

OVERVIEW

The West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services is the designated state agency that acts as the lead entity for programs serving older West Virginians. The Bureau is located in Charleston, West Virginia, on the third floor of the Charleston Town Center Mall. Commissioner Robert E. Roswall was appointed by Governor Earl Ray Tomblin, and is the chief administrative officer and oversees all program and fiscal operations (see Organizational Chart, Exhibit A).

MISSION

To be West Virginia's premier advocate for the provision of in-home and community-based services for the state's seniors and others served by our programs.
To be a faithful steward of the federal and state monies entrusted to our care for the provision of services throughout West Virginia.

HIGHLIGHTS

West Virginia State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) Website

The West Virginia SHIP website provides an invaluable service to Medicare beneficiaries and their families. During State FY2014, there were 10,774 visitors to the website, and its pages have received 57,220 hits. These numbers reflect an increase of 1,999 visitors (22.8% increase) and 24,080 hits (72.7% increase) over the previous year.

Health Insurance Marketplace

The Bureau participated in the In Person Assister program for the Health Insurance Marketplace for the 2014 and 2015 enrollment periods. This program is administered by the Office of the Insurance Commissioner and overseen by MAXIMUS. There are In Person Assisters located at the Bureau of Senior Services, two Area Agencies on Aging, and several County Aging Providers. These assisters are trained to help anyone understand health coverage and assist them in enrolling into coverage through www.healthcare.gov or WV Medicaid if they qualify.

There were over 1,700 client interactions and over 500 outreach events from January 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014.

Home and Community Based Services; Medicaid Programs

The Bureau of Senior Services contracts with the Bureau for Medical Services for operational oversight, monitoring, and training for the Aged and Disabled Waiver (ADW) Program. The program provides home and community-based services to West Virginia residents who are eligible to participate in the program as an alternative to long term care and enables an individual to remain at home rather than being admitted to a Long Term Care Facility (LTCF). Members must be at least 18 years of age and choose home and community-based services rather than nursing home placement.

The program is focused on providing services that are person-centered, that promote choice, independence, participant-direction, respect, and dignity and community integration. ADW services include Case Management, Personal Assistant/Homemaker Services, (which includes RN Assessment and transportation) and Participant-Directed Goods and Services. The ADW program has two models, the Traditional (Agency) Model and the Participant-Directed model known as Personal Options for service delivery.

- Members who chose the Traditional Model receive their services from employees of a certified provider agency.
- Members who chose the Personal Options Model are able to hire, supervise and terminate their own employees and are allocated a monthly budget based on their assessed level of need.

The program has 156 providers located throughout the state. The program has served 6,208 members for FY2014. An annual onsite review was conducted by the Bureau of Senior Services Registered Nurse Monitor, who reviewed 721 Traditional Model member records and the Program Manager for Personal Options reviewed 38 member records for compliance with federal and state program regulations.

The Bureau of Senior Services contracted with WV Interactive to develop a webbased system for providers to submit documented evidence to the Bureau every 12 months to ensure continuing compliance with all required Certification regulations including all required staff training, licensure, and Criminal Investigation Background checks. An appropriate official of the provider agency (e.g., Executive Director or Board Chair) must attest to the information submitted for review.

Personal Care Services is a State program to assist eligible Medicaid members to perform activities that a person ordinarily performs during the course of a day, such as mobility, personal hygiene, bathing, dressing, eating, and skills required for community living, in the member's home, place of employment, or community. There are no age restrictions for members of Personal Care services.

To be medically eligible for Personal Care services, Medicaid members must have three deficits and require hands-on assistance/supervision/cueing in activities of daily living ordered by a physician.

The program has 62 providers located throughout the state who served 9,307 members. An annual onsite review was conducted by the Bureau of Senior Services, Registered Nurse Monitor, who reviewed 843 member records for compliance with Federal and State program regulations.

Alzheimer's Outreach and Registry

The Alzheimer's Outreach and Registry Program (AORP) is a partnership of the Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute; West Virginia Medical Foundation; Alzheimer's Association, West Virginia Chapter; and the West Virginia Bureau of Senior Services. The goals of the partnership are to improve diagnosis and treatment for West Virginians with Alzheimer's disease and to increase support for individuals with Alzheimer's and their caregivers. One component of the project is a two-hour continuing medical education activity, *Alzheimer's Disease Basics for West Virginia Physicians*, which was developed by the partners in 2009 and continues to be presented by them to physician groups and other health care providers throughout the state. The Bureau also participated in a day of Alzheimer's education at the West Virginia Academy of Family Physicians' Annual Scientific Assembly in April.

The Blanchette Rockefeller Neurosciences Institute and its partners were also charged with creating and maintaining the first ever West Virginia Alzheimer's Disease Registry to collect information on Alzheimer's diagnoses from hospitals and physicians and create reports—without identifying data—that will allow policymakers and researchers to develop more effective means of dealing with the growing number of West Virginians with Alzheimer's disease. The Registry was launched in May 2011. Alzheimer's Outreach and Registry Program partners, including the WV Bureau of Senior Services, promote and encourage participation in the registry whenever possible. At the time of this report, 3,544 individuals had been registered, and data continues to be collected.

WV LGBT Legal Advocacy Network

West Virginia Senior Legal Aid, Inc., in partnership with Fairness West Virginia, Mountain State Justice, and members of the West Virginia State Bar, created the WV LGBT Legal Advocacy Network in July 2014. The network's goals include helping lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender West Virginians identify attorneys who can serve their legal needs, helping attorneys find mentors and expertise to help in their LGBT cases, raising awareness about the unique legal issues LGBT citizens face, and developing continuing education opportunities to enhance our state bar's ability to competently serve and support LGBT West Virginians. The network consists of 14 attorneys around the state who are interested and competent to serve the unique legal needs of LGBT West Virginians. The network began work to produce a substantive law conference in 2015 to provide continuing legal education to attorneys on LGBT legal issues and grow the network.

H.B. 4062 Interpretative Rule In-Home Care Worker Registry

The Registry (www.inhomecare.wv.gov) will provide the public a list of in-home care workers, along with their qualifications, who voluntarily agree to be included and who have completed a criminal background check and meet the other requirements of the Registry. Phase I is complete and has accurate state Medicaid providers and staff in the Registry. Phase II, due for activation in February 2015, is for independent providers and agencies who are not providers of state-funded Medicaid services. The Registry is maintained by the Bureau. Statewide Listening Tours

The Bureau conducted statewide listening tours during the months of September through December. This series of meetings was held to listen to the needs and comments of seniors and family/caregivers. The information gathered will be used to gain a deeper understanding of the current and future needs of the state's growing senior segment and the demands on family and caregivers in support. In addition, comments received will assist the Bureau in assessing usage of programs and services and provide information to assist in the review of policies pertaining to state and federal funding. The tours were held in Huntington, Charleston, Clarksburg, Beckley, Wheeling, Parkersburg, Martinsburg, Princeton, Logan, Mullens, and Spencer.

"The Future of Aging Services in West Virginia" – Online Survey for Seniors In December, as part of the ongoing statewide listening tours, the Bureau created a short survey to gather comments on program usage and services for seniors and family/caregivers. Responses and comments will assist the Bureau in the review of policies pertaining to state and federal funding in support of the current and future needs of the state's growing senior population. A report will be produced in State Program Year 2015.

Other Highlights

Advance Care Planning

The Bureau offers three publications free of charge to assist with advance care planning decisions and care: Advance Directives for Health Care Decision Making in West Virginia, Five Wishes, and End-of Life: Helping with Comfort and Care. These publications are available upon request from the Bureau. (The publications are further described in the Advance Care Planning Assistance section of this report.)

Aging and Disability Resource Network (ADRN)

- The Bureau of Senior Services receives \$864,875 in State funding annually to operate the ADRN.
- During the last fiscal year, the ADRN had 19,860 total contacts and assisted 10,252 individuals with their long-term care needs.
- The ADRN has a statewide toll-free number, 1-866-987-2372.
- The ADRN has a fully accessible, statewide resource directory located at www.wvnavigate.org. This directory is updated regularly and contains resources for every county in the state.

Bureau of Senior Services Website and Facebook Pages

- The Bureau's website, www.wvseniorservices.gov, was named the #1 state website by the West Virginia Statewide Internet Group, which recognizes excellence in design, content, and accessibility.
- In addition to general information about aging services in West Virginia, the site includes weekly HIPAA/privacy tips and updates; news of note; upcoming events; information on State of Emergencies; the *Nutrition & Fitness* newsletter, created monthly by the Bureau's Nutrition Consultant.
- During the past twelve months, the website had 62,218 visitors, and its pages received 431,787 hits. The number of visitors increased by 12,791 (25.9%) over last year, and the number of hits increased by 176,430 (69.1%).
- The Bureau's Facebook page, launched in March 2012, is used to share information and photographs with the public. On average, the page has 500 visitors per week. Between July and December, with increased marketing, the number of "Likes" increased from 117 to 1,482.
- The Bureau launched a Silver Haired Legislature (SHL) Facebook page in October 2012. The page is used to share photographs, SHL Position Papers, and information regarding the SHL with members and the public. The page averages 150 visitors per week. The page is updated by SHL members and approved by the Bureau for publishing.

Conferences and Coalitions

- Two hundred fifty seniors participated in the 2014 Robert W. Jackson Senior Conference at Cedar Lakes in Ripley.
- The 33rd session of the West Virginia Silver Haired Legislature convened on November 19–20, 2014, at the Holiday Inn & Suites, South Charleston. At the conclusion of the conference, 19 position papers were passed for submission to the West Virginia Legislature. (See Exhibit B.)

Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR)

• In 2014, the FAIR Program provided 230,210 hours of service to 835 families, 1,670 caregivers and individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder.



- FAIR is a State-funded program available in all 55 counties. It was created by the West Virginia Legislature in 2006 and is funded through the West Virginia Lottery. It provides up to sixteen hours of respite per week for family caregivers, based on need and availability of hours and staff.
- Trained workers from each county senior center give caregivers a much needed break and, at the same time, offer stimulation and socialization to individuals with dementia.
- Dementia care training for FAIR is provided by county senior center staff, who must take the training themselves before providing it to their workers.
- Payment for FAIR is on a sliding fee scale, based on the income of the care recipient. A minimum \$1.00 contribution was required per hour of service for both FAIR and Lighthouse. Contributions collected in the Lottery programs (Lighthouse and FAIR) in Program Year 2014 totaled \$857,509. Contributions are used to provide additional hours of service in these two programs in the county where they are collected. In fiscal year 2014, more than 12,900 hours of FAIR services were provided through sliding fee income.
- The average hours of service per month per client in 2014 was 42 hours.
- The same dementia care training that FAIR workers receive was provided to Adult Protective Service (APS) staff in four locations and was offered twice, in Clarksburg and Charleston, to senior center staff, other health professionals, and family caregivers.
- FY2014 was the first year of a two-year cycle, during which every senior center's FAIR Program will be monitored in person.
- Orientation training for FAIR was provided to eleven new county senior centers' FAIR coordinators during the year.

Golden Mountaineer Card

• The Golden Mountaineer Card discount program has been redesigned. West Virginia seniors who are 60 or older are eligible to enroll in the program. Hundreds of merchants are participating by offering discounts on goods and services throughout the state. Seniors and merchants can enroll in the program online at www.goldenmountaineer.wv.gov. The website is user friendly and seniors can search for participating merchants by name, service type, or county. Links to participating merchants' websites and Facebook pages are also available. This is both a great service to West Virginia seniors and a marketing tool for local businesses. Information can also be obtained by calling the Bureau's toll-free number 1-888-968-4462.

Legislative Initiative for the Elderly (LIFE) Programs

- Each county receives State funding to expand and enhance Older Americans Act programs.
- Funds are allocated evenly to all counties. Additional funds are allocated to the original in-home service providers from the Department of Health and Human Resources (old Homemaker program).
- County providers may budget these funds based on the county's priority needs.
- This year:
 - o 7,817 individuals received 414,220 trips (transportation services).
 - 2,649 individuals received 253,915 hours of services in their homes (adult day care, case management, chore, homemaker, personal care, and congregate respite or in home respite).
 - o 459 individuals received 40,727 Ensure home-delivered meals.
 - 9,331 individuals, 184,014 separate times, received 249,782 hours of caregiver counseling/support groups, caregiver training, individual client support, legal assistance (tax and financial related assistance), group client support, or nutrition counseling services all funded from Lottery and/or LIFE monies.
 - In addition 102,000 sessions or contacts were made to 16,707 individuals for information and assistance, nutrition education or outreach services.

Lighthouse Program

- Two thousand five hundred and fifty-one (2,551) seniors were served this past year through the Lighthouse program, receiving just over 602,800 hours of service.
- The Lighthouse program is available in all 55 counties across the state.
- The average number of unduplicated Lighthouse clients in any given month is 1,597. The average number of Lighthouse clients serviced by each county in any given month was 29.
- The average number of hours of service a Lighthouse client received each month was 31.5.
- A minimum \$1.00 contribution is required per hour of service and is used to provide additional services. This year's in-home contributions totaled \$857,509.

National Family Caregiver Support Program

- The National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP), considered the most important new provision of the 2000 reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, provides grants to states to fund a range of support programs that assist family and informal caregivers to care for their older loved ones at home for as long as possible.
- The NFCSP services to support family caregivers include respite care, information about services, assistance in accessing services, counseling/ support groups, and caregiver training. Services are available in all 55 West Virginia counties and vary by county.
- In 2014, 122,570 hours of service were provided to 2,102 families caring for older individuals and persons of any age with dementia.
- The Relatives as Parents Program supports grandparents raising grandchildren, through a grant to Mission West Virginia for counseling, support groups, information and assistance, and caregiver training.

Meals and Nutrition

- In the past year, 29,160 West Virginia seniors received nearly 2.2 million meals, either in their homes (8,618 seniors, 1,323,839 home-delivered meals) or at County Nutrition Sites (20,542 seniors, 867,107 congregate meals).
- Multiple County Aging Programs received nutrition training from the Bureau's Nutrition Consultant. Training consisted of menu planning, meal analysis, and compliance with Older Americans Act Title III guidelines for senior center staff, with the introduction of the 2010 federal dietary guidelines.

WV SHIP Statewide Toll-Free Number

Medicare counselors are located at the Bureau of Senior Services and three Aging and Disability Resource Network offices statewide. These counselors assist clients who call WV SHIP's toll-free number (1-877-987-4463). Over 15,000 calls are received annually on the toll-free number. WV SHIP has a total of 125 registered counselors statewide, most of whom are local counselors located within the County Aging Programs and Area Agencies on Aging. This program is federally administered and was transferred to the Administration for Community Living in July 2014.

Older Americans Act Programs

- In the past year, 40,525 West Virginians were served through Older Americans Act programs, including nutrition, transportation, chore, and homemaker services. Of those served, 20% were age 85+, 32% were ages 75–84, 48% were ages 60–74, and 49% lived alone.
- 112,572 units of caregiver support services were provided to 2,005 families who care for older loved ones.

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)

- The SCSEP is a training program that provides older West Virginians with the needed skills to obtain employment.
- Enrollees in the program provided 90,745 hours of support to a variety of non-profit organizations.
- Unsubsidized employment was secured for 13 enrollees.
- There are 99 slots statewide in 11 counties for employment training.

Wellness Programs

- A staff member conducted workshops at the Dunbar Nutrition Site to provide the evidence-based program "Healthy Steps" and "Take Control with Arthritis."
- The Bureau is providing Master Training of trainers who will conduct wellness workshops and classes.

West Virginia Senior Farmer's Market Program

Working in conjunction with the West Virginia Department of Agriculture, the Bureau coordinated the distribution of Farmer's Market coupons to seniors aged 60 and older. A total of 15,298 voucher booklets (\$30 per booklet, with a total of \$458,940) were distributed to seniors throughout the state beginning July 1, 2014. The coupons could be exchanged for garden seeds, fruits, vegetables, and other fresh market items.

West Virginia Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program

- The Ombudsman Program conducted 769 monitoring visits in 135 longterm care residential facilities in 2014.
- The ombudsmen investigated 869 complaints made by or on behalf of longterm care residents in 2014. Two-thirds (2/3) of those complaints were verified. Seventy-three percent (73%) of the complaints opened were resolved, or partially resolved, to the satisfaction of the resident and/or complainant.
- The ombudsmen worked with resident councils 349 times; participated in 18 community education sessions; conducted 49 trainings for facility staff on the topics of resident rights, abuse and abuse reporting, and dealing with difficult behaviors; and provided 1,804 telephone consultations to individuals in the community and facility staff.
- The program operated within a total budget of \$802,008. This was comprised of \$110,440 Federal Older Americans Act, Title VII Chapter 2 funds: \$121,475 Federal Older Americans Act, Title VII Chapter 3 funds; \$220,000 other Federal (Medicaid) funds; \$307,426 State funds; and \$42,667 Local funds.

OLDER AMERICANS ACT PROGRAMS

Overview

The Older Americans Act (OAA) is among the most important contributions of aging legislation ever enacted by Congress; its goal is to provide the framework for the administration of services for Americans age 60 and older, and to provide support to families who care for older individuals. As the West Virginia State Unit on Aging, the Bureau of Senior Services is designated to administer the OAA. As required by the OAA, four Area Agencies on Aging are designated by the Bureau throughout the state to provide short- and long-range planning, act as advocates on behalf of the regions' elderly, and provide monitoring and assistance to the County Aging Providers. (See Exhibit C – County Aging Providers, and Exhibit D – Area Agencies on Aging.) Funds are allocated by a federally-mandated formula to the Area Agencies on Aging. (See Exhibits E, F, and G.) These funds are then distributed to the state's County Aging Programs. (See Exhibit H.) This year, 40,525 West Virginians were served with OAA funding. There is no charge to seniors or their families for OAA services, although contributions are encouraged.

The direct provision of services to seniors is made possible by the efforts of a variety of county-based senior organizations that operate senior centers in all 55 counties. Locally constituted boards govern these nonprofit organizations. The mission of the Bureau could not be accomplished without the work of the local service providers.

Caregiver Support

Family Caregiver Support Services were provided to 2,102 families who care for older individuals.

Legal Assistance

Legal services are available to West Virginians age 60 and over through a contract with West Virginia Senior Legal Aid, Inc. (WVSLA). WVSLA targets those seniors with the greatest economic and social need including disabled, rural, minority, LGBT, very elderly, and low-income seniors statewide. This year, WVSLA served a total of 690 seniors across all 55 counties, providing 1,297 hours of individual legal assistance, including legal advice, counsel, document review and drafting, and out of court advocacy. WVSLA's client access points include a toll-free number, 1-800-229-5068; their website, www.seniorlegalaid.org; and outreach visits to individual county senior centers and partners. WVSLA delivered substantive elderlaw and issue-spotting trainings and case consultation to legal. aging, and disability advocacy organizations and networks throughout the state. This year, WVSLA published the 16th edition of its manual, Legal Questions Frequently Asked by West Virginia Seniors, both in hard copy and on its website. WVSLA continued to publish occasional news posts on its award-winning Aging and Law in West Virginia blog at www.seniorlegalaid.blogspot.com. WVSLA participated in the WV Coalition Against Domestic Violence's partnership project

focusing on abuse in later life this year, the statewide Financial Exploitation Task Force, and the newly-formed Working Interdisciplinary Networks of Guardianship Stakeholders. WVSLA partnered with the Alzheimer's Association and AARP to present legal workshops as part of day-long programs around the state targeted to caregivers, both family and professional. For the first time, WVSLA offered trainings by Skype and phone and successfully delivered one to a southern WV church group dedicated to senior issues and one to a statewide group of homecare case managers through an insurance company. WVSLA provided legal information to more than 980 workshop participants at these and other events who included seniors, family caregivers, paid caregivers, social workers, attorneys, and law students this year on topics including financial powers of attorney law, mental capacity and legal decision-making and planning for incapacity, special legal issues of LGBT seniors, legal issues for seniors related to Marcellus gas extraction, dealing with debt, preserving autonomy through proactive legal planning, myths and realities of Medicaid estate recovery, grandparent rights in West Virginia, avoiding financial exploitation, and legal issues related to Green/Natural Burial in West Virginia.

Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program

The Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program advocates for residents of long-term care facilities—nursing homes, assisted living residences, legally unlicensed homes, and similar care homes. The mission of the ombudsman program is to enhance the quality of life, improve the level of care, protect the individual rights, and promote the dignity of each long-term care resident. This often involves educating residents, their families and/or legal representatives, and providers about residents' rights. Long-term ombudsmen also investigate complaints made by, or on behalf of, long-term care residents and conduct routine unannounced monitoring in long-term care facilities.

The Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program is a statewide program comprised of the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman and the Regional Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program. In 2014, the Regional Program consisted of nine paid ombudsmen, each covering a multi-county region, three volunteers, and a program director/volunteer coordinator. 2014 also saw the addition of a part-time (3/5 FTE) ombudsman attorney who focuses primarily on issues related to financial exploitation and surrogate decision-making.

Nutrition

Congregate meals are served in senior centers and their satellite sites. These meals meet federally-mandated nutrition requirements, and the centers offer an opportunity for seniors to socialize. Home-delivered meals, which also meet nutrition requirements, are delivered directly to homebound seniors. This year, West Virginia's aging network served approximately 2.2 million meals to 29,160 seniors. 867,107 of these meals were congregate, and 1,323,839 were home-delivered. The average collected for home-delivered meals was \$.66 and for congregate \$1.29. These funds are used to increase or maintain nutrition services.

Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP)



The SCSEP is a training program that provides older West Virginians with the needed skills to obtain employment. Targeting those age 55 and older who live at or below 125% of the federal poverty level, the SCSEP places seniors at nonprofit organizations for up to 48 months, where they acquire on-the-job skills that will enable them to find gainful

employment. The Bureau administers the SCSEP via a contract with the U.S. Department of Labor. In turn, the Bureau contracts with Preston County Senior Citizens, Inc., which works directly with seniors in thirteen counties across the state. Remaining counties participate in the SCSEP through either the National Council on Aging or Experience Works.

During Program Year 2013 (July 1, 2013–June 30, 2014), Preston County Senior Citizens provided support to 156 people, with 13 achieving unsubsidized employment. During enrollees' on-the-job training, they provided 53,966 hours to general community service groups, with an additional 36,799 hours to senior specific groups. The Federal funds expenditure for Program Year 2013 was \$955,570 and non-Federal funds were \$106,410. There were 99 authorized positions with 42 host agencies in 11 counties. The counties are: Boone, Clay, Doddridge, Harrison, Kanawha, Monongalia, Preston, Putnam, Raleigh, Taylor, and Wyoming.

Supportive Services

Local aging service providers (county senior centers) offer a variety of Supportive Services, including transportation for seniors to senior centers, grocery stores, doctors, and pharmacies. Other services may include health screenings, exercise programs, and information and referral. For seniors who are homebound, some providers offer chore and housekeeping services, assistance with shopping, and telephoning/visiting assurance programs. In FY2014, 2,192 seniors received 60,471 hours of Supportive Services.

OTHER PROGRAMS AND GRANTS

West Virginia Aging and Disability Resource Center



West Virginia's Aging and Disability Resource Network (ADRN) locations are "one-stop shops" where people can turn to access reliable and objective information regarding long-term care services and support options available across the state. Consumers receive a comprehensive needs assessment that helps determine which

services best suit their individual long-term care needs. ADRN offices also assist consumers in applying for long-term care services and benefits. In FY2014, the ADRN had close to 20,000 contacts and assisted more than 10,250 unduplicated individuals with their long-term care needs. Currently, there are seven regional ADRN offices operated by the state's four Area Agencies on Aging and one statewide ADRN, operated by the Bureau of Senior Services. The ADRN offices are state funded through the Bureau of Senior Services. The Bureau also receives some federal funding for the ADRN through the Administration for Community Living. The ADRN has a statewide toll-free number, 1-866-987-2372, and a website that contains a comprehensive resource directory searchable by topic or county, www.wvnavigate.org. (See Exhibit I for a map of ADRN locations, Exhibit J for FY2014 budgets by site, Exhibit K for FY2014 unduplicated clients by site, and Exhibit L for FY2014 total contacts by site.)

Advance Care Planning Assistance

For individuals and families to make informed decisions about end-of-life care, they should have access to and understand information that can help them make those decisions. Individuals should be encouraged to reflect on their own personal goals, values, and beliefs as they make care decisions, and they should discuss those decisions with family members. The Bureau continues to make the following information available free of charge to all who request it to assist with advance care planning and end-of-life decision-making and care:

• Advance Directives for Health Care Decision-Making in West Virginia, which answers the most frequently asked questions about end-of-life care decisions and contains advance directives recognized by West Virginia law to implement those decisions – Medical Power of Attorney, Living Will, and the Combined Medical Power of Attorney/Living Will. This publication is also available for download on the West Virginia Center for End-of-Life Care website, www.wvendoflife.org.

• *Five Wishes*, a product of Aging with Dignity, a living will that allows individuals to determine how they would wish to be treated if they were seriously ill, including choices related to spiritual, personal, and emotional needs, as well as medical wishes. It meets the legal requirements for an advance directive in 42 states, including West Virginia.

•*End-of-Life: Helping with Comfort and Care*, from the National Institute on Aging, covers issues and decisions that a caregiver might face when a loved one is near the end of life. This booklet does not replace specific advice from a doctor, but it can help make sense of what is happening, give the family a framework for making care decisions, and help to ensure that end-of-life treatment and care are consistent with a loved one's wishes.

Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR)

The dictionary defines respite as a brief interval of rest, a break or breathing space. That is what the Family Alzheimer's In-Home Respite (FAIR) Program is for family caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. FAIR is a state-funded program available in all 55 counties, which was created by the West Virginia Legislature in 2006 and is funded through the West Virginia Lottery. It provides up to sixteen hours of respite per week, based on caregiver need and availability of hours and staff. Trained workers from each county senior center give caregivers a much needed break and, at the same time, offer stimulation and socialization to individuals with dementia. The required dementia care training for direct care workers was updated in 2012, and representatives from each county senior center received the training, so that they can provide it to their direct care workers before they begin working in the program.

Payment for FAIR is on a sliding fee scale, based on the income of the care recipient. In 2014, FAIR provided 230,210 hours of service to 835 families, which is at least 1,670 persons (individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia and their family caregivers). Monitoring of the FAIR Program is ongoing to ensure that it is effectively serving as many families as possible statewide and also adhering to program guidelines. Fees collected for services averaged \$1.03 for each hour of service. Fees are used to provide additional hours of FAIR and Lighthouse services in the county where they are collected. In fiscal 2014, more than 12,900 hours of FAIR services were provided through sliding fee income.

Legislative Initiative for the Elderly (LIFE)

LIFE is funded by the State Legislature through lottery funds. Services delivered with these funds are modeled after those provided by the Older Americans Act, with each County Aging Service Provider receiving funds to be used to expand and enhance those services. This year, 20,252 individuals received 96,447 separate occurrences of transportation or other services through LIFE funds.

Lighthouse Program

The Lighthouse Program is a personal care service designed to assist seniors who have functional needs in their homes and do not qualify for any Medicaid in-home care programs. Services are provided by a trained caregiver who is employed by the County Aging Provider. This unique program is funded by the state of West Virginia, and clients pay for services based upon their monthly income. A client can receive up to 60 hours of service each month, including personal care, nutrition,

help with mobility, and environmental tasks. To participate in the program, an individual must be at least 60 years old and meet the functional eligibility criteria established by the Bureau, as determined by the aging provider's registered nurse. In this seventh year of the Lighthouse Program, more than 2,550 seniors received over 602,800 hours of service. The fees collected for services averaged \$1.03 for each unit of service and are used to provide additional in-home services in the county.

Medicaid Aged & Disabled Waiver (ADW) Program

The Bureau of Senior Services conducts the day-to-day operational administration and monitoring of the Medicaid ADW Program, which is available in all 55 counties and provides in-home care for eligible members. The program served 6,208 members in State FY2014. To be eligible for the ADW, individuals must be eighteen years of age or older and residents of West Virginia; they must require the same level of care provided in a nursing facility as determined by a comprehensive medical assessment; and their services cannot exceed the average cost of nursing home care. ADW members can choose to receive their services—case management or personal assistance/homemaker services (which includes transportation and RN assessments)—from an agency, or they can choose Personal Options (see below). Registered nurses at the Bureau provide full-time programmatic monitoring to assure quality services that meet federal and state regulations.

Medicaid Personal Care (PC)

The Medicaid Personal Care Program provides services in the home or in the workplace to members who are certified as requiring these services by a physician. In State FY2014, 9,307 Personal Care members were provided assistance with inhome, hands-on, medically necessary activities, such as dressing, personal hygiene, feeding, self-administration of medications, and meal preparation. Other services include environmental support and assistance outside the home to help obtain/retain competitive employment of at least 40 hours per month. Registered nurses at the Bureau provide full-time programmatic monitoring to assure quality services that meet federal and state regulations.

Medicaid Personal Options

Through a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation that began in 2004, the Bureau, in cooperation with the West Virginia Bureau for Medical Services, developed a consumer-directed "Cash & Counseling" component in the Medicaid Aged and Disabled Waiver Program, offering participants an additional service model to choose from (i.e., participants can choose to be served by a traditional service provider agency, or they can elect to hire their workers directly). Enrollment for the program, entitled Personal Options, began in May 2007. In State FY2014, over 1,207 ADW members chose to self-direct their services through this program option.

Wellness Programs

- The Bureau collaborates with the West Virginia Bureau for Public Health in their health promotion activities, such as the Mountains of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Coalition, the West Virginia Asthma Coalition, the Osteoporosis/Arthritis Advisory Council, the Cardiovascular Health Program, and the Dental Coalition. Bureau staff meets quarterly with these health promotion programs to provide information on mini-grants and education materials and as a referral source to our County Aging Providers.
- Bureau staff attended the annual West Virginia Senior Olympic Games held in Keyser, West Virginia. Staff assisted with the Olympic activities and participated as judges in the bake off and talent competition.
- The Bureau has partnered with West Virginia on the Move (WVOM), a nonprofit organization to promote physical activity in West Virginia. The WVOM Board meets every other month.
- The Bureau has collaborated with West Virginia State University to plan and develop the West Virginia Geri Olympics annual competition held at the South Charleston Community Center, April 2014.
- The Bureau Wellness Coordinator participated on the planning and development committee of the Summer Institute on Aging to develop a curriculum for a two year geriatrics certificate that was offered by West Virginia University beginning in January 2013.
- The Bureau's Wellness Coordinator participates on the West Virginia Arthritis Foundation Regional Advisory Council, which meets quarterly in Charleston, West Virginia, to advise the Council of upcoming events for older adults.
- The Bureau has been working with Reconnect McDowell County on issues concerning seniors in McDowell County. Many children in McDowell County are being reared by their grandparents. This places an additional financial burden on the grandparents. The Bureau has partnered with the National Foundation to End Senior Hunger (NFESH) to develop programs for nutrition, gardening, and working on canning and education. The Five Loaves 2 Fishes Food Pantry is also a Bureau partner for growing fresh produce. NFESH is also working with Walmart in McDowell County on a Reeducation Program.

West Virginia State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP)

(www.wvship.org)



West Virginia SHIP is administered by the Bureau through a grant from the Administration for Community Living and serves all West Virginians receiving Medicare. The program provides assistance to beneficiaries by providing one-on-one counseling, in person and via telephone. SHIP also provides educational group presentations and

uses media resources for outreach. Information is provided to beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers on a variety of Medicare topics, including assistance with prescription medications, preventative services, Medigap policies, and Medicare Savings Programs. The SHIP statewide toll-free number, 1-877-987-4463, is

answered by trained counselors located at the Bureau's SHIP Call Center. Additionally, counselors are located in most County Aging Program offices, Area Agencies on Aging, and Aging and Disability Resource Network offices. SHIP counselors also provide assistance in applying for programs to help with Medicare premiums and co-pays. In the past year (October 2013–September 2014), SHIP has served 24,363 Medicare beneficiaries and has provided 1,457 public media events statewide.

SPECIAL EVENTS

Robert W. Jackson Senior Conference

The annual Robert W. Jackson Senior Conference was held May 20–22, 2014, at Cedar Lakes Conference Center in Ripley. Two hundred fifty seniors participated in a variety of workshops and health and recreational activities that reflected the theme, "Safe Today. Healthy Tomorrow." Workshops and activities at this year's conference included:

Thirty-Third Silver Haired Legislature (SHL)

The 33rd session of the West Virginia Silver Haired Legislature convened on November 19–20, 2014, at the Holiday Inn and Suites in South Charleston. Elections were held in June, 2014, followed by a training session in August at Flatwoods. The SHL Committees drafted new position papers that were voted on by the SHL body in November. Of the 24 position papers submitted, 17 were passed and will be presented to the West Virginia Legislative leadership.

FUNDING

Financial Sources

The Bureau receives funding from five sources under the agency's budget:

- Lottery Appropriations amounted to \$54.5 million, of which \$32.3 million was transferred to the Department of Health and Human Resources to match Medicaid funding for services to seniors;
- General Revenue Appropriations totaled \$10.1 million, of which the full amount was also transferred to the Department of Health and Human Resources to match Medicaid funding for services to seniors;
- License Fee Appropriations from casino license fees in the amount of \$10.5 million fund FAIR, Lighthouse, meals, and transportation;
- Federal Appropriations in the amount of \$14.5 million; and
- Special Revenue Appropriations totaling \$1.8 million.

Exhibits M, N, and O illustrate the Bureau's actual fiscal year 2014 expenditures by program and funding source. Also included in these figures is funding reappropriated from prior fiscal years. Exhibit P lists the Bureau's grants/detailed expenditures for FY2014.

Senior Centers

In fiscal year 2014, \$1.14 million in Lottery funds were appropriated for senior centers and their programs. There were 98 grants designated by the legislature. Those funds not used for senior center repair and renovation were used to support senior center operations and programs, such as family caregiver support, congregate and home-delivered meals, transportation, in-home care, and prescription assistance.

COLLABORATIONS & PARTNERSHIPS

Every year, the Bureau of Senior Services works with many other agencies and organizations to advance the work of the Bureau and provide services to seniors and individuals with disabilities to the fullest extent possible. In 2014, the Bureau collaborated or partnered with all of the following:

- AARP Foundation SHIP Director served as an advisory member on their Benefit Enrollment Center Program.
- AARP West Virginia WV SHIP participates in tele-town hall calls with AARP WV during the Medicare Open Enrollment Period to provide educational information regarding Medicare. WV SHIP partners to provide workshops on Medicare Fraud and Abuse. Bureau staff also presented at two AARP Consumer University workshops on caregiving.
- Access and Functional Needs workgroup Bureau staff participated in this workgroup by the Center for Threat Preparedness to assess the current emergency response system for gaps and to enhance, promote and support emergency response systems to reach all people in West Virginia during threats to the public's health and safety.
- Access Health WV SHIP has partnered with Access Health with information about Medicare.
- ACCESSWV (Agencies Connecting Comprehensive Effective Senior Services) – Sponsored by Cabell Huntington Hospital and WV SHIP, provides updates about Medicare to these agencies.
- Administration for Community Living Administering Older Americans Act programs and ADRN (Aging and Disability Resource Network) grants and SHIP grants. Semi-annual reports on ADRN contacts and functions.
- Adult Protective Services (APS) Consultation regarding APS referrals for members on the ADW and PC programs. Dementia care and other training and education provided for APS staff.
- Advanced Patient Advocacy Health Insurance Marketplace Navigator agency, Bureau partners with for outreach events with the Health Insurance Marketplace.
- Aged & Disabled Waiver Quality Council Development, planning and coordination to meet Centers for Medicare and Medicaid requirements regarding performance measures to ensure continued improvement.

- All4One Disability Expo Bureau staff participated in this annual expo that aims at ensuring all individuals receive the information and resources they need and deserve to reach their fullest potential, regardless of age, diagnosis or prognosis.
- Alzheimer's Association, West Virginia Chapter Bureau provides funding for the Alzheimer's Association's 24-hour Helpline and works with them on projects to benefit Alzheimer's families.
- APS Healthcare: Utilization Management contractor through Bureau for Medical Services.

- Bureau for Children and Family Services Working to educate the public on elder abuse, neglect and exploitation. The Bureau has a representative on the West Virginia World Elder Abuse Awareness Day committee.
- Bureau for Medical Services Participate in the monthly contract meetings, ongoing collaboration regarding the Aged and Disabled Waiver, Personal Care Services, and Money Follows the Person.
- Cabell Huntington Hospital–Senior Wise WV SHIP provides updated information on Medicare issues.
- Cabin Creek Health Centers WV SHIP works with Cabin Creek Health Centers to provide information to their clients.
- Camden Clark Hospital Lifetime Partners.
- Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) WV SHIP participation at various national and regional meetings. Consultation during state monitoring of Aged and Disabled Waiver and Personal Care Services, submitting supporting documentation required for Quality Assurance requirements and Performance Measure report.
- Charleston Area Medical Center WV SHIP collaborates with CAMC to assist retiring and part-time employees in their Medicare options and other health insurance options.
- Charleston/Kanawha Housing Authority WV SHIP director visited each of the high rises that are sponsored by the Charleston/Kanawha Housing Authority.

- Coalition Against Domestic Violence The Bureau is a member of the steering committee for the Coalition's grant to develop a Coordinated Community Response to Elder Abuse.
- Community Education Resource Council WV SHIP participates in this monthly work group, which consists of individuals/agencies that are working to increase knowledge of services/providers and to enhance services in West Virginia. Bureau staff presented at one of their monthly meetings.
- Contemporary Youth Arts Company, Charleston Partnered with Dan Kehde, Director, who wrote and directed a one-act play on elder abuse and neglect, utilizing members of the Youth Arts Group.
- Direct Care Workforce Curriculum Work Group Chaired by staff at the Bureau of Senior Services, this group developed a direct care worker curriculum for the state's in-home services programs and worked to develop the statewide registry for direct care workers.
- Faces of Leadership Conference A Bureau staff person presented a workshop at this conference, hosted by the West Virginia Non-Profit Association.
- Federal Emergency Management Agency Ongoing disaster case management training. Staff members participated in ongoing conference calls with FEMA and other emergency management partners.
- Financial Exploitation Task Force Bureau staff serve as members of this task force on how to reduce the financial exploitation of seniors and other vulnerable adults and report identified incidents of potential financial exploitation of members on the Personal Care and Aged and Disabled Waiver programs.
- Greenbrier Valley Medical Center WV SHIP partners with them to provide educational workshops to Medicare beneficiaries in the Lewisburg and Greenbrier Valley area.
- International Association of Administrative Professionals Staff spoke to their members about Bureau services and presented a caregiver workshop.
- Legal Aid of West Virginia Aged and Disabled Waiver program and Personal Care Services member referrals for assistance and interpretation of program policy.
- Make a Plan for Alzheimer's in West Virginia (MAP) Bureau staff was involved with the development of a state plan for Alzheimer's disease.

- Meals on Wheels Association of America (MOWAA) Bureau works with Association for nutritional training to County Aging Providers.
- Medicaid Fraud Control Unit Conducts investigation of referrals of Medicaid fraud.
- Mission West Virginia, Relatives as Parents Program This program receives a grant from the Bureau of Senior Services through Older Americans Act funding.

Bureau staff also serves on the Quality and Housing Committees that are a part of this program.
- National Arthritis Foundation Participate on the quarterly arthritis advisory panel in West Virginia.
- National Association of State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Programs Members share the mission of Long-Term Care Ombudsman Programs, which is to seek resolution of problems and advocate for the rights of residents of long-term care facilities with the goal of enhancing the quality of life and care of residents.
- National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities (NASUAD) Bureau is a member of and shares a common agenda of providing opportunities and supports for older persons to live independent, meaningful, productive, dignified lives and maintain close family and community ties.
- National Foundation to End Senior Hunger Grant to provide training, gardening and food to McDowell County seniors and grandchildren.
- Nursing Home Advisory Council The state Long-Term Care Ombudsman serves as a member of this council.
- Olmstead Council Work with Council to assure the implementation of and compliance with the 1999 United States Supreme Court Olmstead decision upholding the civil rights of people with disabilities to received communitybased services and supports. The state Long-Term Care Ombudsman is a member of this council.

- Public Partnerships, LLC Under contract with BMS, conducts monitoring to ensure compliance with program regulations.
- Raleigh County Elder Abuse Conference Staff presented at this conference.
- Silver Haired Legislature (SHL) Per State Code, the Bureau oversees the SHL, which is a model legislature composed of 134 members, 60 years of age or older, elected by their peers.
- Social Security Administration (SSA) Bureau works with SSA to do workshops related to Medicare at local hospitals, and Bureau receives Medicare updates.


