Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Youth Health Service, Inc. is a nonprofit corporation organized under the provision of Code Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization provides health, nutritional, and behavioral mental health services, and child care for area youth. The Organization serves the counties of Randolph, Barbour, Tucker and Pocahontas, West Virginia

These financial statements are prepared to focus on the entity as a whole and to present transactions according to the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, transactions and balances are classified into three categories of net assets: 1) unrestricted net assets which have no donor-imposed restrictions, 2) temporarily restricted net assets, which have donor-imposed restrictions that will expire in the future, and 3) permanently restricted net assets which have donor-imposed restrictions which do not expire.

The expiration of a donor-imposed restriction or a contribution is recognized in the period in which the restrictions expire at which time the related revenue is recognized as unrestricted net assets.

Marketable Securities

Marketable securities are stated at fair value with unrealized gains or losses reflected on the Statement of Activities for each year presented.

Pledges Receivable and Bequests

Pledges and bequests, less an appropriate reserve, are recorded at their estimated fair value. Pledges and bequests that are due in more than one year are recorded at the present value of estimated future cash flows.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost or approximate market value at date of acquisition or by gift. Depreciation is provided for by the straight-line method over the expected useful economic life of the assets which is 7 years for equipment, 5 years for vehicles, and 20 years for building and improvements.

Revenue Recognition

Operation revenues are recognized as revenue is earned.

Gifts and grants are recognized as revenue at the time they are contractually received and are recorded at the fair market value at the date of receipt.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Allowance for Uncollectible Receivables

The Organization makes an annual evaluation of its anticipated losses on uncollectible receivables. Provisions for uncollectible amounts are based on historical collection results applied to current receivables.

Interest Expense

Interest costs are expensed as incurred

Cash Flows

For purposes of reporting cash flows, cash includes cash on hand, amounts due from banks and temporary cash investments. There is no significant difference between interest expense and interest paid as reported on the Statements of Activities.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Youth Health Service, Inc. bills the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Services for services performed under the various programs offered by the Organization. At June 30, 2010 approximately 54% of the accounts receivable balance represented fees charged to the State of West Virginia by the Organization.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, Youth Health Service, Inc. bank deposit were insured by the FDIC

Management Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Such estimates are based on known facts and circumstances. Estimates are revised by management in the period such facts and circumstances change.

Financial Instruments

At June 30, 2010, the Organization's financial instruments include cash, accounts receivable, notes payable, and accounts payable. At June 30, 2010 there were no material differences between the carrying amount and the fair value of these financial instruments

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Charity Care

In its effort to provide quality care services to the communities it serves, Youth Health Service, Inc. provides services to various individuals who are not covered by qualified state or federal programs or private insurance carriers. The Organization records the cost of these services to individuals who cannot pay for these services as charity care, while recognizing an equal amount of revenue.

Charity care as distinguished from bad debt expense is the inability of the service recipient to pay for service which is recognized by Youth Health Service, Inc. at the inception of the service, while bad debt expense is recognized for those individuals who do not pay for services rendered.

Note 2. Program Descriptions

Youth Health Service, Inc. provided the following programs and services for area youth under grant awards during the year ended June 30, 2010:

United Way of Randolph County

The United Way provides local support for seed and matching money for expansion of essential services to outlying areas not otherwise served, i.e., Harmon and Valley Head, West Virginia.

Safe and Drug Free Communities Grant

This program aims to increase the availability of research-based prevention services that will reduce youth aggressiveness and disruptive behaviors and substance abuse. The program provides prevention education to youth, ages 4-8 years and parents of youth ages birth-17 years in Randolph County. These services are especially targeted to reach youth in the outlying areas of the county.

Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration

"Strength Builders" is a quality improvement program of Youth Health Service, Inc. as a National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative Community Treatment and Services Center. The goals of Strength Builders are to improve the mental health status of children and adolescents who have experienced complex trauma and to improve community practices and collaborations for the care of traumatized children and adolescents. Professional training, public education and community collaboration are combined to create an environment that supports and sustains the delivery and use of best practices for trauma-focused treatment and care services

Note 2. Program Descriptions (Continued)

Randolph County Family Resource Network

Grant funds are received from the Randolph County Family Resource Network (FRN) to enhance the substance abuse prevention education programs for high risk youth and parents. These funds are awarded to the Randolph County FRN through a state program funded by SAMITSA entitled "West Virginia Strategic Planning Framework State Incentive Grant" (SPF-SIG). The Randolph County FRN sub-contracts YHS to provide (1) Parenting education to parents of high risk youth and (2) substance abuse prevention education for high school students. These funds compliment the Safe and Drug Free Community program at VHS and allow for expansion of prevention services to Randolph county families

Randolph County Schools Pre-K Collaborative Classroom at YHS

This annual contractual agreement establishes a collaboration between the Randolph County Board of Education and the Youth Health Service, Inc. for Pre-K education of 4 year old children. The classroom is located at YHS, Inc. and follows the school calendar for Pre-K students throughout the county. The Randolph County/YHS Collaborative Preschool classroom provides quality preschool and early care service opportunities regardless of socioeconomic status, individual ability or background. The High/Scope preschool curriculum is utilized. Eligible students are enrolled through the Randolph County Pre-K Enrollment process and are assigned to the classroom through a collaborative planning committee comprised of parent and professional representatives.

Note 3: Internally-Designated Assets

As of June 30, 2010, the Board had designated cash and investments aggregating \$64,553. Of this amount, \$23,810 was cash funds and \$40,743 was investments.

Note 5. Bank Line of Credit

The Organization has a bank line of credit with Citizens National Bank for \$200,000. The line of credit is secured by land, building, and improvements. Amounts drawn on the line of credit are subject to the prime interest rate plus 1%. The interest rate on the line of credit as of June 30, 2010 is 5.25%. The outstanding balance on the line of credit is \$199,662 at June 30, 2010.

Note 7. Investments (Continued)

The Organization has an unrealized loss of \$9,370 at June 30, 2010. The Organization considers this loss to be temporarily impaired, and consequently, does not believe the Organization will sustain any material losses as a result of the current temporary decline in market value. The Organization has the ability to hold these investments for a period of time sufficient to allow for anticipated recovery in value

During the year ended June 30, 2010, the Company adopted the FASB's guidance on "Fair Value Measurements." The FASB has provided guidance for using fair value to measure assets and liabilities, and clarifies the principle that fair value should be based on the assumptions market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability. This guidance applies whenever other standards require or permit assets or liabilities to be measured at fair value but does not expand the use of fair value in any new circumstances. The Company's adoption of this guidance did not have a significant impact on its financial condition or results of operations.

The FASB's guidance on "Fair Market Measurements" establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under this guidance are described below:

Basis of Fair Value Measurement:

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities:
- Level2 Quoted prices in markets that are not active, or inputs that are observable either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability;
- Level 3 Prices or valuation techniques that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable (i.e., supported by little or no market activity).

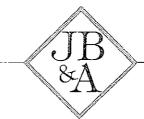
Note 9. Retirement Plan

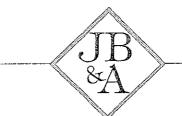

We have audited the financial statements of Youth Health Service, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, and have issued our report thereon dated May 18, 2011. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United State of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Youth Health Service, Inc 's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Youth Health Service, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Youth Health Service, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses 2010-1 that we consider to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Youth Health Services, Inc.'s financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such on opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of Youth Health Services, Inc. in a separate letter dated May 18, 2011.

Youth Health Services, Inc.'s response to the findings identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses. We did not audit Youth Health Services, Inc.'s response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it

Financial Statement Findings

Significant Deficiency

2010-1 Internal Controls

Condition: Credit card was being used without management approval and a charge account was opened without management approval. Some petty cash disbursements were not recorded properly on the GL. One employee's payroll was being calculated for a higher amount than approved by management

Criteria: Internal controls should be in place that provide reasonable assurance that credit card and charge account transactions are approved by management. Internal controls over petty cash and payroll should be in place that provide reasonable assurance that transactions are for approved amounts and recorded propetly.

Cause: Internal controls in place were not being followed or were inadequately disigned

Effect: Because of the failure to approve all credit card transactions \$7,120 in questionable expenditures were made on the credit card and \$2,646 were made on the charge account. There were 7 petty cash checks that were not recorded on the GL and appear to have been for questionable expenditures of \$867 Payroll for one employee was calculated at a higher amount than was approved by management which resulted in \$4,767 in questionable wages.

Recommendation: Internal controls in place should be followed or better designed to provide reasonable assurance that charge accounts are only opened and used with management's approval. Controls also need to be in place to insure that all transactions are recoreded in the GL. All expenditures should be approved by someone other than the person writing checks and the bank accounts should be reconciled by someone other than the person writing checks. Someone without accounting duties should open the mail. Payroll calculations and checks should be reviewed by management on a regular basis to provide assurance that payroll has has been calculated at rates approved by management.

Response: The Organization agrees with the findings and the recommended procedures have been implemented
