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ANNUAL REPORT 2012

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OVERVIEW

The West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services, located at Charleston Town Center, is the agency within state government that acts as the lead entity for programs serving older West Virginians. A Commissioner, appointed by the Governor, is the chief administrative officer and oversees all program and fiscal operations (see Organizational Chart, Exhibit A).

MISSION

To be West Virginia's premier advocate for the provision of in-home and community-based services for the state's seniors and others served by our programs. To be a faithful steward of the federal and state monies entrusted to our care for the provision of services throughout West Virginia.

HIGHLIGHTS

VITALS—Hospital Readmission Demonstration Grant

The West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services wrapped up the final year of a three-year demonstration grant aimed at reducing unnecessary hospital readmissions for people with certain chronic medical conditions (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, congestive heart failure and diabetes). The project was called VITALS (Vital Aspects of Life Services). Over the course of the grant, the Bureau received \$680,727 in Federal money from the Administration on Aging to develop a guided care model for follow-up after discharge that was implemented in two pilot hospitals. This guided care model focused on increasing patient involvement in discharge planning, chronic disease and medication self-management, and access to proper nutrition, specialized follow-up care and in-home care services. The Aging and Disability Resource Centers in Martinsburg and Princeton partnered with the County Aging Providers in Berkeley and Raleigh counties to develop a person-centered service coordination plan for VITALS participants for care after discharge that included home-delivered meals, transportation to specialized follow-up care appointments, and in-home care services. The first VITALS participant was admitted in March 2010, and the program has since had 122 participants. Of those enrolled, only 56 completed the full six months of the project. VITALS participants were surveyed upon admission to the program and again 60 days later. VITALS participants who completed the program had higher satisfaction ratings related to their hospital discharge process and the care they received after discharge compared to their previous hospital discharge experiences. Participants also had slightly lower hospital readmission rates (2%) than non-participants with the same chronic health conditions.

West Virginia State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) Website

The West Virginia SHIP website provides an invaluable service to Medicare beneficiaries and their families. During the past twelve months, there have been 6,972 visitors to the website, and its pages have received 28,820 hits.

Consumer Guide

The West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services continued to distribute the 2011-2012 Consumer Guide, Helping Families Make Informed Choices about Care, which had previously been developed in partnership with the West Virginia Health Care Association and AARP. The purpose of the guide is to familiarize seniors and those who provide services to seniors with many of the programs and services available to them. The Consumer Guide covers the continuum of care—from assistance with transportation and meals to in-home care to making the transition to assisted living or nursing facility care. It is available on the Bureau's website, www.wvseniorservices.gov.

Alzheimer's Outreach and Registry Program

The Alzheimer's Outreach and Registry Program (AORP) is a partnership of the Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute; West Virginia Medical Foundation; Alzheimer's Association, West Virginia Chapter; and the West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services. The goals of the partnership are to improve diagnosis and treatment for West Virginians with Alzheimer's disease and to increase support for individuals with Alzheimer's and their caregivers. One component of the project is a two-hour continuing medical education activity, Alzheimer's Disease Basics for West Virginia Physicians, which was developed by the partners in 2009 and continues to be presented to physician groups and other health care providers throughout the state.

In addition to the continuing medical education sessions offered by AORP, members of the partnership had articles published in the May/June 2011 issue of the *West Virginia Medical Journal*, focusing on Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. This special issue is still available on the website of the West Virginia State Medical Association, http://.wvsma.com/Journal.

The Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute and its partners were also charged with creating and maintaining the first ever West Virginia Alzheimer's Disease Registry to collect information on Alzheimer's diagnoses from hospitals and physicians and create reports—without identifying data—that will allow policymakers and researchers to develop more effective means of dealing with the growing number of West Virginians with Alzheimer's disease. The Registry was launched in May 2011. To date, more than 2,500 individuals have been registered, and data continues to be collected.

Title IV Model Approaches Grant

West Virginia Senior Legal Aid, Inc. is in year three of its Title IV Model Approaches grant from the Administration on Aging to create an improved. efficient, and effective civil legal services system for older West Virginians. The project period is July 1, 2010, through June 30, 2013. The total approved budget for the project period July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013, is \$137,150. There are eight objectives to accomplish the project goal. The goals are: 1) Convene an Elderlaw Advisory Group to make our legal services delivery efficient. effective, higher quality, targeted, and broader access. This goal has been accomplished. 2) Do a legal needs assessment and delivery system assessment. This goal will be completed by July 2013. 3) Cost-effectively dispel mythology among seniors. This goal has been accomplished. 4) Efficiently and costeffectively provide quality, relevant legal trainings online. This goal is still in process. 5) Improve our state's system of response to financial exploitation of seniors by people in positions of trust. Our Financial Exploitation Task Force has produced several important successes including the expansion of APS policy to include investigation of reported financial exploitation of vulnerable adults. 6) Reach out to and serve the special needs of LGBT seniors. We have provided training to seniors and professionals, examined our own policies and outreach materials, received national training and continue to work toward building our competence I those specialized areas. 7) Bring WVSLA and LAWV together to

carefully integrate our programs' services to seniors. We have established a task force between both agencies to enhance the ability of both our programs to serve more seniors and serve them better. 8) Enhance pro bono referral especially to our target populations. We have worked cooperatively with the pro bono referral staff at LAWV to increase the number of senior cases we refer pro bono to private attorneys.

H.B. 4062 Interpretative Rule In-Home Care Worker Registry

The Registry will provide the public a list of in-home care workers, along with their qualifications, who voluntarily agree to be included and who have completed a criminal background check. The Registry is maintained by the Bureau.

Other Highlights

Advance Care Planning

The Bureau offers three publications free of charge to assist with advance care planning decisions and care: Advance Directives for Health Care Decision Making in West Virginia, Five Wishes, and End-of Life: Helping with Comfort and Care. These publications are available upon request from the Bureau. (The publications are further described in the Advance Care Planning Assistance section.)

Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs)

- The Bureau of Senior Services receives \$935,000 in State funding annually to operate the ADRCs.
- There are currently ten ADRC office locations across the state.
- During the last fiscal year, ADRCs had 34,958 contacts and assisted 15,063 individuals with their long-term care needs.
- The ADRCs have a statewide toll-free number 1-866-987-2372.
- The ADRCs have a fully accessible statewide resource directory located at www.wvnavigate.org. This directory is updated regularly and contains resources for every county in the state.

Bureau of Senior Services Website and Facebook Page

- The Bureau's website, www.wvseniorservices.gov, was named the #1 state website by the West Virginia Statewide Internet Group, which recognizes excellence in design, content, and accessibility.
- In addition to general information about aging services in West Virginia, the site includes weekly HIPAA/privacy tips and updates; Hot Topics and upcoming events; information on State of Emergencies, and the Food & Fitness newsletter, created monthly by the Bureau's Nutrition Consultant.
- During the past twelve months, the website had 44,592 visitors, and its pages received 308,331 hits.
- The Bureau launched a Facebook page in March. This page is used to share information and photographs with the public. On average, the page has 350 visitors per week.

Conferences and Coalitions

- Two hundred fifty-nine seniors participated in the 2012 Robert W. Jackson Senior Conference at Cedar Lakes in Ripley.
- The 2012 Silver Haired Legislature assembled in Charleston on December 5–7. At the conclusion of the conference, five position papers were passed for resubmission to the West Virginia Legislature.

Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR)

- In 2012, FAIR provided 228,791 hours of service to 1,764 caregivers and individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. FAIR is a State-funded program available in all 55 counties that was created by the West Virginia Legislature in 2006 and funded through the West Virginia Lottery. It provides up to sixteen hours of respite per week for family caregivers, based on need and availability of hours and staff. Trained workers from each County Senior Center give caregivers a much needed break and, at the same time, offer stimulation and socialization to individuals with dementia. Payment for FAIR is on a sliding fee scale, based on the income of the care recipient.
- The required training for FAIR workers was updated this year. Two staff from each County Senior Center received the new training, so that they can educate their workers before they go into a person's home to provide FAIR services.

Legislative Initiative for the Elderly (LIFE) Programs

- Each county receives State funding to expand and enhance Older Americans Act programs.
- This year, 4,023 individuals received 121,306 trips (transportation services) and 106,060 individuals received 419,595 hours of services, all funded from Lottery and/or LIFE monies.

Lighthouse Program

- Two thousand seven hundred thirty-seven (2,737) seniors were served this past year through the Lighthouse program, receiving just over 590,000 hours of service.
- The Lighthouse Program is available in all 55 counties across the state.
- The average number of Lighthouse clients serviced by each county in any given month was 27.
- The average number of hours of service a Lighthouse client received each month was 32.

National Family Caregiver Support Program

The National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP), considered the most important new provision of the 2000 reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, provides grants to states to fund a range of supports that assist family and informal caregivers to care for their older loved ones at home for as long as possible. The NFCSP services to support family caregivers include information about services, assistance in accessing services, counseling, support groups, caregiver training and respite care. Services are available in all 55 West Virginia counties and vary by county. In 2012,121,000 hours of service were provided to 2,404 families caring for older individuals and persons of any age with dementia. This program also provides support to Grandparents Raising Grandchildren through a grant to Mission West Virginia.

Meals and Nutrition

- In the past year, 47,775 West Virginia seniors received nearly 2.4 million meals, either in their homes (9,741 seniors, 1,402,615 home-delivered meals) or at County Nutrition Sites (38,034 seniors, 988,241 congregate meals).
- Multiple County Senior Centers received nutrition training from the Bureau's Nutrition Consultant. Training consisted of menu planning, meal analysis, and compliance with Older Americans Act Title III guidelines for senior center staff, with the introduction of the 2010 federal dietary guidelines.

Medicaid Programs

- In the last twelve months, 8,088 Personal Care Program members were provided in-home, hands-on, medically necessary services.
- The Medicaid Aged and Disabled Waiver (ADW) Program, which offers the same level of care provided in a nursing facility, served 8,530 members in the past year.
- The Personal Options Program continues to serve more than 900 participants.

WV SHIP Statewide Toll-Free Number

Medicare counselors are located at the Bureau of Senior Services and nine Aging and Disability Resource Centers statewide. These counselors assist clients who call the Bureau's toll-free number (877-987-4463). Over 14,600 calls were received on the toll-free number. WV SHIP has a total of 150 registered counselors statewide, most of whom are local counselors located within the County Aging Programs.

Older Americans Act Programs

- In the past year, 56,265 West Virginians were served through Older Americans Act programs, including nutrition, transportation, and chore and homemaker services.
- 121,002 units of caregiver support services were provided to 2,404 families who care for older loved ones.

Senior Community Service Employment Program

- Enrollees in the program provided 95,415 hours of support to a variety of non-profit organizations.
- Unsubsidized employment was secured for 13 enrollees.

Wellness Programs

 The Bureau partnered with the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health to implement the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act grant, "Communities Putting Prevention to Work." The grant was completed March 2012. The goal of the grant was to reach 500 participants. The State of West Virginia completed this goal with the cooperation of many

- partners, primarily the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health, West Virginia University, and Marshall Center for Rural Health.
- A staff member conducted workshops to provide the evidence-based program "Chronic Disease Self-Management" and "Diabetes Self-Management" as developed by Stanford University. Both six-week workshops were held at the Hansford Senior Center and St. Anthony Catholic Church. A six-week Diabetes Self-Management workshop was held at Dunbar Towers during January and February 2012.
- The evidence-based physical activity program "Tai Chi for Arthritis" was held at the Hansford Senior Center in September and October.

West Virginia Senior Farmer's Market Program

 Working in conjunction with the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, the Bureau coordinated the distribution of Farmer's Market coupons to seniors aged 60 and older. A total of 23,665 voucher booklets were distributed to seniors throughout the state beginning July 1, 2012. The coupons could be exchanged for garden seeds, fruits, vegetables, and other fresh market items.

West Virginia Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program

- The Ombudsman Program conducted 862 monitoring visits in 230 long-term care residential facilities in 2012.
- Ombudsmen investigated 948 complaints made by or on behalf of longterm care residents in 2012. Sixty-six percent (66%) of those complaints were verified. Seventy percent (70%) of the complaints opened were resolved, or partially resolved, to the satisfaction of the resident and/or complainant.
- The ombudsmen worked with resident councils 365 times; participated in 13 community education sessions; conducted 62 trainings for facility staff on the topics of resident rights and abuse and abuse reporting; and provided 1,784 telephone consultations to individuals in the community and facility staff.
- The program operated within a total budget of \$810,721. This was comprised of \$118,529 Federal Older Americans Act, Title VII Chapter 2 funds: \$148,000 Federal Older Americans Act, Title VII Chapter 3 funds; \$170,000 other Federal (Medicaid) funds; \$331,525 State funds; and \$42,667 Local funds.

OLDER AMERICANS ACT PROGRAMS

Overview

The Older Americans Act (OAA) is among the most important contributions of aging legislation ever enacted by Congress; its goal is to provide the framework for the administration of services for Americans age 60 and older, and to provide support to families who care for older individuals. As the West Virginia State Unit on Aging, the Bureau of Senior Services is designated to administer the OAA. As required by the OAA, four Area Agencies on Aging are designated throughout the state (see Exhibit B) to provide short- and long-range planning, act as advocates on behalf of the regions' elderly, and provide monitoring and assistance to the County Aging Providers (Senior Centers—Exhibit C). Funds are allocated by a federally-mandated formula to the Area Agencies on Aging. These funds are then distributed to the state's County Aging Programs. This year, 56,265 West Virginians were served with OAA funding. There is no charge to seniors or their families for OAA services, although contributions are encouraged.

The direct provision of services to seniors is made possible by the efforts of a variety of county-based senior organizations that operate Senior Centers in all 55 counties. Locally constituted boards govern these nonprofit organizations. The mission of the Bureau could not be accomplished without the work of the Area Agencies on Aging and the Local Service Providers.

Older Americans Act Programs

Caregiver Support

Family Caregiver Support Services were provided to 2,404 families who care for older individuals.

Legal Assistance



Legal services are available to West Virginians age 60 and over through a contract with West Virginia Senior Legal Aid, Inc. (WVSLA). WVSLA targets homebound, disabled, rural, minority, LGBT, and low-income seniors statewide. This year, WVSLA served a total of 730 seniors across all 55 counties, providing 2,550 hours of legal assistance, including 206 hours of pro bono case services from private attorneys in

38 cases across 24 counties. WVSLA's client access points include a toll-free number (800-229-5068); their website, www.seniorlegalaid.org; and outreach visits to individual county senior centers. WVSLA delivered substantive elderlaw and issue-spotting trainings and case consultation to legal, aging, and disability advocacy organizations and networks throughout the state, such as the ADRC and SHIP programs. This year WVSLA published the 14th edition of its manual, Legal Questions Frequently Asked by West Virginia Seniors, both in hard copy

and on its website. WVSLA continued to publish occasional news posts on its Aging and Law in West Virginia blog at www.seniorlegalaid.blogspot.com, and published four issues of the quarterly West Virginia Aging and Law News in collaboration with the West Virginia Regional Long-term Care Ombudsman program. WVSLA provided legal information to more than 600 workshop participants this year on topics including the new durable power of attorney law, mental capacity and legal decision-making, special legal issues of LGBT seniors, legal issues for seniors related to Marcellus gas extraction, dealing with debt, preserving autonomy through proactive legal planning, myths and realities of Medicaid estate recovery, grandparent rights in West Virginia, and avoiding financial exploitation.

Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program



The Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program advocates for residents of long-term care facilities—nursing homes, assisted living residences, legally unlicensed homes, and similar care homes. The mission of the ombudsman program is to enhance the quality of life, improve the level of care, protect the individual rights, and promote the dignity of each long-term care resident. This often involves educating residents, their families and/or legal representatives, and

providers about residents' rights. Long-term ombudsman also investigate complaints made by, or on behalf of, long-term care residents and conduct routine unannounced monitoring in long-term care facilities.

The Long-term Care Ombudsman Program is a statewide program compromised of the State Long-term Care Ombudsman and the Regional Long-term Care Ombudsman Program. In 2012, the Regional Program had nine multi-county regions, each containing a paid regional ombudsman and, in some instances, a volunteer. 2012 Regional Program staff also included the regional program director/volunteer coordinator and an attorney.

Nutrition

Congregate meals are served in Senior Centers and their satellite sites to seniors who are able to leave their homes. These meals meet federally-mandated nutrition requirements, and the centers offer an opportunity for seniors to socialize. Home-delivered meals, which also meet nutrition requirements, are delivered directly to homebound seniors. This year, West Virginia's aging network served approximately 2.4 million meals to 47,775 seniors. 988,241 of these meals were congregate, and 1,402,615 were home-delivered. The average collected for Home Delivered meals was \$.65 and for Congregate \$1.43.

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)



The SCSEP is a training program that provides older West Virginians with the needed skills to obtain employment. Targeting those age 55 and older who live at or below 125% of poverty, the SCSEP places seniors at nonprofit organizations for up to 48 months, where they acquire on-the-job skills that will enable them to find gainful employment. The Bureau administers the SCSEP

via a contract with the U.S. Department of Labor. In turn, the Bureau contracts with Preston County Senior Citizens, which works directly with seniors in thirteen counties across the state. Remaining counties participate in the SCSEP through either the National Council on Aging or Experience Works.

During the past year, Preston County Senior Citizens provided support to 159 people, with 13 achieving unsubsidized employment. During enrollees' on-the-job training, they provided 63,621 hours to general community service groups, with an additional 31,794 hours to senior specific groups. The Federal funds expenditure for FY2012 was \$1,003,492 and non-Federal funds were \$113,503. There were 103 authorized positions with 42 host agencies in thirteen counties.

Supportive Services

Local aging service providers (County Senior Centers) offer a variety of supportive services, including transportation for seniors to senior centers, grocery stores, doctors, and pharmacies. Other services may include health screenings, exercise programs, and information and referral. For seniors who are homebound, the providers offer chore and housekeeping services, assistance with shopping, and telephoning/visiting assurance programs.

OTHER PROGRAMS AND GRANTS

West Virginia Aging and Disability Resource Centers



West Virginia's Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs) are "one-stop shops" where people can turn to access reliable and objective information regarding long-term care services and support options available across the state. Consumers receive a comprehensive needs assessment that helps determine which services best suit their individual long-term care needs. ADRCs also assist consumers in applying for long-term care services

and benefits. In FY2012, ADRCs had close to 35,000 contacts and assisted more than 15,000 unduplicated individuals with their long-term care needs. Currently, there are ten ADRCs operated by the state's four Area Agencies on Aging. ADRCs are state funded through the Bureau of Senior Services. The ADRCs have a statewide toll-free number (866-987-2372) and a website that contains a comprehensive resource directory searchable by topic or county (www.wvnavigate.org). See Exhibit D for a map of ADRCs, Exhibit E for FY2012 budgets by site, Exhibit F for FY2012 unduplicated clients by site, and Exhibit G for FY2012 contacts by site.

Advance Care Planning Assistance

To make informed decisions about end-of-life care, individuals and families should have access to and understand information relevant to those decisions. Patients should be encouraged to reflect on their own personal goals, values, and beliefs as they make care decisions, and they should discuss those decisions with family members. The Bureau continues to make



the following information available free of charge to all who request it to assist with advance care planning and end-of-life decision-making and care:

- Advance Directives for Health Care Decision-Making in West Virginia, which answers questions about end-of-life care decisions and contains the advance directives recognized by West Virginia law to implement those decisions Medical Power of Attorney, Living Will, and the Combined Medical Power of Attorney/Living Will. This publication is also available for download on the West Virginia Center for End-of-Life Care website, www.wvendoflife.org.
- Five Wishes, a product of Aging with Dignity, is a living will that allows individuals to determine how they would wish to be treated if they were seriously ill, including choices related to spiritual, personal, and emotional needs, as well as medical wishes. It is valid under the law in 42 states, including West Virginia.
 End-of-Life: Helping with Comfort and Care, from the National Institute on Aging, covers issues and decisions that a caregiver might face when a loved one is near the end of life. This booklet does not replace specific advice from a doctor, but it can help make sense of what is happening, give the family a framework for making care decisions, and help to ensure that end-of-life treatment and care are consistent with a loved one's wishes.

Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR)



The dictionary defines respite as a brief interval of rest, a break or breathing space. That is what the Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR) Program is for family caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. FAIR is a State-funded program available in all 55 counties, which was created by the West Virginia Legislature in 2006

and funded through the West Virginia Lottery. It provides up to sixteen hours of respite per week, based on caregiver need and availability of hours and staff. Trained workers from each County Senior Center give caregivers a much needed break and, at the same time, offer stimulation and socialization to individuals with dementia. The required training for direct care workers was updated this year and representatives from each county senior center received the training, so that they can provide it to their direct care workers before they begin working in the program.

Payment for FAIR is on a sliding fee scale, based on the income of the care recipient. In 2012, FAIR provided 228,791 hours of service to 1,764 caregivers and persons with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. Onsite monitoring of FAIR is ongoing to ensure that the program is effectively serving as many families as possible statewide and also adhering to program guidelines. The fees collected for services averaged \$1.07 for unit of service and is used to provide additional services.

Legislative Initiative for the Elderly (LIFE)

LIFE is funded by the State Legislature through lottery funds. Services delivered with these funds are modeled after those provided by the Older Americans Act, with each county aging service provider receiving funds to be used to expand and enhance those services. This year, 110,083 individuals received transportation or other services through LIFE funds.

Lighthouse Program



The Lighthouse Program is a personal care service designed to assist seniors who have functional needs in their homes and do not qualify for any Medicaid in-home care programs. Services are provided by a trained caregiver who is employed by the county aging provider. This unique program is funded by the state of West Virginia, and clients pay for services based upon their monthly income. A client can receive up to 60 hours of service each month, including personal care, nutrition, help with mobility, and environmental tasks. To participate in the program, an

individual must be at least 60 years old and meet the functional eligibility criteria established by the Bureau, as determined by the aging provider's registered nurse. In this fourth year of the Lighthouse Program, over 2,700 seniors received

over 590,000 hours of service. Fees collected for services averaged \$1.07 per hour of services. The fees are used to provide additional services.

Medicaid Aged & Disabled Waiver (ADW) Program

The Bureau of Senior Services conducts the day-to-day operational administration and monitoring of the Medicaid ADW Program, which is available in all 55 counties and provides in-home health care for eligible members. The program served 8,530 members in FY 2012. To be eligible for the ADW, individuals must be eighteen years of age or older and residents of West Virginia, they must require the same level of care provided in a nursing facility as determined by a comprehensive medical assessment, and their services cannot exceed the average cost of nursing home care. ADW members can choose to receive their services—case management or personal assistance/homemaker services (which includes transportation and RN assessments)—from an agency, or they can choose Personal Options (see below). Registered nurses at the Bureau provide full-time programmatic monitoring to assure quality services and to meet federal and state regulations.

Medicaid Personal Care

The Medicaid Personal Care Program provides services in the home or in the workplace to members who are certified as requiring these services by a physician. In FY 2012, 8,088 Personal Care members were provided in-home, hands-on, medically necessary activities, such as dressing, personal hygiene, feeding, assistance with self-administration of medications, and meal preparation. Other services include environmental support and assistance outside the home to help obtain/retain competitive employment of at least 40 hours per month. Registered nurses at the Bureau provide full-time programmatic monitoring to assure quality services and to meet federal and state regulations.

Medicaid Personal Options

Through a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation that began in 2004, the Bureau, in cooperation with the West Virginia Bureau for Medical Services, developed a consumer-directed "Cash & Counseling" component in the Medicaid Aged and Disabled Waiver Program, offering participants an additional service model to choose from (i.e., participants can choose to be served by a traditional service provider agency, or they can elect to hire their workers directly). Enrollment for the program, entitled Personal Options, began in May 2007. To date, 941 ADW members chose to self-direct their services through this program option.

Wellness Programs

 The Bureau collaborates with the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health in their health promotion activities, such as the Mountains of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Coalition, the West Virginia Asthma Coalition, the Osteoporosis/Arthritis Advisory Council, the Cardiovascular Health Program, and the Dental Coalition. Bureau staff meets quarterly with these health promotion programs to provide

- information on mini-grants and education materials as a referral source to our county aging providers.
- The Bureau has participated in the planning of the West Virginia State Health Education Council (SHEC) annual conference, which was held at the Bridgeport Conference Center, June 2012.
- Staff attended the annual West Virginia Senior Olympic Games held in Keyser, West Virginia. Bureau staff assisted with the Olympic activities and participated as judges in the bake off and talent competition.
- Staff participated in the development of the West Virginia State Physical Activity Plan which was launched January, 2012 by Governor Earl Ray Tomblin.
- The Bureau has participated with West Virginia on the Move (WVOM), a non-profit organization to promote physical activity in West Virginia. The WVOM Board meets every other month. The Bureau Wellness Coordinator is Chair of the WVOM Board.
- The Bureau has participated with West Virginia State University to plan and develop the West Virginia Geri Olympics annual competition held at the South Charleston Community Center, April 2012.
- The Bureau Wellness Coordinator participated on the planning and development committee of the Summer Institute on Aging to develop a curriculum for a two year geriatrics certificate to be provided by West Virginia University in January 2013.
- The Bureau's Wellness Coordinator participates on the West Virginia Arthritis Foundation Regional Advisory Council which meets quarterly in Charleston, West Virginia to advise the Council of upcoming events for older adults.

West Virginia State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) (www.wvship.org)



West Virginia SHIP is administered by the Bureau through a grant from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services and serves West Virginians receiving Medicare. The program provides assistance to beneficiaries by providing one-on-one in-person counseling and via telephone. SHIP also provides educational group presentations and uses media resources for

outreach. Information is provided to beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers on a variety of Medicare topics, including assistance with prescription medications, preventative services, Medigap policies, and Medicare Savings Programs. The SHIP statewide toll-free number (877-987-4463) is answered by trained counselors located within the Aging and Disability Resource Centers throughout the state. Additionally, counselors are located in most County Aging Centers and at the Bureau of Senior Services. SHIP counselors also provide assistance in applying for programs to help with Medicare premiums and copays. In the past year, SHIP has served 23,965 Medicare beneficiaries and has provided over 1,837 public media events statewide.

Thirty-First Silver Haired Legislature

The 31st session of the West Virginia Silver Haired Legislature convened on December 5, 2012, at the Ramada Inn Charleston Downtown. This year's interim session included expert testimony and reviewing position papers from 2011 that were not made into law, to resubmit to the West Virginia Legislature for their upcoming session. These five position papers were adopted for resubmission:

- P.P. 1311 Create an Intermediate Court of Appeals for West Virginia
- P.P. 2211 Increase Produce Vouchers to Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)
- P.P. 2411 Improvement of Educational Qualifications for Magistrate Judges
- P.P. 4311 Amending WV Code 11-21 To Create a Tax Credit for Individuals and Businesses for Hiring Veterans Who Have Served Honorably in the United States Military
- P.P. 4411 Financial Elder Abuse

FUNDING

Financial Sources

The Bureau receives funding from five sources under the agency's budget:

- Lottery appropriations amounted to \$64.8 million, of which \$40.5 million was transferred to the Department of Health and Human Resources to match Medicaid funding for services to seniors;
- License fee appropriations from casino license fees in the amount of \$9.5 million;
- Federal Appropriations in the amount of \$14.5 million; and
- Special Revenue allotments totaling \$1.8 million.

Exhibits H and I illustrate the Bureau's actual fiscal year 2012 expenditures by program and funding source. Also included in these figures is funding re-appropriated from prior fiscal years. Exhibit J lists the Bureau's grants/detailed expenditures for FY2012.

Senior Centers

In fiscal year 2012, \$2.47 million in Lottery funds were appropriated for Senior Centers and their programs. There were 113 grants designated by the legislature. Those funds not used for senior center repair and renovation were used to support senior center operations and programs, such as family caregiver support, congregate and home-delivered meals, transportation, in-home care, prescription assistance, and senior center operations.






AGING & DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTERS FY2012 BUDGETS BY SITE






