### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors
Southern Highlands Community
Mental Health Center, Inc.
Princeton, West Virginia

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Southern Highlands Community Mental Health Center, Inc. ("SHCMHC") as of June 30, 2011, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of SHCMHC's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of SHCMHC's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as, evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of SHCMHC as of June 30, 2011, and the changes in its net assets, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated September 29, 2011 on our consideration of SHCMHC's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on SHCMHC's financial statements as a whole. The schedule of non-federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of SHCMHC. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is also not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 2011

### Note 1. Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

### Organization:

Southern Highlands Community Mental Health Center, Inc. ("SHCMHC") legally changed its name from Mercer, McDowell, Wyoming Mental Health Council, Inc. effective April 15, 2011. All other information including the tax identification number and status remains the same. SHCMHC is a not for profit corporation that provides mental health and other related services in the counties of Mercer, McDowell, and Wyoming, West Virginia.

### Basis of financial statement presentation:

SHCMHC is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted based on the existence of absence of donor-imposed restrictions. All net assets of SHCMHC are either unrestricted or temporarily restricted.

### Source of revenue:

SHCMHC receives revenue from federal, state and other grants along with program income from services to clients through Medicaid, Medicare, other third party, and self pay.

### Contractual adjustments and bad debts:

Contractual adjustments and bad debts are recorded by the reserve method. Accordingly, operations include a provision for such write-offs rather than the amount of specific accounts which were written off.

### Cash and cash equivalents:

For the purposes of reporting cash flows, SHCMHC considers all cash and savings accounts to be cash equivalents. Cash is held in banks located in West Virginia and is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

### Property and equipment:

Purchases of property and equipment in excess of \$1,500 and a useful life of greater than one year are capitalized at cost. Property and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the following estimated useful lives:

### Note 1. Organization and Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

### **Estimates**:

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent liabilities and assets, and the reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

### Income taxes:

SHCMHC is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and is not considered a private foundation. SHMHC's federal income tax returns for 2010, 2009, and 2008 are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service, generally for three years after they are filed.

### Subsequent events:

Subsequent events were considered through September 29, 2011, the date the financials were available to be issued.

SHCMHC's investment policies are to maintain a mix of secure fixed income along with other investments which fluctuate in principal and return on investment. With this mix, SHCMHC hopes to obtain a reasonable return with some level of security.

### Basis for determination of overall expected long-term rate of return:

- 1. Assumptions are developed by the Plan's investment consultant for each investment style category as to rate of return, risk, yield, and correlation with other categories that serve as components of the long-term strategy.
- 2. Based upon these assumptions, eligible components are tested over the desired time horizon given the acceptable tolerance for risk as determined by the Plan Sponsor.
- 3. The expected long-term rate of return reflects assumptions as to continued execution of the current strategic asset allocation, modern portfolio theory, and the Plan's investment policy.

### Note 4. Line of Credit

SHCMHC has a line of credit available in the amount of \$600,000 which is drawn on from time to time as the need arises. As of June 30, 2011, there was \$386,272 outstanding on this line of credit. Security for this line of credit is all accounts receivable and contract rights, together with all cash and non-cash proceeds thereof. Interest is charged at BB&T prime + one half percent adjusted daily. The interest rate at June 30, 2011 was 4.00%. This line of credit matures on March 5, 2012.

### Note 5. Lease Commitments

SHCMHC has lease agreements for several items of small office equipment and certain buildings. Total expense for these was \$86,415 for the year ended June 30, 2011. Terms of the leases vary.

### Note 6. Designated and Temporarily Restricted Net Assets / Cash

Temporarily restricted net assets consist of cash which the donor restricted for use in specific areas. Also, as explained in Note 9, the WV Division of Transportation donated 80% of several vehicles. After 80,000 miles per vehicle, they become the property of the SHCMHC.

### Other restricted cash:

SHCMHC manages client's funds. These amounts are recorded as Temporarily restricted cash and Managed accounts in the accompanying statement of financial position and amounted to \$91,387 in year ended June 30, 2011.

### Note 7. Business and Credit Concentration

SHCMHC relies heavily on Medicaid and Waiver. For the year ended June 30, 2011, Medicaid and Waiver together totaled \$7,066,433 (62%) of total unrestricted support and revenue.

Also, SHCMHC relies on funding through the State of West Virginia. For the year ended June 30, 2011, West Virginia state funding totaled \$2,990,996 (26%) of total unrestricted support and revenue.

SHCMHC maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. SHCMHC is very careful to oversee any amount above the federally insured limits and at this time believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

### Note 8. Related Party Transactions

There were no related party transactions.

### Note 9. Donated Services, Materials / Non-Cash Transactions

The Princeton clinic building used by SHCMHC is leased from the WV Department of Health for \$1 with a 40 year term beginning January 1, 1989. Fair rental value of this building is calculated at \$92,556 per year. This amount is included in revenue and expense in the accompanying statement of activities.

### Promises to give:

SHCMHC has received, through the Section 5310 program of the WV Division of Transportation, use of vans whereby SHCMHC, paid 20% of the cost with 80% of the cost born by the State of West Virginia. In the agreement, the vehicles are titled in the names of the State of West Virginia and the SHCMHC.

SHCMHC will receive full ownership of each vehicle after 80,000 miles of use.

The 80% use contributed to SHCMHC is initially recorded as a temporarily restricted promise to give. The promise to give is then amortized as contributed income and contributed expense equally over 60 months, the estimated time to operate the vehicle 80,000 miles. The unamortized cost of the promise to give is included in Other Assets on the Statement of Financial Position. In addition, the amount recorded as contribution income and expense totaled \$17,877 for the year ended June 30.

SHCMHC has a certificate of deposit in the amount of \$30,495 that matures on October 12, 2012. Interest rate is 1.65%. The certificate of deposit is collateral for \$200,000 note payable and is included in Other Assets on the Statement of Financial Position.

### Note 13. Other Postemployment Benefits

### Annual OPEB cost:

SHCMHC's annual OPEB cost (expense) for the plan is calculated based on the annual required contribution of the *employer (ARC)*, an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Statement No. 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and to amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years.

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the healthcare cost trend. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress information following the notes to the financial statements, presents multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of the plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

### Actuarial methods and assumptions:

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

The following table shows the components of SHCMHC's annual OPEB cost for the year, the amount actually contributed to the plans, and changes in the SHCMHCs net OPEB obligations, as well as the assumptions used to calculate the net OPEB obligation for three covered employees and no retired employees.

We have audited the financial statements of Southern Highlands Community Mental Health Center, Inc. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of SHCMHC's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

### Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether SHCMHS's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of SHCMHC in a separate letter dated September 29, 2011.

### NOTES TO SCHEDULE OF EXPENDITURES OF FEDERAL AWARDS Year Ended June 30, 2011

### Note 1. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards (the "Schedule") includes the federal grant activity of SHCMHC under programs of the federal government for the year ended June 30, 2011. ### Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained on *OMB Circular A-122*, *Cost Principles for Non-Profit Organizations*, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement.
