# West Virginia Law Enforcement Training



# **Annual Report**

§30-29-3, sub-part (j) of the West Virginia State Code stipulates:

...Upon recommendation of the subcommittee, the governor's committee shall...submit, on or before the thirtieth day of September of each year, to the governor, and upon request to individual members of the Legislature, a report on its activities during the previous year and an accounting of funds paid into and disbursed from the special revenue account establish[ed] pursuant to section four of this article.

In furtherance of this directive, the West Virginia Division of Justice and Community Services (DJCS) is submitting the following information concerning the **3,600** plus individuals who are working as sworn law enforcement officers within the State of West Virginia as certified by the Law Enforcement Professional Standards (LEPS) Subcommittee of the Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency and Correction (GCCDC).

During the 2013 Training Year reporting period of July 10, 2012 through June 30, 2013 the LEPS Subcommittee met eleven (11) times as per its regular annual schedule for monthly meetings, with no meeting held during the month of November. Each meeting was conducted as prescribed by the West Virginia Secretary of State Office guidelines concerning public meetings.

Lieutenant Curt Tilley, West Virginia State Police, Director of the West Virginia State Police's Professional Development Center (PDC), served as the Chair for the LEPS Subcommittee through May of 2013 when he retired. Retired Chief Steve Stephens, representing the West Virginia Chiefs of Police Association on the LEPS Subcommittee, was selected by the members to serve as the Chair at that point. Of the eleven positions on the LEPS Subcommittee there are no vacancies.

## Additional items addressed by the Subcommittee:

- 13. Six (6) grant awards were recommended for approval to the Governor's Committee on Crime, Delinquency and Correction. The following awards were recommended in support of the law enforcement training effort.
  - A. \$125,124 for the operation of the 151st Basic Academy Class.
  - B. \$127,423 for the operation of the 152th Basic Academy Class.
  - C. \$146,253 for the operation of the 153<sup>rd</sup> Basic Academy Class.
  - D. \$129.058 for the operation of the 154th Basic Academy Class.
  - E. \$128,526 for the operation of the 155<sup>th</sup> Basic Academy Class
  - F. \$201,157 for salaries for civilian support staff at the Academy for 2014 Training Year.
- 14. Scheduled and held one make-up training program for eighty (80) officers who did not complete their 2012 Training Year in-service requirements.
- 15. Worked to educate officers and administrators that there would be no more make-up training provided. Advising individuals of the importance of completing required in-service hours during the applicable training cycle or face action/s against their certification as an officer in West Virginia.
- 16. Subcommittee members, representing the Subcommittee and their respective associations and organizations, worked with members of the West Virginia Legislature during the 2013 session concerning items pertaining to officer certification and training within the state and as to legislative rule changes concerning CSR 149-2 that had been proposed for consideration.
- 17. Completed a rules review of Legislative Rules Series 149, Title 2 by identifying proposed changes to rules to best support the training and certification of officers. Subcommittee members addressed need to develop guidelines for instructors to become master level instructors, to be able to be a Train the Trainer level instructor, and made recommendations for revising 149-2-17 addressing the certification reactivation review process. Recognized by members that the medical standards section of the rule will need to be reviewed, but that a medical expert would need to be involved in that. To address those changes, as needed, in later legislative session. Proposed changes put out for public comment. Applicable steps to be completed to have these proposed changes addressed during the 2014 session of the West Virginia Legislature.
- 18. Worked with associations, organizations, training entities and individuals to ensure that West Virginia law enforcement officers received instruction and training in subject areas to allow them to continue to perform the job skills/tasks of a law enforcement officer in this state.
- 19. Through its staff the Subcommittee oversaw the transition of the Officer Training Information System (OTIS) to the Law Enforcement Professional Standards Information System (LEPSIS). LEPSIS is a new electronic data management and tracking system operated by Envisage Technologies in Indiana. System will enhance the ability of the Subcommittee and its staff to track the officer certification, training and qualification standards set forth in the Code and legislative rules.
- 20. Worked with the West Virginia Governor's Highway Safety Office staff as to the required design and implementation of a speed enforcement training program for any certified officer who will be using speed enforcement devices as of January 1, 2013. Approved the program to be presented to currently certified officers that is now also part of the entry level training program.

- 21. To work with the West Virginia State Fire Marshall's Office staff in the development of a training program for the issuance of citations for violations of Code relating to applicable statutes by representatives of that office.
- 22. To work with the members of the West Virginia Legislature and applicable associations as to a study mandated during the 2013 session as to training required for individuals who are members of Sheriff's Reserve programs in this state. Subcommittee had last so assisted in the development and approval of training guidelines in 2003 when the reserve program was approved by statue.
