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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Board of Directors Council on Aging, Inc. Ittman, West Virginia

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Council on Aging, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) as of September 30, 2012 and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Council on Aging, Inc. as of September 30, 2012, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated April 16, 2013, on our consideration of Council on Aging, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization and Nature of Operations

Council on Aging, Inc. is a West Virginia nonprofit organization whose mission is to serve senior citizens throughout our area and improving the quality of for our clients.

The Council on Aging, Inc. (The "Council") is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. The Council operates Medicaid Reimbursement In-Home Care Programs and Federal and State Grants primarily with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the State of West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services. Some federal and state grants are passed through to the Council from the Appalachian Area Agency on Aging (the "Agency").

The overall objective of the Title III grant program is to develop a system of coordinated and comprehensive services for older persons – services which will secure and maintain maximum independence and dignity in a home environment for older persons capable of self-care and also remove individual and social barriers to economic and personal independence for older persons.

The objective of the Title IIIB grant program is to provide the elderly with social, outreach, transportation, information and referral services.

Title III C is a nutrition program designed to provide older persons with low cost nutritious meals served in a congregate setting and furnish home delivered meals to the homebound.

Title III D, the Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Services Section of the Older Americans Act, encompasses twelve (12) broad categories of disease prevention and health promotion services.

Title III E, also known as respite, provides information and assistance, and in-home relief to caregivers.

The Division of Public Transit of the West Virginia Department of Transportation provides funding from the State of West Virginia for the Council to provide rural public transportation.

The Council also receives state funds through the Agency in connection with a Health Benefit Information, Counseling and Assistant Grant (SHIP), the purpose of which is to help older individuals understand their rights under the Social Security Act, Medicaid Programs, supplemental social security programs and general insurance policies. This information is provided to seniors by a counselor who has general knowledge of these areas.

The Medicaid Reimbursement In-Home Care Program is a state funded program to allow eligible seniors to receive the assistance necessary to allow them to remain in their homes with minimal outside supervision. These services include housekeeping, personal care, and other related matters.

The Lighthouse program is a state funded program to provide in-home assistance for seniors who do not qualify for other programs.

The FAIR program is a state funded program to provide relief to care givers who care for individuals with Dementia.

(b) Basis of Accounting and Reporting

The Council on Aging, Inc. prepares and maintains their financial statements and accounts on the accrual basis of accounting.

(c) Basis of Presentation

The Council on Aging, Inc. has implemented the financial statement presentation required by the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, it is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. The Council had no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets as of September 30, 2012.

(d) Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

(e) Income Tax Exemption

The Organization is a not-for-profit organization and is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes.

All required federal tax returns for the Organization have been filed up to, and including the tax year ended September 30, 2011. The Organization's federal income tax returns for 2010, 2009, and 2008 remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS").

(f) Donated Goods

Donated noncash assets, such as food items and medical supplies are recorded at their fair value in the period received and used as other revenue with a corresponding expense.

(g) Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers cash to be cash and cash equivalents. Cash on hand and deposits with banking institutions are considered cash while short-term investments with an original maturity of not more than three months are considered cash equivalents.

Investment risk is categorized as follows:

Interest rate risk – The risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment.

Credit risk – The risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations.

Custodial credit risk — The risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty to a transaction, the Organization will not be able to recover the value of investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party.

(h) Recognition of Donor Restrictions

Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is received. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

(i) Compensated Absences

Compensated absences consists of unpaid, accumulated accrued paid time off. The organization owed \$58,898 at September 30, 2012.

(k) Capital Assets

Property and equipment are expensed at the time of the purchase rather than being capitalized and depreciated over its estimated economic life. This is not in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States. Accordingly, no depreciation for these assets has been recorded. The only asset being recorded is a piece of land with an original purchase price of \$54,000. The Organization is currently trying to sell this piece of land.

2. Deposits and Investments

The Organization's deposits are categorized to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the Organization at September 30, 2012. The categories are described as follows:

- Category 1 Insured or collateralized with securities held by the Organization or its agent in the Organization's name.
- Category 2 Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Organization's name.

Category 3 - Uncollateralized.

4. Lease Commitments

The Council rents its primary facility in Itmann, West Virginia from the Pocahontas Land Company for \$1,260 per year. This facility also houses the administrative activities for Council on Aging. It is a standard operating practice in the area for the coal and land holding companies to rent excess facilities to community service organizations at modest lease prices. This lease is on a ten-year lease. The Council leases a second facility in Welch, West Virginia for \$500 per month under a cancelable operating term of one year, a third facility in Charleston, West Virginia for \$1,437 per month under a noncancelable operating term five-years, a fourth facility in Princeton, West Virginia for \$625 per month under a noncancelable operating term five-years and a fifth facility in Oceana, West Virginia for \$400 per month noncancelable operating term of two-years.

5. Advertising Costs

The Organization expenses advertising costs as incurred. These costs amounted to \$34,021 for the year ended September 30, 2012.

6. Pension Plan

Effective January 1, 2008, Council on Aging, Inc. established a 401(k) retirement and savings plan for its employees. Council on Aging, Inc. makes matching contributions of up to 100% of the first 2% of eligible contributions. The Board of Directors also declared \$28,210 in profit sharing for year ended September 30, 2012. Total contributions by the Council on Aging, Inc. to the plan for year ended September 30, 2012 amounted to \$33,759.

7. Related Party Transactions

The Council on Aging, Inc. is related to All Care Home and Community Services, Inc. (the "All Care") through a common Board of Directors. During the year ended September 30, 2012, the Council paid the monthly health insurance premiums, life, eye and dental insurance premiums, and 401(k) employee deferrals, company match and profit share for All Care. All Care Home owes the Council \$15,131 for these remittances.

The Council on Aging has agreed to advance the overhead of All Care because reduced funding had brought them to an unprofitable level. The Council took this action because the services provided to the community by All Care helped fulfill the mission of the Council and referrals from All Care helped support the Council. For year ended September 30, 2012, All Care's estimated associated overhead cost advanced by the Council was approximately \$12,322.

8. Concentration of Risk

Substantially all of the Council on Aging, Inc.'s support and revenues are derived from its Medicaid services and from federal and state grants, the loss of which would have a materially adverse effect on the Council on Aging, Inc. During the year ended September 30, 2012, Medicaid revenues, federal and state grants, and other income accounted for approximately eighty-five percent (85%), thirteen percent (13%) and two percent (2%), respectively, of total support and revenue.

9. Disclosure of Inter-Program Transfers

In order to match appropriate program revenues with program expenses, inter-program entries were recorded to accurately reflect operating results of the programs. For year ending September 30, 2012, the Life program received \$42,593 in revenues for expenses associated with other programs. The inter-program entries to record these matching revenues/expenses per program were as follows: C-2 \$31,585 and Lighthouse \$11,008.

10. Contingencies

Certain of the Council's program are primarily funded through federal and state grants. Federal and state grants received for specific purposes are subject to audit and review by grantor agencies. Such audits could result in requests for reimbursements to grantor agencies for expenditures disallowed under the terms of the grants. The amount, if any, of expenditures, which may ultimately be disallowed by grantor agencies, cannot be determined at this time, although Council management believes such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

11. Subsequent Events

On December 9, 2012, the Council purchased real estate property including 2.85 acres with existing structure for \$300,000. The Council plans to renovate this property for a new Senior Center for Wyoming County.

Management has considered all subsequent events through April 16, 2013, the date the financial statements were made available.

We have audited the financial statements of Council on Aging, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) as of and for the year ended September 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon dated April 16, 2013. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Management of Council on Aging, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. In planning and performing our audit, we considered Council on Aging, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Council on Aging, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Council on Aging, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Council on Aging, Inc.'s financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of Council on Aging, Inc. in a separate letter dated April 16, 2013.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, others within the entity, the Board of Directors, and federal and state awarding agencies and pass through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
