section B

First: Within ten days after the convening of the Legislature, unless such time shall be extended by the Legislature for the sessions at which the budget is to be submitted, the board of public works, which shall consist of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, attorney general, superintendent of free schools and commissioner of agriculture, shall submit to the LegIslature two budgets, one for each of the ensuing fiscal years. Each budget shall contain a complete plan of proposed expenditures and estimated revenues for the particular fiscal year to which it relates; and shall show the estimated surplus or deficit of revenues at the end of such year. Accompanying each budget shall be a statement showing: (1) the revenues and expenditures for each of the two fiscal years next preceding; (2) the current assets, liabilities, reserves and surplus or deficit of the State; (3) the debts and funds of the State; (4) an estimate of the State's financial condition as of the beginning and end of each of the fiscal years covered by the two budgets above provided; (5) any explanation the board of public works may desire to make as to the important features of any budget and any suggestion as to methods for the reduction or increase of the State's revenue.

Second: Each budget shall be divided into two parts, and the first part shall be designated "Governmental Appropriations" and shall embrace an itemized estimate of the appropriations: (1) for the Legislature as certified to the board of public works in the manner hereinafter provided: (2) for the executive department; (3) for the judiciary department, as provided by law, certified to the Governor by the auditor; (4) to pay and discharge the principal and interest of any debt of the State of West Virginia hereafter created in conformity with the Constitution and all laws enacted in pursuance thereof; (5) for the salaries payable by the State under the Constitution and laws of the State; (6) for the aid of the public schools in conformity with the laws of the State; (7) for such other purposes as are set forth in the Constitution and laws made in pursuance thereof.

Third: The second part shall be designated "General Appropriations," and shall include all other estimates of appropriations.

The board of public works shall deliver to the presiding officer of each House the budgets and a bill for all proposed appropriations of the budgets clearly itemized and classified; and the presiding officer of each House shall promptly cause said bill to be introduced therein, and such bill shall be known as the "Budget Bill." The board of public works may, before final action thereon by the Legislature, amend or supplement either of said budgets to correct an oversight or in case of an emergency, with the consent of the Legislature by delivering such an amendment or supplement to the presiding officer of both Houses; and such amendment or supplement shall thereby become a part of said budget bill as an addition to the items of said bill or as a modification of or a substitute for any item of said bill such amendment or supplement may affect.

The Legislature shall not amend the budget bill so as to create a deficit but may amend the bill by increasing or diminishing the items therein relating to

^{*}This section, known as "The Budget Amendment," added to Article VI, was proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, adopted May 23, 1917, (Acts 1917, Extraordinary Session), and was ratified at the general election in 1918. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 51,405; against ratification, 26,661; majority, 24,754.

the Legislature, and by increasing the items therein relating to the judiclary, but except as hereinbefore specified, may not alter the said bill except to strike out or reduce items therein: Provided, however, That the salary or compensation of any public officer shall not be increased or diminished during his term of office; and such bill when and as passed by both houses shall be a law immediately without further action of the governor.

Fourth: The governor and such representatives of the boards, officers and commissions of the State expending or applying for State's money as have been designated by the board of public works for this purpose, shall have the right, and when requested by either House of the Legislature it shall be their duty to appear and be heard with respect to any budget bill during the consideration thereof, and to answer inquiries relative thereto.

Sub-Section C-Supplementary Appropriation Bills

Neither House shall consider other appropriations until the budget bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriations shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following:

(1) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a supplementary appropriation bill; (2) each supplementary appropriation bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be laid and collected as shall be directed in said bill unless it appears from such budget that there is sufficient revenue available; (3) no supplementary appropriation bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each house by a vote of a majority of the members present, and the yeas and nays recorded on its final passage. Each supplementary appropriation bill shall be presented to the governor of the State as provided in section fourteen of article seven of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Nothing in this amendment shall be construed as preventing the Legislature from passing in time of war an appropriation bill to provide for the payment of any obligation of the State of West Virginia within the protection of section ten of article one of the Constitution of the United States.

Sub-Section D-General Provisions

First: If the "Budget Bill" shall not have been finally acted upon by the Legislature three days before the expiration of its regular session, the governor may, and it shall be his duty to issue a proclamation extending the session for such further period as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the passage of such hill; but no other matter than such bill shall be considered during such extended session except a provision for the cost thereof.

Second: The board of public works for the purpose of making up its budgets shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to require from the proper State officials, including herein all executive departments, all executive and administrative officers, bureaus, boards, commissions and agencies expending or supervising the expenditure of, and all institutions applying for state monies and appropriations, such itemized estimates and other information, in such form and at such time as said board shall direct. The estimates for the legislative department, certified by the presiding officer of each House, of the judiciary, as provided by law, certified by the auditor, and for the public schools, as provided by law, shall be transmitted to the board of public works, in such form and at such times as it shall direct, and shall be included in the budget.

The board of public works may provide for public hearings on all estimates and may require the attendance at such hearings of representatives of all agencies, and all institutions applying for state monies. After such public hearings it may, in its discretion, revise all estimates except those for the legislative and judiciary departments, and for the public schools as provided by law.

Third: The Legislature may, from time to time, enact such laws, not inconsistent with this section, as may be necessary and proper to carry out its

Fourth: In the event of any inconsistency between any of the provisions of this section and any of the other provisions of the Constitution, except amendments thereto heretofore made and ratifled by the people, the provisions of this section shall prevail. But nothing herein shall be construed as preventing the governor from calling extraordinary sessions of the Legislature, as provided by section seven of article seven, or as preventing the Legislature at such extraordinary sessions from considering any emergency appropriation or appropriations.

If any item of any appropriation bill passed under the provisions of this section shall be held invalid upon any ground, such invalidity shall not affect the legality of the bill or of any other item of such bill or bills.

ARTICLE VII

Executive Department

1. The executive department shall consist of a governor, secretary of state, state superintendent of free schools, auditor, treasurer, commissioner of agriculture and attorney general, who shall be, ex-officio, reporter of the court of appeals. Their terms of office shall be four years, and shall commence on the first Monday after the second Wednesday of January next after their election. They shall reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices, and shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "The Executive Department shall consist of a Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, who shall be ex-officio Reporter of the Court of Appeals. Their terms of office, respectively, shall be four years, and shall commence on the fourth day of March, next after their election. They shall, except the Attorney General, reside at the seat of government during their terms of office, and keep there the public records, books and papers pertaining to their respective offices and shall perform such dutles as may be prescribed by law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 7, adopted June 3, 1933, Acts First Extraordinary Session, 1933, p. 506, and was adopted at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 251,865; against ratification, 145,787; majority, 106,178.]

Election

2. An election for Governor, Secretary of State, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "An election for Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, and Attorney General, shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed in this Constitution or by general law."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901, and adopted at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 59,509; against ratification, 22,022; majority, 37,487]

37,487.]

Certification of Election Returns—Contests

3. The returns of every election for the above named officers shall be sealed up and transmitted by the returning officers to the Secretary of State, directed to "the Speaker of the House of Delegates," who shall, immediately after the organization of the House, and before proceeding to business, open and publish the same, in the presence of a majority of each house of the Legislature, which shall for that purpose assemble in the Hall of the House of Delegates. The person having the highest number of votes for either of said offices, shall be declared duly elected thereto; but if two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall, by joint vote, choose one of such persons for said office. Contested elections for the office of Governor shall be determined by both houses of the Legislature by joint vote, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The effect of the amendment was to strike out the following at the end of the original section: "The Secretary of State shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, unless sooner removed, until the expiration of the official term of the Governor by whom he shall have been appointed." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Eligibility

4. None of the executive officers mentioned in this article shall hold any other office during the term of his service. The Governor shall not be eligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The section, prior to being amended, read as follows: "Neither the Governor, State Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor, Treasurer, nor Attorney General, shall hold any other effice during the term of his service. The Governor shall be incligible to said office for the four years next succeeding the term for which he was elected." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2.]

Chief Executive-Powers

5. The chief executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

Governor's Message

6. The Governor shall at the commencement of each session, give to the Legislature information by message, of the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. He shall accompany his message with a statement of all money received and paid out by him from any funds, subject to his order, with vouchers therefor; and at the commencement of each regular session, present estimates of the amount of money required by taxation for all purposes.

Extraordinary Legislative Sessions

7. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene, at his own instance, the Legislature; but when so convened it shall enter upon no business except that stated in the proclamation by which it was called together.

Governor to Nominate Certain Officers

8. The Governor shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, (a majority of all the Senators elected concurring by yeas and nays) appoint all officers whose offices are established by this Constitution, or shall be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for, and no such officer shall be appointed or elected by the Legislature.

Recess Vacancies-How Filled

9. In case of a vacancy, during the recess of the Senate, in any office which is not elective, the Governor shall, by appointment, fill such vacancy, until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall make a nomination for such office, and the person so nominated, when confirmed by the Senate (a majority of all the Senators elected convering by years and nays) shall hold his office during the remainder of the term, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person, after being rejected by the Senate, shall be again nomi-

nated for the same office, during the same session, unless at the request of the Senate; nor shall such person be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Senate.

Governor's Power of Removal

10. The Governor shall have power to remove any officer whom he may appoint in case of incompetency, neglect of duty, gross immorality, or malfeasance in office; and he may declare his office vacant and fill the same as herein provided in other cases of vacancy.

Remission of Fines and Penalties By Governor

11. The Governor shall have power to remit fines and penalties in such cases and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; to commute capital punishment and, except where the prosecution has been carried on by the House of Delegates, to grant reprieves and pardons after conviction; but he shall communicate to the Legislature at each session the particulars of every case of fine or penalty remitted, of punishment commuted and of reprieve or pardon granted, with his reasons therefor.

Governor Commander-in-Chief of Military Forces

12. The Governor shall be commander-in-chief of the military forces of the State, (except when they shall be called in the service of the United States) and may call out the same to execute the laws, suppress insurrection and repel invasion.

Official Bond of State Officers

13. When any State officer has executed his official bond, the Governor shall, for such causes and in such manner as the Legislature may direct, require of such officer reasonable additional security; and if the security is not given as required, his office shall be declared vacant, in such manner as may be provided by law.

How Bills Become Laws

14. Every bill passed by the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it, and thereupon it shall become a law; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the House in which it originated, which House shall enter the objections at large upon its journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, a majority of the members elected to that House agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by a majority of the members elected to that House, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the Governor. But in all such cases, the vote of each House shall be determined by yeas and nays to be entered on the journal. Any bill which shall not be returned by the Governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature shall, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after such adjournment, or become a law.

Respecting Appropriations of Monies

15. Every bill passed by the Legislature making appropriations of money, embracing distinct items, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor; if he disapproves the bill, or any item or appropriation therein contained, he shall communicate such disapproval with his reasons therefor to the House in which the bill originated; but all items not disapproved shall have the force and effect of law according to the original provisions of the bill. Any item or items so disapproved shall be void, unless re-passed by a majority of each House according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the preceding section in reference to other bills.

Vacancy in Governorship, How Filled

16. In case of the death, conviction on impeachment, failure to qualify, resignation, or other disability of the Governor, the President of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Delegates; and in all other cases where there is no one to act as Governor, one shall be chosen by joint vote of the Legislature. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Governor before the first three years of the term shall have expired, a new election for Governor shall take place to fill the vacancy.

Vacancies In Other Executive Departments

17. If the office of Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, State Superintendent of Free Schools, or Attorney General, shall become vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the Governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The subordinate officers of the executive department and the officers of all public institutions of the State shall keep an account of all monies received or disbursed by them, respectively, from all sources, and for every service performed, and make a semi-annual report thereof to the Governor under oath or affirmation; and any officer who shall wilfully make a false report shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

[The amendment of this section was proposed by House Joint Resolution of February 15, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 460) and ratified at the general election in 1902. The only change in the original section was the insertion of the words "Secretary of State" in the first line, and by substitution of the word "prescribed" for the word "provided." For the vote on the adoption of the amendment, see note following section 2 of this article.]

Executive Heads To Make Reports

18. The subordinate officers of the Executive Department and the officers of all the public institutions of the State, shall, at least ten days preceding each regular session of the Legislature, severally report to the Governor, who shall transmit such report to the Legislature: and the Governor may at any time require information in writing, under oath, from the officers of his department, and all officers and managers of State institutions, upon any subject relating to the condition, management and expenses of their respective offices.

Salaries of Officials

19. The officers named in this article shall receive for their services a salary to be established by law, which shall not be increased or diminished during their official terms, and they shall not, after the expiration of the terms of those in office at the adoption of this amendment, receive to their own use any fees, costs, perquisites of office or other compensation, and all fees that may hereafter be payable by law, for any service performed by any officer provided for in this article of the Constitution, shall be paid in advance into the State treasury.

[This section, prior to amendment, read as follows: "The Governor shall receive for his services, a salary of twenty-seven hundred dollars per annum and no additional emolument, allowance or perquisite shall be paid or made to him, on any account. Any person acting as Governor shall receive the emoluments of that office. The Secretary of State shall receive one thousand; the State Superintendent of Free Schools, fifteen hundred the Treasurer, fourteen hundred; the Auditor, two thousand, and the Attorney General thirteen hundred dollars per annum; and no additional emolument or allowance except as herein otherwise provided, shall be paid or made out of the treasury of the State to any of the foregoing executive officers on any account."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution adopted February 13, 1901 (Acts 1901, p. 459) and was ratified at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 56,280; against

ratification, 23,513; majority, 32,767.]

ARTICLE VIII

Judicial Department

1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a supreme court of appeals, in circuit courts and the judges thereof, in such inferior tribunals as are herein authorized and in justices of the peace.

[The amendment of this entire article was proposed by joint resolution of March 6, 1879 (Acts 1879, p. 175) and ratified at the general election in 1880. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 67,941; against ratification, 34,270; majority, 23,671.]

Supreme Court of Appeals

2. The supreme court of appeals shall consist of *four judges, any three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected by the voters of the State and hold their office for the term of twelve years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution, except that the judges in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of their present term of office.

Scope of Jurisdiction

3. It shall have original jurisdiction in cases of habeas corpus, mandamus, and prohibition. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in civil cases where the matter in controversy, exclusive of costs, is of greater value or amount than one hundred dollars; in controversies concerning the title or boundaries of land, the probate of wills, the appointment and qualification of a personal representative, guardian, committee or curator; or concerning a mill, road, way, ferry or landing; or the right of a corporation or county to levy tolls or taxes; and, also in cases of quo varranto, habeas corpus, mandamus, certiorari, and prohibition, and in cases involving freedom or the constitutionality of a law. It shall have appellate jurisdiction in criminal cases where there has been a conviction for felony or misdemeanor in a circuit court, and where a conviction has been had in any inferior court and been affirmed in a circuit court, and in cases relating to the public revenue, the right of appeal shall belong to the State as well as the defendant, and such other appellate jurisdiction, in both civil and criminal cases, as may be prescribed by law.

Binding Authority of Decisions

4. No decision rendered by the supreme court of appeals shall be considered as binding authority upon any of the inferior courts of this State, except in the particular case decided, unless such decision is concurred in by at least three judges of said court.

Reversal or Affirmance of Judgments

5. When a judgment or decree is reversed or affirmed by the supreme court of appeals, every point fairly arising upon the record of the case shall be considered and decided; and the reasons therefor shall be concisely stated in writing and preserved with the record of the case; and it shall be the duty of the court to prepare a syllabus of the points adjudicated in each case concurred in by three of the judges thereof, which shall be prefixed to the published report of the case.

Writ of Error, Supersedeas and Appeal

6. A writ of error, supersedeus, or appeal shall be allowed only by the supreme court of appeals, or a judge thereof, upon a petition assigning error in the judgment or proceedings of the inferior court and then only after said

court or judge shall have examined and considered the record and assignment of errors, and is satisfied that there is error in the same, or that it presents a point proper for the consideration of the supreme court of appeals.

Provision for Filling Supreme Court Vacancies

7. If from any cause a vacancy shall occur in the supreme court of appeals, the Governor shall issue a writ of election to fill such vacancy at the next general election for the residue of the term, and in the meantime he shall fill such vacancy by appointment until a judge is elected and qualified. But if the unexpired term be less than two years the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term.

Officers of Supreme Court

8. The officers of the supreme court of appeals, except the reporter, shall be appointed by the court, or in vacation by the judges thereof, with the power of removal; their duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law.

Terms of Supreme Court

9. There shall be at least two terms of the supreme court of appeals held annually at such times and places as may be prescribed by law.

Circuit Courts

10. The State shall be divided into *thirteen circuits. For the circuit hereinafter called the first, two judges shall be elected, and for each of the other circuits one judge shall be elected by the voters thereof. Each of the judges so elected shall hold his office for the term of eight years unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed in this Constitution. The judges of the circuit courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein until the expiration of the term for which they have been elected in the circuit in which they may respectively reside, unless sooner removed as aforesaid. A vacancy in the office of a judge of the circuit court shall be filled in the same manner as is provided for in the case of a vacancy in the office of a judge of the supreme court of appeals. During his continuance in office the judge of a circuit court shall reside in the circuit of which he is judge. The business of the first circuit may be apportioned between the judges thereof, and such judges may hold courts in the same county or in different counties within the circuit at the same time or at different times as may be prescribed by law.

Terms of Circuit Court

11. A circuit court shall be held in every county in the State at least three times in each year, and provisions may be made by law for holding special terms of said court. A judge of any circuit may hold the courts in another circuit.

Circuit Court Jurisdiction

12. The circuit court shall have the supervision and control of all proceedings before justices and other inferior tribunals, by mandamus, prohibition and certiorari. They shall, except in cases confined exclusively by this Constitution to some other tribunal, have original and general jurisdiction of all matters at law where the amount in controversy, exclusive of interest, exceeds fifty dollars; of all cases of habcas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto and prohibition; and of all cases in equity, and of all crimes and misdemeanors. They shall have appollate jurisdiction in all cases, civil and criminal, where an appeal, writ of error or supersedeas may be allowed to the judgment or proceedings of any inferior tribunal. They shall also have such other jurisdiction, whother supervisory, original, appellate or concurrent, as is or may be prescribed by law.

Division of State Into Circuits

13. Until otherwise provided by law, the State shall be divided into the following circuits: The counties of Brooke, Hancock, Ohio and Marshall shall constitute the first circuit; the counties of Monongalia, Marlon and Harrison, the second; the counties of Preston, Taylor, Barbour, Tucker and Randolph, the third; the counties of Wetzel, Tyler, Ritchie and Doddridge, the fourth; the counties of Wood, Wirt and Pleasants, the fifth; the counties of Clay, Gilmer, Jackson, Roane and Calhoun, the sixth; the counties of Putnam, Kanawha and Mason, the seventh; the counties of Cabell, Wayne, Lincoln and Logan, the eighth; the counties of McDowell, Mercer, Raleigh, Wyoming and Boone, the ninth; the counties of Greenbrier, Monroe, Summers, Fayette and Pocahontas, the tenth; the counties of Upshur, Lewis, Braxton, Nicholas and Webster, the eleventh; the counties of Grant, Hardy, Hampshire, Mineral and Pendleton, the twelfth; the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley and Morgan, the thirteenth.

[By various acts of the legislature, authorized by section 14 following, the division of the State into circuits has been changed and the number increased to twenty-four.]

Rearrangement of State Into Circuits

14. The Legislature may rearrange the circuits herein provided for at any session thereof, next preceding any general election of the judges of said circuits, and after the year one thousand eight hundred eighty-eight, may, at any such session, increase or diminish the number thereof.

Special Terms and Judges of Circuit Courts

15. The Legislature shall provide by law for holding regular and special terms of the circuit court, where from any cause the judge shall fall to attend, or, if in attendance, can not properly preside.

Salaries of and Limitation on Judges

16. All judges shall be commissioned by the Governor. The *salary of a judge of the supreme court of appeals shall be two thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and that of a judge of the circuit court shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars per annum; and each shall receive the same mileage as members of the Legislature: Provided, That •hio county may pay an additional sum per annum to the judges of the circuit court thereof; but such allowance shall not be increased or diminished during the term of office of the judges to whom it may have been made. No judge, during his term of office, shall practice the profession of law or hold any other office, appointment or public trust, under this or any other government, and the acceptance thereof shall vacate his judicial office. Nor shall he, during his continuance therein, be eligible to any political office.

How Judges May Be Removed

17. Judges may be removed from office by a concurrent vote of both houses of the Legislature, when from age, disease, mental or bodlly infirmity or intemperance, they are incapable of discharging the duties of their office. But two-thirds of all the members elected to each House must concur in such vote, and the cause of removal shall be entered upon the journal of each House. The judge against whom the Legislature may be about to proceed shall receive notice thereof, accompanied with the cause alleged for his removal, at least twenty days before the day on which action is proposed to be taken therein.

^{*}The "Judicial Amendment" proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted by the Legislature in 1901, providing that the Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges, who shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, was ratified at the general election in 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; majority, 29,966.

Clerk of Circuit Courts

18. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the circuit court, whose term of office shall be six years; his duties and compensation and the manner of removing him from office shall be prescribed by law; and when a vacancy shall occur in the office, the circuit court or the judge thereof in vacation shall fill the same by appointment until the next general election. In any case in respect to which the clerk shall be so situated as to make it improper for him to act, the said court shall appoint a clerk to act therein. The clerks of said courts in office when this article takes effect, shall remain therein for the term for which they were elected, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law.

Courts of Limited Jurisdiction

19. The Legislature may establish courts of limited jurisdiction within any county, incorporated city, town or village, with the right of appeal to the circuit court, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; and all courts of limited jurisdiction heretofore established in any county, incorporated city, town or village, shall remain as at present constituted until otherwise provided by law. The municipal court of Wheeling shall continue in existence until otherwise provided by law, and said court and the judge thereof, shall exercise the powers and jurisdiction heretofore conferred upon them; and appeals in civil cases from said court shall lie directly in the supreme court of appeals.

Regarding Participation In Civil War

20. No citizen of this State who aided or participated in the late war between the government of the United States and a part of the people thereof, on either side, shall be liable in any proceeding, civil or criminal; nor shall his property be seized or sold under final process issued upon judgments or decrees heretofore rendered, or otherwise, because of any act done in accordance with the usages of civilized warfare in the prosecution of said war. The Legislature shall provide, by general laws, for giving full force and effect to this section.

Parts of Common Law Effective

21. Such parts of the common law, and of the laws of this State as are in force when this article goes into operation, and are not repugnant thereto, shall be and continue the law of the State until altered or repealed by the Legislature. All civil and criminal suits and proceedings pending in the former circuit courts of the State, shall remain and be proceeded in before the circuit courts of the counties in which they were pending.

County Courts

22. There shall be in each county of the State a county court, composed of three commissioners, and two of said commissioners shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall hold four regular sessions in each year, and at such times as may be fixed upon and entered of record by the said court. Provisions may be made by law for holding special sessions of said court.

Terms of Office of County Commissioners

23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the torm of six years, except at the first meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot, or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number, who shall hold his office for the term of two years, one for four years, and one for six years, so that one shall be elected every two years. But no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. And if two or more persons residing

in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only the one of such persons receiving the highest number shall be declared elected, and the person living in another district, who shall receive the next highest number of votes, shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number as president, and each shall receive two dollars per day for his services in court, to be paid out of the county treasury.

Powers of County Courts

24. The county courts, through their clerks, shall have the custody of all deeds and other papers presented for record in their counties, and the same shall be preserved therein, or otherwise disposed of, as now is, or may be prescribed by law. They shall have jurisdiction in all matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices. They shall also, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, have the superintendence and administration of the internal police and fiscal affairs of their counties, including the establishment and regulation of roads, ways, bridges, public landings, ferries and mills, with authority to lay and disburse the county levies: Provided, That no license for the sale of intoxicating liquors in any incorporated city, town or village, shall be granted without the consent of the municipal authorities thereof, first had and obtained. They shall in all cases of contest judge of the election, qualification and returns of their own members, and of all county and district officers, subject to such regulations, by appeal or otherwise, as may be prescribed by law. Such courts may exercise such other powers, and perform such other duties, not of a judicial nature, as may be prescribed by law. And provision may be made, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, for the probate of wills, and for the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees and curators during the recess of the regular sessions of the county court. Such tribunals as have been heretofore established by the Legislature under and by virtue of the thirty-fourth section of the eighth article of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, for police and fiscal purposes, shall, until otherwise provided by law, remain and continue as at present constituted in the counties in which they have been respectively established, and shall be and act as to police and fiscal matters in lieu of the county court created by this article until otherwise provided by law. And, until otherwise provided by law, such clerk as is mentioned in the twenty-sixth section of this article, shall exercise any powers and discharge any duties heretofore conferred on, or required of, any court or tribunal established for judicial purposes under the said article and section of the Constitution of one thousand eight hundred seventy-two, or the clerk of such court or tribunal respectively, respecting the recording and preservation of deeds and other papers presented for record, matters of probate, the appointment and qualification of personal representatives, guardians, committees, curators, and the settlement of their accounts, and in all matters relating to apprentices.

Removal of Causes

25. All actions, suits and proceedings not embraced in the next preceding section, pending in a county court when this article takes effect, together with the records and papers pertaining thereto, as well as all records and papers pertaining to such actions, suits and proceedings, as have already been disposed of by said courts, shall be transmitted to and filed with the clerk of the circuit court of the county, to which office all process outstanding at the time this article goes into operation shall be returned; and said clerk shall have the same power and shall perform the same duties in relation to such records, papers and proceedings as were vested in and required of the clerk of the county court on the day before this article shall take effect. All such actions, suits and proceedings so pending as aforesaid, shall be docketed, proceeded in, tried, heard and determined in all respects by the circuit court, as if such suits and proceedings had originated in said court.

Clerk of County Court

26. The voters of each county shall elect a clerk of the county court, whose term of office shall be six years. His duties and compensation and the manner of his removal shall be prescribed by law. But the clerks of said courts, now in office, shall remain therein for the term for which they have been elected, unless sooner removed therefrom, in the manner prescribed by law.

Districting of County-Election of Justices of the Peace

27. Each county shall be laid off into districts, not less than three nor more than ten in number, and as nearly equal as may be in territory and population. There shall be elected in each district containing a population not exceeding twelve hundred, one justice of the peace, and if the population exceeds that number, two such justices shall be elected therein. Every justice shall reside in the district for which he was elected and hold his office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed in the manner prescribed by law. The districts as they now exist shall remain till changed by the county court.

Jurisdiction of Justice of the Peace

28. The civil jurisdiction of a justice of the peace shall extend to actions of assumpait, debt, detinue and trover, if the amount claimed, exclusive of interest, does not exceed three hundred dollars. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend throughout their county; they shall be conservators of the peace and have such jurisdiction and powers in criminal cases as may be prescribed by law. And justices of the peace shall have authority to take the acknowledgment of deeds and other writings, administer oaths, and take and certify depositions. And the Legislature may give to justices such additional civil jurisdiction and powers within their respective counties as may be deemed expedient, under such regulations and restrictions as may be prescribed by general law, except that in suits to recover money or damages, their jurisdiction and powers shall in no case exceed three hundred dollars. Appeals shall be allowed from judgments of justices of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Reformation of County Courts

29. The Legislature shall, upon the application of any county, reform, alter or modify the county court established by this article in such county, and in lieu thereof, with the assent of a majority of the voters of such county voting at an election, create another tribunal for the transaction of the business required to be performed by the county court created by this article; and in such cases all the provisions of this article in relation to the county court shall be applicable to the tribunal established in lieu of said court. And when such tribunal has been established it shall continue to act in lieu of the county court until otherwise provided by law.

Incompatible Offices

30. The office of commissioner and justice of the peace, shall be deemed incompatible. Vacancies in the office of commissioner, clerk of the county court and justices of the peace, shall be filled by the county court of the county until the next general election.

ARTICLE IX

County Organization

1. The voters of each county shall elect a surveyor of lands, a prosecuting attorney, a sheriff, and one and not more than two assessors, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of four years.

Constables, Coroners and Overseers of the Poor

2. There shall also be elected in each district of the county, by the voters thereof, one constable, and if the population of any district shall exceed twelve hundred, an additional constable, whose term of office shall be four years, and whose powers as such shall extend throughout their county. The assessor shall, with the advice and consent of the county court, have the power to appoint one or more assistants. Coroners, overseers of the poor and surveyors of roads, shall be appointed by the county court. The foregoing officers, except the prosecuting attorneys, shall reside in the county and district for which they shall be respectively elected.

Sheriffs—Consecutive Terms Prohibited

3. The same person shall not be elected sheriff for two consecutive full terms; nor shall any person who acted as his deputy be elected successor to such sheriff, nor shall any sheriff act as deputy of his successor: nor shall he during his term of service, or within one year thereafter, be eligible to any other office. The retiring sheriff shall finish all business remaining in his hands, at the expiration of his term; for which purpose his commission and official bond shall remain in force. The duties of the office of sheriff shall be performed by him in person, or under his superintendence.

Malfeasance and Misfeasance in Office

4. The presidents of the county courts, the justices of the peace, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, clerks of the circuit and of the county courts, and all other county officers shall be subject to indictment for malfeasance, misfeasance, or neglect of official duty and upon conviction thereof, their offices shall become vacant.

Commissioning of Officers Not Otherwise Provided for in Constitution

5. The Legislature shall provide for commissioning such of the officers herein mentioned, as it may deem proper, not provided for in the Constitution, and may require any class of them to give bond with security for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices.

Compensation—Deputies

6. It shall further provide for the compensation, the duties and responsibilities of such officers, and may provide for the appointment of their deputies and assistants by general laws.

Conservators of the Peace

7. The President of the county court and every justice and constable shall be a conservator of the peace throughout his county.

Formation of New Counties

8. No new county shall hereafter be formed in this State with an area of less than four hundred square miles; nor with a population of less than six thousand; nor shall any county, from which a new county, or part thereof shall be taken, be reduced in area below four hundred square miles, nor in population below six thousand. Nor shall a new county be formed without the consent of a majority of the voters residing within the boundaries of the proposed new county, and voting on the question.

ARTICLE X

Taxation and Finance

1. Subject to the exceptions in this section contained, taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the state, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value to be ascertained as directed by law.

No one species of property from which a tax may be collected shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; except that the aggregate of taxes assessed in any one year upon personal property employed exclusively in agriculture, including horticulture and grazing, products of agriculture as above defined, including live stock, while owned by the producer, and money, notes, bonds, bills and accounts receivable, stocks and other similar intangible personal property shall not exceed fifty cents on each one hundred dollars of value thereon and upon all property owned, used and occupied by the owner thereof exclusively for residential purposes and upon farms occupied and cultivated by their owners or bona fide tenants, one dollar; and upon all other property situated outside of municipalities, one dollar and fifty cents; and upon all other such property situated within municipalities, two dollars; and the legislature shall further provide by general law for increasing the maximum rates authorized to be fixed by the different levying bodies upon all classes of property by submitting the question to the voters of the taxing units affected, but no increase shall be effective unless at least sixty percent of the qualified voters shall favor such increase, and such increase shall not continue for a longer period than three years at any one time, and shall never exceed by more than fifty per cent the maximum rate herein provided and prescribed by law; and the revenue derived from this source shall be apportioned by the legislature among the levying units of the state in proportion to the levy laid in said units upon real and other personal property; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries, public property, the personal property, including live stock, employed exclusively in agriculture as above defined and the products of agriculture as so defined while owned by the producers may by law be exempted from taxation; household goods to the value of two hundred dollars shall be exempt from taxation. The legislature shall have authority to tax privileges, franchises, and incomes of persons and corporations and to classify and graduate the tax on all incomes according to the amount thereof and to exempt from taxation incomes below a minimum to be fixed from time to time. and such revenues as may be derived from such tax may be appropriated as the legislature may provide. After the year nineteen hundred thirty-three, the rate of the state tax upon property shall not exceed one cent upon the hundred dollars valuation, except to pay the principal and interest of bonded indebtedness of the state now existing.

[This section, prior to its amendment, rend as follows: "Taxation shall be equal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and perequal and uniform throughout the State, and all property, both real and personal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, to be ascertained as directed by law. No one species of property, from which a tax may be collected, shall be taxed higher than any other species of property of equal value; but property used for educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes, all cemeteries and public property may, by law, be exempted from taxation. The Legislature shall have power to tax, by uniform and equal laws, all privileges and franchises of persons and corporations."

The amendment as above set forth was proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 3, adopted August 6, 1932 (Acts Ex. Sess, 1932, p. 16) and was ratified at the general election in 1932. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 335,482; against ratification. 43,931; majority, 291,551.]

Capitation Tax

2. The Legislature shall levy an annual capitation tax of one dollar upon each male inhabitant of the State who has attained the age of twenty-one years, which shall be annually appropriated to the support of free schools. Persons afflicted with bodily infirmity may be exempted from this tax.

Receipts and Expenditures of Public Monies

3. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in pursuance of an appropriation made by law, and on a warrant issued thereon by the Auditor: nor shall any money or fund be taken for any other purpose than that for which it has been or may be appropriated or provided. A complete and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public monies shall be published annually.

Limitation on Contracting of State Debt

4. No debt shall be contracted by this State, except to meet casual deficits in the revenue, to redeem a previous liability of the State; to supress insurrection, repel invasion or defend the State in time of war; but the payment of any liability other than that for the ordinary expenses of the State, shall be equally distributed over a period of at least twenty years.

Power of Taxation

5. The power of taxation of the Legislature shall extend to provisions for the payment of the State debt, and interest thereon, the support of free schools, and the payment of the annual estimated expenses of the State; but whenever any deficiency in the revenue shall exist in any year, it shall, at the regular session thereof held next after the deficiency occurs, levy a tax for the ensuing year, sufficient with the other sources of income, to meet such deficiency, as well as the estimated expenses of such year.

Credit of State Not To Be Granted In Certain Cases

6. The credit of the State shall not be granted to, or in aid of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any county, city, township, corporation or person; nor shall the State ever hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company or association in this State or elsewhere, formed for any purpose whatever.

Duties of County Authorities In Assessing Taxes

7. County authorities shall never assess taxes, in any one year, the aggregate of which shall exceed ninety-five cents per one hundred dollars valuation except for the support of free schools; payment of indebtedness existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; and for the payment of any indebtedness with the interest thereon, created under the succeeding section, unless such assessment, with all questions involving the increase of such aggregate, shall have been submitted to the vote of the people of the county, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against it.

Bonded Indebtedness of Counties, Etc.

8. No county, city, school district, or municipal corporation, except in cases where such corporations have already authorized their bonds to be issued, shall hereafter be allowed to become indebted, in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness; nor without, at the same time, providing for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay, annually, the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof, within, and not exceeding thirty-four years: Provided, That no debt shall be contracted under this section, unless all questions connected with the same, shall have been first submitted to a vote of the people, and have received three-fifths of all the votes cast for and against the same.

Municipal Taxes To Be Uniform

9. The legislature may, by law, authorize the corporate authorities of cities, towns and villages, for corporate purposes, to assess and collect taxes; but such taxes shall be uniform, with respect to persons and property within the jurisdiction of the authority imposing the same.

ARTICLE XI

Corporations

1. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, by general laws, uniform as to the class to which they relate; but no corporation shall be created by special law: Provided, That

nothing in this section contained, shall prevent the Legislature from providing by special laws for the connection, by canal, of the waters of the Chesapeake with the Ohio River by line of the James River, Greenbrier, New River and Great Kanawha.

Corporate Liability for Indebtedness

2. The stockholders of all corporations and joint stock companies, except banks and banking institutions, created by laws of this State, shall be liable for the indebtedness of such corporations to the amount of their stock subscribed and unpaid, and no more.

Exclusive Privileges Prohibited

3. All existing charters or grants of special or exclusive privileges under which organization shall not have taken place, or which shall not have been in operation within two years from the time this Constitution takes effect, shall thereafter have no validity or effect whatever: Provided, That nothing herein shall prevent the execution of any bona fide contract heretofore lawfully made in relation to any existing charter or grant in this State.

Rights of Stockholders

4. The Legislature shall provide by law that in all elections for directors or managers of incorporated companies, every stockholder shall have the right to vote, in person or by proxy, for the number of shares of stock owned by him, for as many persons as there are directors or managers to be elected, or to cumulate said shares, and give one candidate as many votes as the number of directors multiplied by the number of his shares of stock, shall equal, or to distribute them on the same principle among as many candidates as he shall think fit; and such directors or managers shall not be elected in any other manner.

Street Railroads

5. No law shall be passed by the Legislature, granting the right to construct and operate a street railroad within any city, town or incorporated village, without requiring the consent of the local authorities having the control of the street or highway proposed to be occupied by such street railroad.

Banks

6. The Legislature may provide, by general banking law, for the creation and organization of banks of issue or circulation, but the stockholders of any bank hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, whether of issue, deposit or discount, shall be personally liable to the creditors thereof over and above the amount of stock held by them respectively to an amount equal to their respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while they are such stockholders.

Railroads

7. Every railroad corporation organized or doing business in this State shall annually, by their proper officers, make a report under oath, to the auditor of public accounts of this State, or some officer to be designated by law, setting forth the condition of their affairs, the operations of the year, and such other matters relating to their respective railroads as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall pass laws enforcing by suitable penalties the provisions of this section.

Rolling Stock Considered Personal Property

8. The rolling stock and all other movable property belonging to any rail-road company or corporation in this State, shall be considered personal property and shall be liable to execution and sale in the same manner as the personal property of individuals; and the Legislature shall pass no law exempting any such property from execution and sale.

Railroads Public Highways

9. Railroads heretofore constructed, or that may hereafter be constructed in this State, are hereby declared public highways and shall be free to ail persons for the transportation of their persons and property thereon, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law; and the legislature shall, from time to time, pass laws, applicable to all railroad corporations in the State, establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight, and providing for the correction of abuses, the prevention of unjust discrimination between through and local or way freight and passenger tariffs, and for the protection of the just rights of the public, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties.

Stations To Be Established

10. The Legislature shall, in the law regulating railway companies, require railroads running through, or within a half mile of a town or village, containing three hundred or more inhabitants, to establish stations for the accommodation of trade and travel of said town or village.

Competing Lines-Legislative Permission

11. No railroad corporation shall consolidate its stock, property or franchise with any other railroad owning a parallel or competing line, or obtain the possession or control of such parallel or competing line, by lease or other contract, without the permission of the Legislature.

Right of Eminent Domain

12. The exercise of the power and the right of eminent domain shall never be so construed or abridged as to prevent the taking, by the Legislature, of the property and franchises of incorporated companies already organized, and subjecting them to the public use, the same as of individuals.

ARTICLE XII

Education

1. The Legislature shall provide, by general law, for a thorough and efficient system of free schools.

State Superintendent of Free Schools

2. The State Superintendent of Free Schools shall have a general supervision of free schools, and perform such other duties in relation thereto as may be prescribed by law. If in the performance of any such duty imposed upon him by the Legislature he shall incur any expenses, he shall be reimbursed therefor: *Provided*. The amount does not exceed five hundred dollars in any one year.

County Superintendents

3. The Legislature may provide for county superIntendents and such other officers as may be necessary to carry out the objects of this article and define their duties, powers and compensation.

Existing Permanent and Invested School Fund

4. The existing permanent and invested school fund, and all money accruing to this State from forfeited, delinquent, waste and unappropriated lands; and from lands heretofore sold for taxes and purchased by the State of Virginia, if hereafter redeemed or sold to others than this State; all grants, devises or bequests that may be made to this State, for the purposes of education or where the purposes of such grants, devises or bequests are not specified; this

State's just share of the literary fund of Virginia, whether paid over or otherwise liquidated; and any sums of money, stocks or property which this State shall have the right to claim from the State of Virginia for educational purposes; the proceeds of the estates of persons who may die without leaving a will or heir; and of all escheated lands; the proceeds of any taxes that may be levied on the revenues of any corporation; all monles that may be paid as an equivalent for exemption from military duty; and such sums as may from time to time be appropriated by the Legislature for the purpose, shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called the "School Fund," and invested under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, in the interest-bearing securities of the United States, or of this State, or if such interest-bearing securities can not be obtained, then said "School Fund" shall be invested in such other solvent, interest-bearing securities as shall be approved by the Governor, Superintendent of Free Schools, Auditor and Treasurer, who are hereby constituted the "Board of the School Fund," to manage the same under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and the interest thereof shall be annually applied to the support of free schools throughout the State, and to no other purpose whatever. But any portion of said interest remaining unexpended at the close of a fiscal year shall be added to and remain a part of the capital of the "School Fund": Provided. That all taxes which shall be received by the State upon delinquent lands, except the taxes due to the State thereon, shall be refunded to the county or district by or for which the same were levied.

[This section is modified by the "Irreducible School Fund Amendment" set forth at the end of the Constitution.]

Support for Free Schools

5. The Legislature shall provide for the support of free schools by appropriating thereto the interest of the invested "School Fund," the net proceeds of all forfeitures and fines accruing to this State under the laws thereof; the State capitation tax, and by general taxation of persons and property or otherwise. It shall also provide for raising in each county or district, by the authority of the people thereof, such a proportion of the amount required for the support of free schools therein as shall be prescribed by general laws.

School Districts

6. The school districts into which any county is now divided shall continue until changed in pursuance of law.

Levies for School Purposes

7. All levies that may be laid by any county or district for the purpose of free schools shall be reported to the clerk of the county court, and shall, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, be collected by the sheriff, or other collector, who shall make annual settlements with the county court, which settlements shall be made a matter of record by the clerk thereof, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Mixed Schools Prohibited

8. White and colored persons shall not be taught in the same school.

Certain Acts Prohibited

9. No person connected with the free school system of the State, or with any educational institution of any name or grade under State control, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds or profits of any book or other thing used, or to be used therein, under such penalties as may be prescribed by law: Provided. That nothing heroin shall be construed to apply to any work written, or thing invented, by such person.

Creation of Independent Free School Districts

10. No independent free school district, or organization shall hereafter be created, except with the consent of the school district or districts out of which the same is to be created, expressed by a majority of the voters voting on the question.

Appropriation for State Normal Schools

11. No appropriation shall hereafter be made to any State normal school, or branch thereof, except to those already established and in operation, or now chartered.

Legislature to Foster General School Improvements

12. The Legislature shall foster and encourage moral, intellectual, scientific and agricultural improvement; it shall, whenever it may be practicable, make suitable provisions for the blind, mute and insane, and for the organization of such institutions of learning as the best interests of general education in the State may demand.

ARTICLE XIII

Land Titles

1. All private rights and interests in lands in this State derived from or under the laws of the State of Virginia, and from or under the Constitution and laws of this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into operation, shall remain valid and secure and shall be determined by the laws in force in Virginia, prior to the formation of this State, and by the Constitution and laws in force in this State prior to the time this Constitution goes into effect.

Land Entry Prohibited

2. No entry by warrant on land in this State shall hereafter be made.

Forfeited Lands

3. All title to lands in this State heretofore forfeited, or treated as forfeited, waste and unappropriated, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either of said States at sales made for the non-payment of taxes and become irredeemable, or hereafter forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to this State, or purchased by it and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released or otherwise disposed of, vested and remaining in this State, shall be, and is hereby transferred to, and vested in any person (other than those for whose default same may have been forfeited or returned delinquent. their heirs or devisees), for so much thereof as such person has, or shall have had, actual continuous possession of, under color or claim of title for ten years, and who, or those under whom he claims, shall have paid the State taxes thereon for any five years during such possession; or if there be no such person, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisces), for so much of said land as such person shall have title or claim to, regularly derived, mediately or immediately from, or under a grant from the Commonwealth of Virginia, or this State, not forfeited, which but for the title forfeited would be valid, and who, or those under whom he claims has, or shall have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for five successive years, after the year 1865, or from the date of the grant, if it shall have issued since that year; or if there be no such person, as aforesaid, then to any person (other than those for whose default the same may have been forfeited, or returned delinquent, their heirs or devisees), for so much of said land as such person. shall have had claim to and actual continuous possession of, under color of title for any five successive years after the year 1865; and have paid all State taxes charged or chargeable thereon for said period.

Waste and Unappropriated Lands

4. All lands in this State, waste and unappropriated, or heretofore or hereafter for any cause forfeited, or treated as forfeited, or escheated to the State of Virginia, or this State, or purchased by either and become irredeemable, not redeemed, released, transferred or otherwise disposed of, the title whereto shall remain in this State till such sale as is hereinafter mentioned be made, shall by proceedings in the circuit court of the county in which the lands, or a part thereof, are situated, be sold to the highest bidder.

Former Owner's Privilege

5. The former owner of any such land shall be entitled to receive the excess of the sum for which the land may be sold over the taxes charged and chargeable thereon, or which, if the land had not been forfeited, would have been charged or chargeable thereon, since the formation of this State, with interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, and the costs of the proceedings, if his claim be filed in the circuit court that decrees the sale, within two years thereafter.

Land Books-Taxes

6. It shall be the duty of every owner of land, or of an undivided interest therein, to have such land, or such undivided interest therein, entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with taxes legally levied thereon and pay the same. When, for any five successive years, the owner of any tract of land, or undivided interest therein, shall not have been charged on such land books with state, county and district taxes thereon, then, by operation hereof, the land, or undivided interest therein, shall be forfelted and title vested in the state. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner of such land, or of any undivided interest therein, shall have been charged with state, county and district taxes on any part of such land, such part thereof, or undivided interest therein, shall not be forfelted for such cause. And any owner of land so forfelled, or of any interest therein, at the time of the forfelture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest, charged on such land books, with all state and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein, for the year one thousand eight hundred sixty-three, and overy year thereafter, with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum, and pay all taxes and interest thereon for such years, and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: Provided, That such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited.

[This section, prior to its amendment, read as follows: "It shall be the duty of every owner of land to have it entered on the land books of the county in which it, or a part of it, is situated, and to cause himself to be charged with the taxes thereon, and pay the same. When for any five successive years after the year 1869, the owner of any tract of land containing one thousand acres or more, shall not have been charged on such books with State tax on said land, then by operation hereof, the land shall be forfeited and the title thereto vest in the State. But if, for any one or more of such five years, the owner shall have been charged with State tax on any part of the land, such part thereof shall not be forfeited for such cause. And any owner of land so forfeited, or of any interest therein at the time of the forfeiture thereof, who shall then be an infant, married woman, or insane person, may, until the expiration of three years after the removal of such disability, have the land, or such interest charged on such books, with all State and other taxes that shall be, and but for the forfeiture would be, chargeable on the land, or interest therein for the year 1863, and every year thereafter with interest at the rate of ten per centum per annum; and pay all taxes and interest thereon for all such years and thereby redeem the land or interest therein: Provided, Such right to redeem shall in no case extend beyond twenty years from the time such land was forfeited."

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution

The amendment as set forth above was proposed by House Joint Resolution No 4, adopted January 22, 1934 (Acts Second Ex. Sess. 1933, p. 583) and was ratified at the general election in 1934. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 257,090; against ratification, 177,796; majority, 79,294.]

ARTICLE XIV

Amendments

1. No convention shall be called, having the authority to alter the Constitution of the State, unless it be in pursuance of a law, passed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature and providing that polls shall be opened throughout the State, on the same day therein specified, which shall not be less than three months after the passage of such law, for the purpose of taking the sense of the voters on the question of calling a convention. And such convention shall not be held unless a majority of the votes cast at such polls be in favor of calling the same; nor shall the members be elected to such convention until at least one month after the result of the vote shall be duly ascertained, declared and published. And all acts and ordinances of the said convention shall be submitted to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection, and shall have no validity whatever until they are ratified.

How Amendments Are Made

2. Any amendment to the Constitution of the State may be proposed in either House of the Legislature; and if the same, being read on three several days in each House, be agreed to on its third reading, by two-thirds of the members elected thereto, the proposed amendment, with the yeas and nays thereon, shall be entered on the journals, and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide by law, for submitting the same to the voters of the State for ratification or rejection at the next general election thereafter, and cause the same to be published at least three months before such election in some newspaper in every county in which a newspaper is printed. And if a majority of the qualified voters, voting on the question at the polls held pursuant to such law, ratify the proposed amendment, it shall be in force from the time of such ratification, as part of the Constitution of the State. If two or more amendments be submitted at the same time, the vote on the ratification or rejection shall be taken on each separately.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The Judicial Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1901, p. 462). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 54,676; against ratification, 24,710; majority, 29,966.]

The Supreme Court of Appeals shall consist of five judges. Those judges in office when this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until their terms shall expire, and the Legislature shall provide for the election of an additional judge of said court at the next general election, whose term shall begin on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five, and the Governor shall, as for a vacancy, appoint a judge of said court to hold office until the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred five. The Judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals and of the circuit courts shall receive such salaries as shall be fixed by law, for those now in or those hereafter to come into office.

The Irreducible School Fund Amendment

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 28 (Acts 1901, p. 465). Ratified in November, 1902. Vote on the amendment: Far ratification, 56,694; against ratification, 24,763; majority, 31,931.]

The accumulation of the school fund provided for in section four of article twelve, of the Constitution of this State, shall cease upon the adoption of this

amendment, and all money to the credit of said fund over one million dollars, together with the interest on said fund, shall be used for the support of the free schools of this State. All money and taxes heretofore payable into the treasury under the provisions of said section four, to the credit of the school fund shall be hereafter paid into the treasury to the credit of the general school fund for the support of the free schools of the State.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1920

[Proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 (Acts 1919, p. 502). Ratified November 2, 1920. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 248,689; against ratification, 130,569; majority, 118,120,1

The Legislature shall make provision by law for a system of state roads and highways connecting at least the various county seats of the state, and to be under the control and supervision of such state officers and agencies as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also provide a state revenue to build, construct, and maintain, or assist in building, constructing and maintaining the same and for that purpose shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds, the aggregate outstanding amount of which, at any one time, shall not exceed fifty million dollars.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt, and the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

The Good Roads Amendment of 1928

[Proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 17 (Acts 1927, p. 361.) Ratified November 6, 1928. Vote on the amendment: For ratification, 360,597; against ratification, 92,885; majority, 267,712.]

The Legislature shall have power to authorize the issuing and selling of state bonds not exceeding in the aggregate thirty-five million dollars in addition to the state bonds which were authorized to be issued and sold by the amendment to the Constitution proposed by Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, adopted February 15, 1919, and afterwards ratified by a vote of the people. The proceeds of said additional bonds hereby authorized to be issued and sold shall be used and appropriated solely for the building and constructing or for assisting in building and constructing the system of state roads and highways provided for by the amendment to the Constitution above mentioned.

When a bond issue as aforesaid is authorized, the Legislature shall at the same time provide for the collection of an annual state tax sufficient to pay annually the interest on such debt and to pay the principal thereof within and not exceeding thirty years.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

(Adopted at the General Election, Nov. 3, 1936)

GARNISHEE AMENDMENT

(H. J. R. No. 3, adopted March 8, 1935)

That section thirty-five of article six of the constitution of the state, be and the same is hereby repealed and the following inserted in lieu thereof:

Section 35. The state of West Virginia shall never be made defendant in any court of law or equity, except the State of West Virginia, including any subdivision thereof or any municipality therein, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, may be made defendant in any garnishment or attachment proceeding, as garnishee or suggestee.

MUNICIPAL HOME RULE AMENDMENT

(S. J. R. No. 3, adopted March 9, 1935)

That article six of the constitution of West Virginia be amended by adding section thirty-nine-(a) thereto, which is as follows:

Section 39-(a). No local or special law shall hereafter be passed incorporating cities, towns or villages, or amending their charters. The legislature shall provide by general laws for the incorporation and government of cities, towns and villages and shall classify such municipal corporations, upon the basis of population, into not less than two nor more than five classes. Such general laws shall restrict the powers of such cities, towns, and villages to borrow money and contract debts, and shall limit the rate of taxes for municipal purposes, in accordance with section one, article ten of the constitution of the state of West Virginia. Under such general laws, the electors of each municipal corporation, wherein the population exceeds two thousand, shall have power and authority to frame, adopt and amend the charter of such corporation, or to amend an existing charter thereof, and through its legally constituted authority, may pass all laws and ordinances relating to its municipal affairs, provided that any such charter or amendment theerto, and any such law or ordinance so adopted, shall be invalid and void if inconsistent or in conflict with this constitution, or the general laws of the state then in effect, or thereafter from time to time enacted.

RULES OF THE SENATE

(Adopted June 15, 1936)

Presiding Officer

- 1. The President of the Senate may appoint a President pro tempore, who during the absence of the President shall preside and perform all the duties of the President. The President having taken the chair, and a quorum being present the journal of the preceding day shall be read, to the end that any mistake may be corrected that may have been made in the entries.
- 2. The presiding officer of the Senate may call a member to the chair who shall exercise his functions for the time being, but no member by virtue of such appointment, shall preside for a longer period than three days.
- 3. The presiding officer of the Senate shall have the regulation of such parts of the Capitol and of its passages as are, or may be, set apart for the use of the Senate, its officers and committees.

Admittance to Senate Chamber

4. No person except members of the House of Delegates, the heads of the executive departments, the governor's private secretary, ex-members of the legislature, judges of the supreme court of appeals, circuit courts and of other courts of record, representatives of the press duly accredited to the Committee on Rules, and legislative attaches engaged in the proper discharge of their duties, shall be admitted within the Senate chamber while the Senate is in session. No person, not a member of the Senate, shall, while within the chamber when the Senate is in session, seek in any manner whatsoever to influence the vote or opinion of any Senator on any subject of legislative consideration, under penalty of disbarment from the chamber for the remainder of the legislative session. No attache of the Senate shall, at any time, engage in such activity, under penalty of immediate dismissal by the Committee on Rules.

Duties of the Clerk-Official Journal

- 5. The Journal of the Senate shall be daily drawn up by the Clerk and shall be read the succeeding day. It shall be printed under the supervision of the Clerk and delivered to the members without delay. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for corrections, the type from which it was printed shall be changed in accordance therewith, and from the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal. In addition thereto ten copies shall be printed on 6 x 9 heavy weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof signed by the President and Clerk of the Senate certifying that the same is the official Journal of the Senate. They shall be bound in flexible binding and bear the imprint on the back, "Official Journal of the Senate of West Virginia," with designation of regular or extra session and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall be retained in the office of the Clerk, one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History and one with the Clerk of the House of Delegates.
- 6. The Clerk of the Senate shall not suffer any records or papers to be taken from the table, or out of his custody, by any person except a chairman of a committee, but he may deliver any bill or paper, directed to be printed, to the printer of the Senate, or to any member of the Senate on taking his receipt for the same.
- 7. The Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates may interchange messages between the hours of adjournment and that of meeting on the following day, so that said message may be read immediately after the usual order of the day.

Powers of the Senate Over Its Members

- 8. A majority of the Senators shall be necessary to proceed to business; two members may adjourn, and three members may order a call of the Senate, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the Senate, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been twice called.
- 9. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund. And this rule shall apply, as well to the first convention of the Senate at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session, after the hour has arrived to which the Senate stood adjourned.
- 10. No Senator shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, and reported to the Senate, unless by order of the President of the Senate.
- 11. The Senate may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 25.)
- 12. The Senate may punish by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member of words spoken in debate; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 26.)

Privileges of Members

- 13. Every member, when speaking, shall stand in his own place, and address the President and when he has finished, take his seat.
- 14. Every member within the Senate chamber, when a question is put, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the Senate excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting must be made before the Senate divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason why, in his opinion, it ought to be adopted.
- 15. If a member be called to order, for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the Senate for words spoken in debate, if any member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken and before exceptions to them have been taken.

Roll Calls

- 16. No member of the Senate, or other person except the Clerk and his assistants, shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called or counted.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject, without leave of the Senate; nor more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- 18. While the President is reporting or putting a question none shall entertain private discourse, read, stand up, walk into, out of, or across the Senate Chamber.
- 19. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Chair, and then the mover shall have the right to explain his views, in preference to any other member.

- 20. While the President is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.
- 21. During any debate, any Senator, though he has spoken to the matter, may arise and speak to the orders of the Senate, if they be transgressed, in case the President does not; but if the President stands up at any time, he is first to be heard.

Absence Without Leave

22. If any member of the Senate absent himself from the service thereof without leave, except in case of his sickness or other unavoidable cause which may prevent his attendance, the Senate may by order or resolution, direct his absence to be entered on the Journal.

Absence With Leave

23. No member of the Senate shall absent himself from its service without leave first obtained.

Standing Committees

- 24. At the commencement of each session the following standing committees shall be appointed, to consist of not less than five nor more than nine members, except the Committees on Forestry and Conservation and on Public Buildings and Humane Institutions which shall each consist of not less than eleven, and not more than fifteen members, the Committee on Roads and Navigation which shall consist of seventeen members and the Committees on Judiciary and on Finance, which shall each consist of eighteen members:
 - I. On Privileges and Elections.
 - II. On the Judiciary.
 - III. On Finance.
 - IV. On Education.
 - V. On Counties and Municipal Corporations.
 - VI. On Roads and Navigation.
 - VII. On Banks and Corporations.
 - VIII. On Public Bulldings and Humane Institutions.
 - IX. On the Penitentiary.
 - X. On Railroads.
 - XI. On Militia.
 - XII. On Federal Relations.
 - XIII. On Insurance.
 - XIV. On Agriculture.
 - XV. On Mines and Mining.
 - XVI. On Medicine and Sanitation.
 - XVII. On Labor.
 - XVIII. On Claims and Grievances.
 - XIX. On Forfeited, Delinquent and Unappropriated Lands.
 - XX. On Public Printing.
 - XXI. On Rules. (The President of the Senate to be ex-officio Chairman.)
 - XXII. On Joint Rules (to be composed of the President of the Senate as ox-officio Chairman, and two members of the Senate to be appointed by the President.)
 - XXIII. Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills on the part of the Senate (toconsist of five members.)
 - XXIV. On Public Library.
 - XXV. To Examine Clerk's Office (to consist of three members.)
 - XXVI. On Temperance.
 - XXVII. On Forestry and Conservation.
- XXVIII. On Redistricting.

25. All standing committees shall be appointed by the President of the Senate, unless otherwise directed, and the chairman of each committee shall be designated by the President of the Senate.

The chairman of each standing committee of the Senate shall cause to be kept for the purpose, a record of every meeting of such committee, wherein shall be entered:

- (a) The time and place of each committee meeting, and every hearing had before the committee.
- (b) The attendance of members of the committee at each meeting thereof.
 (c) The name of any person appearing before the committee, and the interest represented by him.

Any member of such standing committee may cause a notation to be made upon the record aforesaid of the reason for his absence at any former meeting of the committee; and in the absence of any such explanatory note, the presumption shall be that his absence was without reasonable cause.

All meetings of the committees, other than executive sessions, shall be open to the public.

On the adjournment of each session of the Legislature, the chairman of the respective committees shall deliver to the Clerk of the Senate the record book herein provided for, and it shall be the duty of such Clerk to preserve the same among the archives of his office.

Select Committees

26. Solvet committees shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members unless the Senate shall direct otherwise.

Committee on Privileges and Elections

- 27. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall report in all cases of privileges and contested elections, the principles and reasons on which their resolutions are founded.
- 28. The Committee on Privileges and Elections shall examine the oaths taken by each member, and the evidence of their election, and report to the Senate.

Committee to Examine Clerk's Office

29. The Committee to Examine the Clerk's Office shall see that all papers belonging thereto are properly filed, labeled and put away in the presses, and the books belonging to the office are chronologically arranged, and shall make report thereof to the Senate at each session.

Committee of the Whole

- 30. When the Senate shall resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the chair and appoint a chairman to preside in the Committee.
- 31. The Committee of the Whole shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the Senate. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, so far as they are applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking, concerning the previous question, and taking the Yeas and nays. The proceedings in the Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal of the Senate, except so far as reported to the Senate by the chairman of the committee.

Order of Business

- 32 The order of business of the Senate shall be:
 - I. To read the Journal.
- II. To dispose of Communications from the House of Delegates and the Executive.
- III. To receive reports from Standing Committees.

- IV. To receive reports from Select Committees.
- V. To receive bllls, resolutions, motions and petitions.
- VI. To act upon unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from the previous day, and no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following that on which it was offered.
- VII. Senate and House Bills on third reading.
- VIII. Senate and House Bills on second reading.
 - IX. Senate and House Bills on first reading.
 - X. Miscellaneous business.

Bills to be Read on Three Separate Days

33. All bills originating in the Senate shall be read on three separate days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays, on each bill, this rule be dispensed with.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Title of Bills

- 34. In the title of all bills to amend chapters or sections of the Code, or acts passed since the Code was adopted, the several committees to whom they are referred, or by whom they originated, shall insert the subject matter of the chapter.
- 35. All engrossed bills shall be fully and distinctly read when put upon their passage.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 29.)

Consideration of Bills

36. All bills or business originating in the Senate, shall be considered in the order in which they are introduced and all bills and resolutions received from the House of Delegates shall be introduced in the order in which they are received, unless in either case the Senate otherwise directs.

Resolutions to Lie on Table

37. All resolutions, when introduced, shall lie on the table at least one day.

Appropriation Bills

38. Bills making appropriations for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature, and for salaries for officers of the government, shall contain no provision on any other subject.—(Const., art. 6, sec. 42.)

Reference to Committees

- 39. All bills reported from the House of Delegates shall be referred to the appropriate committee on the first reading. All bills introduced on leave shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry, and if the committee report a bill different from the one introduced such bill shall be received and treated by the Senate as the original bill, and shall be read a first time and printed, unless in any of the aforesaid cases the Senate shall direct otherwise.
- 40. On each reading of a bill, the Clerk shall state whether it is the first, second or third reading of such bill.
- 41. On the demand of any two members when a bill is being read for amendment, it shall be read section by section, and when the amendments which may be moved shall be disposed of, the question, unless the Senate otherwise order, shall be taken on ordering the bill to be engrossed and read the third time. If a bill should be ordered to its engrossment and third reading and amendments thereto have been made, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform to the amendments. The bill shall then be re-printed, and shall be the engrossed bill. If no amendments are made

the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill. All Senate bills so ordered shall be jacketed, endorsed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a bill should be passed by the House and returned to the Senate without amendments, or if amended, and the amendments, should be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a House bill on second reading if the same be amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full in typewriting on slips of paper, and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Clerk before the bill is returned to the House, and all amendments shall appear in the Senate Journal.

42. When a bill or resolution of the House of Delegates is passed or rejected by the Senate, the fact of its passage or rejection, with the bill or resolution, shall be communicated to the House of Delegates.

Messages

43. Messages may be introduced in any stage of business except when a question is being put by the presiding officer, while the yeas and nays are being called by the Clerk, or while the ballots are being counted.

Passage of Bills and Joint Resolutions

44. When a bill or joint resolution is put upon its passage, the President shall propound the question, "Shall the bill (or joint resolution as the case may be) pass?" On the passage of every bill or joint resolution the vote shall be taken by yeas and nays, and be entered on the Journal. When the bill is on a second reading, and the question is upon striking out, the President shall propound the question: "Shall these words be stricken out?"

Motions

- 45. When the question is pending, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, for the previous question, to ile on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to adjourn the question to a different day, to commit or amend, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged.
 - 46. On the first reading of a bill, a motion to reject the bill shall be in order.

Adverse Report by Committee

47. If a Committee shall have reported adversely to a bill, the President immediately after the report of said committee is read, shall put the question: "Shall the bill be rejected?", which question shall have precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn.

Reconsideration of Vote

- 48. The question being once determined must stand as the judgment of the Senate, and cannot during the session be drawn again into debate unless reconsidered, and it shall be in order to reconsider any vote only within two legislative days next after the one upon which such vote was taken. A motion to reconsider shall be in order only when made by a Senator who voted with the prevailing side, and when the vote was not taken by yeas and nays all Senators will be conclusively presumed to have voted with the prevailing side.
- 49. When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question in reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

Division of the Question

50. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided; but on motion to strike out and insert, it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question, but the rejection of a motion

to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition; nor prevent a subsequent motion to simply strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

51. In filling blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put,

Previous Question

52. There shall be a motion for the previous question, which being ordered by a majority of the members present, if a quorum, shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been asked and ordered. The previous question may be asked and ordered upon a single motion, a series of motions or may be made to embrace and authorize motions and amendments and include the bill to its engrossment and third reading and then, on renewal and second of said motion, to its pasage or rejection. It shall be in order pending a motion for or after the previous question shall have been ordered on its passage, for the President to entertain and submit a motion to commit with or without instructions to a standing or select committee; and a motion to lay upon the table shall be in order on the second and third reading of a bill.

A call of the Senate shall not be in order after the previous question is ordered, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the President that a

quorum is not present.

All incidental questions or orders arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether an appeal or otherwise, without debate.

Yeas and Nays

- 53. When the yeas and nays are ordered, or a call of the Senate is directed, the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order.
- 54. The yeas and nays on any question shall, at the desire of one-tenth of the members present, be entered on the Journal and any member may enter any protest on the Journal upon the determination of any question. After the yeas and nays shall have been taken, and before they are counted or entered on the Journal, the Clerk shall read over the names of those who voted in the affirmative and those who voted in the negative, at which time any member shall have the right to correct any mistake committed in enrolling his name.
- 55. When a bill or joint resolution passed by the Senate shall be amended by the House of Delegates, the question on agreeing to the bill or joint resolution, as amended, shall be again voted on by yeas and nays in the Senate. and the result entered upon its Journal. In all such cases the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senate shall be necessary .--(Const., art. 6, sec. 31.)
- 56. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Senato shall be necessary.
- 57. In all elections of officers which may take place in the Senate the vote shall be viva voce, and be entered upon the Journal .- (Const. art. 6 , sec. 44.)

Executive Session

- 58. When nominations shall be made in writing by the Governor to the Senate, a future day shall be assigned, unless the Senate unanimously direct otherwise, for taking them into consideration,
- 59. When acting on the nominations of the Governor, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Clerk, his assistants, the Sergeant-at-Arms and Doorkeeper, and all such officers shall be sworn to secrecy.
- 60. All confidential communications made by the Governor to the Senate and all proceedings thereon, shall be by the members thereof kept secret until the Senate shall, by unanimous affirmative vote of the members present, remove the injunction of secrecy,

61. All information and remarks touching the character or qualification of any person nominated by the Governor to office, shall be kept secret. The Legislative proceedings and the executive proceedings of the Senate shall be kept and recorded in separate books.

Constitutional Amendment

62. When an amendment to be proposed to the Constitution is under consideration, the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate shall not be requisite to decide any question for amendments, or extending to the merits, being short of the final question.

Adjournment

- 63. When the Senate adjourns each day, it shall stand adjourned to 2 o'clock P. M. the next day, unless the Senate otherwise direct.
- 64. When the Senate adjourns each day, every member shall keep his seat until the President leaves the chair.

Parliamentary Practice

65. In all cases not provided for by the Rules of the Senate or the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Delegates, the Senate shall be governed by the practice in the House of Representatives of the Unitd States.

Suspension of Rule

66. No standing rule or order of the Senate shall be rescinded without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor and no rule shall be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Senate present.

Withdrawal of Bills from Committee

67. Any bill, resolution or business may, by a vote of the majority of the members present, be withdrawn from the committee to which it had been referred or be taken from the table, and placed upon the regular or special calendar of the Senate in such order of business as the Senate may direct.

RULES OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

(Adopted June 15, 1936)

ELECTION AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Officers and Their Compensation

1. The House, at the commencement of each Legislature, shall elect a Speaker, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Doorkeeper. All officers, except the Speaker, shall receive such compensation as the House may determine.

Vote to be Viva Voce

2. In the election of officers by the House, the vote shall be given vica voce, and a majority of the whole number of votes given, a quorum being present, shall be necessary to elect. If, upon any vote, there be no election, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped, and any votes thereafter given to such person shall not be taken into the counting to affect the result in any way. But if two or more have the lowest and equal number of votes, they may be voted for again. No question before the House, or in committee of the whole, shall be voted on by ballot.

DUTIES AND RIGHTS OF THE SPEAKER

Call to Order

3. The Speaker shall take the chair on each legislative day precisely at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order and, after prayer, if a quorum is present, proceed to the order of husiness.

Preservation of Order

4. The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum while the House is in session; enforce the rules and orders of the House; prescribe the order in which business shall come up for consideration, subject to the rules and orders of the House; announce the question of business before the House when properly requested by any member; receive all messages and communications; put to vote all questions which are properly moved; announce the result of all votes and authoriticate, when necessary, the acts and proceedings of the House.

Decorum in Debate

5. In debate, the Speaker shall prevent personal reflections and confine members to the question under discussion, but he shall not engage in any debate, or propose his opinion on any question without first calling some other member to the chair. When two or more members arise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

Questions of Order

6. The Speaker shall decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the House when demanded by any ten members. He may speak to questions of order in preference to other members, and may make the concluding speech on any appeal from his decision, notwithstanding, he may have before spoken on the question; but no other members shall speak more than once on such appeal without leave of the House.

When properly requested by a member, the Speaker shall inform the House upon any point of order or practice pertinent to the business before it.

Preserving Order in Galleries

7. The Speaker shall have general control of the House Chamber, lobbies, and fooms and of the corridors and passages in that part of the Capitol assigned to the use of the House. In case of any disorderly conduct or disturbance in the galleries, corridors or passages, he shall have the power to order the same to be cleared, and may cause any person guilty of such disturbance or disorderly conduct to be brought before the bar of the House. In all such cases the members present may take such measures to prevent a repetition of such misconduct, either by the infliction of censure or such other penalty, as may be authorized by law, on the parties thus offending, as the House may deem best.

Presiding Officer in Absence of Speaker

8. The Speaker may designate by an appointment in writing entered upon the Journal of the House, any member to perform the duties of the chair for a period not exceeding three consecutive legislative days, but for no longer period, except by special consent of the House, and the members so designated shall be during the time for which he is designated, vested with all the powers and duties conferred by these rules, or by law, upon the Speaker. The Speaker shall have the right to call any member to the chair to perform the duties of Speaker but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

If the Speaker be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the House, it shall be called to order by the Clerk, and a Speaker pro tempore selected by the House. The Speaker pro tempore shall preside over the House until such time as the Speaker shall be present.

Appointment of Attaches

9. The Speaker shall as soon as practicable after being authorized, appoint for the House such committee clerks, stenographers, pages and other attaches and employees as the House may by resolution direct, and may at his discretion, remove any person so appointed and appoint another in his stead. He may also appoint, without resolution, a private secretary and a stenographer to himself. He shall appoint an official Chaplain whose duty it shall be to be present at the convening of each day's session for the purpose of opening the session with prayer.

Appointment of Committees

10. The Speaker shall appoint all committees, except where the House shall otherwise order. In appointing standing committees he shall designate the chairman and vice chairman of same. In the absence of the chairman of a committee the vice chairman shall preside. When the House authorizes the appointment of a committee the Speaker may wait until the next legislative day to make the appointment.

Chairman of Committee on Rules

11. The Speaker shall be ex officio member and chairman of the Committee on Rules.

Acts and Writs Signed by the Speaker

12. All acts shall be signed by the Speaker as required by the Constitution; and all writs, warrants and suppenss issued by the order of the House or any committee having authority to issue same, shall be under his hand and attested by the Clerk.

Putting Questions

13. The Speaker shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

Vote of the Speaker

14. In all cases of a call of the yeas and mays, the Speaker wall vote, unless excused; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the House is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal and in case of such equal division the question shall be lock. When the yeas and mays are taken the Speaker's name shall be called last.

Examination of Journal

15. It shall be the duty of the Speaker to examine the Journal of the House, daily, before it is read and cause all errors and omissions therein to be corrected.

CLERK

Clerk to Have Charge of Clerical Business of House

16. The Clerk shall have charge and supervision of all the clerical business of the House. He shall perform the duties imposed on him by law and the rules of the House. He shall have charge of the Clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him,

Duties of Clerk

17. It shall be the Clerk's duty to read to the House all papers ordered to be read; to call the roll and note and report the absentees, when a call of the House is ordered; to call the roll and note the answers of members, when a question is taken by yeas and nays; to assist, under the direction of the Speaker, in taking the count when any vote of the House is taken; to notify committees of their appointment and the business referred to them; to superintend the execution of all printing ordered by the House, and to report to the Speaker, to be submitted to the House, every failure of the printer to execute the same properly and promptly. He shall attest all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House and shall certify to the passage of all bills, and to the adoption of all joint and concurrent resolutions by the Legislature. In addition to his other duties the Clerk shall keep the accounts for pay and mileage of members, officers and attaches, and for printing and other contingent expenses of the House, and prepare and sign warrants or requisitions for the same.

The Clerk shall superintend the recording of the Journal of the proceedings, the engrossing and enrolling of bills, and shall cause to be kept and prepared for the printer the Dally Journal of the proceedings of the House.

Clerk to Have Custody of All Records

18. The Clerk shall have the custody of all records and papers of the House, and shall not allow them to be taken from the table or out of his possession without the leave of the House, unless to be delivered to the chairman of a committee to which they may have been referred and then he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall endorse on bills and papers brief notes of proceedings had thereon by the House and preserve the same in convenient files for reference.

Clerk to Appoint Assistants

19. The Clerk shall appoint such assistants as are authorized by law or by resolution of the House and shall have power to suspend or remove any of his appointees and appoint others in their stead. He may also appoint without resolution a secretary to himself and a stenographer who shall be the official stenographer for the House. The per diem of the assistants and employees of the Clerk shall be fixed by the Committee on Rules.

Clerk to Have Charge of All Printing

20. The Clerk shall have supervision and charge of all printing done for the House, and the public printer shall print only such documents and other matter as the Clerk authorizes.

...

Payment for Printing

21. The public printer shall have all bills for printing approved by the supervisor of public printing and then present the same to the Clerk who shall draw his warrant or requisition for same upon the Auditor payable from the Legislative Printing Fund. The supervisor of public printing shall see that all bills are in accordance with the state contract for legislative printing before he approves their payment. A copy of all bills for printing shall be furnished the Clerk by the public printer.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

Duties

22. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the House and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings and to maintain order under the direction of the Speaker. He shall execute the commands of the House from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the Speaker.

Under the direction of the Speaker, he shall superintend the distribution of all documents and papers to be distributed to the members. He shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat.

He shall have charge under the Speaker for the purpose of maintaining order, of the Hall of the House, its lobby, galleries and other rooms in the Capitol assigned for its use, and shall exclude from the floor all persons not entitled to the privilege of the same. He shall attend to seating visitors, and shall see that the janitors and cloak-room attendants perform their duties, and see that the house chamber is properly ventilated, heated, and lighted.

DOORKEEPER

Duties

23. It shall be the duty of the Doorkeeper to attend the House during its sessions, and to announce all messages. He shall have charge of the main door of the Chamber during the sittings of the House, and shall see that the other doors are properly attended: have general charge and oversight of the assistant doorkeepers; detail such assistant doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the Sergeant-at-Arms may deem proper; assist the Sergeant-at-Arms in seeing that the rules relating to admission to the floor are strictly enforced, and shall perform such other duties as the Speaker or the House may order.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS

Absence From the House

24. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be sick and unable to attend, but any member who consciently believes that the seventh day of the week ought to be observed as the Sabbath shall be excused from attending upon the House on that day.

Every Member to Vote

25. Every member present when a question is put, or when his name is called, shall vote unless he is immediately and particularly interested therein, or the House excuses him. A motion to excuse a member from voting must be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and mays is commenced, and it shall be decided without debate, except that the member making the motion may briefly state the reason therefor,

Members Shall Be in Places When Voting

26. While the yeas and nays are being taken every member shall be in his seat, and during the session of the House no person other than a member shall occupy the chair of a member.

Quorum

27. A majority of all the members elected to the House shall be necessary to proceed to business; seven members may adjourn, and ten members may order a call of the House, send for absentees, and make any order for their censure or discharge. On a call of the House, the doors shall not be closed against any member until his name shall have been called twice.

When Less Than Quorum Present

28. In case a number less than a quorum of the House shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, for any and all absent members as the majority of such members shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for nonattendance shall be made as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient; and, in that case, the expense shall be paid out of the contingent fund of the House. This rule shall apply to the first meeting of the House, at the legal time of meeting, as well as to each day of the session after the hour has arrived to which the House stood adjourned.

Taking Members Into Custody

29. No member of the House shall be taken into custody by the Sergeant-at-Arms, on any question of complaint of breach of privilege, until the matter is examined by the Committee on Elections and Privileges, and reported to the House of Delegates, unless by order of the Speaker of the House of Delegates.

Punishment of Members

30. The House of Delegates may punish its own members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, expel a member, but not twice for the same offense. (Const., Art. 6, Sec. 25.)

Providing for Undisturbed Transaction of Business

31. The House of Delegates may punish, by imprisonment, any person not a member, for disrespectful behavior in its presence; for obstructing any of its proceedings, or any of its officers in the discharge of their duties, or for any assault, threat or abuse of any member for words spoken in debates; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the termination of the session.

ORDER AND DECORUM IN DEBATE

Recognition and Decorum

32. When a member is about to speak in debate or deliver any matter to the House, he shall rise in his place and respectfully address the presiding officer, as "Mr. Speaker," and, upon being recognized, shall proceed, confining himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personalities and indecorous or disrespectful language.

When a member arises and addresses the Chair, the Speaker may recognize him by name; but no member in debate shall designate another by name.

Recognition by the Chair

33. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Speaker shall name the one who is to speak first, and his decision shall be final and not open to debate or appeal. However, in all other cases the member who shall rise first and addresses the Chair shall be first recognized.

Mover of Question to Have Preference in Debate

34. No question shall be debated until it has been propounded by the Speaker, and then the mover of the question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon.

Member Out of Order

35. When any member, in speaking or otherwise, trangresses the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted, with leave of the House, to explain; and the House shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to: if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed; if the decision be against him, and the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House, or such other punishment as the House may properly impose.

Calling to Order for Words Spoken in Debate

36. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to and they shall be taken down at the Clerk's table. And no member shall be held to answer, or be subjected to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken or other business has intervened after the words were spoken and before the exception to them was taken.

Decorum During Debate

37. While the Speaker is putting a question, ascertaining the result, or addressing the House, no one shall walk out of or across the House; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the Speaker.

Limitation on Debate

38. No member shall speak except in his place, and not more than twice on a question, except by leave of the House. And if a question be pending at the time of an adjournment and is renewed on the succeeding day, no member who shall have spoken twice on the preceding day shall be permitted again to speak without leave of the House. The House by majority vote may limit debate on any question.

Members Not to Be Disturbed While Speaking

39. No one shall disturb or interrupt a member who is speaking, without his permission, except to call to order if he be transgressing the rules.

Speaking Before Negative is Put

40. When the Speaker is putting the question, any member who has not spoken before to the matter may speak to the question before the negative is put.

PUTTING QUESTIONS AND VOTING

Putting Question; Division

41. All questions shall be put distinctly in this form, to-wit: "As many as are in favor [as the question may be] say 'Aye'," and after the affirmative vote is expressed, "As many as are opposed say 'No"." If the Speaker be in doubt as to the result, or if a division is called for by any member, the House shall divide. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats and be counted, and afterward those in the negative. The count may be made by the

Speaker, or, if he so directs, by the Clerk, or two members, one from each side, to be named for that purpose by the Speaker. When the result is ascertained the Speaker shall rise and state the decision of the House. Such vote shall not be printed in the Journal unless the yeas and nays are called for by not less than nine members of the House prior to the announcement of the decision by the Speaker.

Yeas and Nays

42. On the passage of every bill and joint resolution, and when the yeas and nays on any question are called for by one-tenth of those present, the Speaker shall direct the roll to be called, and every member present shall answer "Aye" or "No" when his name is called, unless excused. Before the result is announced the Clerk shall read to the House the names of those who voted in the affirmative, and then those who voted in the negative, at which time any member may correct a mistake committed in taking down his vote. The result shall then be announced, and the yeas and nays entered on the Journal, but if the House so orders, the announcement of the result and the entry of the yeas and nays upon the Journal may be postponed to the succeeding day, with liberty to absent members at any time before the result is announced by the Speaker, to appear and vote "Aye" or "No," in the presence of the House; and any member may, in the presence of the House, change his vote before the result is announced. The Journal shall also show those absent and not voting.

Upon calls of the House, in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except the Speaker shall be called last.

Pairs

43. Members may pair on any question by filing a signed statement of the same with the Clerk, who shall read the same to the House before the vote is taken. A blank form of pair for use of members shall be provided by the Clerk. No pair shall be recognized unless made in person by the member signing the same, nor unless one or both of the parties thereto are absent.

Division of Question

44. Any member may call for a division of any question before the vote thereon is taken, if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition will remain for the decision of the House, but the member calling for the division of a question shall state in what manner he proposes it shall be divided. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible, but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor motion to strike out and insert.

Calling of Yeas and Nays

45. No member or any person shall visit or remain by the Clerk's table while the yeas and nays are being called.

Tie Vote Loses Question

46. In all cases when the House is equally divided, the question shall be lost,

Verification of Vote

47. When a question upon which the yeas and nays have been taken has prevailed or failed by not more than five votes, the Speaker may, upon request of five members, order a verification of the vote. During such verification, no member shall change his vote unless it was erroneously recorded, nor may any member not having voted cast a vote. A verification must be called for immediately after a vote is announced and before any other business has intervened.

Explanation of Vote

48. No member shall be allowed to make any explanation of his vote during the taking of the yeas and nays; but after the roll has been called and the vote announced, any member may explain his vote and the explanation shall be recorded in the Journal if he requests it. The Speaker may limit the time allowed members for explaining votes.

When Members Not to Vote

49. Any member who has a personal or private interest in any measure or bill proposed or pending before the House shall disclose the fact and not vote thereon.

MOTIONS

Stating the Question

50. When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the Clerk before debate.

Form of Motion

51. Every motion, except subsidiary, or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desires it; but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

Withdrawal of Motions

52. After a motion is stated by the Speaker or read by the Clerk, it is deemed to be in possession of the House, but may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment, unless the previous question has been ordered, in which case it can only be withdrawn by leave of the House.

Order and Precedence of Motions

- 53. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except:
 - 1. To adjourn.
 - 2. To lay on the table.
 - 3. For the previous question,
 - 4. To postpone to a day certain.
 - To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending question immediately.
 - 6. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
 - 7. To commit to a Standing Committee.
 - 8. To commit to a Select Committee.
 - 9. To amend.
 - 10. To postpone indefinitely.

These several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence of another motion to amend; and if carried, the bill is rejected.

Motion to Adjourn

54. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or when no business has been transacted since the motion to adjourn has been defeated.

Motions Not Debatable

- 55. The following motions shall be decided without debate, and shall not be amended:
 - 1. To adjourn.
 - 2. To fix the time to which the House shall adjourn.

- 3. To lay on the table.
- 4. For the previous question.
- To suspend the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days.
- 6. To recess.

Motions Not in Order

56. No motion directing the appropriation or payment of money shall be in order.

Effect of Indefinite Postponement

57. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted on during the session.

Motion to Reconsider

58. A motion to reconsider any question may be made by any member who voted with the majority, or in case of a tie vote, by any member. This motion shall be made on the same or next succeeding legislative day of the House. Such a motion, if seconded, shall take precedence of all other questions, except the consideration of a conference report or a motion to adjourn, and unless by motion postponed until some future time shall be acted upon at once. A motion to reconsider shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House, and if the House decides to reconsider, any member may thereafter call the subject up for consideration. A motion to reconsider a question, having been put and lost, shall not be renewed.

Debate on Motions to Reconsider

59. Debate shall be allowed on a motion to reconsider only when the question which it is proposed to reconsider is debatable. Where debate upon a motion to reconsider is in order, no member shall speak more than once nor for a longer period than three minutes.

Reconsideration of Question Requiring More Than Majority Vote

60. When a majority of members present vote in the affirmative on any question, but the question be lost because it is one in which the concurrence of a greater number than a majority of a quorum is necessary to an affirmative decision, any member may move for a reconsideration.

Effect of Motion to Table

61. A motion to lay on the table shall only have the effect of disposing of the matter temporarily, and may be taken from the table at any time after the eighth order of business has been passed.

Motion Must Be Germane

62. No motion on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

Previous Question

63. When any question is before the House, any member being in order and having the floor may move the previous question, but such motion to be put must be sustained by being seconded by ten members. The question being moved, the Speaker shall say, "Is the motion sustained?" and those favoring the motion shall rise. If a sufficient number arise, the previous question shall be thereby seconded, and the question shall then be put in this form, "Shall the main question be now put?" If this question be decided in the affirmative by a majority of the members voting, a quorum being present, it shall have the effect

of cutting off all debate and bringing the House to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions upon which it has been asked and ordered, except when the motion applies to the main question, the members in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have five minutes to close the discussion before the vote is taken; and when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have three minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. Should the previous question be decided in the negative, the House shall proceed with the matter before it as though the previous question had not been moved.

When a member moves the previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments or to the amendment or amendments only.

The previous question shall not be admitted in the Committee of the Whole.

MEETING OF THE HOUSE

Time of Meeting

64. The House shall meet every day, except Sunday, unless it shall be otherwise directed by special order, precisely at the hour to which it shall have adjourned at its last sitting; but if no hour were fixed at such sitting, then at two o'clock P. M.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

Daily

- 65. The daily order of business shall be as follows:
 - I. To read, correct, and approve the Journal.
 - II. To act upon leave of absence for members.
 - III. To receive and consider reports of standing committees.
 - IV. To receive and consider reports of select committees.
 - V. To receive and consider messages from the Executive, state officials, and other communications and remonstrances,
 - VI. To receive messages from the Senate, and consider amendments proposed by the Senate to bills passed by the House.
 - VII. To receive (a) resolutions, (b) petitions, (c) motions.
 - VIII. Bills introduced on motion for leave and referred to appropriate
 - IX. To act on unfinished business of the preceding day, and resolutions lying over from previous day, but no resolution shall lose its place on the calendar by not being acted upon on the day following on which it was offered.
 - X. House and Senate Bills on third reading.
 - XI. House and Senate Bills on second reading.
 - XII. House and Senate Bills on first reading.
 - XIII. Miscellaneous business.

Priority of Business

66. All questions relating to priority of business shall be decided without debate.

Special Orders

67. Any subject made a special order of business shall be laid before the House by the Speaker, or may he called up by any member, when the time fixed for its consideration arrives. If not called up or acted upon at the time fixed, it shall lose its standing as a special order.

Reports and Messages Receivable at Any Time

63. Messages from the Governor and Senate, communications and reports from state officers, reports from the Committee on Elections and Privileges, which involve the right of a member to his seat, reports from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, reports from the Committee on Rules, and reports of Conference Committees may be received at any time when the House is not actually engaged in taking a vote on some question, in which case it shall be received as soon as the result of the vote is announced. When received it shall be disposed of as the House may direct.

Consideration of Local Bills

69. Local bills shall be placed upon a special calendar to be known as the Local Bill Calendar, and on Friday of each week, after the ninth order of business is passed, shall be taken up and disposed of before any other business is acted upon.

Special Calendar

70. The House may by resolution authorize the Committee on Rules to arrange a special daily calendar and the consideration of bills on this calendar shall take precedence over the Regular House calendar.

COMMITTEES

Kinds of Committees

71. Committees may be of four kinds, namely: Committee of the Whole House, Standing Committees, Select or Special Committees, and Conference Committees.

Committee of the Whole

72. The House may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time on the motion of any member, and in forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the chair and a chairman shall be appointed by him to preside over said committee. It shall consider and report on such subjects as may be committed to it by the House. The proceedings in Committee of the Whole shall not be recorded on the Journal except so far as reported to the House by the Chairman of the Committee.

Rules of Proceeding in the Committee of the Whole

73. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that any member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but he shall not speak a second time until every member desiring to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question nor a motion to lay on the table or to adjourn be made therein. The year and nays need not be taken in Committee of the Whole.

Consideration of Bills in Committee of the Whole

74. Upon demand by any member, bills committed to a Committee of the Whole House shall, in committee of the whole, be read by sections. All amendments made shall be noted by the Clerk and reported to the House by the Chairman. After being reported to the House, the bill shall again be subject to amendment before a vote on the report is taken.

Motion to Rise Decided Without Debate

75. A motion that the Committee of the Whole rise shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

Standing Committees

76. The following standing committees, to consist of not less than seven nor more than twenty-five members, shall be appointed at the commencement of each session and to them respectively shall be referred all bills or resolutions pertaining to the subject indicated by the names of said respective committees, to-wit:

Agriculture.

Arts, Science, and General Improvements.

Banks and Corporations.

Claims and Grievances.

Counties, Districts, and Municipal Corporations.

Education

Elections and Privileges.

Executive Offices and Library.

Federal Relations.

Forestry and Conservation.

Forfeited, Delinquent and Unappropriated Lands,

Game and Fish.

Humane Institutions and Public Buildings.

Insurance.

Judiciary.

Labor.

Medicine and Sanitation.

Military Affairs.

Mines and Mining.

Penitentiary.

Printing and Contingent Expenses.

Railroads.

Redistricting.

Roads.

Rules.

State Boundaries.

Taxation and Finance.

Temperance.

Committee on Elections and Privileges

77. The Committee on Elections and Privileges shall examine and report upon all the certificates, and other evidences referred to them, touching the right of persons claiming to have been elected members of the House, or to any office for the state at large; and also upon other petitions and matters touching elections and returns, or relating to the privileges of members and officers of the House, or witnesses attending the House or any committee thereof, as shall be referred to them.

Committee on Rules

78. At the beginning of each session the Speaker shall appoint a Committee on Rules, to consist of seven members. The Speaker shall be ex-oficio Chairman of said Committee. The Committee on Rules shall report to the House, from time to time, rules for the government thereof, and amendments to such rules. The Committee shall be privileged to report at any time and said report shall be adopted by a majority vote.

All resolutions authorizing the appointment of attaches or relating to the appointment of persons, or prescribing the salary or pay of such attaches or persons, shall originate in and come from the Committee on Rules.

Committee on Taxation and Finance

79. The Committee on Taxation and Finance shall, as soon as possible after the commencement of the regular session, report the general tax and appropriation bill with an estimate of the probable revenue and expenditures

of the two years, and of the public debt. They shall from time to time report such measures for equalizing and reducing taxation, supplying revenue and facilitating the collection thereof, reducing the public expenditure, and providing for the principal and interest of the public debt as may seem to them expedient; and they shall further examine into and report upon all matters and propositions relating to taxation and finance as shall be referred to them by the House.

Committee on Claims and Grievances

80. All claims against the state, which may be presented to the House, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims and Grievances, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

Committee on Executive Offices and Library

\$1. The Committee on Executive Offices and Library shall examine the several public offices and library, and report whether their books and accounts are properly kept; whether the public money has been disbursed according to law; and diligence used in the collection of revenue; and whether the money received is properly accounted for. They shall report from time to time such measures as may seem necessary to add to the economy of the executive offices and the accountability of their officers.

Reports of Committees

82. The several standing committees shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise. All committees shall submit their reports to the House in writing, and the same shall be printed in the Journal. Reports of committees shall be advisory only. Committee chairmen shall see that the originals of all bills, resolutions, and such other documents as are referred to them, are returned to the House, with the report upon the matter to which they pertain.

Discharging Committee from Consideration of Bill

83. When a bill or resolution has been in the hands of a committee five legislative days after having been referred to it, the committee may be discharged from further consideration of the bill or resolution by a majority vote of all the members present. The chairman of a committee may move that his committee be discharged from consideration of the matter at any time after commitment and after the fiftieth day of the session any member may move to discharge a committee from consideration of any bill or resolution at any time after the same has been referred to it.

Committee Meetings

84. Meetings of all committees shall be upon a call of the chairman, but no committee shall sit during a session of the House without leave of the House. It shall be the duty of the Chairman of Committees to announce, or have announced, from the floor of the House, or by the Speaker or Clerk, during the session of the House, committee meetings, and at such time, if practicable, the number of all bills to be considered at such meetings. In case of failure of the chairman of any committee to call a meeting of such committee upon the request of a member, then fifty per cent or more of the members of such committee shall have a right to call a meeting of such committee.

Committee Hearings

85. The introducer of a bill, and all other persons who shall so request of the chairman or clerk of the committee, shall be given an opportunity to be heard upon a measure referred to a committee, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration. Every committee hearing shall be open to the public.

Committee Clerks

86. The Speaker shall assign to the various committees such clerks and other clerical and stenographic help as may be necessary to properly carry on the work of the committees. Committee clerks shall keep such records and perform such duties as the chairmen of the respective committees may direct.

Committee Records

- 87. The chairman of each committee shall keep, or cause to be kept, a record in which there shall be entered:
- (a) The time and place of each hearing, and of each meeting of such committee.
 - (b) The attendance of committee members at each meeting.
- (c) The names and addresses of all persons appearing before the committee, with the name of person, persons, firm or corporation, and addresses, in whose behalf such appearance is made.
- (d) The vote of each member on all motions, bills, resolutions and amendments acted upon, when a yea and nay vote is taken.

Such a record shall be read and approved at the next regular meeting of the committee. The committee records shall be open to inspection of the public at proper times and places and at the close of the session shall be filed with the Clerk of the House.

Committee Quorum—Sub-Committees

88. A majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. A sub-committee, which shall report to the regular committee, may be appointed to consider and report to the committee on any matter referred to it.

Minority Views

89. The minority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the Journal, and said recommendations may, by a vote of the House, be substituted for and become the report of the committee.

House Rules to Govern Committee

90. The rules governing the proceedings of the House shall apply to the proceedings of the committee, insofar as the same are applicable.

Select or Special Committees

91. Select or special committees may be provided for on motion or resolution, designating the number and object, and, unless otherwise ordered, shall be appointed by the Speaker.

Conference Committees and Reports

92. All reports of conference committees shall be presented after having been signed by a majority of the conferees of each House and be printed in the Journal. No matter shall be considered by said committee, or reported upon by it, except that in disagreement between the two houses.

BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND PETITIONS

BILLS

Method of Introducing

93. All bills to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than 4:00 o'clock P. M. on the preceding legislative day. Before the next meeting of the House the Clerk shall number such bills as are presented and

edit and correct them as to form. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business the Clerk shall report each of said bills by title in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule shall not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor in case of urgency.

To Be Presented in Triplicate

94. All bills shall be presented in triplicate and signed by the member introducing the same, the original copy for the use of the committee and for the permanent files of the House, the second for printing and copying, and the third for the use and accommodation of the members of the press, which shall be kept by the Clerk in some convenient place for this purpose.

Reference to Committees

95. Bills introduced by any member, on motion for leave, or by any standing committee, shall be read by their titles and referred to the appropriate committee without printing, and all such bills shall be treated in committee as resolutions of inquiry. If the committee report a bill different from one so introduced, either by amendment or substitution, such bill shall be received and treated by the House as the original bill, and the committee report and Journal of the House shall show that the bill was either amended or substituted in committee.

Contents

96. Bills proposing laws or changes in laws shall consist of a title, beginning with the words "A Bill to," and contain a brief statement of the object of the proposed measure, and if it amends or changes a law, a reference to the law proposed to be changed. The bill proper shall begin with the enacting clause, "Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia," and state at large the measure proposed.

Not To Embrace More Than One Object

97. No bill shall embrace more than one object, and that shall be stated in the title, and no law shall be revived or amended by reference to its title only; but the law revived, or the section amended, shall be inserted at large in the new act. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 30.)

Reporting From Committee

98. When a bill is reported from committee with the recommendation that it do pass, it shall be placed on the calendar for the succeeding day and come up on first reading unless the House by action otherwise directs. If on the calendar when referred, it shall be replaced on the reading from which it was taken.

If a bill be reported favorably with amendments, the report and Journal shall so show, and when the bill reaches second reading the committee amendments shall be acted upon before other amendments are offered, except amendments to the committee amendments.

If a committee to which a bill has been referred reports that the same ought not to pass, the Speaker shall immediately propound the question, "Shall the bill be rejected?" If this question is decided in the negative, the bill shall be disposed of in the same manner as if reported favorably.

Printing

99. The Clerk shall have all bills printed that are ordered to second reading, and such other bills as the House may order printed.

Recommitment

100. A bill may be recommitted at any time before it passes. Should such recommitment take place after its engrossment, and an amendment be reported, the bill shall be placed on second reading when reported back.

Reading

101. Before any bill is read by the Clerk, he shall state to the House whether it is on first, second or third reading.

To Have Three Readings

1\(\)2. No bill shall become a law until it has been fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless in case of urgency, by a vote of four-fifths of the members present, taken by yeas and nays on each bill, this rule be dispensed with. Upon any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the Constitutional rule, in order that the bill may be read twice or three times on the same day, and upon the first or second reading of any bill there may be a motion to dispense with the constitutional rule in order that the bill may, upon such reading, be read by its title. Provided, That in all cases there shall be three readings on each bill, and that an engrossed bill shall be fully and distinctly read. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 29.)

First Reading

103. The first reading of a bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question shall be, "Shall the bill be rejected!" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, it shall be regarded as orderd to its second reading, unless the House otherwise specially directs. On the first reading of a bill, it may at any stage of the reading be rejected on motion.

Second Reading

104. No bill shall be put upon its second reading until the same shall have been printed and delivered to the members of the House at least one day previous to such reading, unless in case of emergency.

Amending and Engrossment

105. On the second reading of a bill on the demand of any two members. it shall be read section by section for amendment, and when the amendments as may be moved are disposed of, the question, unless the House otherwise order, shall be, if a House bill, "Shall the bill be engrossed and ordered to the third reading!" If a House bill shall be ordered to its engrossment and third reading, and amendments have been made thereto, the type from which the bill was originally printed shall be changed to conform with the amendments. The bill shall then be reprinted and shall be the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. If no amendments are made the bill as originally printed may be ordered to its third reading and shall become the engrossed bill, and shall be designated as such. All House bills ordered to their engrossment and third reading shall be jacketed and engrossed with their number, title, by whom introduced, and if the bill is finally passed, the date of its passage and the signature of the Clerk. If a House bill is passed by the Senate and returned to the House without amendment, or if amended and the amendment or amendments be agreed to, it shall then be turned over to the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills. In the case of a Senate bill on second reading, if the same be amended by the House and passed on as amended, the amendment or amendments shall be noted in full on slips of paper in typewriting and attached to the bill at the proper place by the Cierk before the bill is returned to the Senate, and all the amendments shall also appear in the House Journal.

Time to Go Into Effect

106. In the passage of a bill by the House, a motion may be made that it take effect from its passage, or at some time other than ninety days after its passage; and if said motion be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to the House, taken by yeas and nays, the Clerk shall communicate that fact to the Senate along with the bill. (See Const., Art. 6, Sec. 30.)

Senate Bills

107. Senate bills passed by the Senate and reported to the House shall be referred to the appropriate committee unless the House otherwise directs. After this they shall be treated in the same manner as House bills.

RESOLUTIONS

- 108. Resolutions shall be of three classes, as follows:
- (1) Joint Resolutions: All proposed amendments to the Constitution shall take the form of a joint resolution, which shall be subject to the rules which govern the proceedings on bills, except that it shall be read on three several days, and, to be adopted, must on its third reading be agreed to by a two-thirds vote of the members elected to the House. (Const., Art. 14, Sec. 2.) When a proposed amendment to the Constitution is under consideration, the vote of a majority of the members present shall be sufficient to decide an amendment thereto or any collateral or incidental questions thereto short of the final question.

[Note: Joint resolutions are used only for amendments to the State Constitution and to ratify amendments to the Federal Constitution. Such resolutions do not have to be submitted to the Governor for his approval.]

- (2) Concurrent Resolutions: Concurrent resolutions shall be used for the purpose of expressing the sentiments of the Legislature, for authorizing expenditures incidental to the sessions and business of the Legislature, for agreeing upon adjournments beyond the constitutional limitation, for creating special joint committees, for raising a joint assembly and other inferior and incidental nurboses of legislation, and such other purposes as the Legislature may deem proper. The adoption of such resolutions must be concurred in by both houses.
- (3) House Resolutions: These simple resolutions shall be used for expressing the will or order of the House on matters in which the concurrênce of the Senate is not necessary. A House resolution shall be proper to express the sentiments of the body, to authorize expenditures from its contingent fund, for agreeing upon any question, and for all incidental purposes pertaining to the organization and work of the House.

Introduction

109. All resolutions to be introduced in the House shall be filed with the Clerk not later than two hours prior to the convening of the session at which they are to be introduced. They shall be presented in triplicate and copies shall be for the same purpose as that of bills. When the proper order of business is reached, the Clerk shall proceed in the same manner as if they were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a resolution from the floor in case of urgency. The different classes of resolutions shall be numbered by the Clerk and entered in full in the Journal.

Action on in House

110. All joint resolutions shall be referred to the appropriate committee, and when any other resolution is presented, containing no reference of the subject thereof to a committee, it shall lie over for one day, to come up under the ninth order of business unless a majority of the House orders otherwise.

PETITIONS

111. All petitions, remonstrances, memorials and other papers addressed to the House shall be filed by the members with the Clerk prior to the convening of the House. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for persenting petitions or any such papers, the Clerk shall read a list of those on file, giving the member's name presenting same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of the member's selection unless otherwise ordered by the House. Each member upon filing any such petition, remonstrance or other paper, shall endorse thereon his name, and if not so endorsed it shall not be received. The Journal shall show the name of the member presenting such papers, a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the disposition made of same.

AMENDMENTS

Forms For

112. The Clerk shall furnish to members sheets with a proper heading printed in blank upon which amendments shall be written, and all amendments offered shall be on such blanks and bear the name of the member offering the same.

Must Be Germane

113. No amendment shall be in order that is not germane to the matter under consideration: and the Speaker, when the question is raised, shall rule as to the admissibility of the proposed amendment.

Time for Offering

114. Amendments may be offered to any hill or joint resolution and acted upon on their second reading and before they are ordered to their engrossment and third reading. No bill shall be amended on third reading, except by unanimous consent of the members present. Amendments to resolutions other than joint resolutions shall be in order at any time the same are being considered. Committee amendments shall he subject to amendment and shall be disposed of before any other amendments are in order.

Reading and Stating

115. Amendments shall be read by the Clerk and stated by the Speaker before being acted upon.

By Striking Out Enacting Clause

116. A motion to amend by striking out the enacting clause of a bill shall have precedence over another motion to amend, and, if carried, the bill or resolution is rejected.

Amendment to an Amendment

117. A motion to amend a pending amendment may be received, but until it is disposed of no other motion to amend will be in order. But pending such amendment, a motion to amend in the nature of a substitute, and a motion to amend that substitute, may be received, but shall not be voted upon until the original matter is perfected.

Amendment to Have Precedence Over Substitute

118. If a substitute for a hill or resolution be offered, a motion to amend the original bill or resolution shall have precedence.

Motion to Amend to Have Precedence Over One to Strike Out

119. If a motion be made to strike out part of a bill or resolution, a motion to amend the part proposed to be stricken out shall have precedence.

Filling Blanks

120. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time proposed shall be first put, and the question shall be put on names in the order they were nominated.

No Amendment by Way of Rider

121. No amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill after engrossment.

Agreeing to Senate Amendments

122. When a House bill or House joint resolution shall be amended by the Senate, the question on agreeing to the bill or resolution as amended shall be again voted on by yeas and nays, and the result entered on the Journal, and in such a case the affirmative vote of a majority of the members elected to the House shall be necessary. (Const., Art. 7, Sec. 31.)

Amendment by Section

123. It a bill is being considered section by section, only amendments to the section under consideration shall be in order. After all sections have been considered separately, the whole bill shall be open for amendment except that an amendment seeking to strike out matter previously inserted and containing substantially no new proposition shall not be in order.

Amending Titles

124. After the passage of a bill or joint resolution, amendments to its title may be offered when the title is read for approval.

Amendments to Senate Bills

125. Any Senate bill or resolution may be amended in the same manner as a House bill or resolution. If a Senate bill or resolution is amended the same shall be noted by the Clerk on the jacket containing same before it is reported to the Senate.

After the reading of a Senate amendment to a House bill or resolution the question shall be, "Will the House concur in the Senate amendment?" But it shall be in order to move that the House concur in the Senate amendment with an amendment; or that the House refuse to concur and ask the Senate to recede.

If the Senate shall refuse to concur in a House amendment to a Senate bill or resolution, the following motions shall be in order and shall be privileged in the order named: First, That the House recede; Second, That the House insist and ask for a committee of conference; Third. That the House adhere.

Amendments to Be Printed in Journal

126. All amendments proposed, unless withdrawn, shall be printed in the Journal.

Speaking on Amendments

127. On an amendment being moved, a member who has spoken to the main question may speak again to the amendment.

JOURNAL

Clerk to Keep

128. The Clerk of the Honse, under the direction of the Speaker, shall keep a full and correct Journal of the proceedings,

Approval and Correction

129. When the Journal has been read to the end that any mistake made in the entry may be corrected, if no objection is made, it shall stand approved; but if objection be made, the first question of the House shall be to dispose of the same, and when such objections are disposed of and the Journal corrected, as the House may order, it shall stand as approved.

Printing Official Copies

120. After the printed Journal has been approved and fully marked for correction, the type from which it was prin ed shall be changed in accordance therewith. From the type so corrected shall be printed the number of copies required by law for the regular bound volumes of the Journal, which shall be properly indexed. In addition thereto six copies shall be printed on 6x9 heavy-weight bond paper, with a certificate at the end thereof, certifying that the same is the official Journal of the House and the same shall be signed by the Speaker and Clerk. Such printed Journal shall be the official record of the House. They shall be bound in flexible binding, and bear the imprint on the back. "Official Journal of the House of Delegates of West Virginia," with designation of regular or special session, as the case may be, and the year. After being signed by the proper officers, two of these copies shall he retained in the office of the Clerk, and one copy shall be lodged in the office of the Governor, one with the Secretary of State, one with the Department of Archives and History, and one with the Clerk of the Senate.

To Be Printed Daily

131. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to furnish a copy of each day's proceedings of the Journal to the printer, to be printed and distributed without delay.

Inserting Motions

132. Every written motion made to the House shall be inserted in the Journal with the name of the member making it, unless it be withdrawn on the same day it is submitted.

CHANGE OR SUSPENSION OF RULES

Rescinding or Amending Rules

133. All propositions to amend or rescind any standing rule or order of the House shall be by resolution and be at once referred, without debate, to the Committee on Rules, and shall be reported therefrom within two days. Any such resolution may be adopted by a majority vote, a quorum being present.

[Norg: The power to make its rules of procedure is given the House under Sec. 24, Art. 6 of the Constitution.]

Suspension of Rules

134. These rules shall not be suspended, except by a vote of at least twothirds of the members present. Unless there be a unanimous consent for the suspension of rules, the vote shall be determined by year and nays.

[Note: The motion to suspend the rules is usually preceded by a member requesting unanimous consent of the House to do a particular thins. If no one objects the House is deemed to assent, and what is desired is allowed accordingly. If objection is made, then the member may move that the rules be suspended for the specific purpose or object he has in view. A motion to lay on the table may not be applied to a motion to suspend the rules. (Hind's Precedents, Sec. 5405.)]

Manual and Rules

135. On any question of order of parliamentary practice where the rules of the House or the joint rules of the House and Senate are silent or inexplicit, Jeffcrson's Manual and the Digest of the Rules and Practices of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress shall be considered as authority.

[Note: Jefferson's Manual was prepared by Thomas Jefferson for his own guidance as President of the United States Senate in the years he was Vice-President, from 1797 to 1801. The House of Representatives, in 1837, by rule which still exists, provided that the provisions of the Manual should "govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the House." The Manual is regarded by English parliamentarians as the best statement of what the law of Parliament was at the time Jefferson wrote it. (House Manual and Digest), 70th Congress, 1st Sess., Sec. 278.]

MISCELLANEOUS RULES

Persons Admitted to the Floor

136. No person except Senators, elective state officers, heads of state departments, ex-Governors, members of Congress, Judges of the Supreme Court of Appeals, Judges of Circuit and other Courts of record, former members and officers of the House and Senate, members of other State Legislatures, the Governor's secretary, members of the press when properly accredited, attaches when actually engaged in work for the House or a member thereof, the Clerk of the Senate and his assistants, may be admitted upon the floor of the House, except by permission of the Speaker. At the convening of the House, the Sergeant-at-Arms shall see that all persons, except those covered by this rule, retire from the floor of the House.

Lobbying in the House Chamber

137. No person engaged in lobbying shall be permitted upon the floor of the House at any time while the House is in session, and any person transgressing this rule shall be removed from the floor of the House, and be debarred from the privilege of the floor during the remainder of the entire session. The Speaker is charged with the enforcement of this rule and it shall be the duty of any member, officer or employee of the House to inform the Speaker of any violation of this rule.

Newspaper Correspondents

- 138. (a) Any person accorded the privilege of a newspaper correspondent must be the telegraphic correspondent of a daily newspaper, or of a recognized press association, who is not engaged in any department of the state government, or in any other husiness, or must be the official reporter of a Charleston daily newspaper; and no more than one representative of each newspaper shall be admitted to the press tables or press gallery at one time.
- (b) All applications for admission to the press gallery or press table must be made to the Speaker. Such applications shall state the name of the newspaper, its location, times of publication, and be signed by the applicant.
- (c) The Speaker shall verify the statements made in such application, and if the application is approved by him, he shall issue a correspondent's card, signed by him.
- (d) The correspondents shall not visit the members in their seats during the session of the House, and shall abide by such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the Rules Committee of the House.
- (e) The card issued by the Speaker must be presented when required by any Sergeant-at-Arms. It shall not be transferable. The transfer or loan of such card to any one shall be followed by its cancellation and the withdrawal of all its privileges from the correspondent so offending.

(f) The gallery or press tables allotted to newspaper correspondents shall be for their exclusive use, and persons not holding correspondent's cards shall not be entitled to admission thereto.

Lounging Prohibited in the Hall of the House

139. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-atArms to prevent all persons not connected with the Legislature from assembling in the halls at any time when the House is not in session for the purpose of lounging or loafing. For the purpose of enforcing this rule, the Sergeant-at-Arms or his assistants shall be in attendance at all times, and the persistent neglect or disregard of this rule shall be cause for dismissal by the Speaker, or removal.

Peddling Prohibited

140. No person shall be permitted to hawk, peddle or offer for sale any article of traffic at any time within the hall of the House; and it shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to strictly enforce this rule.

Kidd; graduated from Glenville State Teacher's College in 1928, College of Law, West Virginia University, 1930, and College of Law, University of Virginia, 1933; Southern Methodist; Theta Chi; married June 1, 1932, to Marie Tinney; engaged in the practice of law at Glenville since September, 1933; member Democratic State Executive Committee; president Young Democratic Club of Gilmer County, 1933-35; appointed by Governor Kump June 13, 1936, as member of the House of Delegates from Gilmer County to succeed E. E. Cottrill, resigned.

JOSEPH EUGENE MCCUTCHEON. (1)), of Wheeling, was born September 10, 1900, in Ohio County, son of J. C. and Mary T. (Roseborough) McCutcheon; educated in the public schools; graduated from the University of Pittsburgh in 1924 with degree of D. D. S.; United I resbyterian; Odd Fellow; enlisted and served in the U. S. Infantry during the World War; macried December 11, 1926, to Lillian A. Lotter of West Alexander, Pennsylvania; engaged in the practice of dentistry at Wheeling since 1924; member Ohio County Democratic Executive Committee; appointed by Governor Kump June 16, 1936, as a member of the House of Delegates from Ohio County to succeed Jack R. Adams, resigned.





MRS. ALLIE DICKER 'ON PROCT R, (D), of Clifftop, was born November 15, 1899, at Raven's Eye, daughter of Herbert Jackson and Evelyn (Amick) Dick rson; edu ated in the public schools and at Morris Harvey Colleg; graduated from Marshall Colleg in 1922; Eastern Marshall Colleg in 1922; Eastern Marshall Colleg in 1922; Eastern Marshall Colleg in 1923, to Charles Nelson Proctor; ngaged in teaching for past 19 years; appointed by Governor Kump June 13, 1936, as member of the House of Delegates from Fayette County to fill the vacancy caused by the death of her husband, Charles Nelson Proctor.

H. G. SHORES, (D), of Keyser, was born in that city September 12, 1890, son of Edward W. and Benetta L. Shores; graduated from College of Law, West Virginia University, in 1910; Presbyterian; Modern Woodman; married June 20, 1917, to Katherine Howard, of Floyd, Virginia; engaged in the practice of law at Keyser since 1911; appointed by Governor Kump June 13, 1936, as a member of the House of Delegates to succeed George F. Parrish, who resigned to accept appointment as Registrar of Motor Vehicles.





CLIFFORD RAYMOND SNIDER, (D), of Clarksburg, was born April 27, 1890, at Market, son of Charles Lemuel and Rulina Elizabeth (Sperry) Snider; graduated from West Virginia University in 1914 with degree of E. A., and m 1917 with degree of LL. B., and from Harvard University in 1919 with the degree of Doctor of Cience of Jurisprudence; Sigma Chi; Phi Delta Phi; Ensign U. S. Naval Reserve Force, 1917-18; professor of law at West Virginia University, 1921-31; engaged in the practice of law at Clarksburg; appointed by Governor Kump June 13, 1936, as a member of the House of Delegates from Harrison County to succeed John H. Clifford, resigned.

GEORGE TELDON WALLACE, (D), of Huntington, was born September 6, 1871, near Greenwood, Virginia, son of Charles Irving and Maria (Sclater) Wallace; graduated from West Virginia University in 1897 with degree of UL, B.; married October 4, 1905, to Frances Bodine Gibson; first lieutenant 2d W. Va. Volunteer Infantry during Spanish-American War; served in West Virginia National Guard, 1900-1916, in ranks from second lieutenant to lieutenant-colonel; lieutenant-colonel with A. E. F. during the World War, serving at GHQ; prosecuting attorney Cabell County, 1905-1908; engaged in the practice of law at Huntington; appointed by Governor Kump June 13, 1936, as a member of the House of Delegates from Cabell County to succeed Ed V. Perry, resigned.



EVERETT EDISON WHITE, (D), of Madison, was born September 28, 1881, at Gordon, Boone County, son of Asa and Amanda (Brown) White; educated in the public schools of that county and at Marshall College; married December 24, 1912, to Lula Burdette; Southern Methodist; Odd Fellow; 32° Mason; past president Madlson Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce; cashier Boone Tational Bank; has been engaged in the banking business for about thirty years; elected member of House of Delegates from Boone County in 1928, 1930 and 1932, Appointed member of that body by Governor Kump June 16, 1936, to succeed Arnold G. Breedlove, resigned.

JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF DELEGATES

(Adopted June 15, 1936)

Joint Assembly

1. Whenever there shall be a joint assembly of the two houses, a brief account of the proceedings shall be entered upon the Journal of each house, except in the joint assembly for counting votes for state officers.

[Note: It is the custom to hold joint assemblies in the House chamber and they are presided over by the Speaker. In such sessions the Clerk of the House ac.s as Clerk, assisted by the Clerk of the Senate. The President of the Senate is given a seat to the right of the Speaker and seats are arranged for the members of the Senate.]

Joint Assembly to Open and Publish Election Returns

2. As soon as the Senate, being organized, is informed that the House of Delegates is ready to proceed, as provided by section three of article seven of the Constitution, to open and publish the returns of the elections for state officers, the Senate, preceded by its president and other officers shall repair in a body to the hall of the House of Delegates. Upon their arrival the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Delegates, shall announce the presence of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall then address the Speaker of the House, stating that a majority of the Senate have assembled in the hall of the House of Delegates to be present at the opening and publishing of the returns of the elections for state officers, held on the day of The Speaker of the House of Delegates shall invite the President of the Senate to a seat upon his right, and the other members of the Senate and officers thereof to take seats assigned them, and after announcing that a majority of the House of Delegates is present, shall then open and publish the returns of said election, proceeding by counties in alphabetical order, the Clerks of the two houses each taking down the returns as announced by the Speaker; to be entered upon the Journal of the House; and when completed and estimated the Speaker shall announce the votes received by each person voted for, for each of said offices, and those receiving the largest number of votes shall be by him declared duly elected; and the Senate shall then return to its hall; and if any two or more candidates for any of said offices have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the two houses shall immediately proceed to choose one of such persons for said office by a joint vote, as provided by Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution.

Disagreement and Conference

3. Whenever a measure of one house is amended in the other and the house in which it originated shall refuse to concur in the amendment, the house amending the measure may either insist or recede therefrom. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. If said house refuses to concur, the other house may either recede from or insist upon its amendment, and a motion to recede shall take precedence of a motion to insist. The motion to lay on the table or to postpone indefinitely shall not be in order in respect to the motion to recede from or to lnsist.

A motion to recede having failed shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to insist and shall be so entered upon the Journal. A motion to insist being decided in the negative shall be equivalent to the adoption of a motion to recede and shall be so entered upon the Journal. If the motion to insist prevails, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the

subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house may thereupon appoint such committee. Unless a different number is agreed upon, such conference committee shall consist of five members from each house.

Such committee shall consider and report upon, only the subject matter of the amendment or amendments which were in disagreement, with necessary consequential changes. The committee shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairmen, and having conferred freely, shall report to their respective houses the result of the conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action, with the papers referred, shall be immediately reported by the Clerk to the other house. In case of disagreement, the papers shall remain with the house in which the measure originated. If an agreement is reached, the report shall be made and signed in duplicate by at least a majority of the conferees from each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the conferees of each house.

Messages Between the Houses

4. When a message is sent by one house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent, by the Doorkeeper thereof, if it be in session, and then be respectfully communicated to the presiding officer by the person by whom it may be sent, but no message shall be received during a call of the roll. But the Clerk of one house may communicate a message to the Clerk of the other after adjournment, and any message so sent shall be received by the house to which it is sent whenever it may be in session.

Introduction of Bills

5. No bill, other than an appropriation bill, shall be introduced in either house after the fiftieth day of the session unless permission to introduce the bill be given by a concurrent resolution, setting out the title of the bill, and adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of each house present and voting.

One House to Notify Other of Rejection of Bill

6. When a bill or resolution passed in one house is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be sent to the house in which the same shall have been passed.

Record of Bills

7. The Clerks of the two houses shall keep separate records or registers, in which shall be recorded every action taken by the Senate and House on each bill and resolution.

Clerk to Endorse Bills

8. The Clerks of the two houses shall endorse on each bill a statement of any action taken by their respective bodies.

Notice to be in Writing

9. Notice to either House of the action of the other shall be in writing, signed by the Clerk of the House giving such notice.

Each House to Have Control of Own Printing

10. Each House may order the printing of bills, resolutions, reports and other documents without the consent of the other.

Joint Committees

11. Joint standing committees of the Senate and House shall be appointed as follows:

- (1) Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, to consist of five members from each House.
- (2) Committee on Joint Rules, to consist of the presiding officers and two members of each House, to be appointed by the presiding officers.
- (3) Such other joint committees as may be provided for by concurrent resolutions. A bill or resolution referred to a joint committee may be recalled from such committee by the House in which it originated.

Engrossed Bills to be Filed With Clerk of House

12. All engrossed bills passed by, and joint and concurrent resolutions adopted by, both houses shall be filed with the Clerk of the House to be kept with the rolls of the Legislature and to be used by him in printing and publishing the acts of the Legislature,

Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills

13. The Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills shall consist of five members of the Senate and five members of the House of Delegates to be appointed by the presiding officer of each house, whose duty it shall be to compare carefully all bills and joint resolutions passed by both houses with the enrollment thereof, and to correct any errors or omissions they may discover and to make reports to their respective houses from time to time, of the correctly enrolled bills or joint resolutions. It shall be in order for the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills to report at any time.

Printing Enrolled Bills

14. After a bill has been passed by both houses, the type from which it was originally printed shall be corrected as to any typographical errors that may not previously have been corrected and to include any amendments that may have been made by either house since the last printing of the bill. After the type has been so corrected two hundred copies of the bill shall be printed (except charter bills, of which only twenty-five of each shall be printed). Twelve of these copies shall be on seven and one-fourth by ten bond paper, twenty pound basis of at least fifty per cent rag content, for the use of the Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, one of which copies when properly authenticated, shall become the enrolled bill, and the remainder shall be on twenty pound basis, sulphite bond paper. From these copies all judges shall be firnished enrolled bills as provided for in section fourteen, article one, chapter four of the code.

Authentication of Enrolled Bills

15. Enrolled bills shall be authentleated by the signature of the chairman of the House Committee and the chairman of the Senate Committee, composing such Joint Committee on Enrolled Bills, but in the absence of such chairman another member of the committee may act in his stead, and they shall require all bills and joint resolutions before such authentication to be free from interlineations or crasures and destroy any previous enrollment containing any interlineations or crasures. A certificate, showing in which House the hill originated and the date it takes effect, signed by the Clerks of the two Houses, shall be endorsed on the bill. After enrolled bills and joint resolutions are authenticated as aforesald, they shall be signed by the Speaker of the House and by the President of the Senate.

Presenting Bills to Governor

16. After a bill shall have thus been signed in each house, it shall be presented by the said committee to the Governor, for his approval. The said committee shall report the day of presentation to the Governor, which time shall be entered on the Journal of each house,

Record of Enrolled Bills

17. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Enrolled Bills to keep a record book of all bills presented to the Governor for his approval. The title and number of each bill presented to the Governor shall be entered in this book and when a bill is presented to him, the date presented and the signature of the Governor, showing receipt of same, shall be entered at the side of each title.

Action of Governor on Bills

18. Every bill disapproved by the Governor shall be returned by him to the house in which it originated, with his objections thereto unless the Legislature shall by its adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within five days after said adjournment.

Every bill approved by the Governor shall, within five days after it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State and the fact of said approval communicated by the Governor to the house in which said bill originated

Every bill which shall be neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor, shall immediately after the expiration of five days from the time it is presented to him, be filed in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall forthwith engross thereon a certificate to the following effect: "I certify that the foregoing act, having been presented to the Governor for his approval, and not having been returned by him to the house of the Legislature in which it originated within the time prescribed by the Constitution of the state, has become a law without his approval," and shall date and sign the same. The Governor shall notify the house in which the bill originated of each bill becoming a law without his appreval

Upon each bill returned to either house of the Legislature with the objections of the Governor, the Clerks of the Senate and House of Delegates shall engross the action, if any, of their respective houses on the reconsideration and passage of said bill, and sign the same.

Joint Meetings of Committees.

19. Whenever any bill has been referred by the Senate to one of its standing committees, and the same or like bill has been referred by the House to one of its committees, the chairman of the respective committees, when in their judgment the interest of legislation or the expedition of business will be better served thereby, may arrange for a joint meeting of their committees for the consideration of such bill. All joint committee meetings shall be presided over by the chairman of the Senate committee.

What Shall be Printed in the Journal

- 20. The following shall always be printed in the Journal of each House:
- (a) Messages from the Governor and messages from other House, the titles of all bills, and the title and text of all resolutions.
- (b) Every vote taken by yeas and nays in each House, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial, or paper presented to each House.
 - (c) A true and accurate account of the proceedings of each House,

Manner of Printing the Journal and Bills

- 21. In printing the daily Journal of the proceedings of each house there shall be printed at the top of each page, except the first, the date of the Journal and on the last page of each day's Journal shall be printed the calendar for the next day.
- At the top of the first page of each bill, preceding the title and number thereof, there shall be printed the name of the person by whom or the committee by which it was introduced and the date of introduction; and at the top of each page, except the first, shall be printed the number of the bill.

Use of Legislative Halls and Offices

22. Permission to use other than for statutory purposes, either Legislative chamber or offices used by the two houses may be granted by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House as the case may be. During legislative sessions, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate shall have power to regulate the use of the halls and stairways of the parts of the capitol building used by their respective houses, for any purpose whatsoever.

Resolutions

23. Resolutions requiring concurrent action may originate in either House, and shall be of two kinds, namely:

Joint Resolutions: These resolutions shall be used for proposing amendments to the State Constitution and for ratifying amendments to the Federal Constitution. Joint resolutions shall be adopted as provided in section two, article fourteen of the Constitution.

Concurrent Resolutions: Such resolutions shall be used for all purposes not covered by joint resolutions as defined above.

Suspension of Joint Rules

24. No Joint Rule shall be suspended except by a two-thirds vote of each House, unless there be unanimous consent, such vote to be taken by year and nays.

LEGISLATIVE ENACTMENTS

EXTRAORDINARY SESSION, 1936

The Legislature of West Virginia was convened in extraordinary session by Governor Kump on June 15, 1936, adjourning sine die on June 20, 1936.

During the session, 32 bills were introduced, 18 originating in the House and 14 in the Senate. A total of 15 bills were passed by both Senate and House. No bills were vetoed by the Governor.

The following is a synopsis of the bills passed, all of which became laws with the approval of the Governor:

Appropriations

Chap. 2, page 72, Acts (House Bill No. 10, by Mr. Thomas)—Appropriates \$2,500,000.00 for the purpose of carrying into effect the public welfare law of 1936.

Chap. 3, page 73, Acts (House Bill No. 12, by Mr. LaFon)—Appropriation for carrying into effect the delinquent tax redemption law.

Chap. 4, page 74, Acts (House Bill No. 7, by Mr. Thomas)—Appropriation for the maintenance of the West Virginia Employment Service.

Chap. 5, page 75, Acts (House Bill No. 14, by Mr. Davis)—General appropriation bill to pay expenses of extraordinary session.

Chap. 6, page 78, Acts (House Bill No. 9, by Mr. Thomas)—Appropriation for relief of the needy.

Chap. 7, page 79, Acts (House Bill No. 8, by Mr. Thomas)—Appropriation for the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of public roads.

Chap. 8, page 80, Acts (House Bill No. 6, by Mr. Thomas)—Appropriation of state funds necessary to secure federal grants-in-aid for buildings now under construction at certain state institutions.

Chap. 9, page 81, Acts (Senate Bill No. 17, by Mr. Hodges, by request)—Appropriation for vocational rehabilitation.

Eminent Domain, Exercise of Right of by State Road Commission

Chap. 13, page 85, Acts (House Bill No. 13, by Mr. Martin, of Jefferson)—Authorizes State Road Commission to exercise right of eminent domain.

Federal Grants-In-Aid

Chap. 12, page 84, Acts (House Bill No. 4, by Mr. Pelter)—Authorizes county courts, district boards of education and municipalities to receive and expend federal grants-in-aid.

Forfeited and Escheated Lands

Chap. 11, page 83, Acts (House Bill No. 3, by Mr. Thomas)—Provides moratorium for the institution and prosecution of suits for sale of forfeited or escheated lands.

Interstate Cooperation

Chap. 15, page 88, Acts (Senate Bill No. 18, by Mr. Randolph and Mr. Barnhart)—Establishes West Virginia Commission on Interstate Cooperation.

Liquor Control Commission, Allocation of Receipts of

Chap. 14, page 87, Acts (Senate Bill No. 14, by Mr. Hodges, by request)—Provides for transfer monthly into the state fund general revenue of receipts of Liquor Control Commission in excess of requirements of operating and reserve funds.

Public Welfare

Chap. 1, page 1, Acts (House Bill No. 1, by Mr. Pelter)—Provides for public assistance to the agcd, blind and physically handicapped adult persons, dependent, crippled, neglected and delinquent children, and further provides for general relief of needy persons.

Redemption of Real Estate

Chap. 10, page 81, Acts (House Bill No. 2, by Mr. Thomas)—Extends time for redemption of real estate sold for non-payment of taxes.

STENOGRAPHERS

STATE LAW LIBRARY

The West Virginia state law library, consisting of law books and legal periodicals only, is situated on the third floor of the second unit of the capitol building.

The library is in charge of the state law librarian, appointed by the Supreme Court.

The books of the library consist of text-books purchased, and reports of other states as well as many foreign countries, all except text books coming in by exchange for West Virginia reports provided for by the state law librarian, as consecutive volumes of the reports of West Virginia and elsewhere are published.

The state law librarian, from West Virginia reports furnished him by the superintendent of public printing, supplies all judges of courts, state officers and some of the other law libraries of the state with copies of these reports.

The law governing the state law library provides that the library shall be open to the judges of the supreme court and the clerks, judges of the United States and circuit courts, state officers, and members and officers of the legislature during the session of that body.

It is also provided that no other person shall be permitted to remove any book or paper from the place where the library is kept.

A provision is also made, that "other persons than those prescribed above may be permitted to use the library at the place where it is kept."



WEST VIRGINIA FOUNDATION FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN AT BERKELEY SPRINGS

OBJECT

This project for experimentation in the therapeutic treatment of infantile paralysis by use of the water from the springs (state-owned) at Berkeley Springs is sponsored by the West Virginia Relief Administration in cooperation with the State Department of Public Welfare. The water there shows an analysis almost identical with that at Great Warm Springs, Georgia, which has great renown in connection with the treatment of infantile paralysis or pollomyelitis.

Only children are admitted to the institution. They have all been taken from indigent families in West Virginia and have been selected only after they have been examined, treated and approved by orthopedic surgeons designated by the State Department of Public Welfare. The Legislature of 1935 appropriated \$7,000.00 as a grant to Morgan County for the purchase of the property which is in use by the institution.

WEST VIRGINIA STATE FLAG

The present design for the West Virginia state flag was adopted by the legislature March 7, 1929. The proportions are the same as those of the United States ensign.

The field is pure white, upon the center of which is emblazoned in proper colors the coat-of-arms of the state, upon which appears the date of the admission of West Virginia into the Union and the motto "Montani Semper Liberi" (Mountaineers Always Freemen).

Above the coat-of-arms of the State of West Virginia there is a ribbon lettered. "State of West Virginia," and a wreath of rhododcadron maximum in proper colors is arranged appropriately around the lower part thereof. The field of pure white is bordered by a strip of blue on four sides.

THE STATE FLOWER

The rhododendron, or big laurel (rhododendron maximum), was named as the official state flower under the provisions of a joint resolution adopted by the legislature of West Virginia on January 23, 1903, during the administration of Governor Albert Blakeslee White,








Photo by Davies Studio Parkersburg, fourth largest city in West Virginia. Population 1933 (estimated), 30,100.

CENSUS

ESTIMATES OF POPULATION, WEST VIRGINIA 1935

(Compiled from data furnished by the United States Bureau of the Census)

West Virginia, originally a part of Virginia was admitted to the Union as the thirty-fifth State in June, 1863. Its population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was 1,729,205, which represents an increase of 265,504, or 18.1 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. On July 1, 1935. the population was estimated at 1,816,000. The area of the State is 24,282.45 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 72. as compared with 60.9 in 1920.

The following table shows the population of West Virginia trom 1870 to 1935, inclusive, together with the forcesse in each decade. The population at each census prior to 1870 of that part of Virginia which was later taken to form West Virginia; owns as follows: 1800, 376,688; 1850, 302,313; 1840, 224,537; 1830, 176,924; 1820, 136,808; 1810, 105,469; 1800, 78,592; 1790, 55,873.

Wheeling, with a population of 61,659, is the second city in West Virginia, and is closely followed by Charleston, the capital, with a population of 60,408. Other important cities in the order of their population are Parkersburg. Clarksburg, Fairmont, Bluefield, Morgantown, Martinsburg, and Moundsville. The combined population of Bluefield, W. Va., and the neighboring town of Bluefield, Va., is 23,245.

Built for the purpose of better providing for the under-privileged children of West Virginia, Camp Fair Chance, in Boone County, has cared for 836 children during the short period of its existence. Here have come neglected and dependent children from almost every county in the state and here they have been given a chance to grow healthy, physically and mentally.

The Camp Fair Chance of today is the achievement of several years of planning and experimenting by the Department of Public Welfare. The camp program was really started in this state in 1933, when two National Guard camps, at Kingwood and Point Pleasant, were used as health centers where children of families on relief rolls from all over the state were taken for reconditioning periods of two weeks each. Some three thousand children were cared for in these camps.

The following year, a Salvation Army camp in Putnam County was borrowed and two hundred children taken there from the county poor farms. The children were kept in the camp three months and plans made for their placement. Of these, 160 were placed in homes of relatives, boarding homes, or were adopted. In December of that year the forty remaining children were taken to a former CCC camp near Whitesville, in Boone County. About a hundred more children from destitute families were added to this group, and forty-two boys were taken from the Boys' Industrial School at Pruntytown and placed in the camp. These latter were nearly all under the age of thirteen years and had been sent to the Industrial School for minor offenses. They were all paroled to the Director of the Department of Public Welfare.

It soon became apparent that a more permanent site would be needed for the camp and a long-time program was planned. The result is Camp Fair Chance as it is today. Finished in June, 1935, the camp consists of ten barracks-like buildings on the slope of a hill three miles from Madison, just left off Route 119. The thirty-acre location, guaranteed by the Rotary Club of Madison and leased for a ten-year term by the Boone County Court, overlooks the village of Low Gap. Funds were made available through the West Virginia Relief Administration and the camp has since been financed by the Department of Public Welfare, the Works Progress Administration and the Relief Administration.

The land was cleared and the buildings constructed under the supervision of Captain Charles R. Marsh, commandant of the camp since its founding.

The buildings are light and comfortable, weather-boarded with white pine, and well insulated. The entire camp is provided with an electric lighting system, and large coal stoves are used for heating purposes. There are five barracks, three for boys and two for girls, each equipped to care for fifty children. Here there are rows of double-deck white enameled beds, and the girls' quarters are provided with bath rooms. At the rear of each is a supply room and a room for the house mother in charge.

The dining room, known in camp always as the mess hall, has a seating capacity of 280, and a dietitian and four cooks are employed. The commissary and laundry are located near the kitchen.

The infirmary is in the center of the camp and consists of two wards, a medicine supply room, a diet kitchen, a clinic and examination room, and quarters for the three registered nurses who are in charge. A doctor, provided by the Department of Public Welfare, makes daily calls and is available at all times of the day or night. Every precaution is used to avoid contagion and the camp has been singularly free from epidemics. Once a week each child is given a health examination and all children with communicable diseases are promptly isolated. Hospitalization and special treatments are provided by the Welfare Department, the children being taken to the Charleston hospitals.

Three of the buildings are used for school rooms and all grades up to the sixth are taught here. Children beyond these grades attend school at Madison. Six teachers are retained throughout the entire year, devoting their time during the summer months to the direction of recreational and vocational activities. Captain Marsh and his administrative staff occupy the administration building. The camp offices and record room are located in this building.

The hillside on which Camp Fair Chance stands has been terraced to provide ample space for the various sports of the children, and a road winds among the buildings. The site overlooks the valley and faces a thickly wooded hill side, lovely at all times of the year with oak and pine trees. Just over the edge of the hill, in Coal River, is a swimming hole, and swimming is the favorite summer sport. However, fishing is a close second.

Football and basketball are the most popular games, but tennis, volley ball and most all of the other usual children's games are provided. A large recreation hall is used for these sports during the winter months. Boy Scout troops, classes in woodcraft, a journalism club, a group of nature study students, and dramatic and glee clubs are among the many organizations of the camp.

Best known of all the groups at Camp Fair Chance, however, is the Drum and Bugle Corps, organized in June, 1935. It now consists of thirty-five boys and girls and plays every evening at retreat. Under Captain Marsh, the corps has appeared in many towns in the southern part of the state, and it has twice won prizes in the State American Legion junior drum and bugle corps contests.

The daily program for the camp is one providing much time for recreation. In the summer, the morning hours are devoted to keeping the camp and grounds in good condition and to vocational training. At noon, after lunch, there is a rest period of one hour, followed by an afternoon of supervised sports. Retreat is sounded at 4:30, and supper is served at five o'clock. The evenings are devoted to club activities and games.

In winter, the hours from 9 to 4 are spent in the school rooms, but the evenings are devoted to recreation for the younger children. The older children who attend school at Madison have a brief study period directly after supper. The children retire at 8:30.


Children are summoned and their hours of study and play regulated by bugle calls. They are taught to work and to play with precision.

Children from some thirty counties have been cared for at Camp Fair Chance since its establishment. Orphans and dependent children have come, many in family groups of three or four. They remain until other plans are made for them by the Department of Public Welfare. Some children are adopted and others placed in boarding homes; some, but relatively few, return to their own families. There are a few children who have been committed to the state, but these, too, are relatively few. The lengths of their stays, of course, vary greatly, the average time a child spends there being perhaps from four to flve months. The ages of the children vary from two to eighteen, the average being about twelve years. There are about three times as many boys as girls. Of the group from Pruntytown there are only sixteen still at the camp, the


others having been placed in boarding homes or adopted. The peak number of children at any one time was 287. At present there are 138, a number much smaller than the average.

The food, clothing, utilities and hospitalization, and the salaries of the administrative staff are now paid for by the Department of Public Welfare and the Relief Administration. The salaries of the other members of the staff are paid by the Works Progress Administration. Besides Captain Marsh, his administrative assistant, Miss Thelma I. Peebles, and the bookkeeper, Miss Rosalynd Poling, the staff of thirty-three includes a chief counselor, a recreational director, and teachers, nurses, and kitchen and laundry workers.

Camp Fair Chance has been and is an experiment. Its establishment is a result of our desire to see that West Virginia provides an opportunity for all children to make a success of life. That its establishment has been justified by the results obtained to date, primarily in the way of improved health and ment I attitude of hundreds of West Virginia children, no one who has ever visited the camp or who knows of its achievements can entertain the slightest doubt.

CONSERVATION

THE SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM IN WEST VIRGINIA

A reconnaisance survey of soil erosion was recently made of the state of West Virginia and from this source it was found that the state is suffering very much from soil losses. On areas which have been to any extent farmed and especially areas in which considerable cultivation has taken place, erosion is a very serious matter. In fact, some areas in the state have been completely ruined for agricultural purposes. It is not the purpose of the Soil Conservation Service to reclaim areas which have been completely ruined, but to take areas which have been seriously damaged and in which there is a possibility of preventing further erosion and setting up on such areas erosion control plans for the purpose of demonstrating what can be done to curtail losses of this kind.

At the request of the owner a map is made of a farm in one of the affected areas. This map shows the soil types, the kind of cover, the degree of erosion and the slope of the land. With this map as a base, and with pertinent information relative to the previous management of the farm, Soil Conservation Service technicians develop a plan of erosion control which includes reforestation, pasture improvement, improved crop rotations, contour strip cropping, contour cultivation, construction of temporary and permanent mechanical erosion controls, and other important measures. This plan is worked out to the satisfaction of the farmer and he is expected to follow it for a period of five years. Much of the labor used in planting trees and performing other work necessary to put the plan in effect is furnished by the CCC camps. For the inconvenience It sometimes causes the farmers, and in order to make the demonstration immediately effective, the Soil Conservation Service provides trees and operates its own nurseries. Every farm worked up under this plan becomes a demonstration over a period of years of what can be done to control erosion. The areas in which this work is being performed become units themselves, clearly demonstrating to the people of other sections just how erosion can be controlled.

The project at Spencer was started about two and one-half years ago and embraces some fifty thousand acres of land in the Reedy Creek watershed. This project was placed on a maintenance basis July 1, 1936, after cooperative agreements had been worked up on 441 farms within the area. These agreements were designed to give complete crosion control protection, such plans being put into effect as rapidly as possible. For the next two and one-half years while this project is on a maintenance basis, an effort will be made to improve these farm plans by such revisions and amendments as are necessary in order to make the soil conservation program on such farms more effective.

During the past year, the Soil Conservation Service extended its operations of erosion control to another watershed area in Marshall County. This area consists of approximately 25,000 acres of the best farm land in that section. This new project has made exceedingly good progress and it, too, will go on a maintenance basis July 1, 1937. Already one hundred and ton farm plans have been worked out, which represent approximately seventy-five per cent of the farms within the watershed. The plan to be followed here during the next

three years will be practically the same as is in operation at Spencer at the present time, with perhaps certain slight changes which may be advisable in order to make the program more effective.

In connection with these two watershed demonstrational areas there has been assigned to the service seven Civilian Conservation Corps Camps which are under the direction of soil conservation specialists who are performing control work in definite areas. This work was started only late last fall; however, considerable progress has been made during the year.

Near Moundsville, there is located ECW—SCS Camp No. 3. In addition to working on the Moundsville watershed area, this camp has succeeded in working up thirty-four cooperative agreements on farms, aggregating a total of 5.004 acres.

ECW—SCS Camp No. 2 near Elizabeth, Wirt County, has secured sixty-six agreements, totaling 7,440 acres; Camp No. 6 at Ripley, Jackson County, sixty agreements, totaling 12,016 acres; and, Camp No. 7 at Nutter Fort, Harrison County, sixty-one agreements, comprising an area of 10,654 acres.

At Lewisburg, in Greenbrier County, is located ECW—SCS Camp No. 5. This is also in one of the very best agricultural sections of the state and this camp has been fortunate in securing seventy-five excellent erosion control agreements, aggregating a total of 13,347 acres.

West Virginia ECW—SCS Camp No. 1, which was located near Spencer, in Roane County, has been discontinued except for occasional use as an auxiliary camp for those engaged in work at the Soil Conservation Nursery located near Reedy. This camp was located inside the Spencer watershed area and devoted its efforts exclusively to that area before being discontinued.

At Beverly, in Randolph County, there is located ECW—SCS Camp No. 8. This camp, during the past year, has devoted its efforts to work on the Tygart Valley Homestead project near Elkins. At present a small soil conservation service area is being developed in the Leading Creek section north of Elkins, and during the next six months this camp will divide its time between the work on this area and the Tygart Valley Homestead project.

The ECW—SCS Camps are working within an area extending for a radius of approximately ten miles from each camp. In each of these camp areas an erosion control program, much the same as those being carried out in the watershed demonstrational areas, is being put into effect.

The work of the Soil Conservation Service has a far broader reach than can be expressed in a few words. It includes relationships to flood control and water conservation. It is a well known fact, fully recognized by the soil conservation forces over the country, that vegetative cover is one of the best means for controlling moisture losses and run off. To date, in all the areas in which this work is being performed in West Virginia, approximately 918 farms have been planned for erosion control protection. This number will become considerably larger during the present winter and spring.

Potomac River

Formed by the junction of the North and South Branches near Green Spring, Hampshire County, West Virginia. Mouth, Chesapeake Bay.

South Branch Potomac River

Source near Hightown in Highland County, Virginia. Mouth, junction with North Branch to form Potomac River near Green Spring, Hampshire County, West Virginia.

North Branch Potomac River

Source at Fairfax Stone at southwestern corner of Maryland. Mouth, junction with South Branch to form Potomac River.

Monongahela River

Formed by the junction of Tygart and West Fork Rivers at Fairmont, West Virginia. Joins the Allegheny River at Pittsburgh to form the Ohio River.

Cheat River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Monongahela River at Point Marion, Pennsylvania.

Tygart River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with West Fork River at Fairmont to form the Monongahela River.

West Fork River

Source in western part of Upshur County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction, with Tygart River at Fairmont to form the Monongahela River.

Ohio River

Formed by the junction of the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Mouth, junction with Mississippi River at Cairo, Illinois.

Little Kanawha River

Source in southern part of Upshur County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Parkersburg, West Virginia.

Kanawha River

Formed by the junction of New and Gauley Rivers just above Kanawha Falls in Fayette County, West Virginia. Mouth, Junction with Ohio River at Point Pieasant, Mason County, West Virginia.

New River

Source in central part of Watauga County in northwest corner of North Carolina. Mouth, junction with Gauley River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Greenbrier River

Source in northern part of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with New River just above Hinton in Summers County, West Virginia.

Gauley River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with New River in Fayette County to form Kanawha River.

Elk River

Source in western part of Pocahontas County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at Charleston, Kanawha County, West Virginia.

Coal River

Source in central part of Raleigh County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Kanawha River at St. Albans, Kanawha County, West Virginia.

Guyandotte River

Source in southern part of Raleigh County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohlo River at Guyandotte, near Huntington, Cabell County, West Virginia.

Big Sandy River

Formed by the junction of Tug Fork and Levisa Fork at Louisa, Kentucky, Ft. Gay, Wayne County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Ohio River at Kenova, Wayne County, West Virginia.

Tug Fork


Source in southeastern part of McDowell County, West Virginia. Mouth, junction with Levisa Fork to form Big Sandy River at Louisa, Kentucky.



DEPTH AVAILABLE FOR NAVIGATION

Ohio River—Improvement of the Ohio River, as authorized by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of June 25, 1910, provides for a channel depth of 9 feet in the entire 931 miles of the river by the construction of locks and dams and open channel work. The system of locks and dams throughout the river provides a navigable depth of 9 feet at ordinary river stage. New dams of modern design are being completed near flogsett, West Virginia (Gallipolis Lock and Dam), and at Montgomery Island, 32 miles below Pittsburgh.

Monongahela River, West Virginia and Pennsylvania—The existing project provides for improvement of the river by 14 locks and dams to afford slack-water navigation from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to 4 miles above Fairmont, a distance of 131 miles. The project is approximately complete and the controlling depth between Pittsburgh and Morgantown, 101.5 miles above the mouth is 8 feet, and above Morgantown 7 feet to the upper limits of the project.

Kanawha River, West Virginia—The existing project provides for the construction of 3 modern dams on the Kanawha River, with twin locks, and one lock and dam on the Ohio River, near Hogsett, West Virginia, to furnish a 3-foot navigable depth from the Ohio to a point 90.57 miles above the mouth. The depth available at the present time is 6 feet from the mouth to Charleston and 9 feet from Charleston to the head of improvement. Procurement of a 9-foot depth below Charleston is dependent upon completion of the Gallipolis Dam, which is now under construction.

Big Sandy River, West Virginia and Kentucky, including Levisa and Tug Forks—The existing project provides for 3 locks and dams on the main river, 2 locks and dams each on Levisa Fork and Tug Fork, and regulating works below Lock No. 1, reaching to the Ohio River. The 3 locks and dams on the main river and the lower lock and dam on each fork have been constructed, providing a slack-water depth of 6 feet from the Ohio River to Louisa, Kentucky, 27 miles, and thence to Cox Branch on Levisa Fork and to Bear Branch on Tug Fork, 17.5 and 12.5 miles, respectively, above Louisa.

Tygart River Reservoir Project—The Tygart River Dam, located on the Tygart River, 2½ miles upstream from Grafton, as authorized by the Public Works Administration January 11, 1924 and approved by Congress in the River and Harbor Act of August 30, 1935, provides for a dam 1,850 feet long and 215 feet high for the storage of 337,500 acre-feet of water to control floods and aid navigation in the Monongahela River.

Bluestone Reservoir Project—The proposed Bluestone Reservoir, located on the New River, 2½ miles above Hinton, was authorized by Executive order dated September 12, 1935, and approved by Congress in the Flood Control Act of June 22, 1936. The project, designed to afford flood control in the Kanawha and Ohio Valleys, the development of power, and as an aid to navigation, provides for a concrete gravity type dam 180 feet high and 2,060 feet long, and a reservoir with a surface area of 9,040 acres and storage capacity of 625,600 acre-feet, extending 35 miles up New River, 7 miles up Bluestone River, and 10 miles up Indian Creek.

HISTORICAL

VIRGINIA FRONTIER DEFENSES, 1719-1795



The story of the defense of the frontier of Virginia begins about the year 1719, by which time there seems to be reasonable evidence of settlers south of the Potomac River, on what is now the soil of West Virginia. The Indian, with some misgivings, of course, viewed the gradual encroachment of the white man in this region with a certain degree of tolerance. Indeed, for thirty years the two groups lived to some extent in peace and harmony. However, entrance of the French into the Ohio Valley led to the opening of the French and Indian War in 1754, which, while it ended in America by 1762, actually swept on into the fields of Europe. The opening marked the beginning of border warfare between settlers and colonial and state troops and the Indians that did not end until the power of the tribes was broken by General Anthony Wayne, in the treaty of 1795.

Robert Dinwiddle, Royal Governor of Virginia, gave more than passing attention to the western border of that day. In March, 1756, the Virginia Assembly authorized the erection of a chain of defenses on the west. Colonel George Washington, who had achieved distinction in the operations of the British Army and the local troops in the Fort Duquesne (Pittsburgh) region, was placed in charge. A long region reaching out from the head of the Ohio River, swinging east to Wills Creek (Cumberland), and thence roughly following the Allegheny Mountains to North Carolina, received attention. A chain of forts about twenty miles apart, designed to afford some protection for the settlers, was constructed during the next year. Many were the scenes of tragic episodes in which numerous lives were lost, especially in the region now along the South Branch of the Potomac.

The Ohio valley was the key to the possession of the continent. The ten years of comparative peace following the close of the French and Indian war disclosed a continual movement from eastern Virginia to western Virginia, and a like movement down along the Ohio River from the Pittsburgh entrance. The old line of defense fell more or less into disuse. Then came the hectic days of 1774, and a new outbreak between the settlers and the Indians, called Dunmore's War, of which the most important episode was the Battle of Point Pleasant. A new line of defense was then developed, running from Fort Pitt, and "old Fort Redstone," following generally the Monongahela and West Fork of the Monongahela, and the Ohio Valley, together with the regions along the Great Kanawha as far west as Maysville, Kentucky. In western Virginia there then sprang up a long series of forts, stockades, and blockhouses, located at strategic points to safeguard the pioneer settlers in this region.

The defenses of the frontier may be classified into three general groups. First, the fort, which was the strongest type of a fortress, and generally but not always erected under the direction of the Executive Council of the State, and garrisoned in like manner. Second, the stockade, which was usually a large log house with a palisade around it, embracing enough ground to shelter several families in time of need. Third, the blockhouse, which was to be found of several types. Some had a second story, overhung, and others simply had provision made for rifle defense.

In the preparation of the list appended, no attempt has been made to go into extensive details. There is merely a brief statement as to location. It provides a check list, arranged alphabetically, of names of posts of defense on the border, which has been compiled from records and letters, and in some cases from pension applications of participants.

FORTS, STOCKADES AND BLOCKHOUSES

Arbuckle

A stockade erected about 1774 by Captain Mathew Arbuckle at the mouth of Mill Creek, a branch of Muddy Creek, Greenbrier County.

Ashby

A stockade, located on the east bank of Patterson's Creek, on the site of the village of Alaska, formerly Frankfort, Mineral County. Erected by a company of men commanded by Lt. John Bacon, in 1755, and named for Captain John Ashby. One of the buildings erected therein is the only remaining structure of its kind in West Virginia dating back to the frontier posts of defense.

Bailey

See Davidson.

Baker

Erected in 1782, by Captain John Baker. Located at the head of Cresap's Bottom, Mead District, Marshall County. Also designated in many contemporary records as "Baker's Station," and sometimes as "Cresap's Fort."

Baldwin

A blockhouse situated on the site of Blacksville, Clay District, Monongalia County.

Beech

See West.

Beech Bottom

A small stockade, situated in Buffalo District, Brooke County, twelve miles above Wheeling. The garrison participated in the first siege of Fort Honry in 1777, and also in Indian incursions of March, 1789.

Beeler

A stockade erected in 1779 by Colonel Joseph Beeler at Beeler Station Church, eight miles from the site of the town of Cameron, Marshall County. Designated as "Beeler's Station." A garrison of fifty men was stationed there in 1781.

Belleville

A rather extensive fort, erected on the site of Belleville, Wood County, in 1785, under direction of Captain Joseph Wood. Composed of a group of four blockhouses, embracing a square 100 x 300 feet, in which was located a central fort building, 20 x 40, two stories high.

Bingaman

A small fort situated four miles south of Petersburg, in Grant County. Named for Samuel Bingaman.

Blair

See Randolph.

Bowling

The exact location has never been ascertained, but records indicate its existence in the "panhandle" above Wheeling.

Buckhannen

A small fort situated at Red Rock, about two and one-half miles west of Buckhannon, Upshur County. Scene of an Indian foray March 8, 1781.

Burnside

Mentioned in contemporary records. Situated in territory now embraced in Monroe County. Also listed as Byrnside.

Burris

A small fort located on the "Flats" on the east side of the Monongahela River, Morgan District, Monongalia County.

Bush

This fort was situated about a mile and one-half northeast of Buckhannon, above where Turkey Run joins the Buckhannon River in Upshur County. Location of settlement by Hackers, Jacksons, and others, as early as 1769.

Butler

A small fort erected about 1774 at the mouth of Roaring Creek, on the east side of Cheat River, Preston County.

Buttermilk

A stockade located on the South Branch of the Potomac, three miles above the present town of Moorefield, Hardy County. Sometimes referred to as "Fort Waggoner," a title derived from the fact that Captain Thomas Waggoner once commanded troops at that point.

Capon

A stockade located at the "forks of Capon," in the Great Cacapon River valley, Hampshire County.

Cassino

See Currence.

Chapman

A blockhouse erected by the Chapman family in 1784, near the site of New Cumberland, Hancock County.

Charles

The history of this fort is not clear. On August 10, 1776, Col. John Stuart, at Greenbrier, reported that he "expects to have a fort soon completed at Camp Union," now Lewisburg. On Sept. 20, Captain McKee reported to Colonel William Fleming, "I arrived at Fort Charles in the Savannah on the 27th with only 17 men."

Clark

A small stockade fort erected by Henry Clark in 1771, on Pleasant Hill, Union District, Marshall County. Consisted of four cabins, with a ten-foot pallsade wall.

Clover Lick

A small fort erected by Jacob Warwlck at Clover Lick, Pocahontas County. Also mentioned as Warwick's Fort.

Coal

See Tackett.

Cobun

A small stockade fort erected by Jonathan Cobun in 1770, near Dorsey's Knob, on Cobun's Creek, Monongalia County.

Cocke

A stockade located on Patterson's Creek, six miles southeast of Keyser, and nine miles from Fort Ashby. Named for Captain Thomas Cocke.

Cook

A large stockade fort embracing one and one-half acres with four block houses erected under direction of Captain John Cook, situated on Indian Creek, just below Greenville, Monroe County. It sheltered over three hundred settlers in 1778.

Coon

A small fort located on the west bank of Coon's Run, about three miles from the West Fork of the Monongahela, in Marlon County.

Cooper

A blockhouse erected by Leonard Cooper in 1792, on the north bank of the Great Kanawha River, eight miles above Point Pleasant.

Cresap's

See Baker's.

Cox

A stockade fort located at the mouth of the Little Cacapon River, on the eastern side of the stream, Named for Friend Cox.

Culbertson

A stockade erected in 1774 by Captain James Robertson. It was situated on the site of a settlement established by Androw Culbertson in 1753, now known as Crump's Bottom, on New River, Summers County. Frequently mentioned in early records as "Fort Byrd," and "Fort Field."

Currence

A small fort erected in 1774, onehalf mile east of the site of the town of Crickard (Mill Creek), Huttonsville District, Randolph County. It has also been called "Fort Cassino."

Davidson-Bailey

A small blockhouse erected about 1780 by John G. Davidson and Richard Bailey, near the head of Beaver Pond Springs, a short distance from the site of present Bluefield.

Davisson

A small blockhouse type dwelling erected by Daniel Davisson near the corner of Chestnut and Pike Streets, Clarksburg.

Day

See Keckley.

Desiance

Located on the South Branch of the Potomac, about twenty miles above the "Trough."

Dinwiddie

A stockade situated on the site of Stewartstown, Monongalla County. Appears to have been erected by John Rogers, and sometimes called "Fort Rogers."

Donnally

A large, two-story double log house surrounded by a pallsaded wall erected by Col. Andrew Donnally prior to 1771, on Rader's Run, near present Williamsburg, Greenbrier County. Seene of a most important action of the border wars in May, 1778, and one of the most important military posts on the frontier.

Drennan

A small fort situated at Edray, Pocahontas County. Named for Thomas Drennan.

Dunmore

A small blockhouse, situated on the site of Dunmore, Pocahontas County.

Edington

A small fort situated near the mouth of Harmon's Creek (opposite Steubenville, Ohlo), in Cross Creek District, Brooke County.

Edwards

A small fort situated five miles south of present Boothsville, in Booth's Creek District, Taylor County.

Edwards

A stockade located on or near the site of present Capon Bridge, Hampshire County. Named for the family of that name, owners of the land thereabouts.

Enoch's

Situated on the Great Cacapon River, fifteen miles from its mouth, at or near the present village of Largent.

Evans

A stockade fort situated two miles south of present Martinsburg, at the head of Big Spring, Berkeley County. Erected by John Evans, in 1755-56.

Farley

Situated on New River at what is known as "Warford," on Crump's Bottom, Summers County. Erected by Thomas Farley.

Field

See Culbertson.

Fincastle

See Fort Henry.

Flesher's

A small blockhouse erected at what is now the corner of Main and Second Streets, in the city of Weston. Contemporary records indicate as "Fiesher's Station."

Flinn

A small stockade erected under direction of members of the Flinn family, located on the upper point, at the junction of Lee Creek with the Ohio River, in Wood County. In early records frequently designated as "Flinn's Station."

Friend

A small fort erected by Jonas Friend, at Maxwell's Ferry, on Leading Creek, Randolph County. Scene of important Indian forays in 1781.

Furman

A stockade situated three miles north of Romney, Hampshire County. Erected under direction of William Furman. Also called Forman and Foreman.

George

A small stockade situated on the east bank of the South Branch of the Potoniac, near present Petersburg, Grant County. Presumably erected by the Welton family about 1754.

Greenbrier

Erected about 1771 by Captain Peter VanBibber, situated on Wolf Creek near site of Lowell, Summers County. Scene of attack on Graham family in 1777. Possibly also known as Jarrett's Fort.

Green Bryer

A small station erected by Andrew Lewis on the site of Marlinton, 1755.

Hadden

A small fort erected by John Hadden, near the mouth of Becco's Creek, Randolph County.

Hadden

A strong fort situated on the point of land on the west side of the stream at the junction of Elkwater Creek with the Tygarts Valley River, Randolph County. Named for the family of that name who came to this location from the South Branch of the Potomac. Sometimes mentioned as Old Fort.

Harbert

A blockhouse erected on Jones Run, a branch of Ten Mile Creek, about two miles from Lumberport, Harrison County. Scene of an Indian attack, March 3, 1778.

Harness

Situated, according to the Washington papers,—"81 miles west of Fourt Loudoun (Winchester), and on the South Branch," for the protection of the inhabitants of the "trough" region of the valley.

Harrison

A stockade fort erected by Richard Harrison at the source of Crooked Run, in Cass District, Monongalla County, on the west side of the Monongahela River.

Hedges

A small stockade on the west side of Back Creek, near Hedgesville, on the road leading from Martinsburg to Berkeley Springs.

Henrey

A local fort in Greenbrier County, the exact location of which is not known. In command of Captain James Henderson, September 12, 1777.

Henry

This was one of the largest and most important forts on the Virginia border. It was erected in part on the high bluff along what is now Market Street, in the city of Wheeling, in 1774, by Ebenezer Zane and John Caldwell, under the military direction of Major Angus McDonald. It was first designated as Fort Fincastle, in honor of the Viscount Fincastle, better known to Virginians as Lord Dunmore. He visited the post in the fall of 1774, with a command of twelve hundred men, during the "Point Pleasant Campaign." In 1777 the fort was rebullt and much enlarged, embracing in all more than half an acre of ground, and renamed Fort Henry, in honor of Patrick Henry. The fort underwent a slege by Indians in 1777, and in September, 1782, was the scene of the last engagement of the American Revolution.

Hinkles

A stockade fort erected about 1760 by John Justus Hinkle, near the site of Riverton, on the North Fork of the South Branch of the Potomac, in Pendleton County.

Holliday

A small fort erected in 1776 on the site of Holliday's Cove, Hancock County.

Hopewell

Situated on the South Branch of the Potomac, at a location unknown. Mentioned in Washington Papers in 1754.

Jackson

A small blockhouse, beatered about three miles west of Bush's Fort, on Fink's Run, Upshur County.

Jackson

A small stockade erected in 1774 on Ten Mile Creek, Sardis District, Harrlson County.

Jarrett

See Greenbrier.

Keckley

A small fort crected about 1772 at present Millpoint, Little Levels District, Pocahontas County. Subsequently sometimes designated as Fort Day, and Price's Old Fort, and Keekley.

Keeney

A small fort situated near Keeney's Knob, Summers County.

Kelly

A small fort erected by Captain William Morris in 1774, on the site of Cedar Grove, Kanawha County, at the mouth of Kellys Creek. Named for Walter Kelly, who attempted to establish a settlement at this point, but was killed by the Indians. Appears as "Kelly's Station" in many contemporary records.

Kerns

A stockade fort erected about 1772 by Michael Kerns at the mouth of Deckers Creek, now the Greenment section of the city of Morgantown. An important frontier post.

Lee

An important military post erected in April, 1788, at the corner of present Brooks and Kanawha Streets, on the site of Charleston, by a company of Virginia Rangers under Colonel George Clendenin. Named for Henry Lee, governor of Virginia, but better known as General "Light Horse Harry" Lee, of the American Revolution. Sometimes referred to as "Clendenin's Station."

Liberty

A blockhouse, situated on the site of West Liberty, Ohio County. Sometimes called the "Court House Fort."

Link

A blockhouse erected by Jonathan Link in 1780, near the site of Triadelphla, Ohio County. Scene of an important Indian attack in 1781.

Maidstone

A stockade situated on the point at the mouth of the Great Cacapon River, Morgan County. Erected 1756.

Mann's

A small fort erected by Adam and Jacob Mann, about 1770, situated on Indian Creek, ten miles west of Union, Monroe County.

Martin

A stockade erected by Presley Martin at the mouth of Fish Creek, Franklin District, Marshall County.

Martin

A fort erected by Charles Martin in 1773, situated on the west side of the Monongahela River, on Crooked Run, in Cass District, Monongalia County. Scene of an Indian attack in June, 1779.

Mason (Hugh) Mill Fort

Situated near Upper Tract, Pendleton County.

Minear

This fort was situated on the site of St. George, Tucker County, erected in 1774 by John Minear. Scene of Indian depredations in 1780 and 1781.

Morgan

A small stockade fort erected about 1772, by members of the Morgan family, on the site of the city of Morgantown. Near "Fort Kerns."

Morris

A stockade embracing about an acre of ground, on Hog Run of Sandy Creek, Grant District, Preston County. Constructed under the direction of Richard Morris, in 1774.

Morris

A stockade fort erected by Captain John Morris in 1774-75. It was located on the south bank of the Great Kanawha River, opposite the mouth of Campbells Creek, near what Is now known as South Malden, Kanawha County.

McKenzie

Situated at an undetermined location on the South Branch of the Potomac. Named for Captain Robert McKenzie. Mentioned in Dinwiddle Papers 1757.

Neal

A stockade fort erected in 1786, under direction of Captain James Neal. It was situated on the south bank of the Little Kanawha River, one mile from its mouth, in what is now the "Fort Neal" section of the city of Parkersburg. It was an important place of refuge during the Indian wars, and the object of Indian forays in August, 1789. Appears in many contemporary records as "Neal's Station."

Neally

A small stockade on Opequon River, Berkeley County. Scene of an Indian attack and massacre, September 17, 1756.

Nutter

A stockade fort erected by the family of that name in 1772, on the east bank of Elk Creek, now embraced in the "Nutter Fort" section of the city of Clarksburg.

Ogden

Situated on Difficult Creek, Grant County, southeast of Gormania. Also called "Logsdon Fort."

Ohio

A blockhouse erected in 1750, for the Ohio Company on the site of Ridgely, Mineral County.

Parkers

Situated on the South Branch of the Potomac, ten miles from Fort Ashby.

Paris's

Location unknown. Mentioned in Washington Papers, May 13, 1756. indicating that it was near Ashby's Fort.

Patterson's

Said to have been situated on the South Branch of the Potomac.

Pawpaw

Small fort situated on Pawpaw Creek, not far from the town of Rivesville, Marlon County.

Pearsall

A stockade erected by Job Pearsall, 1755-1756, on the site of present Romney.

Peterson

A small stockade situated on the South Branch of the Potomac, two miles above the mouth of the North Branch, Grant County. Erected 1756.

Pierpont

A small fort erected in 1769 by John Pierpont. It was located about one mile from the village of Easton, and about four miles from Morgantown, in Union District, Monongalla County.

Pleasant

A large stockade comprising cabins, palisades and blockhouses. It was situated on the "Indian Old Fields," in Hardy County, a mile and one-half above the "Trough." Erected in 1756 by Captain Thomas Waggoner. Often called "Fort Van Meter," and later "Town Fort," because of proximity to Moorefield. Near here in 1756 was fought by the Indians and white settlers the "battle of the Trough," so widely known in the annals of the border.

Powers

A small stockade erected, presumably by James Powers, in 1771. It was located about one mile north of the town of Bridgeport, on Simpson's Creek, in Harrison County.

Prickett

A stockade fort erected by the family of that name in 1774, situated at the mouth of Prickett's Creek, on the east side of the Monongahela River, five miles below the city of Fairmont. It was here in 1779 that the celebrated encounter between David Morgan and the Indians took place.

Randolph

This fort stood on the site of the city of Point Pleasant, and along with Fort Henry and Fort Donnally was one of the most important frontier military posts. The first stockade was erected here, under the direction of General Andrew Lewis, following the battle of Point Pleasant, October 10, 1774, during Dunmore's War. Later in the fall of the same year, Captain Williams Russell, with a company of rangers, appeared, and erected a new fort composed of two block houses, and a pallsade, which was named Fort Blair, in honor of John Blair. It was evacuated and abandoned in June, 1775, and presumably destroyed by the Indians. During the summer of 1776, under the direction of Captain Mathew Arbuckle, a larger and more pretentious fort was erected, which was named Fort Randolph, in honor of Peyton Randolph. This in turn was abandoned by the garrison in July, a short distance above the previous sites, in which a garrison was stationed until 1795, commanded most of the time by Colonel Thomas Lewis. Fort Randolph underwent a siege by the Indians in May, 1778.

1779, and was burned by the Indians. About 1786 another fort was erected

Rice

A large stockade fort erected by the Rice family, located on Buffalo Creek, about fifteen miles from its mouth, in Brooke County, near the present location of Bethany College. It was the scene in September, 1782, of one of the most important episodes in the Indians wars, during which six defenders drove away a band of over a hundred Indians.

Richards

This was an important fort erected in 1774, by Arnold Richards, located on the west bank of the West Fork of the Monongahela, half a mile southeast of West Milford, Harrison County. Also designated as Lowther's Fort and West Fork Fort.

Riddle

A small stockade on Lost River, Hardy County. Scene in 1756 of a battle between a body of Indians commanded by a French officer. and a company of Virginia frontiersmen. Also listed as Ruddle.

Robinson

A blockhouse erected by Captain Isaac Robinson in 1794, located on the Ohio River opposite the foot of Six Mile Island, Mason County. It was attacked by Indians the same year.

Rogers

See Dinwlddie.

Salem

A blockhouse situated on the site of New Salem, now Salem, erected by a group of settlers from Salem, New Jersey.

Savannah

A most important military post located on the site of Lewisburg, Greenbrier County, presumably between 1769 and 1774. It was the meeting point for the Virginians who marched under General Andrew Lewis to Point Pleasant, in the fall of 1774. Some authorities suggest that a fort may have been erected on this site as early as 1755, under orders issued by General Braddock.

Sellers

A small stockade at the mouth of Patterson's Creek, erected 1756. Named for Thomas Sellers.

Seybert

A large stockade having cabins, palisades and blockhouses, situated on the South Fork of the South Branch of the Potonac, twelve miles northeast of Franklin, Pendleton County. Scene of Indian massacre, April 28, 1758.

Shepherd

Situated on the Potomac River, near "Old Pack Horse Fort," where Shepherd College now stands, Shepherdstown. History obscure.

Shepherd

A most important stockade fort, erected in 1775, under direction of Captain David Shepherd, situated at the forks of Wheeling Creek, near present Triadelphia, Ohio County. It was evacuated in September, 1777, and burned by the Indians, but rebuilt in 1786, and further extended in 1790.

Statler

A stockade fort erected by John Statler after 1770. on Dunkard Creek, Clay District, Monongalla County. Scene of a bitter Indian attack in 1779, when many settlers lost their lives.

Stewart

A blockhouse erected by John Stewart in 1773, on Stewart's Run, about two miles from Georgetown, Grant District, Monongalla County,

Stuart

A fort erected by Colonel John Stuart, at a large spring, four miles southwest of Lewisburg, Fort Spring District, Greenbrier County. It is often referred to as "Fort Spring," and this title has been much used in other directions. An important military post, and here was held the first court of Greenbrier County. The builder was one of the most remarkable men on the border.

Tackett

A small stockade fort erected by Lewis Tackett, as early as 1787, located one-half mile below the mouth of Coal River, Kanawha County. The site is now embraced in the town of St. Albans. It was destroyed by the Indians on August 27, 1790.

Tomlinson

A stockade fort erected in 1770 by Joseph Tomlinson, on a site now embraced in the city of Moundsville, Marshall County. It was located about three hundred yards north of the noted Graves Creek Mound. It was abandoned in 1777, and about that time was destroyed by Indians, but was rebuilt shortly after 1784.

Town

See Pleasant.

Trout Rock

Situated at present Trout Rock, four mlles south of Franklin, Pendleton County.

Union

A title sometimes by error applied to Fort Savannah, located on site of Lewisburg. Colonel William Fleming, commanding the Botetourt troops in the fall of 1774, records on September 2rd. "we were alarmed by a report that Stuart's Fort four miles from CAMP UNION was attacked by Indians." Other contemporary records agree that the camp was known as "Camp Union" and this has subsequently been by mistake confused with a "Fort Union" and "Fort Savannah."

Upper Tract

A stockade erected in 1756, situated a short distance west of the South Branch of the Potomac, at what is now "Upper Tract," Mill Run District, Pendleton County. Destroyed April 27, 1758, during attack by Indians, when many were killed.

Van Meter

A stockade fort, erected in 1774, situated on the north side of Short Creek, about five miles from its confluence with the Ohio, in Richland District, Ohio County. For a time Major Samuel McCulloch was commander.

Waggoner

See Buttermilk.

Warden

A small stockade situated in the vicinity of present Wardensville, Hardy County.

Warwick

Small fort erected by John Warwick, at forks of Deer Creek, near Greenbank, Pocahontas County.

Warwick

A small fort erected by Jacob Warwick, situated in what is now Huttonsville District, Randolph County. This was an important early point of defense in the Tygart Valley River region.

Wells

A stockade fort erected in 1773 by Richard Wells. It was situated on the ridge between Cross Creek and Harmon's Creek, in Brooke County. Wells was widely known among both Indians and whites as "Grey Beard."

West

A stockade fort erected by members of the West family, on the present site of the town of Jane Lew, Lewis County. It was built about 1770 and for a number of years offered some defense to the important settlements on Hacker's Creek, which suffered more severely at the hands of the Indians than most any other region on the border. The fort was destroyed in 1779, but in 1790 some of the settlers

ventured back and built another fort a short distance away, which was called Beech Fort.

Westfall

A stockade fort erected by Jacob Westfall in 1774, located on the southern border of the site of Beverly, Randolph County, near mouth of Files Creek. Scene of an Indian attack in 1782.

West Fork

See Richards.

Wetzel

A stockade fort erected about 1769 by John Wetzel and his noted sons, twelve miles from Wheeling, on Wheeling Creek, in what is now Sand Hill District, Marshall County.

White's

A pallsaded house built by Major Robert White, near Cacapon River.

Williams

A stockade situated on the South Branch of the Potomac, two miles below Hanging Rock, Hampshire County.

Wilson

This fort was located about half a mile above the mouth of Chenoweth's Creek, on the east side of Tygart's Valley River, Leadville District Randolph County. This was a very important early frontier post, and was erected by Colonel Benjamin Wilson, one of the most aggressive and important men on the border. In 1782 twenty-two families took refuge here.

Woods

A stockade fort situated on Rich Creek, about four miles east of Peterstown, Monroe County. It was constructed about 1773 by Captain Michael Woods and had many important contacts with operations in southern western Virginia, and with the operations of George Rogers Clark in Illinois regions.

Unknown

A fort mentioned by Kercheval and others, unnamed, located seven miles above present Romney.

^{*}It is difficult to make a clear and comprehensive list of the Governors of Virginia, for the reason that the person bearing the title of governor often resided in England, while the real official head, residing in Virginia, was a deputy. The history of Virginia executives divides itself into nine heads, including the period at attempted colonization in the time of Elizabeth, though the real history of Virginia begins with the London Company, whose rule lasted for eighteen years, under two presidents or treasurers—Sir Thomas Smith and Sir Edwin Sandys—neither of whom visited the colony. Therefore, the early government of Virginia was intended to be a colonial council, with a president, often spoken of as governor. The first man ever to have the title of "governor" was Lord Delaware, appointed by the London Company, in 1609, to hold office for life. He held this position for nine years, dying in 1618. He resided in Virginia only nine months and for the balance of the nine years was represented by a deputy. In 1624 the London Company lost its charter, and Virginia then passed into the hands of the King, who, from time to time, appointed royal governors. These governors often resided in England, and were represented in Virginia by deputies. Virginia still retained a resident council, and if, for any reason, the governor or deputy governor was absent from the colony, the president of the council was the acting governor. In 1652, Virginia passed under the Commonwealth (Cromwell) and the General Assembly, by its own authority, elected four governors. From 1660 to 1776 Virginia was again under the rule of the King, who appointed the governors. During this period there were only ten governors of Virginia, but a great number of deputies. Of these governors, Sir William Berkeley, Sir Herbert Jeffries, Lord Culpeper and Sir Edmund Andros were residents of Virginia the greater portion of their terms. But the Earl of Orkney, the Earl of Albemarle, the Earl of Loudoun and Sir Jeffrey Amherst, governors from 1697 to 1763, nev



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DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL PLATFORM

(Adopted at Philadelphia, June 25, 1936)

We hold this truth to be self-evident—that the test of a representative government is its ability to promote the safety and happiness of the people.

We hold this truth to be self-evident—that twelve years of Republican leadership left our nation sorely stricken in body, mind and spirit; and that three years of Democratic leadership have put it back on the road to restored health and prosperity.

We hold this truth to be self-evident—that twelve years of Republican surrender to the dictatorship of a privileged few have been supplanted by a Democratic leadership which has returned the people themselves to the places of authority, and has revived in them new faith and restored the hope which they had almost lost.

We hold this truth to be self-evident—that this three-year recovery in all the basic values of life and the reestablishment of the American way of living has been brought about by humanizing the policies of the Federal Government as they affect the personal, financial, industrial and agricultural well-being of the American people.

We hold this truth to be self-evident—that government in a modern civilization has certain inescapable obligations to its citizens, among which are:

- (1) Protection of the family and the home.
- (2) Establishment of a democracy of opportunity for all the people.
- (3) Aid to those overtaken by disaster.

These obligations, neglected through twelve years of the old leadership, have once more been recognized by American Government. Under the new leadership they will never be neglected.

FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE FAMILY AND THE HOME

(1) We have begun and shall continue the successful drive to rid our land of kidnappers and bandits. We shall continue to use the powers of government to end the activities of the malefactors of great wealth who defraud and exploit the people.

Savings and Investment

(2) We have safeguarded the thrift of our citizens by restraining those who would gamble with other people's savings, by requiring truth in the sale of securities; by putting the brakes upon the use of credit for speculation; by outlawing the manipulation of prices in stock and commodity markets; by curbing the overweening power and unholy practices of utility holding companies; by insuring fifty million bank accounts.

Old Age and Social Security

(3) We have built foundations for the security of those who are faced with the hazards of unemployment and old age; for the orphaned, the crippled and the blind. On the foundation of the Social Security Act we are determined to erect a structure of economic security for all our people, making sure that this benefit shall keep step with the ever-increasing capacity of America to provide a high standard of living for all its citizens.

Consumer

(4) We will act to secure to the consumer fair value, honest sales and a decreased spread between the price he pays and the price the producer receives.

Rural Electrification

(5) This administration has fostered power rate yardsticks in the Tennessee Valley and in several other parts of the nation. As a result electricity has been made available to the people at a lower rate. We will continue to promote plans for rural electrification and for cheap power by means of the yardstick method.

Housing

(6) We maintain that our people are entitled to decent, adequate housing at a price which they can afford. In the last three years the Federal Government, having saved more than two million homes from foreclosure, has taken the first steps in our history to provide decent housing for people of meagre incomes. We believe every encouragement should be given to the building of new homes by private enterprise; and that the Government should steadily extend its housing program toward the goal of adequate housing for those forced through economic necessities to live in unhealthy and slum conditions.

Veterans

(7) We shall continue just treatment of our war veterans and their dependents.

FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A DEMOCRACY OF OPPORTUNITY

Agriculture

We have taken the farmers off the road to ruin.

We have kept our pledge to agriculture to use all available means to raise farm income toward its pre-war purchasing power. The farmer is no longer suffering from 15-cent corn, 3-cent hogs, 2½-cent beef at the farm, 5-cent wool, 30-cent wheat, 5-cent cotton and 3-cent sugar.

By Federal legislation we have reduced the farmer's indebtedness and doubled his net income. In cooperation with the States and through the farmers' own committees, we are restoring the fertility of his land and checking the erosion of his soil. We are bringing electricity and good roads to his home.

We will continue to improve the soil conservation and domestic allotment program with payments to farmers.

We will continue a fair-minded administration of agricultural laws, quick to recognize and meet new problems and conditions. We recognize the gravity of the evils of farm tenancy, and we pledge the full cooperation of the Government in the refinancing of farm indebtedness at the lowest possible rates of interest and over a long term of years.

We favor the production of all the market will absorb, both at home and abroad, plus a reserve supply sufficient to insure fair prices to consumers; we favor judicious commodity loans on seasonal surpluses; and we favor assistance within Federal authority to enable farmers to adjust and balance production with demand, at a fair profit to the farmers.

We favor encouragement of sound, practical farm cooperatives.

By the purchase and retirement of ten million acres of sub-marginal land, and assistance to those attempting to eke out an existence upon it, we have made a good beginning toward proper land use and rural rehabilitation.

The farmer has been returned to the road to freedom and prosperity. We will keep him on that road.

Labor

We have given the army of America's industrial workers something more substantial than the Republicans' dinner pall full of promises. We have increased the worker's pay and shortened his hours; we have undertaken to put an end to the sweated labor of his wife and children; we have written into the law of the land his right to collective barganing and self-organization free from the interference of employers; we have provided Federal machinery for the peaceful settlement of labor disputes.

We will continue to protect the worker and we will guard his rights, both as wage-earner and consumer, in the production and consumption of all commodities, including coal and water power and other natural-resource products.

The worker has been returned to the road to freedom and prosperity. We will keep him on that road.

Business

We have taken the American business man out of the red. We have saved his bank and given it a sounder foundation; we have extended credit; we have lowered interest rates; we have undertaken to free him from the ravages of cut-throat competition.

The American business man has been returned to the road to freedom and prosperity. We will keep him on that road.

Youth

We have aided youth to stay in school; given them constructive occupation; opened the door to opportunity which twelve years of Republican neglect had closed.

Our youth have been returned to the road to freedom and prosperity. We will keep them on that road.

Monopoly and Concentration of Economic Power

Monopolies and the concentration of economic power the creation of Republican rule and privilege, continue to be the master of the producer, the exploiter of the consumer, and the enemy of the independent operator. This is a problem challenging the unceasing effort of untrammeled public officials in every branch of the Government. We pledge vigorously and fearlessly to enforce the criminal and civil provisions of the existing anti-trust laws, and to the extent that their effectiveness has been weakened by new corporate devices or judicial construction, we propose by law to restore their efficacy in stamping out monopolistic practices and the concentration of economic power.

AID TO THOSE OVERTAKEN BY DISASTER

We have aided and will continue to aid those who have been visited by widespread drought and floods and have adopted a nation-wide flood-control policy.

Unemployment

We believe that unemployment is a national problem, and that it is an inescapable obligation of our Government to meet it in a national way. Due to our stimulation of private business, more than five million people have been reemployed; and we shall continue to maintain that the first objective of a program of economic security is maximum employment in private industry at adequate wages. Where business fails to supply such employment, we believe that work at prevailing wages should be provided in cooperation with State and local governments on useful public projects, to the end that the national wealth may be increased, the skill and energy of the worker may be utilized, his morale maintained, and the unemployment assured the opportunity to earn the necessities of life.

The Constitution

The Republican platform proposes to meet many pressing national problems solely by action of the separate States. We know that drought, dust storms, floods, minimum wages, maximum hours, child labor and working conditions in

industry, monopolistic and unfair business practices cannot be adequately handled exclusively by 48 separate State legislatures, 48 separate State administrations and 48 separate State courts. Transactions and activities which inevitably overflow State boundaries call for both State and Federal treatment.

We have sought and will continue to seek to meet these problems through legislation within the Constitution.

If these problems cannot be effectively solved by legislation within the Constitution, we shall seek such clarifying amendment as will assure to the legislatures of the several States and to the Congress of the United States, each within its proper jurisdiction, the power to cnact those laws which the State and Federal legislatures, within their respective spheres, shall find necessary, in order adequately to regulate commerce, protect public health and safety and safeguard economic security. Thus we propose to maintain the letter and spirit of the Constitution.

The Merit System in Government

For the protection of government itself and promotion of its efficiency, we pledge the immediate extension of the merit system through the classified civil service—which was first established and fostered under Democratic auspices—to all non-policy-making positions in the Federal service.

We shall subject to the civil service law all continuing positions which, because of the emergency, have been exempt from its operation.

Civil Liberties

We shall continue to guard the freedom of speech, press, radio, religion and assembly which our Constitution guarantees; with equal rights to all and special privileges to none.

Government Finance

The Administration has stopped deflation, restored values and enabled business to go ahead with confidence.

When national income shrinks, government income is imperilled. In reviving national income, we have fortified government finance. We have raised the public credit to a position of unsurpassed security. The interest rate on Government bonds has been reduced to the lowest point in twenty-eight years. The same Government bonds which in 1932 sold under eighty-three are now selling over 104.

We approve the objective of a permanently sound currency so stabilized as to prevent the former wide fluctuations in value which injured in turn producers, debtors, and property owners on the one hand, and wage-earners and creditors on the other, a currency which will permit full utilization of the country's resources. We assert that today we have the soundest currency in the world.

We are determined to reduce the expenses of government. We are being aided therein by the recession in unemployment. As the requirements of relief decline and national income advances, an increasing percentage of Federal expenditures can and will be met from current revenues, secured from taxes levied in accordance with ability to pay. Our retrenchment, tax and recovery programs thus reflect our firm determination to achieve a balanced budget and the reduction of the national debt at the earliest possible moment.

Foreign Policy

In our relationship with other nations, this Government will continue to extend the policy of the Good Neighbor. We reaffirm our opposition to war as an instrument of national policy, and declare that disputes between nations should be settled by peaceful means. We shall continue to observe a true neutrality in the disputes of others; to be prepared, resolutely to resist aggres-

sion against ourselves; to work for peace and to take the profits out of war; to guard against being drawn, by political commitments, international banking or private trading, into any war which may develop anywhere.

We shall continue to foster the increase in our foreign trade which has been achieved by this administration; to seek by mutual agreement the lowering of those tariff barriers, quotas and embargoes which have been raised against our exports of agricultural and industrial products; but continue as in the past to give adequate protection to our farmers and manufacturers against unfair competition or the dumping on our shores of commodities and goods produced abroad by cheap labor or subsidized by foreign governments.

THE ISSUE

The issue in this election is plain. The American people are called upon to choose between a Republican administration that has and would again regiment them in the service of privileged groups and a Democratic administration dedicated to the establishment of equal economic opportunity for all our people.

We have faith in the destiny of our nation. We are sufficiently endowed with natural resources and with productive capacity to provide for all a quality of life that meets the standards of real Americanism.

Dedicated to a government of liberal American principles, we are determined to eppose equally, the despotism of Communism and the menace of concealed Fascism.

We hold this final truth to be self-evident—that the interests, the security and the happiness of the people of the United States of America can be perpetuated only under democratic government as conceived by the founders of our nation.

DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Clarksburg, August 8, 1936)

We, the Democrats of West Virginia, in Convention assembled, reaffirm our faith in the eternal principles of the great Party to which we acknowledge allegiance.

National

We congratulate the people of the United States upon the Platform adopted by our Party in National Convention assembled in the City of Philadelphia, and endorse the principles therein enunciated.

Four years ago the Democracy of the State approved the program of the

Democracy of the Nation, and congratulated the citizenry upon its opportunity to follow Franklin D. Roosevelt. Such action has been fully justified. The National Administration has successfully met every emergency. It has brought order out of chaos, concord out of discord. It has made business profitable. It has been helpful to labor. Under its guidance the nation has advanced in prosperity and contentment, and it has added to the happiness and welfare of all the people. Historians in appraising the present era in America, will set down the accomplishments of the Roosevelt Administration as among the greatest achievements in the history of human government. We again congratulate the citizenship of West Virginia upon its opportunity to follow once more the competent leadership of Franklin D. Roosevelt and John N. Garner. We heartily endorse their nomination for President and Vice President of the United States and pledge to them our earnest and loyal support.

We endorse the record and services of Matthew M. Neely in the Senate of the United States and call for his reelection, together with the well-merited reelection of each of our distinguished Congressmen: Robert L. Ramsey, Jennings Randolph, Andrew Edmiston, George W. Johnson, John Kee and Joe L. Smith.

State

We endorse the present Democratic Administration of our State Government and the accomplishments of the 1933, 1935, and 1936 Regular and Special Sessions of the Legislature, and congratulate our whole people thereon. The record of this Administration, unparalleled in the history of the State, has been made under the intelligent, courageous, and exalted leadership of Governor Herman Guy Kump. Fearlessly, regardless of personal consequences, he has advised the people of the problems confronting them and promptly recommended the steps necessary to solve these problems. Every step in the record made has had his loyal support and, for the most part, has been taken upon his advice and initiative. He will retire from office with the respect, admiration, and affection of the whole people of this State. Without reservation, we point to his as the outstanding administration of the State's history in everything that constitutes constructive service to the people of their government. Without the loyal cooperation and support of the men and women who have composed the two Legislatures which have served with it, the great record of the Administration could not have been achieved, and full credit belongs to them for the performance of a great task well done.

We also endorse the administration of the several elective officials who have honestly and efficiently performed the important duties of their positions, and recommend them to the people of the State as worthy of reelection. We commend the appointive heads of the various departments in the State Government and extend this commendation to those occupying lesser positions in the public service without whose diligence and loyalty the heavy duties of their chiefs could not have been met.

We accept the responsibility of leadership and with pride present to the whole people of West Virginia our State Ticket, headed by Homer A. Holt of Fayette County, our candidate for Governor. As Attorney General during the present Administration he has conducted the legal affairs of the State with eminent and unparalleled success. His genial firmness, sincerity, warm personality, and understanding heart, as well as his brilliance as a profound lawyer, fit him in every way to become the Chief Executive of our beloved State. We urge support for the head of the Ticket by the selection of William S. O'Brien for Secretary of State, William W. Trent for Superintendent of Free Schools, Richard E. Talbott for Treasurer, Edgar B. Sims for Auditor, Clarence W. Meadows for Attorney General, and James Blaine McLaughlin for Commissioner of Agriculture. The ability and character of each of these candidates have withstood successfully the test of the last three and one-half years of public office. Their election will perpetuate the achievements of the present State Administration and will insure the continuation of good government.

Conditions In March, 1933

Before March 4, 1933, the State was deluged with the destitute and unemployed, her public revenues had fallen steadily and her public deficit had risen rapidly, banks were failing, schools were closing or their devoted teachers were unpaid, our homes and farms were being lost to the tax gatherer or the mortgage holder, the State public revenue, governmental services and credit rating were tied tightly in the meshes of a new "Tax Limitation Amendment" the meaning of which was unexplored and undetermined. The out-going administration had forfeited public confidence. We were faced with a huge State deficit and her fiscal affairs and those of her sub-divisions were desperate. An unbearable load of property taxation had resulted in heavy tax delinquencies, threatening the forfeiture of the property of our people for taxes, and hampering the State and local governments in their several functions. On the whole, government, in all its forms, was on the verge of a complete collapse, and the credit of the State, and its local sub-divisions, was at the lowest point in its history. The existence of this condition in government cannot be denied, and proof thereof will be found in the public records of the State. Disorganization, chaos, and the breakdown of orderly government seemed unavoidable.

Undismayed by the desperate situation, the Democratic Administration assumed the responsibility entrusted to it and forthwith set about putting the House of State in order.

Taxation

Confronted with the tax limitation amendment to our constitution, which reduced property taxes approximately forty per cent, in the first year of the present Administration we were called upon to readjust our tax system to the changed order. We have accomplished this task by the imposition of indirect taxes, which, for the first time in the history of the State, have been applied to all classes of business, and to all our people, in keeping with correct principles of taxation, and with due regard to ability to pay. Now, every citizen and every business makes a contribution to government, and taxation so applied creates no unreasonable burden on any individual or any business. The purpose of the tax limitation amendment has been carried out as the people intended that it should be, and the relief afforded thereby, particularly to the owners of farms and homes, has been made secure and permanent. The tax limitation amendment is a part of our constitution and will be preserved and protected by the Democratic Party. We promise to maintain the essential principles of the present tax system, with fair, equal, and uniform application to all our people.

Finances

When we took over the reins of government in 1933, our first problem was to salvage the State's finances. Faced with an appalling deficit, and with State deposits tied up in closed banks, and the loss of millions in revenue because of the tax limitation amendment, the necessity to make provision for secondary roads and for support of schools no longer able to function fully from local resources by reason of the curtailment of direct property taxes, our first economy was to reduce stringently the cost of government to the taxpayers by horizontal salary reductions to State employees and by other savings.

A large part of the State's current deficit, inherited from past administrations, has been wiped out. A large part of the deficit has been paid and the balance refunded on favorable terms.

We shall continue an economical, business-like government, pay off the State indebtedness as rapidly as taxes which will not unduly burden business and individual initiative permit, maintain the credit of the State, and provide any limited State aid necessary for essential local services, and continue a program of indirect taxation.

Ranks

The depression intensified, accelerated, and prolonged the destruction of values and precipitated the wholesale and colossal failure of banking institutions. Beginning with 1921, bank failures proceeded at an average rate of about 900 per year until March, 1933. The Democratic Administration, upon its inauguration, found all the banks of the nation in a paralyzed and thoroughly demoralized condition, and a national Banking Holiday had to be declared.

The Democratic Legislature of 1933 enacted laws of momentous effect upon the business of banking. Power was given the State Banking Commissioner to save institutions for their depositors from the destruction of frenzied runs, and he was authorized to reorganize banks to preserve and salvage assets as well as protect the rights and interests of all concerned. The policy of orderly and reasonable liquidation of closed banks was followed. The problems of the small country banks were approached with a sympathetic understanding. Rehabilitation has replaced receivership.

Today the banking structure of West Virginia was never in a technically stronger condition. The inherent soundness of the rehabilitation policy and excellent coordination of activities with the Federal agencies have brought to depositors the definite knowledge of a fundamentally sound condition. This is attested by a steady and enormous increase in deposits.

Ours was one of the first states to recommend membership in the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation to the state banks and has consistently coperated with the other assisting Federal agencies. We shall continue the single standard of examination requirements impartially administered, and advocate similar liability upon stockholders of State and National banks, unform conditions for the whole banking public and encouragement of the extension of broader credits.

Schools

We have carried to the youth in every section of the State equal opportunities for education and have made secure the free school system of West Virginia through the County Unit Law and provisions for State aid. By means of these we have, for the first time in the history of West Virginia, provided a universal school term of full nine months with practical uniformity and universal payment in full of teachers' salaries. We have taid the foundation on which to build the school system embracing better buildings and equipment, better schools through consolidation where possible, and higher salaries for teachers. None of these higher alms, purposes and results could have been effected for the State at large under the old system. We believe the County Unit Plan and State aid are the only means by which full and equal opportunities can now be afforded. The cost of education has been reduced and abuses in the school system which were present prior to the enactment of the County Unit Law have been largely eliminated.

We favor the application of the consumers sales tax for the support of free schools, the enactment of legislation which will tend to rid the school system of partisan politics, which will assure tenure to competent teachers, provide for the establishment of a state-wide teachers' retirement fund, the universal provision of free text books, and the continuation of the program for which we have laid a sound foundation.

Roads

The adoption of the Tax Limitation Amendment to our Constitution made imperative the assumption by the State of the control and maintenance of all roads, secondary as well as primary, entailing a heavy burden on the State Treasury. In addition to the increased burden imposed by taking over control of approximately 29,000 miles of secondary roads heretofore maintained by the counties, we have had to contend with two severe winters, with their destructive effect on main highways which were poorly constructed in the begin-

ning, and later subjected to traffic burdens not contemplated at the time of their construction, all of which has resulted in partial breaking down of many of our roads. The situation thus created presented a problem difficult to solve. Under our present unified system of road construction and maintenance, gratifying progress is being made in the repair of damaged roads, and in such new construction as our road revenues will permit. We must first preserve and protect the roads already built, and thus save the investment made in their construction. This will be done. In addition, we promise to extend, expand and complete the system of state highways, heretofore designated as such, and all weather farm-to-market roads as rapidly as revenues will permit. We shall also, to the fullest extent possible within available revenues, extend our system of secondary roads.

Social Security-Relief and Welfare

The destitute, unemployed and helpless have been cared for directly by the State to the extent of \$3,000,000 per annum from State tax monies, although this expenditure was unforeseen and unexpected at the first of the Administration; but the call of human need, misery and suffering was not permitted to go unanswered. Through the sacrifice of this expenditure by the people of this State, large additional supplementary funds were contributed by and secured from the Federal government. Mistakes in the administration of relief cannot be attributed to lack of devotion, integrity or toil on the part of those in charge but to the vastness of the unmapped course which they explored and the lack of precedent to guide them. If some pennies failed to fill empty mouths, at least no mouth remained unfilled.

We have enacted legislation for the payment of pensions to the indigent aged and blind, and for the care of dependent children, all in keeping with the generous policies of the Federal government, and in conjunction therewith. We have also provided for the care of the poor who do not come within the scope of provisions for the aged, blind, and the dependent children. We have consolidated into one department, to work in conjunction with County authorities, all the agencies for the relief of the poor and the unfortunates. We propose, through this department, to translate into service the generous impulses of our people to relieve those, and only those, justly entitled to assistance. Future Federal requirements for its aid, including unemployment insurance, will meet with State compliance.

Utilities

The present Administration reorganized the Public Service Commission, and for the first time in the twenty years of its life, a special appropriation, which originated in the State Senate in 1933, afforded it the financial support necessary for it to function effectively. The law was strengthened and permanent provision was made for the work of the Commission by the 1935 legislature. The benefits resulting from this long-needed legislation are already beginning to appear, notwithstanding the fact that Federal and State taxes paid by public utilities have been substantially increased each year in this State since 1932.

Aid to Land Owners

We have extended the time for redemption of delinquent lands to the owners, so that of nearly half a milion tracts of land delinquent for the non-payment of taxes when we entered office, less than half that number remain upon the delinquent books and millions of dollars of these uncollected taxes have been secured to the State and the land owner has saved his home and farm from forfeiture. No part of these recovered taxes has been dissipated in commissions, and the State and the owners have received the full benefit with the average cost of redemption reduced from \$36.60 to 34 %c per tract.

Liquor

Upon repeal of prohibition it became necessary to harness liquor. We adopted the policy of State control and abolished the incentive of private profit. The success of the plan of control enacted by our Legislature is evidenced by the well ordered stores and agencies we have established in the State.

Beer

We advocate legislation more effectively regulating the licensing of establishments where beer is sold at retail.

Law and Order

We have maintained law and order solely through the agencies of the State ... its sub-divisions and have removed every vestige of private control in such inforcement. In response to public demand, the Department of Public Safety has been enlarged and under able administration has reached the highest state of efficiency in its history and today enjoys the confidence and respect of every law abiding citizen.

Conservation

A new and more adequate conservation law was put upon the statute books and under it our natural resources and parks are being developed into inviting resorts not only for tourists, sportsmen, and those of leisure, but for all of our people. Field and stream are being stocked with fowl and fish, and our forests are being protected and replanted. We unqualifiedly endorse the Democratic National Platform on power and flood control, and pledge the Democratic Party in this State to help, aid and assist the Federal Government in every legal way in its very laudable work already begun of building and enacting power and flood control dams, to the end that disastrous floods may be avoided and that the soil of our State may be conserved.

Negroes

Recognizing a minority group, the Democratic Legislature of 1933 created the Negro Board of Education for the State so that the guidance of the educational progress of that race might be vested in its own members, and provided for Negro Assistant County Superintendents of Schools to supervise Negro schools in all counties with at least sixty Negro teachers, while the social security law enacted in 1936 by another Democratic Legislature requires the appointment from this race of an Assistant County Director of Public Assistance in each county having a Negro population of ten per cent or more.

The worth of that race in public and civic affairs is attested by the fine record of a Democratic member of the 1935 and 1936 Sessions of the Legislature, the important position of Assistant Surgeon in the Welch Emergency Hospital ably filled by one of its race, and efficient board members, department heads, and numerous employees in the State Democratic government. The Negro Housing Survey and other investigations have been made and statistics gathered, compiled and published for the benefit of this race.

State Departments

The costs of the State and Local government during the past three and one-half years, and each of these years, has been much less than in a like previous period. This is true in spite of additional cutlays for Social Security and Relief. The number of employees and salarles have been consistently reduced for comparable service. We have administered the affairs of the State honestly and efficiently and challenge the most rigid investigation of every department of government. The functions and departments of the State government should be further systematized, rearranged and consolidated both for efficiency and

further economy of administration. Trained and experienced employees working in those departments are best qualified and equipped to perform the details of this tremendous task guided by the best expert advice available, conforming with sound and modern policies. To retain employees where expert or technical qualifications are necessary, a well-designed merit tenure system should be put in operation.

In lieu of former loose practices of uncontrolled purchase of equipment and supplies by the various State departments, a central purchasing agency under a competent head and expert buyers performs all procurement for the State with large resulting savings. The principles of budgetary control essential to sound functioning of large private business has been applied to the great business of State.

Labor

The welfare of labor has been, and will continue to be, our constant aim. Not only have we maintained a Department of Labor in a high state of efficient service to protect those who work in factory and elsewhere and to aid employment, and a Department of Mines to strive for the safety of those who risk their lives to toil beneath the ground, but we have liberalized the Workmen's Compensation Law and created a Board of Appeals to review the Commissioner's decisions, provided for the relief of the victims of silicosis, and appropriated funds to maintain a West Virginia Employment Service under our Commissioner of Labor, thereby securing the cooperation of the Department of Labor of the United States and contributions from it for the service of those in search of work,

Democracy believes that labor has the right to bargain collectively or individually and that its rights should be safeguarded in every manner vouchsafed to it under the Constitution, and that all necessary laws should be enacted to give effect thereto. To such an end the Party pledges itself and its candidates.

The Democratic Party welcomes the support of labor and promises to give every consideration to the just demands of the representatives of its organizations. We shall protect and safeguard labor in its copartnership with capital. Each is essential to the other and without fair opportunity to each the welfare of the State would cease.

Agriculture

The success and prosperity of our great farming industry is vital to our progress, peace, and welfare. The Democratic Party, therefore, pledges anew its efforts to advance the science of agriculture and the welfare of the farmer.

Education in efficient production, modern and economic methods of marketing and in the advertisements of our products, together with the further development of farm-to-market roads to give every farm an outlet to a hard road, will be our most earnest endeavor.

Industry

The coal, oil, gas, lumber, rock, sand and gravel and other natural industries, as well as manufacturing, commerce and trade and general business, must receive the utmost consideration from government, and when their full share has been contributed to taxation we shall shield them from the unnecessary oppressive taxation that would place a burden upon competition with rivals outside the State, or discourage investments and employment and profit within a State which has been afforded such rare physical and economic opportunities as are provided here by nature.

Aid to Municipalities

Legislation should be enacted to facilitate the meeting of the budgetary requirements of municipalities and those smaller counties which are finding difficulty in meeting mandatory charges.

Civil Service for City Police

The police, as well as firemen of our cities, should be free from a suspicion of political preference or prejudice. The training they receive by experience is a valuable qualification. We favor the application of civil service systems to those valued public servants in order to attract and retain them in the service and preserve their freedom and independence.

Natural Resources

We shall encourage the further development of all our natural resources for the good of all and not a favored few.

Equal Rights

We favor equal rights and privileges for all our citizens.

Proud of past accomplishments, the redemption of promises of four years ago, the vindication of pledges then given, and relying upon the guidance of Divine Providence, we again march forward with united front to four more years of faithful discharge of duty.

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REPUBLICAN NATIONAL PLATFORM

(Adopted at Cleveland, June 12, 1936)

America is in peril. The welfare of American men and women and the future of our youth are at stake. We dedicate ourselves to the preservation of their political liberty, their individual opportunity and their character as free citizens, which today for the first time are threatened by government itself.

For three long years the New Deal administration has dishonored American traditions and flagrantly betrayed the pledges upon which the Democratic party sought and received public support.

The powers of Congress have been usurped by the President.

The integrity and authority of the Supreme Court have been flouted.

The rights and liberties of American citizens have been violated.

Regulated monopoly has displaced free enterprise.

The New Deal administration constantly seeks to usurp the rights reserved to the states and to the people.

It has insisted on the passage of laws contrary to the constitution.

It has intimidated witnerses and interferred with the right of petition.

It has dishonored our country by repudiating its most sacred obligations,

It has been guilty of frightful waste and extravagance, using public funds for partisan political purposes.

It has promoted investigations to harass and intimidate American citizens, at the same time denying investigations into its own improper expenditures.

It has created a vast multitude of new offices, filled them with its favorites, set up a centralized bureaucracy, and sent out swarms of inspectors to harass our people.

It has bred fear and hesitation in commerce and industry, thus discouraging new enterprises, preventing employment and prolonging the depression.

It secretly has made tariff agreements with our foreign competitors, flooding our markets with foreign commodities.

It has coerced and intimidated voters by withholding relief from those opposing its tyrannical policies.

It has destroyed the morale of many of our people and made them dependent upon government.

Appeals to passion and class prejudice have replaced reason and tolerance,

To a free people, these actions are insufferable. This campaign cannot be waged on the traditional differences between the Republican and Democratic parties. The responsibility of this election transcends all previous political divisions. We invite all Americans irrespective of party, to join us in defense of American institutions.

Constitutional Government

We pledge ourselves:

- 1. To maintain the American system of constitutional and local self-government, and to resist all attempts to impair the authority of the Supreme Court of the United States, the final protector of the rights of our citizens against the arbitrary encroachments of the legislative and executive branches of government. There can be no individual liberty without an independent judiciary.
- 2. To preserve the American system of free enterprise, private competition, and equality of opportunity, and to seek its constant betterment in the interests of all.

Re-employment

The only permanent solution of the unemployment problem is the absorption of the unemployed by industry and agriculture. To that end, we advocate: Removal of restrictions on production.

Abandonment of all New Deal policies that raise production costs, increase the cost of living, and thereby restrict buying, reduce volume and prevent reemployment.

Encouragement instead of hindrance to regitimate business.

Withdrawal of government from competition with private payrolls.

Elimination of unnecessary and hampering regulations.

Adoption of such other policies as will furnish a chance for individual enterprise, industrial expansion, and the restoration of jobs.

Relief

The necessities of life must be provided for the needy, and hope must be restored pending recovery. The administration of relief is a major failure of the New Deal. It has been faithless to those who most deserve our sympathy. To end confusion, partisanship, waste and incompetence, we pledge

- 1. The return of responsibility for relief administration to non-political local agencies familiar with community problems.
- 2. Federal grants-in-aid to the State and territories while the need exists, upon compliance with these conditions: (a) a fair proportion of the total relief burden to be provided from the revenues of state and local governments; (b) all engaged in relief administration to be selected on the basis of merit and fitness; (c) adequate provision to be made for the encouragement of those persons who are trying to become self-supporting.
- 3. Undertaking of federal public works only on their merits and separate from the administration of relief.
 - 4. A prompt determination of the facts concerning relief and unemployment.

Security

Real security will be possible only when our productive capacity is sufficient to furnish a decent standard of living for all American families and to provide a surplus for future needs and contingencies. For the attainment of that ultimate objective, we look to the energy, self-reliance and character of our people, and to our system of free enterprise.

Society has an obligation to promote the security of the people by affording some measure of protection against involuntary unemployment and dependency

in old age. The New Deal policies, while purporting to provide social security, have, in fact, endangered it.

We propose a system of old age security, based upon the following principles:

- 1. We approve a pay-as-you-go policy, which requires of each generation the support of the aged and the determination of what is just and adequate.
- 2. Every American citizen over 65 should receive the supplementary payment necessary to provide a minimum income sufficient to protect him or her from want.
- 3. Each state and territory, upon complying with simple and general minimum standards, should receive from the federal government a graduated contribution in proportion to its own, up to a fixed maximum.
- 4. To make this program consistent with sound fiscal policy the federal revenues for this purpose must be provided from the proceeds of a direct tax widely distributed. All will be benefited and all should contribute.

We propose to encourage adoption by the states and territories of honest and practical measures for meeting the problems of unemployment insurance.

The unemployment insurance and old age annuity sections of the present social security act are unworkable and deny benefits to about two-thirds of our adult population, including professional men and women and all those engaged in agriculture and domestic service, and the self-employed while imposing heavy tax burdens upon all. The so-called reserve fund estimated at \$47,000,000,000 for old age insurance is no reserve at all, because the fund will contain nothing but the government's promise to pay, while the taxes collected in the guise of premiums will be wasted by the government in reckless and extravagant political schemes.

Labor

The welfare of labor rests upon increased production and the prevention of exploitation. We pledge ourselves to:

Protect the right of labor to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of its own choosing without interference from any source.

Prevent governmental job holders from exercising autocratic powers over labor.

Support the adoption of state laws and interstate compacts to abolish sweat shops and child labor, and to protect women and children with respect to maximum hours, minimum wages and working conditions. We believe that this can be done within the constitution as it now stands.

Agriculture

The farm problem is an economic and social, not a partisan problem, and we propose to treat it accordingly. Following the wreck of the restrictive and coercive AAA, the New Deal administration has taken to itself the principles of the Republican policy of soil conservation and land retirement. This action opens the way for a non-political and permanent solution. Such a solution cannot be had under a New Deal administration which misuses the program to serve partisan ends, to promote scarcity and to limit by coercive methods the farmer's control over his own farm.

Our paramount object is to protect and foster the family type of farm, traditional in American life, and to promote policies which will bring about an adjustment of agriculture to meet the needs of domestic and foreign markets. As an emergency measure, during the agricultural depression, federal benefit payments or grants-in-aid when administered within the means of the federal government are consistent with a balanced budget.

We propose:

To facilitate economical production and increased consumption on a basis
of abundance instead of scarcity.

- 2. A national land-use program, including the acquisition of abandoned and non-productive farm lands by voluntary sale or lease, subject to approval of the legislative and executive branches of the states concerned, and the devotion of such land to appropriate public use, such as watershed recreation and conservation of wild life.
- 3. That an agricultural policy be pursued for the protection and restoration of the land resources, designed to bring about such a balance between solbuilding and soil-depleting crops as will permanently insure productivity, with reasonable benefits to cooperating farmers on family-type farm, but so regulated as to eliminate the New Deal's destructive policy towards the dairy and livestock industries.
- 4. To extend experimental aid to farmers developing new crops suited to our soil and climate.
 - 5. To promote the industrial use of farm products by applied science.
- 6. To protect the American farmer against the importation of all live stock, dairy and agricultural products, substitutes therefor, and derivatives therefrom, which will depress American farm prices.
- 7. To provide effective quarantine against imported livestock, dairy and other farm products from countries which do not impose health and sanitary regulations fully equal to those required of our own producers.
- 8. To provide for ample farm credit at rates as low as those enjoyed by other industries, including commodity and livestock loans, and preference in land loans to the farmer acquiring or refinancing a farm as a home.
- 9. To provide for decentralized, non-partisan control of the farm credit administration and the election by National Farm Loan Associations of at least one half of each board of directors of the Federal Land Banks, and thereby remove these institutions from politics.
- 10. To provide in the case of agricultural products of which there are exportable surpluses, the payment of reasonable benefits upon the domestically consumed portion of such crops in order to make the tariff effective. These payments are to be limited to the production level of the family type farm.
 - 11. To encourage and, further develop co-operative marketing.
- 12. To furnish government assistance in disposing of surpluses in foreign trade by bargaining for foreign markets selectively, by countries both as to exports and imports. We strenuously oppose so-called reciprocal treaties which trade off the American farmer,
- 13. To give every reasonable assistance to producers in areas suffering from temporary disaster, so that they may regain and maintain a self-supporting status.

Tariff

Nearly sixty per cent of all imports into the United States are now free of duty. The other forty per cent of imports compete directly with the product of our industry. We would keep on the free list all products not grown or produced in the United States in commercial quantities. As to all commodities that commercially compete with our farms, our forests, our mines, our fisherles, our oil wells, our labor and our industries, sufficient protection should be maintained at all times to defend the American farmer and the American wage earner from the destructive competition emanating from the subsidies of foreign governments and the imports from low-wage and depreciated-currency countries.

We will repeal the present reciprocal trade agreement law. It is futile and dangerous. Its effect on agriculture and industry has been destructive. Its continuation would work to the detriment of the wage earner and the farmer.

We will restore the prinicple of the flexible tariff in order to meet changing economic conditions here and abroad and broaden by careful definition the powers of the tariff commission in order to extend this policy along non-partisan lines.

We will adjust tariffs with a view to promoting international trade, the stabilization of currencies, and the attainment of a proper balance between agriculture and industry.

We condemn the secret negotiation of reciprocal trade treaties without public hearing or legislative approval.

Monopolies

A private monopoly is indefensible and into!erable. It menaces and, if continued, will utterly destroy constitutional government and the liberty of the citizen

We favor the vigorous enforcement of the criminal laws, as well as the civil laws, against monopolies and trusts and their officials, and we demand the enactment of such additional legislation as is necessary to make it impossible for private monopoly to exist in the United States.

We will employ the full powers of the government to the end that monopoly shall be eliminated and that free enterprise shall be fully restored and maintained.

Regulation of Business

We recognize the existence of a field within which governmental regulation is desirable and salutary. The authority to regulate should be vested in an independent tribunal acting under clear and specific laws establishing definite standards. Their determinations on law and facts should be subject to review by the courts. We favor federal regulation, within the constitution, of the marketing of securities to protect investors. We favor also federal regulation of the interstate activities of public utilities.

Civil Service

Under the New Deal, official authority has been given to inexperienced and incompetent persons. The civil service has been sacrificed to create a national political machine. As a result the federal government has never presented such a picture of confusion and inefficiency.

We pledge ourselves to the merit system, virtually destroyed by New Deal spoilsmen. It should be restored, improved and extended.

We will provide such conditions as offer an attractive permanent career in government service to young men and women of ability, irrespective of party affiliations.

Government Finance

The New Deal administration has been characterized by shameful waste, and general financial irresponsibility. It has piled deficit upon deficit. It threatens national bankruptcy and the destruction through inflation of insurance policies and savings bank deposits.

We pledge ourselves to:

Stop the folly of uncontrolled spending.

Balance the budget—not by increasing taxes but by cutting expenditures, drastically and immediately.

Revise the federal tax system and co-ordinate it with state and local tax systems.

Use the taxing power for raising revenue and not for punitive or political purposes.

Money and Banking

We advocate a sound currency to be preserved at all hazards.

The first requisite to a sound and stable currency is a balanced budget.

We oppose further devaluation of the dollar.

We will restore to the Congress the authority lodged with it by the constitution to coin money and regulate the value thereof by repealing all the laws delegating this authority to the executive.

We will co-operate with other countries toward stabilization of currencies as soon as we can do so with due regard for our national interests and as soon as other nations have sufficient stability to justify such action.

Foreign Affairs

We pledge ourselves to promote and maintain peace by all honorable means not leading to foreign alliances or political commitments.

Obedient to the traditional foreign policy of America and to the repeatedly expressed will of the American people, we pledge that America shall not become a member of the League of Nations nor of the World Court nor shall America take on any entangling alliances in toreign affairs.

We shall promote, as the best means of securing and maintaining peace by the pacific settlement of disputes, the great cause of international arbitration through the establishment of free, independent tribunals, which shall determine such disputes in accordance with law, equity and justice.

National Defense

We favor an army and navy, including air forces, adequate for our national defense.

We will co-operate with other nations in the limitation of armaments and control of traffic in arms.

Bill of Rights

We pledge ourselves to preserve, protect and defend, against all intimidation and threat, freedom of religion, speech, press and radio; and the right of assembly and petition and immunity from unreasonable searches and seizures.

We offer the abiding security of a government of laws as against the autocratic perils of a government of men.

Furthermore

- 1. We favor the construction by the Federal Government of headwater storage basins to prevent floods, subject to the approval of the legislative and executive branches of the government of the States whose lands are concerned.
- 2. We favor equal opportunity for our colored citizens. We pledge our protection of their economic status and personal safety. We will do our best to further their employment in the gainfully occupied life of America, particularly in private industry, agriculture emergency agencies and the Civil Service.

We condemn the present New Deal policies which would regiment and ultimately eliminate the colored citizen from the country's productive life, and make him solely a ward of the federal government.

- 3. To our Indian population we pledge every effort on the part of the national government to ameliorate living conditions for them.
- 4. We pledge continuation of the Republican policy of adequate compensation and care for veterans disabled in the service of our country and for their widows, orphans and dependents.
- 5. We shall use every effort to collect the war debt due us from foreign countries amounting to \$12,000,000,000--one-third of our national debt. No effort has been made by the present administration even to reopen negotiations.

6. We are opposed to legislation which discriminates against women in Federal and State employment.

Conclusion

We assume the obligations and duties imposed upon Government by modern conditions. We affirm our unalterable conviction that, in the future as in the past, the fate of the nation will depend, not so much on the wisdom and power of government, as on the character and virtue, self-reliance, industry and thrift of the people and on their willingness to meet the responsibilities essential to the preservation of a free society.

Finally, as our party affirmed in its first Platform in 1856: "Believing that the spirit of our institutions as well as the Constitution of our country guarantees liberty of conscience and equality of rights among our citizens we oppose all legislation tending to impair them," and "we invite the affiliation and cooperation of the men of all parties, however differing from us in other respects, in support of the principles herein declared."

The acceptance of the nomination tendered by this Convention carries with it, as a matter of private honor and public faith, an undertaking by each candidate to be true to the principles and program herein set forth.

REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Huntington, August 14, 1936)

A crisis has been reached in public affairs. This crisis calls for plain language and decisive action. A momentous decision rests with West Virginia voters in this campaign. Matheny, and C. M. (Casey) Jones—to loyal support of the Republican national platform and the next Republic national administration and commend their candidacies to the voters of West Virginia.

Condemn Kump Regime

We condemn the Democratic state administration.

- 1. For debauching the 1936 primary election.
- 2. For compelling self-respecting needy citizens, on threat of being ruth-lessly deprived of public assistance of relief employment, to vote according to dictation, and in particular for the shameful degrading of numerous judicial conventions by compelling relief workers to attend and vote as directed by Democratic bosses.
- 3. For converting state liquor monopoly into a vicious political machine in wanton violation of the governor's solemn pledge that he would not permit this monopoly to be used for political purposes or the advancement of personal political ambitions.

- 4. For paying political debts through the reprehensible practice of purchasing liquors through political agents, office holders and relatives of those entrusted with the administration of this law.
- 5. For coercing hundreds of employees of state institutions, departments, commissions and bureaus and of federal agencies in West Virginia to contribute to primary campaign funds and activities.

Neglect of Highways

- 6. For impairing, where not actually destroying, the heavy investments of West Virginia taxpayers in their public roads through gross neglect, incompetence and wasteful and improvident use of public money—a record all the more indefensible in view of the fact that tens of thousands of men have worked on the roads with their wages paid out of relief funds and at no cost to the Road Commission.
- 7. For depriving the minority party of representation on the State Road Commission by the creation of a one-man commission and for disrupting the business-like transaction of its affairs by politicalizing its personnel.
- 8. For despoiling the public schools of West Virginia for political purposes by demanding that teachers register as Democrats, contribute to campaign funds and vote under orders; by appointing Democratic boards of education in the 55 counties to replace regularly elected board members; by requiring arbitrary rural school consolidations contrary to local needs or desires; by destroying the continued use of hundreds of rural schools as community centers; by unnecessarily transporting young children long distances under conditions inimical to their health and home life; and by violating the principle of home rule in unwarranted inerference in local affairs by the State Department of Schools.

Blundering Bank Liquidation

- 9. For shamefully dissipating the money of thousands of distressed depositors in insolvent state banks through wasteful and blundering liquidation of these assets and through the payment of exorbitant fees to politically appointed lawyers.
- 10. For prostituting the state purchasing department, at the taxpayers' expense, for the financial benefit of relatives of high Democratic office holders and favored political individuals and groups.
- 11. For repudiating its 1932 platform promise of a "complete reorganization of West Virginia state government along lines of economy."
- 12. For repudiating Governor Kump's reiterated promises to "dispense with all departments, boards, bureaus, and commissions not serving a useful public purpose"; to "reduce public expenditures to the basis of 1920"; to "dismiss all appointees and employees not essential to the administration of the affairs of state," and to dispense with the services of "one third of the high salaried appointees."
- 13. For multiplying new bureaus and agencies of state government with the shocking result that the new capitol designated to meet all legitimate needs of the state for a half century to come is today filled to capacity with political employees who overflow into outside rented offices.
- 14. For repeatedly and persistently attempting to nullify the tax limitation amendment.

Republican Promises

- If the state administration is entrusted to the Republican party at the November election, we promise:
- 1. A comprehensive revision of primary and general election laws to prevent a repetition of the abuses, corruption, and coercion of which the present administration has been guilty.

- 2. Enactment of laws and adoption of administrative policies and regulations that will actually take state liquor control out of politics and keep it out of politics and which will forbid all persons connected with liquor control to take part in politics.
- 3. Realistic solution of the problem created by the indiscriminate and non-selective licensing of the sale of beer.
- 4. Restoration of the three-man bi-partisan state road commission; immediate efforts to recondition our improved roads and henceforth to maintain them properly; extension as rapidly as possible of the road system with particular attention to farm-to-market roads; satisfaction of all requirements to obtain West Virginia's full share of federal highway aid.

Merit System

- 5. Establishment and maintenance of business-like system of selecting public employees on a sound merit basis and of protecting them in the tenure of their positions.
- 6. Maintenance of a free public school system to serve the children of West Virginia by providing for the election of county boards of education on a separate non-partisan ballot; by assuring competent teachers reasonable tenure in office without regard to political affiliation; by maintaining adequate salary schedules; by discouraging rural school consolidations where the local school is a desirable and established community center; by limiting to the irreducible minimum the transportation of young children long distances from their homes to attend school; by encouraging the location in a rural community rather than a distant urban center of consolidated rural schools where consolidation is desirable and practical; by providing for the maintenance of school buildings to prevent Impariment of the taxpayers' investment in them and to provide satisfactory housing of pupils; by providing free textbooks; by correcting inequalities in the present method of calculating state aid allotments; and by appropriating sufficient funds for a full school term.

Economy in Government

- 7. Drastic reduction of the number of state employees and appointees; demand of a day's work for a day's wage; clearing out of the capitol its useless hangers-on; and a decent measure of real economy for the taxpayers.
- 8. Unstinted support of the tax limitation amendment—originated and popularized by a Republican state tax commissioner and submitted to the people for their overwhelming ratification under the last Republican state administration—to the end that its beneficial effects may be more fully realized than they have been under a Democratic administration which reluctantly accepted the amendment, under the lash of public opinion, and which has had the effrontery to enter a spurious claim for its origin and adoption.
- 9. Amendment of the consumers' sales tax to exempt from tax all purchases of 25 cents or less, and to provide a better method of tax accounting and collection.
- 10. Lightening of the tax burden in every practical way after the expenses of state government are reduced to tolerable proportions,
- 11. Immediate assistance to the municipalities of West Virginia in working out their serious fiscal problems.

Old Age Security

12. Adoption of old age security legislation in conformity with the Republican national platform to furnish supplementary payments to aged American citizens necessary to provide a minimum income sufficient to protect them

from want; honest and practical measures to meet the problems of unemployment insurance; all necessary enactments to enable West Virginians to receive the full measure of federal benefits made available to the states on a cooperating basis; effective assistance for dependent children and indigent blind; an honest administration of public relief to all needy and unfortunate without regard to politics, race, or creed; and economical administration of all social security and relief funds and activities.

- 13. Generous provision for the treatment, hospitalization, and vocational training of the crippled and physically handicapped children in West Virginia, whose plight was first formally recognized by a Republican administration in 1929.
- 14. Adherence to the principle that employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing and shall be free from interference, restraint, or coercion in such organization, bargaining, or designation of representatives.

Aid for Workers

- 15. Strengthening of the workmen's compensation, mining, and labor departments, all established by Republican state administration, for the maximum benefit and protection of the working men and women of West Virginia.
- 16. Continuation of our traditional friendship for our Negro citizens, as evidenced by the fact that all existing state institutions for Negroes were established and expanded under Republican rule and that all existing laws for their protection and advancement were adopted under similar auspices, and as evidenced further by our present recognition that more satisfactory and modern facilities for Negro tubercular patients must be provided as an immediate obligation of the state.
- 17. Intelligent and vigilant conservation of the state's natural resources, wild life, scenic beauty, forests and streams, and a fuller utilization of all these resources for the recreation of our own people and our guests from other states.

Farm Aid

- 18. Enactment of legislation to bring to West Virginia farmers their full share of Federal agricultural benefits; support of the State Department of Agriculture, Agriculture Extension division and Experiment station, and allied agencies for greater service to the farmers; development of policies that will tend toward a greater use of West Virginia farm products on the tables of West Virginia homes.
- 19. Constant recognition of the fact that the welfare of West Virginia depends to a large extent upon the soundness and growth of her industries, and that the State government is under a continuing responsibility to contribute in every feasible and reasonable way to the retention and expansion of our present industries and to the creation of conditions favorable for the attraction of new industries.

To end these intolerable abuses and to accomplish these constructive purposes, we pledge our nominee for Governor, Summers H. Sharp; our nominee for other state offices—Phil Conley, Enoch L. Ellison, R. Worth Shumaker, Vernon E. Johnson, Philip Hill and Harvey A. Hall, and our nonlinees for State Senate and the House of Delegates. And in the resolute confidence that they will meet the obligations of this platform and the needs of the state, we earnestly urge their election.

The speed limit for automobiles on open country highways in West Virginia is 45 miles per hour; on suburban streets, 25 miles per hour; and, on city streets 20 miles per hour.

An operator of a motor vehicle must be at least 15 years of age. The fee for an operator's license is one dollar, and the license is good unless and until revoked for cause.



PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS WITH FEDERAL AID

Early in 1933 construction work had fallen to the lowest point in recent history. As a result, the great basic industries, steel, lumber, cement, coal and a host of others, were gasping for breath. Their employees were idle. The transportation industry was at a standstill.

To strike at the root of this evil, Congress in June, 1933, passed the National Industrial Recovery Act. Title I of this Act provided that each industry organize under a code of its own to limit working hours and establish minimum wages. The object was to spread employment and insure a decent living for those employed. This was popularly known as the NRA.

Title II created the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, commonly called the PWA. Its purpose was to stimulate construction by undertaking at once much needed public improvements. The sum of \$3,300,000,000 was appropriated to effectuate its purposes.

The program fell into two broad classifications, federal and non-federal. Under the first there were constructed locks and dams, post offices, additions to the army and naval establishments, and other improvements strictly a function of the regular bureaus of the federal government. Also, there was alloted from the appropriation funds for the CCC, CWA, Emergency Housing Corporation, Federal Aid Highways, the Tennessee Valley Authority and other agencies. Examples of this type of work in West Virginia are the locks and dams in the Kanawha and Ohio rivers, the Tygart River Flood Control Dam, improvements at the federal prison at Alderson, patrol boats constructed at Point Pleasant, several post offices, etc.

The non-federal part of the program had as its objective the construction by municipalities, counties and states of meritorious public improvements. To encourage such work the government offered to make reasonably secured loans at a four per cent interest rate, and to grant, or give, to the public body thirty per cent of the construction cost. The applicant in turn covenanted to have the work done under regulations established by the government. These regulations provided maximum hours of work and minimum wages. Also, it was stipulated that work be done by open competitive bidding, and safeguards were thrown around the contractors, labor and materialmen to see that all parties were properly protected and that the applicant secured full value for the money expended.

The Emergency Relief Act of 1935 provided a limited amount of additional funds for PWA, and these were supplemented by proceeds from sale to private investors of bonds previously purchased by the administration. The grant was increased to forty-five per cent.

In West Virginia, the state itself, its counties and municipalities, as of June 30, 1936, had secured PWA funds to aid in the construction of improvements estimated to cost \$14,318,773.

Included in this non-federal PWA program were 46 new or revamped waterworks systems; 11 sewers and sewage disposal plants; dormitories at West Virginia University, Marshall College, West Virginia State College, Glenville State Teachers' College, Concord State Teachers' College and West Liberty State Teachers' College; faculty homes and apartments at Institute, West Liberty, Keyser, Athens, Montgomery and Bluefield; doctors' and nurses' apartments at Pinecrest and Hopemont Sanltaria; clinic buildings at Hopemont, Spencer and Huntington State Hospital, and at the Ohio County Tuberculosis Sanitarium at Roney's Point; laundry and other buildings at Pinecrest Sanitarium; Wetzel County hospital at New Martinsville and improvements to the Camden-Clark Memorial hospital at Parkersburg; municipal incinerators at Morgantown, Charleston and Williamson; bridges over the Kanawha River at

Charleston and the Little Kanawha at Parkersburg; schools in Brooke and Mason Counties; and a statewide primary road building program costing over six million dollars.

All of the above projects are either completed or under construction. They were well conceived by their sponsors and will be of continuing use and economic value to the citizens of West Virginia. The PWA program is still active. Between June 30 and October 15, 1936, five more non-federal projects estimated to cost \$715,161 have been approved for West Virginia.

A summary of a few of the basic principles underlying the non-federal PWA program and its purposes are as follows:

- 1. To induce public bodies to undertake in time of stress major improvements of continuing social and economic value by offering a federal grant for part of the cost and lending the rest at a reasonable interest rate.
- 2. To reduce the ultimate cost to the federal government by requiring repayment of the federal loan.
- 3. To provide employment of a normal kind as to occupation, distribution and wages. To the direct employment of skilled and unskilled labor at the construction site is added the indirect labor engaged in mining, manufacturing and transporting material and equipment for construction use.
- 4. To insure a careful selection of only the most meritorious projects by requiring the sponsor to furnish the major part of the cost.
- 5. To protect labor, materialmen, contractors and owners by requiring that contracts be let and work done under federal regulations,

REEMPLOYMENT IN WEST VIRGINIA

By JAMES H. McGINNIS, State Director

The West Virginia State Employment Service, a division of the State Department of Labor, now operates two offices with funds provided by the state of West Virginia as matched by the federal government. One is in Wheeling and the other in Charleston.

In addition to the two state offices, there are ten district offices of the National Reemployment Service, which is operated directly by the United States Employment Service, a bureau of the United States Department of Labor. The State Service was established July 1, 1934; the National Reemployment Service dates from August 1, 1935.

The purpose of the public employment service is to provide an agency to classify and evaluate the skills of unemployed persons who apply to it for work, and then refer them to employers, either on public works or in private industry, as requests may be received. In other words, the employment service provides a market for labor. It provides an agency for the public through which requests for workers may be cleared with the assurance that the persons selected to fill the positions will be able to perform the work required.

Since the organization of a public employment service in West Virginia, 400,217 unemployed persons have applied to it for work, and 121,821 have been placed in gainful employment, in private industry or in Public Works, other than the CWA or WPA. In addition to this, the employment service has referred to the Works Progress Administration 44,039 workers, and has referred to the Civil Works Administration 42,722 persons. As of October 3, 1936, there were 120,183 persons in West Virginia still seeking work. Of this number, of course, a great many are now employed, and are merely seeking better positions, and this figure, called the "active balance of registrants," is not intended to be an indication of the number of unemployed persons in West Virginia. It merely indicates the total number of persons who have visited our offices within the past sixty days for the purpose of making inquiries concerning a job. An average of 47,050 persons each month, or 2,045 persons each working day, contact offices of the Employment Service.

The operating personnel of the employment services in West Virginia is selected as far as practicable from lists of eligible persons established by competitive examinations.

The accompanying table of statistics shows the accomplishments of the Services to October 3, 1936. These statistics are merely a breakdown, by counties, of the number of individuals who are registered with the Services, and the number of jobs which have been obtained and filled, and the number of persons still actively seeking new jobs or new employment.

Much difficulty has been experienced in obtaining adequate understanding on the part of the public and other coordinating agencies of the duties and responsibilities of the Employment Services in West Virginia. There seems to be some belief that jobs can be created. As a matter of fact, the real authority of the Services is limited to finding jobs and referring workers, classified with reference to their skills, to employers seeking labor.

Publicity for the Employment Service is necessarily limited because of the tendency of the general public to misunderstand news releases and swamp the offices with applicants, for which there is no adequate remedy except to explain to each person that a limited number of jobs are available.

The Employment Services in West Virginia are planning to meet their responsibilities in connection with the Unemployment Compensation Section of the Social Security Act passed at the extraordinary session of the legislature early in December. It is striving to train its employees so they may fully master the intricate system of correctly evaluating skills of workers. They must also be able to furnish technical advice in the matter of vocational training. It has been acquiring background and experience over three years, and is heading toward a professionalized service for the benefit of the public in holding down excessive migration of labor, and in referring workers upon the sole consideration of their ability to perform the work required by the employer.

The United States Employment Service, with which the State Service is affiliated, and which operates the National Reemployment Service, is now engaged in research activity seeking, among other things, to codify and make available job descriptions in all industries for the purpose of interrelated skills required in one position which may be applicable to some other job. Over nine thousand job specifications have already been coded.

THE WORKS PROGRESS ADMINISTRATION IN WEST VIRGINIA

By F. W. McCULLOUGH, State Administrator

Hundreds of miles of all-weather roads, stretching back into heretofore isolated regions of every county in the state, scores of new public buildings, swimming pools, athletic fields, and miles of streets and sewers are among the permanent public improvements persons removed from the direct relief rolls and given work through the Works Progress Administration have returned to their respective communities for the opportunity to earn a regular security wage.

Want Jobs. Not Dole

The depression had denied millions of American men and women the opportunity to earn a living, men and women who have expressed their desire for work and not a dole. Local governmental units, such as cities, counties and the state, need new or improved roads, schools, streets, institutions, airports and other public improvements.

The responsibility of putting the employable jobless persons on relief to work on these needed improvements was given to the Works Progress Administration. Projects upon which they were to be given work were suggested by the officials of local governments, who were in better position to know public improvement needs than the federal government. Project applications which fitted the federal government's requirements were approved and placed into a reservoir from which they could be drawn to fit local employment needs.

Needs Considered

The employable persons on direct relief were certified as to their eligibility by county relief administrations. The amount of money appropriated by congress was apportioned to the respective states in proportion to their respective relief needs. The state Works Progress Administration, in turn, apportioned its share in proportion to the relief loads of the various counties.

When the amount of money available for each county was translated into the number of persons it would employ, district WPA directors, after ascertaining the type of work these persons could do, selected for operation projects which they could build, or operate, taking into consideration their nearness to the persons to be employed and the needs and suggestions of local governments.

Peak Reached in March

The peak of WPA employment was reached in March, 1936, when 56,800 were at work. As their skills were greatly diversified the types of projects ranged from women in sewing rooms making garments to distribute among the needy to workmen constructing huge bridges and buildings.

As of June 30, 1936, the end of the government's fiscal year, the employment on WPA projects had dropped to 43,389 in the face of seasonal demands and the general improvement in business conditions. Of these, all but approximately six out of every 100 were certified from direct relief rolls as eligible, these six representing persons of technical skills or experience, not available from relief rolls but necessary for operation of projects. Government regulations would have permitted as many as ten of each 100 to be hired from non-relief sources, had it been necessary.

\$21,145,000 Spent

At that time, the WPA's expenditures in West Virginia totalled approximately \$21,145,000 for all purposes, including the National Youth Administration's administrative costs, and flood relief and rehabilitation projects. Of this, 72.85 cents of each dollar had gone directly into the pockets of project employees, and 5.34 cents of each dollar for administrative salaries and costs. The remainder went for materials, supplies, etc. Local governmental units sponsoring projects furnished funds for materials and services which the WPA's allotments could not accommodate.

Results of Work

To show for their employment since late in the fall of 1935, these workers had, on June 30, 1936, completed, in addition to a long list of other miscellaneous public improvements, 1,736 miles of roads; 62 new public buildings; 257 new bridges; 290,618 lineal feet of city streets; 468,191 lineal feet of sewers; two swimming pools; and, 10 athletic fields. They had also remodeled, repaired or painted 464 schools and other public buildings and repaired 42 bridges.

Non-Manual Projects

Under the non-manual women's and professional division, women sewing room workers had manufactured 1,047,073 garments for distribution to the needy; 418 home-bound, crippled or handicapped children were being instructed in academics and handicraft; 2,000 pre-school ago children were being kept in day nursery schools while their mothers, with families to support, worked; 203,236 children and youths were enrolled at WPA-operated playgrounds, free from traffic hazards; 30,995 persons were enrolled in WPA-operated emergency education classes, many learning to read and write for the first time, and many others participating in other WPA-operated recreational activities.

In Every County



RESUME OF 1936

A year of bustling business activity, of important political events, of hope, enthusiasm and activity in practically every field of human endeavor-—that was 1936 in West Virginia as in the nation. That was 1936 in West Virginia even more than in the nation as a whole.

The dominant note throughout the year was the recovery of business and industry from the depths of a long and hard depression. The processes that began in 1933 reached their full flower in 1936, although many predicted recovery to an even greater extent in 1937. Be that as it may, the optimism in every line of commercial endeavor as 1936 drew to a close was evidence of the great strides already made.

Although the final records of business and industrial activity had not been assembled at this writing there is no doubt of the story they will tell when finally computed. The coal industry alone presents an impressive figure, indicative of the condition of industry as a whole.

Increase in Coal Production

In the nine months of 1936 up to October first, West Virginia had produced 83,950,493 tons of coal. That is for three-quarters of the year and, in the opinion of experienced coal men, it may be figured as roughly three-quarters of what the total will be when the final report is made. On that basis, the last three months of the year will have accounted for the production of another 27 million tons of coal, and West Virginia's 1936 total will be a record breaking 110 million tons. This, incidentally, may be compared with production of 99,-810,903 tons in 1935 and 98,441,233 tons in 1934.

There was a comparable increase in employment in the mines. In 1934, the average number of persons employed in the coal industry, as reported by the Bureau of Mines, was 106,590. In 1935, the average rose to 111,868. It will be noticed that the increase in production in 1935 over the preceding year was hardly sufficient to account for this considerable rise in employment, and it was attributed to the reduction of hours in the working schedule of the miners. The marked increase in production in 1936 over 1935, however, is held to be responsible for a decided jump in employment and as the year drew to a close the number of persons employed in West Virginia coal mines was estimated as high as 120,000.

Best Business Year Since 1929

Unfortunately, comparable figures are not available on all of West Virginia's varied industries. Most of them, indeed, have been so busy filling orders that an opportunity to take stock of production and employment has scarcely been available. But, it is indicated from reports of the state department of labor and other sources that most of the heavy industries of the state will tell a similar story when the record is compiled.

Chemicals, steel, glass and other important enterprises of the state have shown their best year since 1929. The last estimate of employment in the state's manufacturing plants was 200,000. According to the state department of labor, the first six months of the year alone witnessed an increase of industrial activity sufficient to show that at lenst 40,000 more persons were being

employed than during the preceding year. There were other significant phases of the improvement. Bonuses and wage increases were reported in nearly every line of activity. As a whole, wages were up seven per cent over last year.

From many reliable sources it is estimated that the gain in retail business is even greater than the upward surge in inoustry. Merchants in every city of the state during most of the year have reported sales approaching the 1929 level. Bank debits are uniformly up, while the consensus is that the last months of the year will contribute even more heavily to the gains over preceding years.

Thus the general picture of the business history of 1936 in West Virginia. Doubtless it is what historians will record as of the greatest importance of the year. At any rate it is of vast immediate importance and has been a vital factor in the political fortunes, as well as the private lives, of the people of the state.

Roosevelt Given Record Vote

Politically, the year was almost as important as it was in business and industry. Perhaps in the judgment of later years it will loom as even more important. It marked, for one thing, the even firmer entrenchment of the Democratic party by a smashing victory all down the line on November third. It marked the reelection of all of the state elective officers who were candidates, and the election of Attorney General Homer A. Holt, Democrat, to succeed Governor Kump, whose term expires January 18, 1937. Clarence W. Meadows, of Beckley, was elected Attorney General to succeed Mr. Holt.

As the fateful day of November third approached it became apparent that a momentous thing was about to happen, and did happen. What it meant to West Virginia must be divided into several parts. It meant, first of all, that this state, with forty-five others, was preponderantly in favor of the administration of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. His popular majority in West Virginia was 177.00—a record. It meant, secondly, that Senator Matthew Mansfield Neely and Congressman Robert L. Ramsay, Jennings Randolph, Andrew Edminston, Jr., George W. Johnson, John Kee and Joe L. Smith, who had served during Mr. Roosevelt's first term, would return to Washington as his supporters in 1937.

The election of 1936 was also important to West Virginia by reason of the addition of two amendments to the state constitution. By broad majorities, the voters ratified both an amendment permitting the municipalities to change their charters by popular vote and another subjecting state employees to garnishee action. They had been submitted by the legislature of 1935.

The election meant that the legislature of the state for at least two years would be predominately Democratic in both houses. In the Senate the line-up will be twenty-four Democrats and six Republicans, the same as it was in 1935. In the House there are eighty-two Democrats and twelve Republicans, an addition of ten to the Democratic majority. Similarly, in all but the most traditionally Republican counties, local elections went to the Democrats.

Enactment of Social Security Measures

Although no political event of the year was comparable to the election, there were other happenings of importance in their own right. Two of these were extraordinary sessions of the legislature called by Governor Kump in order that the state might participate in the great social security program of the federal government. The first session was held in mid-June and lasted one week. In that period, enabling legislation setting up a system of old-age pensions in connection with the federal plan was enacted. A new state department was created to administer the law, and A. W. Garnett, who had been Governor Kump's secretary and, before, state pardon attorney, was named its director. Under the law, a board to administer the act in each county was named.

The second session of the legislature was called by the governor to meet on December fourteenth, to enact unemployment insurance legislation. Although it had not concluded its session as this is being written, speedy enactment of the legislation is expected and it was predicted that the record of the first session for brevity would be equalled or bettered.

Changes in Administrative Personnel

For the most party, the administrative arm of the government moved along its charted way quietly and serenely, with few important interruptions. There were some rather momentous changes in administrative personnel, perhaps the most important of them coming in the last month of the year in the state liquor commission. Early in December a new chairman of the commission was appointed. He was George M. Alexander, of Fairmont, who succeeded D. Homer Stephenson, of Kanawha County, in that office. Also appointed to the commission was F. M. Peters, former member of the legislature and former mayor of Bluefield, who succeeded John B. Wilson, of Wheeling. The third member of the commission, A. Spates Brady, who was appointed in May, 1935, remained in office. The nomination of Mr. Alexander was rejected by the Senate at the extraordinary session in December, and a vacancy now exists in the chairmanship of the commission.

Another important administrative change was the appointment of C. P. Nelson as a member of the Board of Control to succeed James A. Chambers. Fred M. Hawkins became Director of Purchases in place of James P. Tierney. These were the biggest changes in personnel in 1936 at the West Virginia Capitol.

Interim Legislative Committees Report

Two committees of the legislature functioned actively during much of the year while the legislature as a whole was inactive. One was the social security committee which studied the problems of social legislation and prepared recommendations for both the pension measure enacted at the first extraordinary session and the unemployment insurance measure which was to be considered at the second session. The other legislative committee was that named to study conditions under which beer is sold in the state and to investigate many complaints made of abuses under the present law.

Reporting early in December, the committee recommended, among other things, that:

- 1. Licensing provisions be revised so as to give the state greater discretion in licensing sellers;
- 2. Sales be prohibited on Sundays and between midnight and 7 A. M. on any day; and,
 - 3. That no sales be made to persons under 21 years of age.

The report is expected to engage the attention of the members of the legislature at the regular session in 1937.

Flood Damage

No record of 1936 in West Virginia would be complete without mention of the unusual weather during the early part of the year. Its effect was felt in nearly every section of the state. As described by one writer, the first three months of the year saw the "coldest winter, driest spring and worst floods" in the history of the state. There was no doubt about the frigidity, and existing records for cold, ice and snow were broken in various parts of the state. The damage to highways was extreme. There was also no doubt about the severity of the floods, especially along Ohio river towns and in the eastern panhandle. Wheeling, Parkersburg and Huntington, with the smaller cities and towns intermediate, suffered from the rampaging Ohio, while other West Virginia communities were damaged as streams left their banks. As a result of the damage in this state, West Virginia is expected to participate in a general flood control program on a nationwide basis.

Improvement in Unemployment Situation

What else happened in 1936? Among the important events affecting this state was the invalidation of the Guffey coal control act by the United States Supreme Court. Relief continued to be a major undertaking, although with increased employment in private industry it was no longer so vast as a year ago.

About 40,000 persons were employed on WPA projects as the year drew to a close. Death removed three figures long familiar to West Virginians. They were Frank Hill, of Marlinton, former legislator and state pardon attorney; Howard S. Holt, publisher of the Grafton Sentinel; and George Laughlin, a former publisher at Wheeling.

And so the year 1936. As in every year, many things happened. But in years to come it is safe to say that the two things that will be remembered from it are the recovery of business and industry, and the election of November third.
